LESBIAN AND GAY PRIDE WEEK WRAP-UP IN PHOTOS

We gave a pretty complete rundown on the picnic last issue where approximately 1500 persons visited Himmel Park throughout the first day of Pride Week and all appeared to have a wonderful time, as evidenced by the accompanying photos.

The Monday evening "Law and Government Forum" was cancelled due to lack of response from officials of our city law enforcement and city government officials.

The Tuesday evening "Video Dance" at Rita's Rendezvous was a spectacular event indeed. A huge, rear-projected screen featuring the hottest in video sounds of the day were displayed to a large appreciative crowd who gathered to watch and dance. As a surprise, video footage was shown of scenes from the Sunday Picnic which drew lots of hoots and hollers from the video gathering. A fun night.

On Wednesday, "Consenting Adults" movie was substituted at MCC because of the unavailability of "The Life and Times of Harvey Milk". This turn of events proved somewhat disappointing to the many who missed seeing the Milk film when it played at the New Loft. TGLPC has promised to show it as soon as it becomes available on video tape.

"International Stud" played to two performances at The Fineline on Thursday, and as usual both were top notch, thanks to the cast of Anthony, Monte-Jon and Delyla. We look forward to more from this talented crew.

The Dance Contest at Tramps held on Friday was well received even though there were only four couples who entered. All won prize money and TGLPC thanks all who entered.

Saturday's event was Summer Carnival held simultaneously at Colette's West and Back Pocket. The broiling sun did not deter those who participated by setting up booths nor those who stopped by to be entertained, informed and buy. This is a fun event that promises to get bigger each year.

On Sunday, Casino Night turned out to be Casino Afternoon at Tramps. A large crowd came by to enjoy the "gambling tables" and the winners took some mighty healthy looking plants as prizes. The "Swap Meet" for Arizona Gay was meagerly attended undoubtedly due to the extremely hot temperature.

So there it was, months in the planning, and even though there were some kinks, the entire week really ran like clockwork, mainly due to the untiring efforts of the Tucson Lesbian/Gay Pride Committee, and also to the businesses, organizations, and individuals who unselfishly donated their money, time, talents to make this year's Pride Week truly "Alive With Pride in '85".

PINELINE CHANGES POLICY

TUCSON - The Pineline has changed its policy with regard to underage admissions and also its alcohol drinking policy. Owner Dick Plowman has announced that effective Wednesday, July 3, the area which houses the Disco in the three story complex will no longer serve alcoholic beverages. The upstairs bar and the lower level bar will continue to serve alcoholic beverages as usual, but no alcohol may be brought into the Disco area.

In another major change, The Pineline will allow all persons 18 years of age or older entrance to the Disco area of the complex, since there will be no alcohol dispensed in this area. All persons under the legal drinking age [born after Dec. 31, 1965] will be required to remain in this area while on the premises. All other persons who can show that they are of legal age by providing proper identification, can move about the premises freely but may not bring alcoholic beverages into the Disco area. There will be soft drinks as well as juice drinks available in the Disco. Because of this change in policy, there will be a small admission fee for the Disco area of the Pineline complex.


In another development, Plowman stated that he will again be open after hours every Friday and Saturday night as well as Holiday nights.

Because of this new policy, and because of past troubles, Plowman stated that security will tightened even more to prevent minors from gaining access to either the upstairs or downstairs bar areas. Acceptable ID is required for admission to the drinking areas.

Because of the recent rash of laws being passed raising the drinking age across the country, many clubs are initiating this policy of providing non-alcohol areas for the younger customers, where they may enjoy the music and dancing, in a night club atmosphere but without having alcoholic beverages served in those special areas.




A View From Within

A LETTER FROM A FRIEND.

Last week, I received a letter from a new-found friend. I was quite touched by the sentiment, even though this letter was a quotation from someone else. It was short, simple really, but eloquent as few other writings have ever been. In another departure from my weekly commentary, I reprint that letter here. This letter contains a quote from Robert Hardy Andrews.

"In India 2500 years ago, a man named Buddha walked the roads and preached and taught. His teachings are still remembered by five million Buddhist believers in Asia and the Orient.

"I am not a Buddhist. But I find no disloyalty to my faith in accepting advice as practical today as it was when Buddha first offered it. In a mango grove in Bihar he told one of his disciples that five things are necessary to achieve release from unhappiness and fear. These, he said, include: restraint, proper discourse, energy in producing good thoughts, firmness in pursuing them, and acquisition of true insight. But first of all, and above all, he said, the seeker must learn to be a good friend.

"When Buddha was asked for a definition of friendliness, he answered 'It means to have hope of the welfare of others more than for one's self... It means affection unsullied by hope or thought of any reward on Earth or in Heaven.'

"Buddha admitted that such generous wholeheartedness would not be easy. Yet in the long run it is intensely practical. 'Compassion and knowledge and virtue,' he said, 'are the only possessions that do not fade away.'

"To be a good friend... Now simple it sounds -- just five short words. Yet how much they represent! Think how much it could mean, a friend out of new forces of friendship from person to person, and eventually from land to land.

"Try as we may, there is no other form of security. As Buddha said, 'Friendship is the only cure for hatred, the only guarantee of peace.'

To find a friend is always a wonderful feeling. If that friendship leads to a more intimate relationship, then you both will know the joy of sharing with someone who is both a friend and lover.

CHRISTI: Of course! I'd love to!




