

FDA to allow experimental AIDS drug

WASHINGTON, DC (AP) - The Food and Drug Administration said over last weekend that it will allow a California pharmaceutical company to provide an experimental drug to any AIDS victims whose doctors ask for it, but company officials said they have not yet agreed to such a plan.

The FDA, in an internal advisory, said it had agreed to let Newport Pharmaceuticals of Newport Beach, California, conduct a "compassionate-use protocol" that would allow the drug Isoprinosine to be distributed, at the request of a doctor, to AIDS patients. Sales would have to be made at cost; no profit could be made.

An FDA spokesperson, commenting on the decision, compared the drug with an experimental cancer treatment, explaining: "The fact that they're not perfected becomes immaterial if your life expectancy is a week or a month." But company officials, advised of the FDA announcement by a reporter, said

they were unaware of the action, had not agreed to broad distribution of their drug under the requirements stipulated by FDA, and doubted they could handle such a task.

"We have not really agreed to conduct a compassionate protocol with regard to AIDS," said Cynthia Renger, manager of regulatory affairs. "We haven't finished our negotiations (with FDA) at this time. We just haven't had a chance to consider it yet."

Sanford Glasky, Newport's executive vice president, noted that the FDA was essentially inviting every AIDS patient in the country to call the company directly and sign up for the drug to fight acquired immune deficiency syndrome. Isoprinosine is one of about a half dozen drugs about to be used in clinical trials, the FDA said.

Scientists hope Isoprinosine may be of help because it stimulates the

immune system, the agency said. AIDS kills by destroying the immune system and leaving the body defenseless against infection or disease.

The FDA issued the advisory to its staff after news reports earlier telling that AIDS victims "are rushing across the border in droves" to buy the drug in Mexico, where it is sold legally by a Newport licensee, Laboratorios Sanfer Co. (Observer, May 9)

Other AIDS victims are buying the substance from black market dealers in this country, the news stories said. The drug reportedly is legally available in some 70 countries, although it cannot be prescribed in the United States.

In issuing the advisory, the FDA noted that it has never approved Isoprinosine for general public marketing for any medical purpose, nor is any application pending. However,

it said, an experimental license was issued to Newport last November to test the effect of Isoprinosine in a limited number of patients with "persistent generalized lymphadenopathy" and "AIDS-related complex" syndromes that are believed to progress to AIDS in some cases.

Earlier last week, the FDA said, it broadened the license to allow the compassionate-use protocol - in effect, allowing the drug to be distributed to any AIDS victim who asks for it. Bruce Brown, an FDA spokesperson, said compassionate-use licenses are not unusual, but also are not often publicized.

"Cancer drugs are the most common," Brown said. "The fact that they're not perfected becomes immaterial if your life expectancy is a week or a month." He called it "a humanizing element" in a drug-approval process that is geared to large clinical studies, not individual patients.

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Youth Sentenced In Benson Slaying

BISBEE, AZ - A 17-year-old Michigan youth has been sentenced as an adult to 10 years in prison for his role in the October 30, 1984 murder of a St. David man. (Observer, Nov. 21, 1984).

Troy Anthony Fulmer, of Cheboygan, Michigan, received the minimum sentence for second degree murder three weeks after his no-contest plea, which means he did not admit guilt.

Fulmer and a friend, Michael Aust, then 13, were detained by Van Horn, Texas police October 31 and were later charged with murdering Charles Henderson Bush, 34, and committing other felonies. Aust was sentenced in juvenile court to an unspecified term in the Department of Corrections after his guilty plea to a negligent homicide charge.

Bush had died of blood loss caused by three stab wounds and had also suffered multiple bruises and a fractured skull, an autopsy showed.

Court testimony showed that Bush picked up the youths, who later said they were hitchhiking from California to Fulmer's home, on Interstate 10 in the Tucson area. Bush took the boys to his St. David home in his van, offered them marijuana and allegedly made sexual advances toward them, the youths told lawmen.

Fulmer said he hit Bush in the back of the head with a small pipe and then ordered the dazed man at knife-

point into the van. Fulmer then drove off as Aust held Bush at knifepoint in the rear of the van, testimony showed. Aust and Bush started fighting and Fulmer stopped the van and joined the clash.

During the fighting, Bush suffered a fatal wound when Aust stabbed him in the thigh, severing his femoral artery. The youths then tossed Bush out the van's side door in a mini-park in downtown Benson. The body was found by a transient the next day.

Fulmer said he drove east on Interstate 10 to Van Horn, where they were detained by lawmen after acting suspiciously.

Fulmer was indicted by a Grand Jury on charges of first-degree murder and other felonies before plea bargaining to the reduced homicide count. Public Defender Wallace Haggatt, Fulmer's lawyer, said his client plea bargained to avoid any chance of a first-degree murder conviction, which carries a minimum sentence of 25 years. (Observer Apr. 17, 1985).

Haggatt told Superior Court Judge Matthew Borowiec the murder was not "cold-blooded, ruthless, calculated," but had been caused by Bush's alleged homosexual advances toward two immature youths. (Observer Dec. 27, 1984).

"Had they not acted it is possible I would be representing Mr. Bush on a charge of child molesting," Haggatt said.

Borowiec said Bush's murder was "not intentional," but that the situation was not one "society can easily handle."

10% Lost Jobs in NJ

TRENTON, NJ - One in ten Gays have lost jobs in the last seven years because of their sexual orientation, according to a survey conducted in New Jersey last year. The survey of 350 Lesbians and Gay men was commissioned by the New Jersey Lesbian and Gay Coalition in support of an anti-discrimination bill being considered in the New Jersey Senate. Despite the survey and the active support of the National Organization for Women, which hired a

'Moral Nuisance' Bill Defeated!

PHOENIX - A bill to make it easier to close down businesses that rent or sell sexually-explicit movies or books was defeated in the Senate last week on a 14-16 vote.

The bill H2429 (OBSERVER Feb 27 and April 3), would have permitted private citizens, upon posting \$5,000 bond, to apply for superior court injunctions against places they believe are operating moral nuisances. Courts would have been empowered to order those convicted of running a moral nuisance to close down and have seized, in addition to obscene materials, all of an establishment's property used in conducting the nuisance and the estimated income gained from the nuisance.

"This is a statement by the state Legislature in favor of morality," Senate Judiciary Chairperson Peter Kay said before the vote. "There are many people in our state that have

considerable concerns over these types of films, which according to the testimony of the Judiciary Committee, precipitate criminal behavior."

"If we were to make a statement, we would do it in the form of a resolution or a memorial, but here we are about to pass a law," responded Republican Senator John Mawhinney (Tucson). "And it's a law filled with uncertainty and confused in its definitions and applications... that allows for people to perform great mischief." He added that the bill could cause "orders to be nailed on the front door of a place that could very well be a public book store or a library announcing that some books contain material that might offend."

All Democrats except Sen. Lela Alston joined Mr. Mawhinney and four other Republicans to vote against the bill. A similar bill was vetoed by Governor Babbitt two years ago.

Gay Boston Men Seek Return of 2 Foster Boys

BOSTON, MA (AP) - Two Gay men said that they will challenge the state's removal of two foster boys from their home. The boys, aged 2 and 3 1/2, were taken from Donald Babets, 36, and David Jean, 31, of Boston last week, two weeks after their arrival, because of an uproar by community residents who considered the arrangement morally wrong.

"We take exception to any suggestion by the department that there was any evidence of harm to the boys as a result of the media attention, or that there was community opposition to the placement of these children with us," the two men said in a statement.

The boys' mother "acknowledged the good care her children received with us and expressly approved the placement with us as an openly Gay couple," they said.

Kevin Cathcart, an attorney for the Gay men, said he will ask an administrative law judge to reverse the order of Marie Matava, secretary of the state Department of Social Services. "We're starting internally, because the issue here is these two children's best interest," said Cathcart, who is executive director of Gay-Lesbian Advocates and Defenders. "We feel this is the most appropriate avenue. We are

concerned about publicity and maintaining the anonymity of the children."

Matava said she ordered the removal of the children because she believed the "public storm" surrounding the boy's placement would be too stressful for them.

The Gay men had been recommended by two clergymen, and Matava said the removal had nothing to do with the character of the men. Matava said state guidelines do not address the issue of homosexuality as a consideration in qualifying foster parents.

However, Gov. Michael S. Dukakis last Thursday asked Matava and Human Services Secretary Phillip Johnson to set a policy concerning homosexual foster parents.

Last Wednesday, May 8, Babets called the removal order a "gross miscarriage of justice.... The only thing motivating people now is narrow-mindedness, hatred, bigotry and outright stupidity."

The Massachusetts Civil Liberties Union supported the couple and said state officials "caved in to the homophobic reaction after the placement was made public."

ANTI-ABORTION FILM FARCE

WASHINGTON, DC (GCN) - White House officials have screened a film that supposedly shows the reaction of a 12-week-old fetus as it is aborted, according to the Boston Globe. Copies of "The Silent Scream", a half-hour long film, were also delivered earlier to Ronald Reagan, every member of Congress and every member of the Supreme Court.

The film distribution is part of a campaign to try to reverse or overrule through legislative means the Supreme Court's 1973 decision legalizing abortion.

Doctors have criticized the film, saying it falsely portrays as a reaction to pain, an involuntary and painless reaction of the fetus, which most closely resembles a hiccup.

MORE BAD NEWS

IN THE LONE STAR STATE

DALLAS, TX (GCN) - The Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans has voted to review an appeal to reinstate the Texas sodomy statute, according to the Washington Blade.

Last October, a three-judge panel of the same court ruled that the district attorney of Amarillo County, Texas did not have the authority to challenge the District Court's 1982 decision which declared the sodomy statute unconstitutional. The 1982 decision claimed the statute was unconstitutional because it applied only to homosexual sodomy.

Leonard Graff, legal director of National Gay Rights Advocates (NGRA), said it is impossible to determine why the Fifth Circuit Court decided to rehear the case. Graff, who has filed a friend-of-the-court brief, said oral arguments are set for June. The full 14-member court will review the case.

STUDDS REGAINS COAST POST

WASHINGTON, DC (GCM) - U.S. Representative Gerry Studds (D-MA), the only openly Gay member of Congress and an outspoken critic of this administration's aggression in Central America, has been reinstated as chair of the Coast Guard and Navigation Subcommittee of the Merchant Marine Committee.

In the standard vote for chairs of subcommittees at the beginning of each congressional session, committee members voted 19-2 to reappoint Studds to the position he lost in 1983 following his censure for having sex with a 17-year-old page a decade earlier. The committee vote was then ratified by the full Democratic House caucus in a unanimous vote.

Stating he did not anticipate any negative reaction to his reinstatement, Studds called the action "the final, final, final chapter of this business."

MEN OF ALL COLORS TOGETHER

NEW YORK, NY (GCM) - After months of discussion, the steering committee of Black and White Men Together (BWMT) of New York has recommended a name change to Men of All Colors Together (MACT).

Those are both important points with the latter being a real stumbling block for some. We may think the hurdle to accepting oneself is high. The peer pressure which one feels may make the next hurdle even higher. Face it, we all like to be loved and accepted.

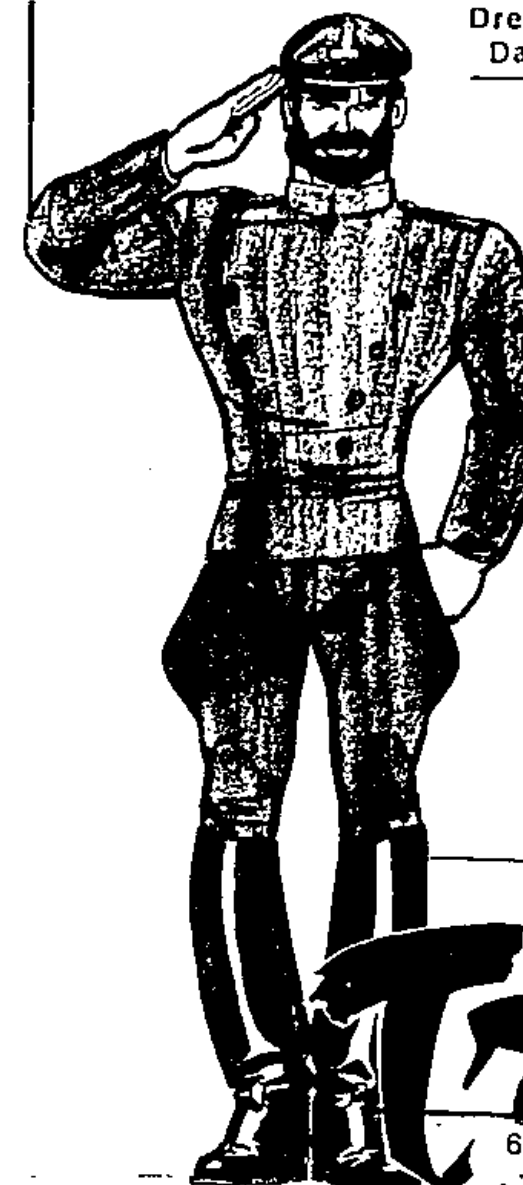

lobbyist for the issue last year. The Washington Blade reports the bill is given little chance of passing.

Other findings of the survey showed that 80 percent of the respondents hid their sexual orientation for fear of being fired or hurting their careers. One-fifth said they had problems getting housing, and 17 percent said they'd been physically attacked because of their homosexuality. Fewer than 20 percent of those attacked reported the incidents to authorities.

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

Well, this gorgeous guy was at the

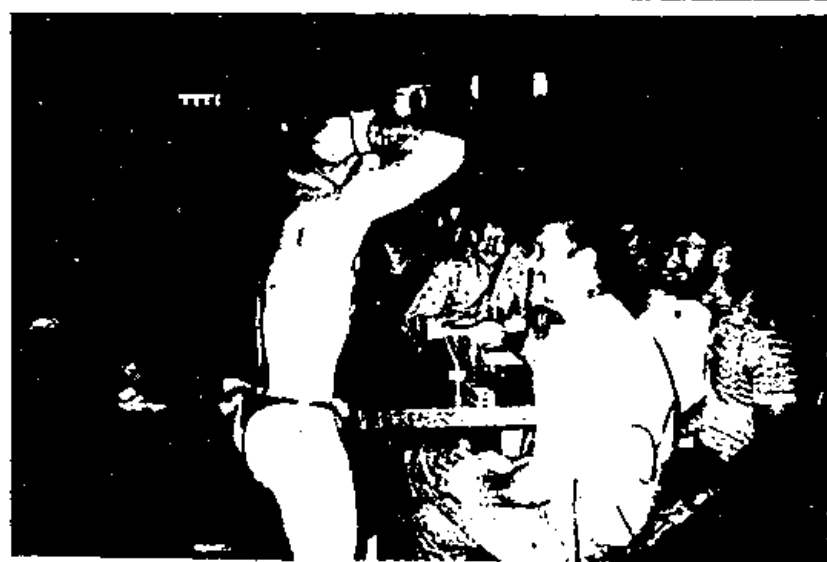
