Local AIDS Blood Incidence 'Average'

TUCSON - About one unit out of all blood units being sold or donated daily in Tucson is contaminated with the potentially deadly virus linked to AIDS, say health officials.

As a general statistic, that rate of contamination is "not alarming...it is exactly what we expected, about the national average," said Bruce Porter, head of the communicable disease division of the Pima County Health Department.

A total of about 400 to 500 units of blood per day, from all non-profit and commercial Tucson blood centers, are now being tested here for the HTLV-III virus, believed to cause AIDS.

People who have the virus will not necessarily get the disease. However, many of those individuals who have sold or donated the apparently contaminated blood are reacting angrily when told of the test results, protesting that they have been tested for the AIDS factor without knowing it.

"They are shocked, but many of them are real angry," said Porter, who personally is notifying those who test positive for HTLV-III after selling their blood to Tucson plasma centers. "They are angry about the test, at their spouses and sex partners, about where they may have been exposed. This seems to outweigh their concern for the future of their own health."

The testing for HTLV-III virus in blood was started voluntarily this spring by the American Red Cross and other blood centers around the nation. It since has been mandated for all blood businesses by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

AIDS, which has killed more than half of the 10,000 plus people diagnosed as having it, can be spread to unsuspecting and healthy people through contaminated blood. The disease so far has affected mostly homosexual men, but also intravenous drug users and hemophiliacs, who have

LIQUOR BOARD

RULES AGAINST FINELINE

TUCSON - A State Liquor Board panel has revoked the liquor license of the Fineline bar because of alleged violations primarily involving minors visiting and drinking at the business. Some youngsters testified that no one at the bar ever asked to see proof of their age. James P. Lagattuta, assistant attorney general said at the hearing held last week. Lagattuta said a 14-year-old testified that he and two young friends entered the bar by distracting the person checking ages. A 19-year-old estimated he had been in the Fineline 100 times since he was 17. Lagattuta added. People who are at least 21, and those who turned 19 before January 1, are of legal drinking age in Arizona, he said. The minimum age increased this year.

Harold L. Higgins, an attorney for bar owner Richard Plowman, said the revocation is not justified and Plowman "is going to pursue the matter to whatever court is necessary." Higgins said Plowman has taken steps to correct any problems at the bar at 101 W. Drachman.

"The bar will continue to operate

as long as it is legally permissible to do so," which is as long as appeals are being made, Higgins said. Higgins said he plans to file for a rehearing within 10 days and will appeal to the Pima County Superior Court should that fail.

In the meantime, the Fineline is open as usual and will be open as long as there are appeals to the court system.

The 1985 Pride Week Picnic set a record for attendance and also was the first picnic in eight years where there were no incidents of harassment or fights. This was also the first picnic where a major TV station [CH 9] held a live telecast for their evening news.

The picnic was also covered by TV channels 4, 13 and Arizona Gay. All the news reporters noted a major difference this year in the general attitude of the picnickers. They were amazed that as they moved around the park with their cameras no one ran and hid. Our pride was very evident this year.

The picnic and the entire Pride Week events have a very significant purpose. It is our purpose, as we join Lesbians and Gays across the country, to celebrate our accomplishments and to further our struggle against the discrimination we face in our daily lives. Pride Week celebrations are as important to us as July 4th is important to this country. With every Pride Week, it is our intent to recall our pride in our history. We celebrate a time in history when Gay Power really began.

At a bar called the Stonewall Inn, in New York City, on Saturday, June 28, 1969, the police conducted a raid. Three Gays were arrested and put in a paddy wagon. A Lesbian came out of the bar and fought the police. People began yelling police brutality and a riot began that lasted two and a half days. Many people were arrested and ten police officers were hospitalized.

Lesbian and Gay Power really began at that time, which showed that we no longer allow ourselves to be society's scapegoats. In the past we ran from the police. At Stonewall we fought back for the first time, turning on our oppressors.

We in Tucson, Arizona are celebrating our Lesbian and Gay history under the theme of "Alive With Pride in '85". In Tucson, we have also fought back and as a result we have a law that

protects us from discrimination based on sexual preference in employment, housing and public accommodations. They can't fire us or kick us out of our residence simply because we are Lesbian or Gay.

We still have a long way to go. If you work outside of the city limits, you have no job protection. Consensual sexual behavior between two adults of the same sex is against the law in the state of Arizona. Our relationships have no legal or institutional sanction. Your spouse can't be covered by your medical insurance policy where you work. The fear of AIDS has caused some groups in Tucson to consider a movement to repeal the legal protection that we now have. We have much more work to do. So, as you celebrate today, this week and throughout the year, consider what you can do to bring to reality this year's slogan - "ALIVE WITH PRIDE IN '85".

**LAST MINUTE CHANGES
IN PRIDE WEEK EVENTS**

There were three 'casualties' in the weeklong series of events for Lesbian and Gay Pride Week '85. The "Law and Government Forum" scheduled to be held at the Fineline on Monday, June 24, had to be cancelled due to lack of response of members of the Law and Government of Tucson.

"The Life and Times of Harvey Milk" which was supposed to be shown at the MCC church building on Wednesday, June 26 and again at Joshua Tree on Saturday, June 29 was unable to be shown. The distributors of the video version of this Academy Award Winning Documentary was unable to supply the tape and will be unable to provide it until sometime in December, not in June as they promised. Instead, "Consenting Adults", the highly acclaimed television drama was shown instead.

On Sunday, due to circumstances beyond anyone's control, the "Casino Night" originally scheduled to be held at the Graduate has been moved to Tramps and scheduled for 3:00 p.m. to coincide with the planned Swap Meet.

been infected through blood transfusions.

Nationwide, the HTLV-III virus is showing up in about two or three out of every 1,000 units of blood tested, and all suspect units are being destroyed. The first to use the test here - The Red Cross, which processes more units of blood than any other center in the area - reported positive results at about the same rate.

However, the Red Cross has not yet begun notifying its donors who have been exposed to the virus. "We will begin that process by July 1," said Joann Webster, director of the Tucson Chapter of the Red Cross. "We're still working out how we will inform people. It will be done by a physician."

All potentially infected people being notified by the county are being advised to see a doctor immediately, and to have their blood re-tested, said Porter. "It's not easy to do this," he commented. "We try to emphasize that it only means exposure, that it doesn't mean they have AIDS or are going to die." But it is a tremendous social dislocation. These are human beings who are being told that they may have some real problems, that their lives may be threatened."

Positive test results are occurring not only in the high-risk male homosexual group, but also in the low-risk heterosexual population, he said.


However, the very fact that such news could be "catastrophic" to a blood donor, and that the test being used to detect the virus is not totally accurate, has prompted United Blood Services of Southern Arizona to decline to notify anyone with a positive test result. "It is premature to do it," said Joseph Dooley, executive director of UBS, which has just opened a non-profit blood donor center in Tucson and is testing all donated blood for the virus. "The test is too insensitive... It doesn't tell you much."

No blood units donated to UBS in Tucson have tested positive, he said.

probably because the center is so new and few units have been processed. However, UBS has no plans now to notify any potentially infected donors in Phoenix, either, where the company dominates the non-profit blood donation business.

"Telling someone they have a positive test is potentially catastrophic for them," said Dr. James Olive, vice president for medical and technical operations for Blood Services Inc., in Scottsdale, parent company of UBS. "We've got to have better data if we're going to do that. Even a confirmed positive test doesn't mean you have AIDS. We don't really know what it means. It really isn't right to frighten someone nice enough to give blood with a test result that we don't even understand."

People who have repeatedly tested positive to HTLV-III with this test have shown a negative result when a more specific, sophisticated and expensive blood test is used, he pointed out. "It makes you think there might be something wrong with the test," Olive said. It is "unwise" for people at high risk for AIDS to take the HTLV-III test, in Olive's opinion.



Q. Can straight women and Lesbians get AIDS?

A. YES, but to date women are a very small group (6%) of the total number of Persons With AIDS (PWA's). This would

be about 600 out of 10,000 cases currently reported. Most in the group have been infected [1] by sexual contact with high-risk men (Gay, bisexual, IV drug users), or [2] due to contaminated blood products, or sexual contact with someone who received such blood products. Lesbians who refrain from sexual contact with high-risk males have a very low incidence of AIDS. If you are contemplating sexual activity with high-risk males, use of condoms may provide some degree of protection.

Q. I'm getting married after several years of a "Gay" lifestyle. Should I get the HTLV-III test to see if I've been exposed to AIDS?

A. YES and NO! This is a difficult question, and may be the only exception to the advice we generally give against taking the HTLV-III test. The answer is NO if you have already been sexually active with your potential marriage partner and do not plan to have children in the near future. In this situation, if you were tested and were found to be positive, she probably would also test positive - eventually,

due to your exchange of body fluids. So why worry about the fact that both of you have been exposed, but may never develop AIDS? If, however, you plan to start a family, both of you should consider being tested to see if either or both of you have been exposed. Pediatric AIDS cases are not rare (107+ cases), especially to mothers who had no symptoms of AIDS before they gave birth, but who developed AIDS after giving birth. Therefore, planning to have children where one or both parents are in a high risk group (Gay, bisexual, IV drug user) might be the exception to the general "NO" given regarding the HTLV-III test, especially if either person was sexually exposed to someone who actually developed AIDS.

Q. What is an ARC? I heard the term used at the AIDS Forum.

A. ARC stands for "AIDS Related Complex or Condition", a syndrome recently defined by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta. Since most of the opportunistic infections used for diagnosis of AIDS

appear in only the most severe cases, a new group was devised to reflect those persons who share many of the symptoms, but do not yet have the "appropriate" infection to meet CDC standards for a confirmed diagnosis of AIDS. Thus we have "ARC" - conditions related to AIDS but not quite yet a "confirmed" case.

ARC includes persons without severe opportunistic infections who satisfy criteria for two laboratory conditions or abnormalities from each group below:

[1] CLINICAL, for 3 or more months in the absence of other causes.

[a.] Fever equal to, or above 100 degrees F.

[b.] Swollen lymph nodes [Lymphadenopathy]

[c.] Diarrhea.

[d.] Night Sweats.

[e.] Constant fatigue.

[f.] Total weight loss of 10% of body weight, or more than 15 lbs. in 1 week to 3 months.

[2] LABORATORY [See your doctor about this if you have any two of the above!!!!]

PROUD OF WHAT?

Part of the 'American Ethic' that we are taught is to take pride in what we do and to have pride in ones self. Developing a supportive network of friends can help to erase the damage of the past. It makes me very proud when I meet understanding parents who are supportive. I'm proud of organizations in Tucson like the Gay Youth Group. They all work to produce stable persons who are accepting of themselves and are proud to be who they are. The harassment and condemnation needs to be countered with support.

When the declaration of one's sexual preference is made to parents and they have a loving response, I'm proud of these people. Parents may be shocked but they've probably known all

along. I'm very proud of those persons who come to the point of self-acceptance that they feel they must let those who mean most know about their sexual preference. It takes a lot of courage. A person risks much in doing so. I'm not proud of parents who reject their own because of their son or daughter's sexual preference. It is a twisted parental love that does things like that. From my own personal experience I can tell you it's not easy to deal with at times.



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
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

A View From Within

NAOMI HARWARD ON THE EVENT OF THE UNITED NATIONS DECADE OF WOMEN CONFERENCE IN NAIROBI, AFRICA**JULY 1985**

"This is the 1985 United Nations Decade of Women Conference and it's the follow-up from the big conference on women in Mexico in 1975. Then the mid-decade conference in Copenhagen in 1980. What they're trying to do is really stimulate more awareness and concern for women throughout the world and there will be people from all over the world talking in terms of the kinds of things that are their problems, and what they are doing about them, and how it's coming.

"This particular conference is concentrating on equality, opportunity and peace. Then they have sub-headings [which include] employment, health-care, and education.

"I'm representing the Gray Panthers at the sub-committee on the Non-Governmental Organization [NGO]. They found from their experience in Mexico City and Copenhagen that official delegates from the countries that participate in the United Nations ... come with instructions on what they are supposed to say, and what they are not supposed to say. So, they have developed this NGO conference that precedes the regular conference to get people together, to feel freer [to talk], and these people are not delegates from their governments: they are representatives from all different kinds of organizations, and groups throughout the world that are concerned about the welfare of women. They come together to talk frankly in terms of what is really happening, while at the regular United Nations Conference, it's very official.

"I will be participating in the older women's sub-committee and I will be carrying a resolution that has been developed by the Gray Panthers and nine other organizations, and will be presenting it at the sub-committee meeting. I have not seen it yet [the


Naomi Harward, 78, professor emeritus at the Arizona State University, [1954-1976] has been an active member of the Gray Panthers since she helped found the Arizona chapter in 1978. She is from Illinois, and came to Arizona in 1954 because of her children's health. She taught for almost 23 years at ASU first in the Sociology Department, and later in the School of Social Work, and retired from teaching in 1976. In 1978, she helped to create the Valley of the Sun Gray Panthers. It is because of her work with the Arizona chapter, and her work with the national Gray Panthers organization that she is going to Africa.

She has spoken in favor of civil rights of many groups, including Gay men and Lesbian women [most recently of which was her presentation to the Human Relations Committee Ad Hoc Committee on Additional Coverage for the Phoenix City Council, which was examining the possibilities of adding sexual orientation to the list of groups against which discrimination would be illegal.]

"I'm Vice Chair of the National Steering Committee [for the Gray Panthers] and so, I'm on the National Executive Board of the Gray Panthers.

"I think it [the trip to Africa and the United Nations Conference] is very exciting. I think it will be an opportunity to have some contact with people from all different kinds of backgrounds, and to discuss some of our common problems and any ideas we have on how to meet them."

Dear Large Nellie Thing,


