TUCSON - It what was probably the worst kept secret in Tucson memory, Rumor Hazzit opened its doors last weekend amid a flurry of hot recorded sounds and great video dancing entertainment. The club, located at 2222 N. Stone Avenue is right in the 'glide path' of all the other night spots frequented by the Tucson Gay Community. For old time Tucsonans, the location was initially opened as a Gay bar in 1976 known as Lucky Pierre's and then again as the Front Runner, and since has housed several non-Gay operations.

The facility is an excellent one which has been enhanced by the addition of the latest in sound equipment from New York and the latest in Video equipment also. The giant, life-size screen puts the dancer right in the picture. This club is unique in that it is only one of two or three such entertainment spots in the entire city. A really nice coup for the Tucson Gay Community.

Owner Bruce Pegg along with his able right hand and manager Jason Mallonee have put a lot of thought and effort into this new venture. Bruce was co-owner of a club in Los Angeles prior to coming to Tucson. Jason was daytime bartender at the Graduate before coming to Rumor Hazzit.

In addition, Bruce has surrounded himself with a very competent staff of

people, many of whom are well-known in the local community. They include Eddie Florez [aka Eileen Over], Jim Joplin, ex Fineline tender; Brian, ex-Rita's waiter, and Chuck, who left Tucson seven years ago for San Francisco, are behind the bar; Jack is waiter, Steve and John are DJ and VJ respectively and Scott is the big man on the door.

The opening weekend saw a large crowd attend the four-day celebration and dance their 'booties' off on the large dance floor, or cruise at the thirty foot bar, or sit and watch everything in the seating area.

Rumor Hazzit opens at 11:00 a.m., [noon on Sundays], and closes at 1:00 a.m. Video dancing begins at 9:00 daily. Also scheduled are some great movies to be shown Saturday, Sunday and Mondays. Saturday will feature adventure movies of first-run calibre. On Sundays movies that have a Gay theme will be shown. Mondays will be "Classic" movie night featuring the oldies but goldies. In addition the club offers a different drink special each day of the week.

Possible link between pot, immunity suppression

WASHINGTON, DC - Scientists are stepping up investigations into a possible link between AIDS and smoking marijuana, government officials testified Monday at a House subcommittee hearing. Marijuana is being studied, because "it is known that cannabis in and of itself" suppresses the immune system, as does acquired immune deficiency syndrome, said Dr. James O. Mason, acting assistant secretary for health in the Department of Health and Human Services.

Thus, the question of whether a connection exists "is being looked at very carefully," Mason said. "Maybe the interaction of the two has an effect," he said.

Mason faced tough questioning from Rep. Henry A. Waxman, D-Calif., who has charged that the Reagan administration has not put enough money into AIDS research. After prodding by Waxman, chairman of the House Energy and Commerce subcommittee on health and the environment, the administration has proposed a 47 percent budget increase in AIDS research for fiscal 1986. Moreover, Mason told the subcommittee: "Everything that can be done is being done. No stone is being left unturned."

After the hearing, other government officials gave details of the marijuana studies, which are being conducted on both animals and humans. The officials, calling the studies "preliminary," defended them as being worthwhile in the face of the AIDS epidemic.

For example, a study on guinea

pigs at the Medical College in Richmond Virginia, showed that marijuana suppresses the animals' immune systems and makes them more susceptible to herpes, said Dr. Marvin Snyder, director of the division of pre-clinical research at the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration.

But although herpes and AIDS are both viral diseases, they differ in many of their symptoms, Snyder acknowledged. Nevertheless, Snyder said, the Virginia research "raises the issue of whether, because it [suppression of the immune system] happens with one virus, it can happen with another."

The drug studies are part of investigations of what scientists call a patient's "co-factors," including nutrition, general health and the number of previous infections. Many of those who are AIDS victims also smoke marijuana, he added.

Dr. Harold M. Ginzburg, associate director of clinical medicine at the federal drug institute said that data is being compiled on drug users in New York and New Jersey, to see if "any unique patterns" could link AIDS to drug use. So far, he said, "an index of suspicion" worth pursuing has been raised. But, he added, that he does not expect definitive results before the year's end.

Snyder said that anyone "would be well advised to stop taking any illicit drug, especially marijuana," and he speculated that heroin also might suppress the immune system.

Rock Hudson Ill, Being Treated By AIDS Specialists

PARIS, FRANCE (AP) - The American Hospital Wednesday, July 24, denied that movie idol Rock Hudson is being treated for inoperable liver cancer, and said tests have not yet revealed what ailment is responsible for the star's collapse and hospitalization.

"As far as we know that report [of liver cancer] is false, and it certainly wasn't given by the doctors at the American Hospital in Paris," said hospital spokesman Bruce Redor. Redor was replying to a question from the CBS morning news.

Hudson's publicity agent has said the actor is suffering from liver cancer and is being treated by specialists from a Paris institute that specializes in medical research and has conducted a search for the cause of AIDS. The agent, Dale Olson, said in Los Angeles that the actor had collapsed at the Paris Ritz Hotel on Sunday night. "He's been in and out of a coma. He's a very, very sick man," Olson said. My official statement is that Rock Hudson is in the American Hospital in Paris, where his doctors have diagnosed that he has cancer of the liver and that it is not operable," Olson said.

Hospital spokeswoman Joyce Gray told the Associated Press: "Mr. Hudson was hospitalized July 21, Sunday, for fatigue and general malaise. He is currently undergoing a series of examinations. As of this moment the results of these examinations have been inconclusive."

Redor said that the 59-year-old Hudson was under observation and was in satisfactory condition. Hudson had gone to Paris to see doctors at the Pasteur Institute said his Beverly Hills physician Dr. Rexford Kennamer. The Institute specializes in research, and has conducted recent work to seek the cause of AIDS [Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome].

Hudson made a public appearance last week in Pebble Beach, Calif., to help Doris Day promote her television series on pets. He looked gaunt at the time, but his publicists said only that Hudson had wanted to lose weight.

Beginning in 1948, Hudson's commanding 6-foot-4 size, strong presence and good looks led him to starring roles opposite some of Hollywood's leading ladies in more than 50 Westerns, war epics, comedies and tear-jerking dramas. He later went on to star in the television series "McMillan and Wife" and "Dynasty".

Olson also said there were indications of cancer in Hudson's blood. However, he said reports that Hudson is suffering from acquired immune deficiency syndrome were speculative and have not been confirmed or denied by doctors. AIDS destroys the body's immunity to infection.

"The doctor in Paris indicated that at this point he has seen no indication of AIDS," Olson said. Asked what Hudson's prognosis was, she said: "I haven't been given one." He said he believed doctors wanted to wait until after sessions with specialists before making a prognosis. He said Hudson was being tested for "everything". Asked whether that included AIDS, he repeated: "Everything."

AIDS, believed to be caused by an unusual virus discovered in France and the United States in 1984, is most likely to strike homosexuals, abusers of injectable drugs and hemophiliacs. It apparently is spread by sexual contact, contaminated needles and blood transfusions, but not by casual contact.

As of June 24, AIDS had struck 12,271 people in the United States and claimed 5,641 lives since 1979.

ATASCOSA PEAK

This is a fairly steep, dry and hot climb. It's about three-and-a-half miles up with a 1500 foot, or so, elevation gain. The peak is at the southern end of the reef-like cliffs of Atascosa Mountains. Special needs of Lesbians & Gays

Lesbians and Gays are subject to both sexual assault and domestic violence. Until recently, sexual assault in the Lesbian and Gay community in Tucson was a silent issue. The Tucson Lesbian and Gay Pride Committee publicly addressed the issue at a law enforcement forum in November, 1984. Police officials from the sex crime divisions of both the Tucson Police Department and the Sheriff's Dept. discussed the dilemma and identified some effective ways to begin to empower Lesbians and Gays.

The problem is just not as simple as reporting incidents to the police. Most often Gay men are assaulted by men. Therefore, the assault itself is of a homosexual nature. Not that the offender is necessarily homosexual, but that in the reporting of the crime, the Gay victim is in essence revealing his sexual preference. If the rapist is caught and the case goes to trial, the victim's private sexual behavior is made public. Most victims, therefore, are reluctant to report or fail to report at all out of a very real fear of severe repercussions on the job or from family and friends.

Lesbians face a similar dilemma. Many rapists and heterosexual men in general have the opinion that all a Lesbian needs is a "good man" to turn her around. If the crime is reported and the case goes to trial, the victim again faces the fear of her private life being made public. Thus both Lesbians and Gays are often assaulted as they enter and leave popular gathering spots because the rapist knows that if the incident is reported, the victim may have more to lose than the offender.

The Tucson Police Department and the Tucson Lesbian & Gay Pride Committee have appointed mutual liaisons to insure that crimes are effectively investigated and that the victims are protected and supported. Also many Lesbians and Gays have volunteered to be available to offer support to the victim on the scene and afterwards,

similar to a victim-witness type program.

Unfortunately, the issue of domestic violence among Lesbian and Gay couples has yet to be formally or specifically addressed in Tucson. Recent research and literature on Gay relationships suggest that there is a connection between a lack of positive, effective role models and domestic violence. It is obvious that almost all Lesbians and Gays came from heterosexual parents. So our role models are those of how our parents related to each other as spouses. As the majority society has prescribed different roles and appropriate behaviors for men and women, same sex couples cannot effectively and/or successfully relate by simply learning from the majority examples. To the extent that there is domestic violence in the majority society and to the degree that same sex couples rely on their role models from the majority society as examples of how to behave, there will be domestic violence in same sex relationships. Furthermore, the stress that most Lesbians and Gays experience because of discrimination is as contributing factor in creating abusive behavior.

The Tucson Lesbian & Gay Pride Committee is a relatively new organization. We are continually identifying new program areas than we can address. As in many minority groups, we become so busy fighting overt discrimination issues in relating day to day with the majority society, that we overlook how we relate to each other. In reality how we treat each other many times is greatly affected by how we perceive we are treated by the majority society. The Tucson Lesbian & Gay Pride Committee hopes that as we become more open as Lesbians and Gays, our relationships will receive more sanctioning from our families, friends, and institutions. Then there will be more visible, successful role models from which to learn. Also, as more community services recognize the unique needs of the Lesbian and Gay community, it is hoped their staff will become increasingly sensitive in addressing our needs.

A View From Within

JENNIFER ROBERSON, NOVELIST, ON HER NEW NOVEL TENTATIVELY ENTITLED THE HOUND OF IRELAND AND THE IMPORTANCE OF THE GAY CHARACTER, BARD.

"One of the new books that I will have coming out will be out from DELL, and it is a straight, historical romance also known... in the genre, as a bodice ripper, ... a straight romance between a man and a woman, and unbelievable adventures... It has some characteristics that I think will make it stand apart from other historical romances in that it's taking today's problems with the IRA and talking about them back in the year 1617, because it has the roots a long time ago. But, I have also added an element which I'm not positive has been treated fairly before in historical fiction in that there is a love triangle" It's two men and a woman, and instead of having two men in love with the same woman, I have a woman and a man in love with the hero."

With this intriguing description, Jennifer Roberson, 31, began to tell the tale of her forthcoming book to an interested collection of avid book readers at a recent autograph party held to celebrate the release of her newest book THE SONG OF HOMANA, published by DAW. The book, the second of her eight part fantasy series, Chronicles of the Cheysuli, continues the story of shapechangers which began with the first book SHAPECHANGERS, and will continue in 1986 with LEGACY OF THE SWORD.

A busy writer, Jennifer has four completed projects either out now, or scheduled for release, and seven projects in various stages of progress. Though new to the field of professional writing, "If you want to call me a 15-year overnight success, that's fine." With three professional years behind her, she represents a vital new generation of authors. With her forthcoming book, she deals honestly and compassionately with a character who is homosexual.

Speaking on the part her homosexual character, Bard, plays in the novel, Ms. Roberson says: "He is the right-hand man of the hero... He goes everywhere with O'Neal [the main male character], and looks after him in a rather dangerous sort of way because all the dirty work that has to be done is done by Bard, as far as the killing and the stealing and things like that. He is an interesting character in that he is very complex. You're never quite sure what he is capable of doing. You know he has killed and that he is capable of killing again, and that he just might."

"For those people who may view him with distaste at first, I think will come to like him and understand him as a character because he is doing what he has to do for Ireland. That is the predominant theme through the whole book. Yes, it is a love story. But it is a love story. But it is also love of country, and dedication to country as well as the classic romance story that unfolds."

"[The relationship between Bard and Keiran O'Neal] began a long time ago, in childhood; they grew up together. I can't say everything about it because it would be giving away some things in the book. Bard fell in love with Keiran O'Neal many years before and is very devoted to him. But it's not an obsessive devotion in that he is not drooling, or crawling around on his hands and knees for him. It's an abiding love based on trust, loyalty as well as physical attraction too. And O'Neal is aware of it and, to some degree, he uses it because he has to. He will use anything that is necessary in order to support his cause. For them both, Ireland is the most important thing. Even more important than any physical attraction between men, or men and women. There is a lot of repression and some violence in that and I think it just adds some facets that a lot of times are overlooked."

As interested as I was in the story, I had to ask if there were any love scenes between the two major male characters. To this question, Ms.

Roberson quickly replied: "No. O'Neal is all heterosexual, and for him to let down enough barriers to allow any sort of physical love to show, he is just not capable of it. For a long time Bard does not really know the depth of affection that Keiran holds for him, but there, near the end of the book, it is devolved. You understand that O'Neal did indeed all along know how much Bard cared for him. He could never really vocalize it. There is a brief conflict where Keiran sort of vocalizes how he feels about it and says, basically, 'You be what you have to be; I'm what I am, you're what you are.' I think it comes clear, between the lines - if not stated - ... it becomes quite clear what there is between them."

It seems too true, now, that Gay men and Lesbian women are being peppered amongst stories in print, and in films and television, as a token gesture of liberalism -- much the same way that blacks were in the early 70's. Few are those characters that go beyond the gratuitous, and emerge as strong men and women who serve to move the story toward completion. It is a new generation of writers who will people their stories with real flesh-and-bones homosexual that will move our cause forward by exposing the reading masses to another side of homosexuality; that will show them that we are as normal and ordinary as they.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. What is the "Delta Hepatitis" I heard about in California recently?

A. Hepatitis-B alone is a very dangerous disease, with the death rate reported as being as high as 50% in some metropolitan areas. More dangerous yet, and almost always fatal is the "Delta Factor" associated with Hepatitis-B, which has been frequently found in California this past year in high risk individuals [i.e. drug users & Gay/bisexual men].

So far, it has only been observed in persons with active cases of Hepatitis-B [HEP-B], so if you've already had a case of it, or have been immunized actively or passively for the disease, you are probably safe from this dreaded form of Hepatitis. Unfortunately, not many sexually active Gay men have taken advantage of the excellent HEP-B vaccine to safeguard their health [and lives!]. The cost may be one reason, since it is about \$100 for a series of 3 injections-which could save anywhere from \$5,000 to \$10,000 in medical expenses if someone were hospitalized with a serious case of HEP-B.

More costly yet is the toll due to permanent liver damage which may occur - and the high fatality rate [up to 50%] associated with HEP-B. One should also remember that this disease can be transmitted by persons in a "carrier" state, who are, or appear to be otherwise healthy. A simple blood test, available at the TALHA clinic, or

the Pima County Health Department, will confirm if you fall into one of the following categories, and should be run before you decide on taking the HEP-B vaccine. You will be only one of the following:

1. POSITIVE to HEP-B and passively immunized [no vaccine needed].
2. POSITIVE to HEP-B and an active "Carrier" of the disease
3. NEGATIVE, so the vaccine can protect you.

Hepatitis-B is a fairly common disease among Gay men, and 87 cases were reported in Pima County last year. If you are trying your best, in view of the AIDS epidemic, to be healthy, and stay healthy, think seriously about investing a little money in the added protection that can be gained from the HEP-B Vaccine.

'COMIC RELIEF' RAISES OVER \$300,000 FOR

AIDS MEDICAL FOUNDATION GRANTS

NEW YORK, NY - The AIDS Medical Foundation has announced grants totaling over \$300,000 in support of outstanding AIDS research projects. Selected for merit and relevance by the AIDS Medical Foundation's distinguished Scientific Committee, these projects range from molecular studies of the virus associated with AIDS to clinical trials of new drugs with promise for the treatment of the infection by this virus. Among the institutions in which this research will be carried out are the Universities of Cornell, Nebraska, Boston, and San Francisco. The Albert Einstein College of Medicine, Massachusetts General Hospital, The St. Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital Center of Columbia University as well as the National Institute of Health and the Pasteur Institute in Paris.

New applications are being accepted at this time for the second cycle of funding in 1985. Investigators need not be directly associated with the AIDS Medical Foundation. 


