PINELINE CHANGES POLICY

TUCSON - The Pineline has changed its policy with regard to underage admissions and also its alcohol drinking policy. Owner Dick Plowman has announced that effective Wednesday, July 3, the area which houses the Disco in the three story complex will no longer serve alcoholic beverages. The upstairs bar and the lower level bar will continue to serve alcoholic beverages as usual, but no alcohol may be brought into the Disco area.

In another major change, The Pineline will allow all persons 18 years of age or older entrance to the Disco area of the complex, since there will be no alcohol dispensed in this area. All persons under the legal drinking age (born after Dec. 31, 1955) will be required to remain in this area while on the premises. All other persons who can show that they are of legal age by providing proper identification, can move about the premises freely but may not bring alcoholic beverages into the Disco area. There will be soft drinks as well as juice drinks available in the Disco. Because of this change in policy, there will be a small admission fee for the Disco area of the Pineline complex.

In another development, Plowman stated that he will again be open after hours every Friday and Saturday night as well as Holiday nights.

Because of this new policy, and because of past troubles, Plowman stated that security will be tightened even more to prevent minors from gaining access to either the upstairs or downstairs bar areas. Acceptable ID is required for admission to the drinking areas.

Because of the recent rash of laws being passed raising the drinking age across the country, many clubs are initiating this policy of providing non-alcohol areas for the younger customers, where they may enjoy the music and dancing, in a night club atmosphere but without having alcoholic beverages served in those special areas.

DIVERSITY MARKS
GAY PRIDE CELEBRATIONS

Men dressed as cheerleaders, sultans and nuns hoisted a multi-colored Gay Pride flag opposite San Francisco's city hall, while in New York, a banner proclaiming "You Ain't Seen Nothing Yet" led the 18th annual Gay/Lesbian Pride Day Parade down Fifth Avenue.

About 100,000 people marched last Sunday, June 30, in San Francisco's 13th annual Gay and Lesbian Freedom Day celebration, and police estimated that an additional 150,000 turned out to offer support.

"From Our Freedom, we produce diversity, and from our diversity, we gain strength to overcome our problems," said Senator Alan Cranston, D-Calif., who waved a Gay pride flag from the speakers platform at the Civic Center plaza.

In New York, the 15,000 to 20,000 marchers included groups carrying signs identifying themselves as college students, teachers, bankers, lawyers, psychologists, veterans, police officers and members of various religious denominations.

SAILOR WITH AIDS
OUSTED WITHOUT BENEFITS

SAN DIEGO, CA (AP) - A sailor dying from AIDS who had sought a medical discharge from the Navy has been recommended to dismissal under conditions that would provide him with neither medical nor disability benefits.

"What he needs is a medical retirement so he can be comfortable in his last days," said Tom Holmann, an American Civil Liberties Union attorney representing Petty Officer 3rd Class Byron G. Kinney, 28. "This is the cruelest decision they could have made."

A discharge panel unanimously decided last week that Kinney is a homosexual and had therefore fraudulently enlisted in the Navy, which bars homosexuals.

'SUMMER SMILES' TO BENEFIT AIDS

TUCSON - "Summer Smiles" a live show produced by Garbo Productions in association with "R" Productions will present an AIDS Benefit this Wednesday, July 3 at 7:30 p.m. in the BFR at The Pineline. A \$5.00 donation is requested. The show stars Newton-John Skinner and Barbara Tafaya. Skinner, who has himself been diagnosed as having AIDS, was a recent speaker at the Tucson AIDS Forum. He is an accomplished actor who has studied at the University of Arizona and has appeared in several theatrical productions locally as well as New York and Chicago.

"Summer Smiles" will continue after the July 3rd Benefit Show with ten more performances: Friday - Sunday, July 5, 6, 7 and Wednesday - Sunday, July 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14. In addition there will be two matinee performances on the Sundays of July 7 and 14 at 5:00 p.m. Tickets for all these performances will be \$3.00 in advance or \$4.00 at the door and may be purchased at the upstairs bar at The Pineline. The production will be reviewed in next week's edition of the OBSERVER.

THAT'S WHAT FRIENDS ARE FOR

One of the things a person realizes when they make a long distance move is that they will be leaving friends. When they get to their new location chances are there will be no friends there to greet them. Friends make all the difference in the world.

When a person has a few friends there are people to do things with; people to share with. If you're in a tight spot a friend with a listening ear is always beneficial. Friends give a person a sense of community - of belonging.

There are a few different kinds of friends that one may or may not wish to have. There are the friends-in-passing kind who say, "Hello, how are you doing?" They don't expect a real answer to the question and probably don't want one. They really don't know you and couldn't be counted on in a pinch. They don't mean any harm. Let's classify them as friendly, courteous people.

Then there are the superficial kind of friends. They say they care, would be there for you, etc. They may be there too if it's in their schedule. They may be there too if there's something in it for them. The play-by-my-rules kind of friend fits in here also. As long as you play by the rules and don't rock the boat everything is fine. Don't disagree or have a better idea with these. The run-your-life kind of friend is next. They are always giving advice when it's never been asked for. Often times these people specialize in giving advice about things they know little or nothing about. Maybe you've experienced some of these kinds of friends and found them to be less than good experiences.

If someone is to have genuine friends or to be a genuine friend to someone else it requires some kind of informal understandings. There is a process of investing oneself in another when you become a friend to someone else. It's not something that happens overnight but usually is something that grows between two people. The understandings are not verbalized but somehow understood by each. Paul Young in a recent song that's being played a lot lately, sings a line, "Everytime you go away, you take a piece of me with you." That strikes a few notes in me. Recently I moved away from a very special group of friends and I know I felt like I was leaving some of me there. I also felt like I was taking something with me. There had been an investment made that was mutual. Friendship is not one-sided but mutual.

When you're not doing well, a friend is there to give support. Friends are good listeners. Friends may disagree but they don't condemn one another. A friend keeps things shared in confidence. When a friend makes a commitment to another, they're there. A friend rejoices with you and cries with you. A friend is not there for what they can get out of it.

That's what friends are for. Isn't it.

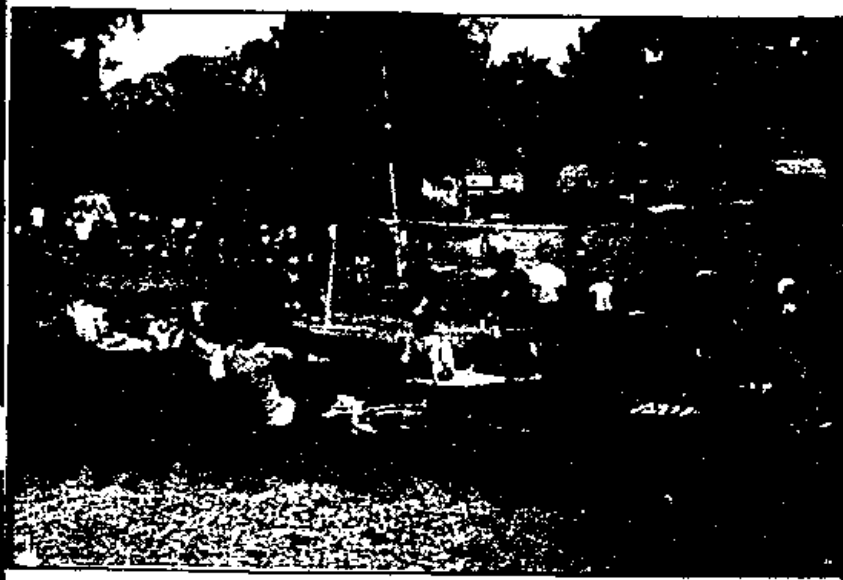

CHRISTI: Of course! I'd love to!

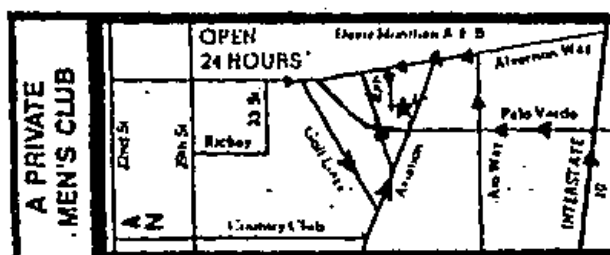
