Consenting Adult

['CONSENTING ADULTS', Monday, February 4, 8:00 to 10:00 p.m. ABC Television Network (CH 9 Tucson; CH 3 Phoenix. Stars Marlo Thomas, Martin Sheen and Barry Tubb).

It is almost always difficult for parents to understand and accept the fact that their children's ideologies, values, and even lifestyles may differ from their own, whether these differences be expressed in political affiliation, religious conviction or sexual orientation. In any of these situations the parents' fundamental love for their child must sustain them during the process of learning to understand.

"Consenting Adults" is a sensitive and informative exploration of how a son's declaration of homosexuality tests the delicate balance of relationships in a tightly knit family. The ABC Theater presentation airing Monday, February 4 on the ABC Television Network, focuses attention on the feelings of separation and loss experienced by parents and siblings who discover that a family member is not the person they thought he or she was. Marlo Thomas, Martin Sheen and Barry Tubb star in this two-hour drama.

Many families view the news as a



loss - almost a death - of the son or daughter they have known and loved. Collin Murray Parkes, M.D., a leading authority on bereavement, defines the grieving associated with death as a process of realization, of coming to grips with (and accepting) the reality of an external event that was not desired and for which no plans for coping existed. The stages normally associated with the loss and separation, following bereavement, include shock, yearning for the lost object, anger or protest, and denial. The resolution of these stages results in acceptance for the majority of bereaved persons who do recover.

Similarly, parental reactions to the threat of separation and loss triggered by a child's coming out follow a general pattern including shock, denial, guilt, feelings expressed, personal decision-making, and, for some, true acceptance.

Approximately 10% of the adult population is homosexual. One out of four families has a homosexual family member. As a result, the potential exists in those families for the necessity of facing the threat of loss and separation experienced by Ken and Tess Lynd, the parents in the drama.

"Consenting Adult" is based on the novel by Laura Z. Hobson, author of the widely acclaimed book "Gentleman's Agreement". The screenplay is by John



McGreevey does not dwell on homosexuality itself; but rather it examines how the family must come to terms with it. Like many parents, Ken and Tess experience guilt, shame and fear. They feel they have failed to be good parents. Ken attempts to deny that Jeff is a homosexual and refuses to discuss the issue. Family communication is shattered. Jeff is viewed as a stranger and warm family intimacy, so common in the Lynd household, virtually disappears. As the family struggles to gain its equilibrium, the story provides viewers with insights into the social and psychological consequences of serious breakdowns in family communication between parents and their children, regardless of the cause.

The Story: Jeff Lynd (Barry Tubb) is a college sophomore who appears to have the world on a string. He is a college swim star and a pre-med student. Jeff is bright, attractive, athletic and sensitive - the perfect son, the all-American boy. His father, Ken (Martin Sheen) is a successful businessman, recently recovered from a near-fatal stroke. During his illness, Tess, his wife (Marlo Thomas), took over his business and held it together. Now that he has recuperated, she is looking forward to returning to normal married life.

With her daughter, Margie (Talia Balsam), recently married and expecting a child, and Jeff away at college, Tess is looking forward to some time alone with Ken. She's done her job as a wife and mother well, and glows with satisfaction as Ken celebrates his recovery with his family and close friends, including Dr. Waldo (Ben Piazza), the physician he credits with saving his life.

When Jeff reveals his homosexual



feelings to his mother, she is shocked and tries to tell herself it can't be true. Ken takes the news even harder. His sense of personal loss is staggering and he retreats into silence, shutting Jeff, his only son, out of his

Convict In Local Prison Contracts AIDS

TUCSON - A convicted thief who was held in a Tucson prison for eight months has been diagnosed as Arizona's first inmate victim of AIDS - acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

The inmate, a man in his mid-20s, was being treated in the Maricopa Medical Center in Phoenix. His name is being withheld by prison officials.

The special circumstances - with inmates and guards confined in close quarters and possibly exposed to an often fatal communicable disease - tended to "heighten fears," acknowledged Bruce Porter, Pima County Health Department epidemiologist.

The inmate was removed from the state prison in Tucson on Dec. 3 and ultimately diagnosed as having a form of pneumonia that is the most common infection contracted by victims of AIDS.

"There are so many unknown factors with regards to AIDS," said Department of Corrections spokesperson Mike Arra. "We don't know much about it. The (Arizona) Department of Health Services doesn't know. Science doesn't know."

The inmate is the 35th AIDS victim diagnosed in Arizona since the disease appeared in 1981, and the fourth in Pima County. Of the more than 7,000 victims logged nationally, more than 3,300 have died, according to the national Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta. No victim has yet survived for six years.

The inmate was convicted in Maricopa County on three counts of theft, and has served 2 1/4 years of a five year sentence, Arra said.

The inmate has been held in state prisons in Perryville, Tucson, Florence and the Alhambra intake center in Phoenix. He was treated twice at St. Mary's Hospital in Tucson, and by several physicians here on an outpatient basis, according to health officials. "This is a well-traveled man," said Porter.

The inmate was sent to prison on South Wilmot Road here last April. Health officials began to suspect he had contracted AIDS in October, when he was hospitalized at St. Mary's for nine days for mononucleosis.

A blood test indicated AIDS may have been the cause of the infection but the results were not conclusive said Dr. Joseph Scalzo, medical administrator for the Corrections Department. The inmate was kept in isolation at St. Mary's, and the staff and inmates at the prison received what little information state and county health officials could offer about AIDS.

The briefing was aimed at "alleviating fears and misconceptions people have about the disease," Scalzo said. Health officials received numerous inquiries from concerned families of inmates. AIDS is "certainly an infectious disease, but not a highly contagious one," said Porter. AIDS cases are usually not "clustered," he said. "You usually don't see cases that are linked. There have been some notable exceptions, but the odds of seeing a second case" at the Tucson prison are "slim," Porter said.

When a case of AIDS is diagnosed, "There isn't much we can do about it," Scalzo said. The inmate was returned to prison and held in an isolation room near the health facilities in the Santa Rita unit. Over the months, the inmate's symptoms included fever, fatigue, weight loss, night sweats and swollen lymph nodes. The symptoms worsened, and the inmate was taken back to St. Mary's on Dec. 3. Eight days later, he was taken to the infirmary at the Arizona State Prison in Florence, and on Jan. 2 he was taken to the Maricopa Medical Center.

AIDS cannot be positively diagnosed until a victim contracts one of a spectrum of diseases known to prey

upon those with deficient immune systems. The diagnosis was based on the pneumonia infection that indicates AIDS. The inmate is "recovering" from the pneumonia and will be returned to the Florence prison infirmary in a week or two, Scalzo said. He will "probably go on to develop another infection," Porter said. "You don't recover from AIDS."

Health officials said nothing further can be done to protect inmates who contracted the victim. "We just have to wait and see" if additional cases develop, Porter said. A blood test being perfected by the Centers for Disease Control (See separate story this issue) may be used on inmates in a few months, Scalzo said.

Officials are investigating whether the victim indulged in homosexual activity or intravenous drug use with other inmates - two suspected methods of transmitting AIDS. Because such sexual activity is common in prisons, and many inmates have injected drugs, "the risk in prison is high," Porter said.

Some inmates have reported homosexual relations with the victim, but the reports "may be more from fear" than fact, Scalzo said. The other inmates may be so afraid of the disease they are making false reports to receive whatever treatment can be provided, Scalzo said.

"I don't know at this time" how severe the risk has been to the inmates and prison staff, said Lee Dominguez, epidemiologist for the Arizona Department of Health Services. AIDS victims in prisons in other states have been held in isolation or released early from their sentences, Porter said.

Pedophile Pamphleteer To Stand Trial In Texas

AUSTIN, TX (GCH) - David Sonenschein, publisher of "How To Have Sex with Kids", will answer charges of promoting obscenity, a misdemeanor, and for felony counts of promoting sexual performance of children. If convicted of all charges, he faces ten years in prison and fines up to \$5000.

Sonenschein, of Austin, Texas, was arrested on the misdemeanor charge on July 8, 1984 after television reporter Bruce Gordon of KTVU-TV, the local NBC affiliate, signed a complaint with the County Attorney citing "How To Have Sex with Kids" as obscene material. Gordon who had heard of the controversy surrounding the pamphlet in Philadelphia, ordered a copy from Sonenschein under an assumed name. Sonenschein was released on personal recognizance the next day.

He was arrested on the felony charges over the Labor Day weekend, after Robert Woodruff told police that Sonenschein had sent him pictures of children having sex with adults, pictures which had been photocopied from a magazine. Woodruff, who has been sentenced to 30 years for "producing and trading kiddie porn" and having sexual contact with children, had Sonenschein's address in his wallet at the time of his arrest. He also had a copy of "How To Have Sex with Kids" in his apartment.

The charges against Sonenschein were dismissed when the state's attorney failed to appear at the arraignment, but were reinstated after the state presented its case to a grand jury in early October.

The Austin chapter of the ACLU has assigned attorney William Allison to assist Sonenschein's lawyer David Rodriguez. According to Sonenschein, the ACLU initially expressed reluctance to get involved in a "kiddie porn"

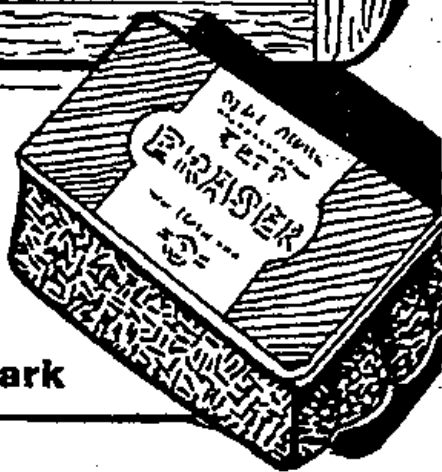

TUCSON - On Saturday, January 26, the Old Pueblo Business & Professional Association (OPBPA) held its first major fundraising event. Dr. Andrew McWhirter and Dr. David Mattison, co-authors of the book "The Male Couple" held a workshop on "Developing and Maintaining Intimacy in Relationships" at the Holiday Inn-Broadway.

A no host cocktail party was held at the Fineline on Friday, Jan. 26 where nearly one hundred people attended to meet the authors. Another cocktail and book-signing party was held prior to the workshop on Saturday.

The Male Couple is based on research performed by McWhirter and Mattison and compiled from interviews with many male couples in the San Diego area where both men hold clinical faculty appointments at the School of Medicine at the University of California at San Diego.

Various stages in the growth of couple relationships are documented for the first time. Anyone who has been

involved in a relationship will be able to identify with the stages and couples in this book.

In the past, McWhirter and Mattison conducted verbal interviews and note taking. Presently, they are conducting video interviews with couples and plan to use these videos not only as a source for future publications but also to use as counseling Gay couples. Several local Gay couples were interviewed during their stay in Tucson.

Bruce Hyland, president of the OPBPA said that this initial fundraiser was very successful and that more are planned in the near future. 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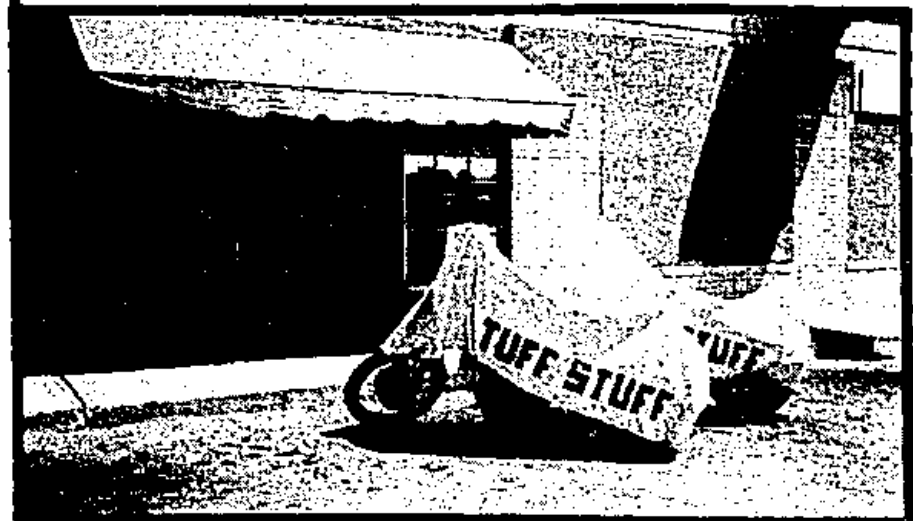
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Gay Fourth Avenue Continues To Expand

trial, but decided to help defend Sonenschein on the obscenity charge after conferring with Rodriguez.

On Dec. 19, Allison asked the judge to dismiss the obscenity complaint on the grounds that "How To Have Sex with Kids" presents the idea of sex between adults and minors, rather than the graphic representation of such sex, and is therefore protected by the First Amendment. The judge rejected Allison's motion to dismiss. Sonenschein says that his attorneys plan to appeal the decision before a federal circuit court judge.

Sonenschein lost his job in the office of the Austin Board of Education after his first arrest. Due to media attention to his case since then, he doubts that he'll be able to find another job in Austin. He quoted attorney Allison as telling him that, right now, he's "the most hated man in Austin."

Sonenschein said, "Whenever I'm on TV, I just stay indoors for a few days."

1984 - ARIZONA LEATHER YEAR

There can be no doubt that 1984 was the year in which Arizona's leather community began to "step out".

Mike Bezio, Mr. Arizona Leatherman '84 was this state's first official candidate to the annual International Mr. Leather Contest in Chicago last May where he made a very commendable showing by placing fourth in this well established and widely publicized event.

Mike also was a candidate in the Rocky Mountain regional Mr. Drummer Contest in June, taking second place in this Denver competition.

Last April the Arizona Leather Fraternity (ALF) was formed as Arizona's first leather only organization and was succeeded in July by the Copperstate Leathermen.

In the 1984 Phoenix Gay Pride Parade, Arizona bore witness to its first ever leather contingent - a fact not lost on the coordinators of the activities nor on the national Gay media.

During August, The Copperstate Leathermen produced the highly successful "Sleazeball I" at Trax, followed in October by "Power Blast" which even made a favorable impression

on the several San Franciscans in attendance, and then, of course, there was the even more recent "Leatherfest I" which was a major step forward for the entire Arizona leather community.

In late October, the first Mr. Tucson Leatherman contest was held and was a community wide event of tremendous compliment to the people and businesses of Tucson.

Then in November, it was the Mr. Arizona Leatherman '85 contest. Held this year in Tucson with a statewide turnout that was refreshing. All ten of the contestants for the finals were "hot, hot" men and the winner, Jay Cunningham of Sun Country Leather Club of Tucson will represent the entire state next May in Chicago. Incidentally, the Copperstate Leathermen served as the official hospitality committee for this event and ever current charter member of the organization made the trip from Phoenix to Tucson to be a part of this historic wedding of rival cities. (Leather is our community bond, not city limits).

On December 31, the Sun Country Leather Club installed their officers and hung their colors in Tramps bar in Tucson.

I also love gentle, sensitive and caring men who take pride in being themselves. Honest, truthful men are also turn ons to me. Above all, I love vulnerability. Only a strong person can be open enough to withstand the onslaught which vulnerability will bring and survive intact.

So, I have retreated from our G.A.Y. (Give Anything But Yourself) society. Maybe some depth will return. There are some truly great people in this town. They all seem to have lovers and dedicated relationships. I salute you. Someday, my prince will come. But, until then, there will be no room for diluting my dream and settling for less than I deserve. I hope you all feel the same way.

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HM REVIEW

THE TIMES OF HARVEY MILK. Directed by Robert Epstein and Richard Schmiechen. Narrated by Harvey Fierstein. At The New Loft.

In what had to be one of the best kept of secrets, "The Times of Harvey Milk" opened for a five day (one performance a day) stint at the New Loft. No advance publicity. Just a small ad in the Star and Citizen proclaimed the showing of this documentary of one of the Gay heroes of this city. This reporter rushed to see the film and found it to be a fast-paced, well edited, factual portrayal of the short political life of openly Gay San Francisco Supervisor Harvey Milk. Having lived through this period and written in depth concerning Milk's election and subsequent assassination, the documentary held a particular interest. Because of the exceptionally short run and the minimal local publicity we are certain that very, very few of the Gay community got the opportunity to view the film. Therefore, we are presenting herewith an in-depth review of this enthralling film as reported by Michael Bronski of Gay Community News.

"The Times of Harvey Milk" begins with an emotional/political wallop that continues throughout the film: on a bleary shaky video, San Francisco Supervisor Dianne Feinstein announces to a shocked public that Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk have been shot and murdered by ex-Supervisor Dan White. The film's narration then backtracks and we slowly begin to see, to understand, the story that leads to this shocking climax.

Most Gay audiences will know the story of Harvey Milk, populist, openly Gay man, and consummate politician. His death made him both a symbol and a martyr for Gay communities throughout the country. The Times Of Harvey Milk is like a re-telling of a familiar

story. We know the plot, we even know the ending, but it is the details, the minutiae, the particulars in the new

telling which interests us. Directors Epstein and Schmiechen have distilled a great deal of television footage to assemble the career and life of Milk. This is one of the first documentaries in memory which has had this access, coupled with such a good story and such

a pungent and cogent political point of view.

The Times of Harvey Milk is more than just a panegyric biography of a Gay man in politics. From the mass of TV and news footage, the filmmakers have managed to bring to life a whole community - San Francisco - dealing with an on-going political process. What stands out most in the film is the constant attention which Milk paid to other minorities and how those other people came to like and respect him.

Much of this film is not just the "tragedy of Harvey Milk," but a documentary on how and why a multi-ethnic, many-minoritized, grass roots movement can affect a city government. Just as The Times of Harvey Milk never stints on dealing openly with his sexuality, it also never tries to hide his basic radicalism and populist leanings under the guise of saint-hearted liberalism.

Able to stand on its own as a political/biographical documentary, The Times of Harvey Milk also functions equally well on a purely emotional



level. Gay audiences will not only be reacting with pride as Harvey Milk flaunts his sexual preference in a traditionally straight arena, but also, and even more strongly, to the anger and violence which resulted in Dan White's casual and meaningless jail sentence. What makes the film so great is that it never loses sight of the emotional impact that Milk had upon individuals and upon a community.

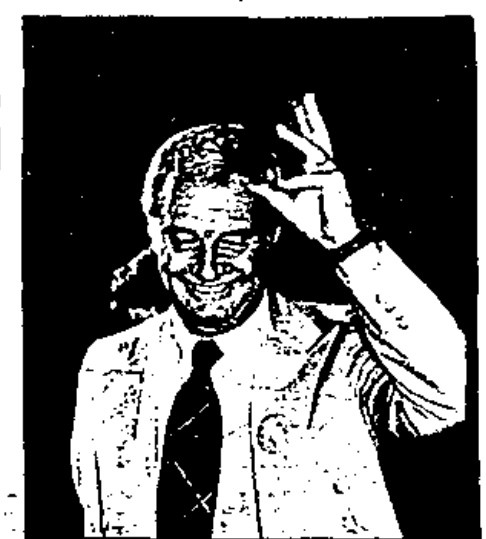
The material in this story is so potent one wishes for more information. Epstein and Schmiechen have interviewed several people extensively, and although their choices were good, they contain the film and place a hold on



the energy trying to burst out.

We are lucky - in both life and art - that Milk's story moved, so often, from the person out into the streets. The sweeping shots of the candlelight march and the White Night riots allow our full emotions to be vented and expressed. [The footage of a curved row of police cars being set aflame is simply breathtaking]. The Times of Harvey Milk is both a documentary and a personal statement; a skillful recreation of history and an analysis of what history means to us as a Gay community. It is as much a story of the birth and emergence of Gay pride and Gay anger as it is the story of any one man.

POPPER WARNING

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (GCN) - A federal study of 87 Gay men with AIDS revealed that the use of poppers may be a co-factor "in the allowance or enhancing in the development of Kaposi's Sarcoma (KS)." KS is a skin cancer occurring in 30 percent of the people with AIDS, according to the Bay Area Reporter.

But researcher/physician Harry Haverkos cautioned that the findings did not indicate poppers themselves cause AIDS. He said the use of poppers is apparently part of a fast-lane life style which includes multiple sex partners and drug use. Use of poppers is frequent among those contracting KS, but popper use may be only one of several factors related to KS development.

Several Bay Area businesses which sell poppers have been sent letters by the city health department advising them to post a notice regarding the health hazards associated with poppers. Much like the warning on cigarette packages, the notices are required by a one-year-old city ordinance to be posted in stores.

The notices list possible side effects of popper usage, such as "skin rashes, nasal irritation, sinus or lung infections, and rarely severe anemia....several studies have suggested some impairment of the immune system is possible." Warning letters were sent at the urging of Gay activist Hank Wilson of the Committee to Monitor Poppers..

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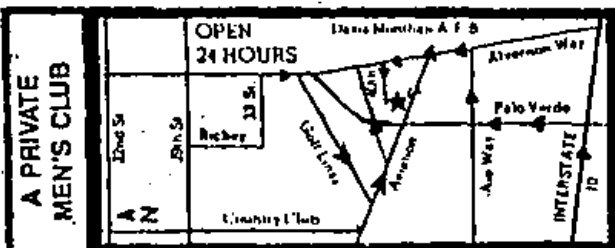

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A View From Within

WHY ARE WE DOING WHAT WE DO?

I was talking recently with one of my friends, whose opinion I greatly respect. The topic of this discussion was A LETTER TO THE EDITOR which appeared in the January 12 Phoenix Gazette. It was your basic "anti-homosexual rights" letter which made us look like rather sad old rats who lurk behind walls in the dead of night and gang-rape helpless Christian boys.

I phoned the author of the letter to ask from where she got her information, and had as pleasant a conversation as I possibly could with one of the 'enemy'. She said that, as a Christian, she was against the ERA, and Gay civil-rights laws: not Gays themselves, just laws to protect them. (And we can see from the recent sweeping defeat of the Houston 'Gay-rights ordinance' that she is hardly alone in that sentiment.)

My friend said that there was some validity in her argument, and I agreed. "If there were no discrimination, or harassment against Gays, then we would need no laws." Yes, indeed!

I am only in my mid-twenties, and, as I have written before, I never knew what prejudice was until I moved to San Francisco, where the Asians receive the brunt of harassment. In my constant study of the 1940's (A big interest of mine) I discovered that airplane manufacturers absolutely refused to hire blacks. They were short-staffed, and desperate for man or woman-power, yet they posted BLACKS NEED NOT APPLY signs. Forty years later, an all-black band was invited to play for President Reagan's inauguration. There are black mayors, businessmen, bar-owners, writers: a plethora of avenues are now populated by blacks, where none dared to tread only four decades ago.

Do you think that this just "occured"? That this just happened by "coincidence"? Was it just the natural "evolution" of society? Simply put: NO! Black men and women fought and died to get one law after another passed, then fought and died to have these laws enforced. It took mass rallies on Washington and other

government sites, and finally the martyred assignation of Dr. Martin Luther King to get America to take notice and get the black off their butts to take a stand. This was how it happened. PERIOD!

Now then. As a colleague of mine has said, "The ball has started to roll..." Yes, it has. Not long ago, no openly Gay person existed, it would have seemed, in society except behind prison bars or dead. And now? Openly Gay politicians, teachers, dancers, authors: a plethora of careers that have always been populated by Gays, are now openly populated by Gays. A small, but very important distinction that needs to be made. (again...and again...)

From here, where do we go? Up? Or down? The choice is yours. We have not made these advances by pure, dumb luck, or the natural "evolution" of society. There are still uneducated masses out there in the real world who believe that being "Gay" means molesting little boys. And if being "Gay" did mean that, then who wouldn't be against us? Look at this from their eyes, not our own.

The time is coming, and I believe it will be within the next five years, by 1990, when we will either be accepted as passe', like our black brothers and sisters, or legally murdered, one by one, under laws condemning us all.

Which will it be? You decide. You can have your fun now, and wake up one morning staring up at the barrel of a law-enforcer's gun, waiting to escort you to jail and your death, or you can sacrifice a little of your precious time now and join us: the civil rights advocates.

This may seem callous, but we deserve to lose our battle if you don't give a damn. And I might just get one last little joy watching you all die on the gallows, one by one, before my turn comes, because I will go to my death with the dignity of knowing that I did my damnest to insure fairness, equality and justice for every last one of us.
