## 46 Arrested At Chicago Festival; Police Actions Rapped

CHICAGO, IL - Forty six persons, most of them Gay, were arrested Sunday evening, August 12, during disturbances at the North Halstead Street Market Days. A number of the persons were arrested after about 400 persons marched on the Town Hall Police Station to protest the first arrests.

Though the initial arrests were not Gay-related, anti-Gay slurs hurled by some of the arresting officers gave the situation Gay overtones.

According to police, officers were called to the area when a large crowd had assembled "shooting" passing motorists with water pistols. At one point the crowd spilled so far out into the street that traffic was limited to one lane.

Bill Mosier, manager of Little Jim's (sister bar to the 307 in Phoenix) and an official of the festival, said he called police after he had heard that a bus driver who had been squirted, radioed police and told them there was a "riot" at Cornelia and Halstead. Mosier said when he called to tell police there was no riot but that the water pistol situation had gotten out of hand, he was informed that police already had been dispatched.

The initial arrests were made by two plain clothes officers driving an unmarked car. They said they made the arrest after beer and ice had been tossed on one of the officers. A number of people complained that the one officer, who many did not recognize as a policeman until they saw his gun dangling from his side, used excessive force when making the arrest. When some of the bystanders complained that the person arrested had done nothing wrong, the officer grabbed them and tossed them into the

unmarked car.

By the time uniformed police began arriving on the scene, the mood of the crowd, which earlier had been playful, turned hostile, particularly after one officer shouted "Let's clear these faggots off the street." Some persons reported they heard other officers use similar anti-Gay slurs against the predominantly Gay crowd. The crowd heavily booed the officers and some tossed beer and fired their water pistols at them after police arrested additional persons.

The situation appeared to be getting under control until the original arresting officer taunted the crowd by smiling and waving at them as he drove off with the persons he arrested to the police station two blocks away.

At this point, a crowd of about 400 persons marched on the police station shouting "Let them go, let them go." For a few minutes police watched the growing crowd from the station's windows, but then a contingent of officers came outside to disperse the crowd. When some of the people refused to leave the area, police began making additional arrests, charging most of them with mob action. Police said some of the people were attempting to break in the back of the station house. Additional police came out of the station and formed a line across the entire street, walking with outstretched hands holding batons. They pushed the crowd back, ordering everyone off the street.

Most of those arrested were not released until around midnight. Many of the people had friends who posted the \$50 bond. Most of those arrested said that once they were taken to the stations, they were treated with great respect.

## Team Finds Sign Of AIDS Germ

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (AP) - University of California virologists have discovered antibodies to a previously unknown retrovirus, thought to be a possible cause of AIDS, in each of 86 AIDS patients they tested. The scientists also found antibodies to the retrovirus in the blood of 30 of 47 clinically healthy homosexual men, or 64 percent.

The results were released last Friday, Aug. 17 and will be published in the University of California at San Francisco's *Science* magazine.

The scientists' findings were the first independent confirmation outside Europe of the findings of a French group that isolated the retrovirus from AIDS patients last year. Levy's group indicate that the virus at one time was present in the body. Unlike normal unknown retrovirus from AIDS patients, viruses, retroviruses are made up of ribonucleic acid (RNA), instead of antibodies to this retrovirus in all deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA), the AIDS patients tested.

## ACLU Sues LAPD

LOS ANGELES, CA - The ACLU of Southern California filed suit charging illegal storage and dissemination of Los Angeles Police Department intelligence information by Western Goals Foundation, a private right-wing organization. The suit alleges a conspiracy between officers of Western Goals and members of the Los Angeles Police Department including Detective Jay Paul.

The 49 plaintiffs bringing suit include a broad spectrum of civil rights organizations (Alliance for Survival, Coalition Against Police Abuse, National Black United Front, National Gay Task Force) and such prominent activists as Joan Baez, Richard Dreyfuss, Mike Farrell, Susan Sarandon, producer Norman Lear, author Studs Terkel, Southern Christian Leadership Conference President Mark Ridley-Thomas, Jackson Browne, Bonnie Raitt and UAW Local 645 President Pete Beltran. Each plaintiff was the subject of files maintained by the Los Angeles Police Department and turned over to Western Goals.

Western Goals was founded in 1979 by the late Congressman Larry P. McDonald with the avowed purpose of combatting what it considers as "communist" or "Anti-American" expressions of political beliefs by collecting and distributing to

"interested individuals and organizations" through a computerized network of information obtained from local law enforcement individuals and agencies.

The Foundation Board of Directors include Representative Jean Ashbrook, Philip Crane and Bob Stump (who is U.S. Representative from Dist. 3 in Arizona), Dr. Edward Teller, Generals Lewis Walt and George Patton, Jr. and Admiral Thomas Moorer.

The suit represents the first litigation linking local law enforcement agencies with the activities of ultra-conservative groups.

It demonstrates that police spying of progressive individuals and groups within Los Angeles was conducted deliberately to further the ideological objectives of the most reactionary sections of the society said ACLU council Mark Rosenbaum.

## DC FEMALE IMPERSONATOR KILLED

WASHINGTON, DC - A Gay man who was one of Washington's top female impersonators was found dead near his apartment from a gunshot wound. According to Washington police, the death has been listed as a homicide.

The performer, whose real name was Clinton Richard Wolton and who went under the stage name of Michele Montgomery, was pronounced dead 2 1/2 hours after being found. Sgt. Hank Daly of the Washington police homicide squad said police can find no motive for the murder.

The 25-year-old Wolton became an immediate hit when he first entered the 1980 Miss Gay America pageant as a novice and won first runner-up in the event. He performed regularly at two Washington Gay bars, The Rogue and Bachelor's Mill.

However, a friend and fellow performer said that a friend's death sent Wolton into a depression and allegedly led to drug usage. Ron Stewart, who performs in costume as Dana Terrell, said that Wolton began using drugs about a year ago. Police say that Wolton was found unconscious near 5th and T Streets, N.W. which is known for heavy drug trafficking.

## TOO LITTLE, TOO LATE

CAMBRIDGE, MA (GCN) - A national magazine of "technology and its implications" has published in its August issue an article condemning the government's lack of initiative in providing funds for AIDS research. Technology Review jumps into AIDS reporting with "Too Little Aids for AIDS" by Judith Randal.

Randal calls onto the carpet Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret Heckler for her department's negligence in responding to the AIDS crisis. Says Randal: "...the mayors of New York, San Francisco, Los Angeles and other cities hardest hit by the AIDS epidemic have learned to their sorrow that they can count on precious little help from Washington - particularly when it comes to paying the enormous medical bills for AIDS patients.

But worse than its reluctance to spend money for AIDS research, says Randal, is the Reagan administration's misleading and dangerous implication that "AIDS has now been converted from a health emergency to a manageable problem." She says that HTLV-3 is an unsubstantiated causal agent; that the AIDS blood test is an unknown quantity; that development of a vaccine is problematic and estimates it to be a 6-8 project; and that treatment is no better now than it was three years ago.

Randal posits that the federal machinery is not equipped to cope with epidemics and health emergencies, and although Congress has passed legislation establishing a mechanism to automatically allocate funds for health emergencies, no money has yet been appropriated to it. As one scientist observed, "AIDS is a tragic problem, but what if it was a much larger problem? We'd really be in trouble then."

#### AIDS INSURANCE INTRODUCED

**DALLAS, TX** - The AIDS Medical Expense Insurance Policy was introduced recently to Texas Gays, according to the president of the Dallas Gay Alliance.

"Dallas residents have the first opportunity to review the program of coverage," said Mike Stewart, the president of the DGA. Stewart said the AIDS Medical Expense Policy became available in Texas recently and includes benefits in addition to any other coverage a person may need at a reasonable cost. He praised the role the Texas Gay community played in helping to get this plan to become a reality.

There was "significant input from the Gay community, including people with AIDS," said Stewart. "I believe it meets an obvious need caused by the current health crisis.

Stewart said 50 cases of AIDS have been reported in Dallas.

## ANTI-GAY SPEAKER RILES GAY PROSTITUTES

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (GCN) - The appearance of an anti-Gay speaker at the "Women's Forum on Prostitute's Rights," held here, threw the Hooker's Convention into an uproar, according to Robert D'Avanzo of New York's Gay Prostitutes' Collective. Fred Cherry, also from New York and an anti-Gay activist, prompted the controversy when he was invited to speak. D'Avanzo says Cherry has conducted a campaign against Gay rights legislation, placing at least one ad in a paper calling on New York's "homosexual" Mayor Ed Koch to crack down on Gays instead of straight clients of prostitutes.

One prostitute said, "What rights does any John have to call for increased arrests of Gays and Gay prostitutes? All this convention is doing for me is giving me a headache."

And D'Avanzo, who said he was too busy bailing people out of jail to go hear a homophobe speak, warned that Margo St. James, a well-known prostitute's rights activist, may have damaged her credibility. "Margo St. James can attend Gay rights demonstrations until she is blue in the face but she will find it difficult to repair the damage she did here."

## ANTI-PORN ORDINANCE VETOED

MINNEAPOLIS, MN (GCN) - For the second time this year, Minneapolis Mayor Donald Fraser, a Democrat, vetoed an ordinance defining pornography as a violation of women's civil rights, according to the *Boston Globe*. The 13-member city council had passed by a 7-6 vote an ordinance similar to the one it passed last December, vetoed by Fraser at the beginning of January. Fraser vetoed the ordinance on the grounds that it is an unconstitutional infringement of the First Amendment rights, but at the same time assailed "the scourge of pornography that is dangerous to women."

About 25 singing and chanting demonstrators - two men among them - disrupted the Council meeting and were subsequently arrested. Three days earlier, a 23-year-old woman poured gasoline on her head and set herself afire to protest the selling of pornography in a downtown bookstore. She is reported to be in stable condition with serious burns.

The Council did give the bill's proponents a minor victory, however. It passed and Fraser signed an updating of the city's existing obscenity ordinance to define "sexually violent" material as obscene. And another provision requires sealed opaque covers on sex magazines sold where minors can see them - to discourage the sale of such material in neighborhood stores. A coalition of feminists and neighborhood activists opposed to adult bookstores and X-rated movie houses had again joined forces to lobby for the bill.

## SPERM SUPREMACY

SONOMA, CA (GCN) - A California judge ruled that a Sonoma County lesbian must grant visitation rights to a Gay man who donated sperm for an at-home artificial insemination. The judge said that although state law provides that sperm donors are not to be considered natural fathers if the sperm is used by a licensed physician in artificial insemination, the law does not extend to procedures done without a doctor, according to *Mom's Apple Pie*, the newsletter of the Lesbian Mothers' Defense Fund.

The lesbian mother was also ordered to inform the donor of all major medical and educational decisions affecting her son. Another lesbian, who had been acting as co-parent to the boy, was also granted visitation privileges, but her rights were ruled to be secondary to those of the sperm donor.

## FERRARO ON GAY ISSUES

JACKSON HEIGHTS, NY (GCN) - Democratic vice presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro addressed about 80 members of the Lesbian and Gay Political Action Club of Queens (LAGPACQ) ten days before Walter Mondale named her as his running mate.

Ferraro told LAGPACQ members, half of whom identified themselves as living in her district, that she supports and will vote for the federal Gay and Lesbian civil rights bill, but will not become a co-sponsor. She blamed the make-up of her district, saying, "My district is just too conservative. I have a responsibility to my constituents and I care about them."

Audience members suggested that her district's demography has changed; that her recent rise to national visibility would offset any backlash from conservative constituents and that her role in the Democratic Party carries with it a leadership role on issues such as Gay rights. But Ferraro rejected all these attempts to persuade her to become a co-sponsor of the federal Gay/ Lesbian bill.

Ferraro said she has "always opposed discrimination" and brought out as an example her 1979 vote against the McDonald amendment, barring legal service funds from being used in cases involving Gay/ Lesbian civil rights. She attributed her 'no' vote on the House bill to legalize private, consensual sexual activity in the District of Columbia to the ordinance's lowering of criminal penalties for rape.

## KISS MAY COST POLICE OFFICER

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (AP) - A policeman may lose his job because he kissed a male friend while in uniform during the city's Gay Freedom Day Parade in June, an investigating officer says.

An internal investigation is underway to determine what punishment should be handed out to Paul Seidler, a 17-year veteran of the San Francisco Police Department who works as a liaison between the force and the city's Gay community. Seidler has been charged with 'conduct unbecoming an officer'.

The charges against Seidler could result in his dismissal, said Sgt. Robert Jones, a police investigator. Jones refused to discuss the investigation.

"It was a little peck on the lips, the sort of thing you would give to a friend at a party," Seidler said of the kiss.

The incident occurred during the parade June 24 as Seidler, while on duty, was watching from the sidewalk. A friend, Walter Mellon, who heads the San Francisco AIDS Foundation, approached Seidler and the two men kissed.

A formal complaint lodged by his superiors alleges that bystanders were bothered by the incident, Seidler said.

"In my 17 years with the force, I can never remember anyone being disciplined for kissing while in uniform," Seidler said. "It puts me and every other Gay and Lesbian officer in the department in the position of having to look over our shoulders all the time," he said. "Heterosexual officers aren't in that position."

## MALDEN PASSES GAY RIGHTS LAW


MALDEN, MASS (GCN) - The Malden City Council has voted 7-2 in favor of an ordinance extending civil rights protections to Gays and lesbians.

Malden, a suburb of Boston with 51,000 residents, joins Amherst as the second city in Massachusetts with such a law. The ordinance establishes a 17-member advisory council to educate local residents and air complaints of civil rights violations.
