## AIDS Could Kill More In U.S. By '87 Than Died In Vietnam War Battles

ATLANTA, GA - If trends continue, by the end of 1987 AIDS will have killed more young Americans than died in battle in the Vietnam War.

That, in all its starkness, is a conclusion that can be drawn from the data presented here last week, as more than 2,400 scientists from all over the world took part in the largest conference ever held on AIDS. (Observer April 17).

Although experts on the AIDS epidemic are reluctant to predict events as far as two years away, they left here frightened that the pace of the epidemic's spread might outrun the scientists' fast-moving efforts to find a cure.

Worldwide, AIDS has now struck more than 11,000 victims, and most of them will be dead within two years, the researchers attending the International Conference on Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS) were told. More than 10,000 of those cases are in the United States.

An additional 50,000 to 1 million Americans have already been infected with the virus. And, although they are not yet sick, they run a very high risk - 10 percent or more - of developing symptoms and dying of the disease within the next five years.

Federal experts expect the number of lethal cases to double within the next 12 months, bringing the total number in the United States to more than 20,000. If this trend should continue, which is likely, the death toll would surpass the 47,000 Vietnam battle deaths by the end of 1987.

The disease has now spread beyond the Gay community and other high-risk groups, with heterosexual now accounting for about 30 percent of AIDS cases.

AIDS has also been costly in terms of dollars. By one federal estimate, the AIDS epidemic is already costing more than \$1.5 billion in medical costs alone - \$5.5 billion if lost earnings and other indirect costs are added in. (ED NOTE: See separate story this issue of Observer).

AIDS has spread out from New York City, Los Angeles, and San Francisco, which to date have seen most of the cases, to other cities, which are reporting increasingly large numbers of new patients.

AIDS is beginning to infect so many people, including heterosexuals who have had sexual contact with members of the high-risk groups, that it will be necessary to vaccinate all Americans if and when a vaccine is developed, said James W. Curran, who heads the AIDS task force for the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), the federal agency responsible for tracking epidemics.

"I was frightened when all this started," said Charles Kilpatrick, a physician at the National Jewish Hospital in Denver, who identified the first case of AIDS in a hemophiliac. "I never thought that we would reach 9,000 cases."

Though much concern was evident at the Georgia World Congress Center, where the meetings were held, there was also a sense of excitement among the scientists, who were aware that they are a part of an unprecedented concentrated effort to conquer a single disease.

Researchers from all over the world, who had been keeping in touch through medical journal articles and telephone calls, now had a chance to

sit down with each other and discuss their latest work - frequently only a few days or weeks old - and share solutions.

With no vaccine or clearly effective drug in sight, the message being presented by all of the groups was the same: Protect yourself. AIDS is primarily transmitted through sexual contact. Limit sexual partners. Use precautions.

Ever since AIDS was first discovered in a few homosexual men in New York City and Los Angeles during the summer of 1981, it has been largely a disease of homosexual men and intravenous drug users, who together account for 90 percent of cases.

Many of the reports presented at this meeting, however, indicate there is now a secondary spread of the virus to the spouses of intravenous drug users, and recipients of AIDS-contaminated blood transfusions and the fetuses of infected women.

Growing evidence suggests that many of these people are actively infected, although they might not feel sick. And they are theoretically capable of passing the virus and the fatal form of the disease on to other heterosexuals through intimate contact.

Growing experimental evidence supports what the epidemiologists have suspected for a long time - the AIDS virus is passed through the fluids of sexual intercourse.

For a while researchers said that heterosexual passage of the disease would be less likely because, they thought, the violent nature of homosexual sex allowed the virus to enter the bloodstream through ruptured tissue. Presumably that would not happen among heterosexuals.

This theory, however, was thrown into serious doubt last week. Not only are the spouses of AIDS victims showing evidence of having been infected, but Patricia N. Fultz, a CDC laboratory researcher, easily infected a baboon by swabbing the animal's vagina with the AIDS virus. Only two weeks after application, Fultz found evidence of the virus in the blood of the animal.

The most heartening data presented at the meeting from several sources is that AIDS does not seem to be passed through casual contact, such as sharing the same house or job, eating at the same table to going to school.

The AIDS epidemic frequently has been likened to an iceberg, and many of the papers presented here last week dealt with the hidden base of the epidemic.

Until the AIDS virus was discovered and grown in test tubes last spring, only the visible portion of the iceberg was known to physicians - the obviously sick people stricken with the fatal form of the disease.

Once scientists had isolated the actual AIDS virus, however, they could investigate the larger, unseen base of the iceberg by looking for evidence of the virus in the blood of apparently healthy people.

The evidence consisted of AIDS antibodies, proteins that the body makes specifically to defend itself against the AIDS virus, just as it makes measles antibodies to defend itself against measles.

The base of the AIDS iceberg is turning out to be frighteningly large.

For every sick or dying AIDS

patient, the by Donald C. Drake apparently healthy people who carry AIDS antibodies in their blood which means that they have at one time or another been infected by the virus.

The big question that the researchers have been asking all year is how many of these people - 500,000 to 1 million - still carry active virus that could eventually kill them or be passed on to other people.

Doctors had hoped that people with the AIDS antibody would be just like people with the measles antibody and never have to worry about getting the disease again. Unfortunately, the evidence presented at the meeting suggests this is not the case.

Study after study suggests that a large number of people with the AIDS antibody also carry the active virus. Scientists do not know what this means, but they think it might mean that these people are more likely to get the fatal form of AIDS or pass the virus on to other people.

New evidence presented last week suggests that the virus survives as a chronic infection in apparently healthy people, perhaps for the life of the individual. Ironically, the virus apparently finds a sanctuary in the T-helper lymphocytes, the white blood cells that are supposed to protect against infection.

It is almost as though the fugitives being sought in the manhunt have taken up refuge in the police cars.

This disturbing information was presented by Anthony Fauci, a nationally recognized immunologist and now director of the National Institute of Allergies and Infectious Diseases.

Fauci infected human white blood cells with the AIDS virus. After a few days all the cells died off, which was expected. But instead of throwing away all of the presumably dead cells, Fauci kept them, and after a few more days started to see apparently new and healthy helper cells.

Somehow they had escaped the killing effects of the AIDS virus and presumably were now safe, because Fauci could find no virus in any of his cell cultures. But when he treated these lymphocytes with bio-chemicals that forced them to multiply, AIDS viruses started pouring out of the cells, where they had apparently been living in a dormant state.

This means that the virus might live for years causing no trouble at all, according to this theory, until the unknowing host is stricken by another infection, which activates the immune system. But instead of fighting the new infection, the activated lymphocytes would start releasing the dormant AIDS virus.

Even though the ominous cloud of this ever-expanding epidemic hung over the meeting, adding a sense of urgency to everything that was being said, there was also very much a feeling of hope.

So many discoveries were being made so quickly by so many scientists that it seemed only a matter of time before even as formidable an enemy as AIDS would fall.

The AIDS virus was fully identified only a year ago, but already human trials are beginning on no fewer than six drugs that, in test tube studies at least, seem particularly effective against retroviruses, the class of virus that the AIDS virus belongs to. Knight-Ridder Newspapers

## Thousands involuntarily sterilized

LYNCHBURG, VA (CCN) - Virginia has been directed to launch a public media drive in order to attempt to inform thousands of former and current psychiatric patients that they may have been involuntarily sterilized, according to the 'Guardian'.

This order was the result of a federal class action suit brought in 1980 by the Virginia chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) on behalf of men and women sterilized in state facilities between 1924 and 1972.

The Virginia law, which allowed the sterilizations of possibly as many as 10,000 people in those years was set up to "protect the class of socially

Two of the plays are by the outstanding American playwright/actor, Sam Shepard who most recently wrote the screenplay for the award-winning film "Paris, Texas" and starred in "Country". The one-act plays are characteristic of his unique style (sometime labeled bizarre realism) which incorporates sharply drawn characters and elements of American myth with an ominous surrealistic edge.

#### 'DEAR ABBY' TO RECEIVE IMAGE IN MEDIA AWARD AT CONFERENCE IN LOS ANGELES

NEW YORK, NY - At a New York press conference this week, Gene Santomasso, president of the 2,000-member Gay Father's Coalition International (GFCI) based in Washington, DC, announced that newspaper advice columnist, Abigail Van Buren, has been named to receive the organization's Image in Media award. Last year, television talk show host Phil Donahue received the award at a New York ceremony.

In making the announcement, Santomasso noted that Van Buren, writing her column as "Dear Abby" since 1959, has given hope to thousands of Gay men in parenting roles. "Few media personalities have had as significant an impact upon the perception by Middle America, of Gays and Lesbians, as has Ms. Van Buren."

Writing her nationally-syndicated column for more than 1,000 newspapers around the world, Dear Abby reaches over 80 million readers daily. Many of her letters deal with Gay-related subjects, and her accepting and informative answers have helped open the minds of the world to the issues of Gay parenting.

From her Beverly Hills, California home, Ms. Van Buren said that she would accept GFCI's Image in Media award in person during a dinner in her honor, on opening day of the GFCI's 6th Annual World Conference on May 31 in Los Angeles.

#### 'SINGING NUN' AND 'FRIEND' DEAD IN APPARENT SUICIDE

WAVRE, BELGIUM (GCN) - Jeanine Deckers, the "Singing Nun" who became famous around the world more than 20 years ago with her song, "Dominique," committed suicide with a close woman "friend" the last weekend in March, according to the Boston Globe.

Deckers, who left the Dominican order in 1966, and an unidentified friend she lived with, were found by police in their home. The women apparently taken a huge dose of sedatives. They left a letter which according to the Belgian news agency, explained their suicide and asked for "discretion".

Deckers was 52 at the time of her death.

NEW YORK, NY (GCN) - A 'Glamour' magazine poll in the March issue shows 94 percent of the women respondents, aged 18 to 35, have used "erotic materials," according to USA Today. 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## Review... Values held by 'Lesbian Nuns' incompatible with religious life

**LESBIAN NUNS: BREAKING SILENCE**, edited by Rosemary Curb and Nancy Manahan, Malad Press, \$9.95, 382 pp.

It seems ironic that Lesbian activists and other militant feminists - who are fond of attacking anything even faintly suggestive of being exploitive of women - have been done in so neatly here by some of their own [secular] sisters.

One of the persons interviewed for the report on this book, called it "a disservice" to women still in religious life.

That is incontestable: The book's aggressively touted (and now outmoded) values of "doing one's own thing" and "expressing one's self" are obviously at odds with the religious life, which starts with a basic premise of trying to get "out of" not "into" self, in order to serve God and others.

To say nothing of the book's exclusive focus on the "sexual activity" interpretation of that term Lesbian, not on the "sexual orientation" connotation - and of this focus in purposeful juxtaposition with the word "nun", which connotes a vow of chastity.

But the book is just as clearly a disservice to women in general, Gay or straight, in or out of religious life.

Also, the book is used as a tool to vent anger - which comes through loud and clear - on any target in sight, preferably large and stationary targets such as the church and society.

The tactics used by the editors and publishers to accomplish the primary purpose - making the book a sure-fire moneymaker - and the transparency of these tactics are what makes the book, in a word, tacky.

Very simply, the book is soft pornography. Yet it (unskillfully) masquerades as what it is not.

The title indicates this is an

account of women religious who are Lesbian. What we find is that only nine of the 51 personal "confessions" are by current nuns; the rest have long since left the vowed life, most before final vows (co-editor Manahan left after a year).

Secondly, the description of the sexual encounters is not in any way justified here (as it is in literature) by being an integral part of a larger story. Rather, the sexual activity is the story. Period.

It also can't be classified as a book of self-discovery or growth because it stays locked in one-dimensionality.

This, I think, is one of the major disservices it does to Gay women - and

to women in general.

This is presuming that at least some of these women possess attributes other than their yen for furtive sex (with an occasional fist-shake at the establishment thrown in for underscoring).

It's almost impossible to find qualities of tenderness, compassion, tolerance, and goodwill in the accounts or to spot any of the common human emotions such as love, fear and sadness that most humans possess in varying degrees at varying times.

There are one or two accounts that probably would have been poignant had they appeared in isolation from the others. I cannot help but wonder if these particular women were not duped

into believing this would be a more sensitive book.

But the deadly dull sameness of the accounts - with "X" amounts of explicit details sprinkled in at predictably spaced intervals - cancels out the possibility of poignancy very quickly.

If we were to buy this crudely molded one-dimensional [genital-only] composite of a woman presented by this book we would be forced to ask:

Is this all there is to a woman?

Is this all there is to a human being?

I don't think so.

### CARDIAC ARREST OR POLICE BASHING?

NEW YORK, NY (GON) - In the wake of a congressional hearing on racist police brutality here, a new grand jury is examining charges that white city police murdered a young Black man and were protected by the Chief City Medical Examiner, according to the New York Times.

Michael Stewart had been "taken into custody" last September by three white officers who accused him of writing graffiti on the subway. According to sources, he was on his way home from a Gay bar. When Stewart arrived at Bellevue Hospital hours later, he had been hogtied, was covered with bruises and other wounds, and was no longer breathing. The autopsy performed by Examiner Elliott Gross at Stewart's death 13 days later claimed "There was no evidence of physical injury resulting or contributing to death....The cause of death is cardiac arrest pending further study."

Dr. Gross's autopsy report is "an outrageous statement - it's called a blatant lie," said Dr. Robert Wolf, one of the Stewart family's doctors. Pathologists in the medical examiner's office make the same charge.

New York Mayor Edward Koch has also ordered an investigation into allegations against Dr. Gross, who has stepped aside temporarily from his duties.

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### AIDS cost to U.S. tops \$5 billion - could double

ATLANTA, GA (AP) - The costs of health care, disability and death associated with the national AIDS epidemic have topped \$5 billion and could double in the next year, according to the national Centers for Disease Control.

The CDC estimates that the first 9,000 people to get AIDS in this country required 1.5 million days of hospitalization and 51,000 days of outpatient treatment, for a health care cost of \$1.25 billion, said CDC researcher Ann Hardy.

Those same patients, according to the CDC's estimates, will total 7,538 years of work disablement before their deaths, and their deaths will rob the economy of more than \$4.2 billion in lost wages and benefits.

The total price tag on the disease: \$5,638,500,000.

The dollar amount is a representation of the cost of AIDS to the country, not just to the individual

patients and families involved. Hardy said at the CDC's international conference on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome.

"This is meant to help broadly determine the economic impact of AIDS," she said.

A total of 9,608 AIDS cases have been reported in this country since 1979; 73 percent have been in the chief risk group, homosexual or bisexual males. The disease, which breaks down the body's immune system, has so far claimed the lives of 4,712 people.

The dollar-value of the damage wrought by AIDS pales statistically next to diseases such as cancer, at \$50 billion a year, and heart disease, at \$85 billion a year, both of which strike many more people than does AIDS, Hardy said.

But AIDS kills predominantly young people in their productive years, she added.

### \$19,000 AIDS DONATION MISSING

NEW YORK, NY - The Gay Men's Health Crisis (GMHC) has reportedly been cheated out of over \$19,000 by Megatone Records, according to a story in the New York Native. According to the report, the profits of the disco record, "Wenergy Megamedley" by Patrick Cowley, who died of AIDS in 1982, were supposed to go to GMHC, and the record label promised "100 percent of world-wide profits from this record will be donated to GMHC to help fight AIDS."

Thus far, only \$735 has been received by GMHC. Megatone informed GMHC that only \$735 remained after expenses, but the company's own records indicate a \$20,000 donation to GMHC, which GMHC has not received.

**THOUSANDS INVOLUNTARILY STERILIZED**

Inadequate citizens from themselves."

Millions of people in the U.S., particularly people of color, poor people, the disabled and immigrants were sterilized without their consent as the result of eugenics laws in the 1920's.

According to the ACLU, "many of the men and women involuntarily sterilized were selected for sterilization because they were characterized as misfits, loose women or incorrigibles." During that period many men and women were committed to mental institutions because of their homosexual tendencies or activities.

By 1972, the Lynchburg Training School and Hospital alone had sterilized 8,300 men, women and children.

The Virginia settlement provides medical treatment and counseling to those reached by the radio and television campaign, but no financial compensation. A federal judge

dismissed the Virginia ACLU's claim that the sterilization law was unconstitutional in 1981.

The lawsuit has pushed Virginia to enact one of the most comprehensive laws in the U.S. safeguarding people from involuntary sterilization. As a result of pressure from reproductive rights activists, national safeguards were implemented in 1978 to protect Medicaid recipients from sterilization abuse.

Over one-third of Puerto Rican women of child-bearing age in the U.S. and possibly more than one-half on the island have been sterilized. Disproportionately high numbers of Native American women and Black women have also been sterilized.

NEW YORK, NY (GCN) - Gay men of color from around the world are invited to submit work for an anthology of Black and Third World Gay male writing. The book will include both poetry and prose (fiction and non-fiction) and will be published by The Crossing Press. Isaac Jackson is the editor.

The anthology will explore the ways race, ethnicity, and racism shape the perceptions of Gay men of color - of themselves and of their sexual orientation.

Visual artists are also invited to send photographs and drawings (in black and white only).

**HOLOPHOBIC, ANTI-SEMITIC,**

**GAINSVILLE, FL (GCN)** - The Beta Theta Pi fraternity at the University of Florida, which was reprimanded last year for harassment of Gay people, may lose official campus status because of an anti-semitic 30-page publication, according to Gay Life.

The publication, entitled "Uncensored, 4 o'clock weekly" gives awards for "Mike of the Year" and "Most hateable Jew of the Year." It also names the "most lustful after little sister."

### LESBIANS AGAINST GAYS: IT'S ALL OUT WAR NOW . . .

I am in the battle not just for myself, not just for other Gay men, and not just for Lesbians. I am in this civil right fight for everybody! (and THAT is something that you can quote me on).

There are certain Lesbian women -- who may or may not work for an organization whose acronym is quite the opposite of T.H.E.N. -- who must feel slightly defiled; who feel that they can only work toward their own goals; who do only what is necessary for their own survival and to hell with Gay men and everyone else. (Are you still with me here, Maxine?)

After the Sally Jessy Raphael fiasco (for those not familiar with this: KTVK, the ABC affiliate in Phoenix, chose not to show a segment dealing with Lesbian nuns in the Catholic Church. Certain Lesbian women protested). KTVK-ABC decided that to try and ease tensions within the Gay community, and the media, they would offer 30 minutes of prime Saturday afternoon viewing time to address Lesbian and Gay issues, and women's issues.

Well, when this Saturday show reaches the air in a couple of months, don't look for any Gay issues to be addressed: The "representatives from the Lesbian community" wanted all 30 minutes to themselves.

How do I know this? KTVK-ABC invited me to attend a planning conference. I have been in constant contact with KTVK-ABC, KTSP-CBS, KPHO-Independent, and KPNX-NEC to try and get some media/Gay dialogue going. I was invited, because KTVK-ABC said that they wanted some input from the Gay community, and I was only too happy to go.

I arrived at the KTVK-ABC studios only to be informed that these "women" were rather upset because a "man" had been invited to attend. "They" said it was "their" issue, and "they" did not want the women/Lesbian issues to be clouded by "Gay" issues.

Why was I not surprised? When I

got involved in this civil rights fight, I was told that these "women" were anti-Gay. They could not be counted on to help "Gay" people. They were rotten, self-centered, egotistical, cynical extremists.

I did not, for a moment, believe it. I do now.

Just who do these "women" think they are? The sun does not rise and fall by their wishes alone! WE ARE ALL IN THIS TOGETHER! Every advantage I get to help Lesbians, I use. I ask their advice. I seek their input. I go the whole 9 yards.

DON'T LOOK FOR THIS KIND OF CONSIDERATION FROM ME ANYMORE, LADIES! If you want to play this game by your own rules, fine. After we get our civil rights, and you are all stuck doing dishes, don't ask us to come to your assistance. EVER!

Change your own tires, girls. Open your own doors, dears. I AM PISSED, AND I AM NOT GOING TO TAKE IT ANYMORE. I am through pulling for my Lesbian "sisters".

I was told by many Lesbian women how "surprised" they were by what I had said at the first Human Relations Committee meeting (for the anti-discrimination ordinance in Phoenix) last fall. "They were surprised", I was told, "that a man could be smart enough to say what I said, and say it so well." If this was not a back-handed compliment, I don't know what was. I had, apparently, earned their respect. Frankly, if this is what their respect includes, I don't want it.

I am honestly ashamed that you guys are on our side. How does this look to outsiders? We can't even muster up enough allegiance to our common cause to sit down and talk about mutual issues.

I was game, and you dropped the ball. As far as I am concerned, you are on your own.

## AIDS can be spread by heterosexual contact

ATLANTA, GA - A study of military personnel indicates that AIDS can be spread by heterosexual contact, supporting a growing belief that the deadly disease is moving into the mainstream of society, a researcher reported last week.

"It is very clear that AIDS is transmitted to recurrent heterosexual activity in terms of spouses," said Dr. Robert R. Redfield of Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington. The data, he said, also showed that prostitutes were likely to transmit the mysterious disease. "The more [sexual] activity one has, particularly if it crosses over into these high-risk groups, the greater the risk" of getting AIDS, he said.

Both conclusions, if confirmed by larger studies, would mean that groups like homosexuals and intravenous drug abusers may not be the only ones at high risk of contracting the illness.

Redfield, who works in the Army hospital's virology department, said that he thought AIDS in heterosexuals would follow patterns seen in homosexuals, who make up about 75 percent of AIDS victims.

"It wasn't homosexuality that was shown to be at risk, it was the degree of activity... I would suggest that as this disease enters the heterosexual community, it may follow the same mode. Those individuals who have more heterosexual partners may be at greater risk..."

The study of 41 patients was presented at the final session of the three-day International Conference on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, where about 2,400 scientists and researchers from 30 countries have heard the latest reports about AIDS, which destroys the immune system's ability to fight infection.

Another study of AIDS patients, done in New York City, supported the cases for heterosexual transmission. In that study of 3,000 cases, 27 men were found to have no known risk factor. Two of the 27 reported sexual contacts with women who were intravenous drug abusers. Of the remaining 25 patients, 12 frequented prostitutes.

"Sexual contacts from prostitutes may be a route of transmission in these men," Charles Rabkin of the New York City Health Department said.

A federal official told the conference that the 9600 AIDS cases reported since 1981 have cost the nation about \$5.6 billion in medical bills and lost productivity.

Ann Hardy of the federal Centers for Disease Control, which are based here, said that if cases soar to 18,000 in 1986 as expected, costs would double next year unless a treatment was discovered.

Other papers presented at the conference reported:

\* At least six anti-viral agents are beginning to be tested against AIDS. "We have a long way to go before AIDS is preventable or even treatable," said Dr. Martin S. Hirsch of Massachusetts General Hospital. "But we have taken the first steps and I think we are on the way."

\* Symptoms of diffuse dementia, a condition of dulled mental processes, now are being seen among AIDS patients. Scientists think the finding indicates that the virus may not only attack the immune system but the brain and central nervous system as well.

Among the strongest evidence Redfield offered on heterosexual transmission was the results of a survey of seven wives of AIDS patients. Blood tests showed that five had contracted the AIDS virus. The other two had pre-AIDS conditions which is known as AIDS Related Complex.
