## EDITOR'S NOTE

As predicted, the situation is getting worse. And it will get a lot worse before it's all over. Two more Tucsonans died just last Monday from the dreaded Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome. Actor Newton John Skinner and George Hamilton both met their maker after valiant efforts to 'beat' the effects of AIDS. This makes a total of 13 deaths in Pima County, with the State's death count at 28 as of the 7th of August.

Before this unpleasant news, a letter from the Arizona AIDS Fund Trust Executive Director Bob Hegyi, informed us that in a recent two week period in Arizona, "20 people were diagnosed with AIDS Related Complex, 11 people were diagnosed with certifiable AIDS and 7 people died of AIDS".

Pretty frightening figures. And they promise to get worse-- much worse!

The Reagan administration has finally increased the AIDS funding request by some \$46 million, according to the National Gay Task Force. This budget amendment adds \$5 million to AIDS spending in 1985 bringing the total to nearly \$109 million and adds \$40.7 million to the President's budget request for fiscal 1986 [which brings that amount to over \$126 million].

All well and good for the researchers and toward educational efforts. But what about the actual victims? Who are they to turn to for help, assistance, counseling, guidance and the thousands of other things that a person who finds themselves in such a predicament, needs to take care of? To this end a state-wide organization - Arizona Aids Fund Trust - was set up to administer one-on-one assistance to People With AIDS [PWA's]

## Tucsonan Newton John Skinner Succumbs To AIDS

It's like to have AIDS.

TUCSON - Talented local actor and popular member of the Tucson community, Newton John Skinner passed away last Monday, August 5 from complications associated with AIDS. Services will be held this Thursday, May 8, at 11:00 a.m. at Christ The King Church, 2800 West Ina Road.

A real show business trooper, Newton, who studied at the University of Arizona Drama Department, last appeared in a light-hearted revue "Summer Smiles" at the Fineline during the month of July. The show, which contained some of his original material as well as others, and played with Barbara Tafuya, showed off Skinner's unique talents. Summer Smiles played to large audiences and was extremely well received. All the reviews were excellent.

Newton was a very outspoken person on the subject of AIDS, and he used every opportunity to voice his opinions and knowledge in an attempt to educate people about the dread disease. He spoke eloquently before the first Tucson AIDS Project forum held last May 23.

Since he was so sincere in his desire to let people know about AIDS, and the fears of the unknown, we are herewith reprinting his short talk for those who may have missed it. Of course, the words ring even truer today.

"First of all, I want to thank Bob Henry because he's done a lot of work to get us all here, and also the Tucson AIDS Project for finally getting together. It's happening now.

"The Choice was mine, and mine completely. I could have any prize that I desired. I could burn with the splendor of the brightest fire. Or else, or else I could choose time.

"My name is Newton. With a name like Newton, I was marked as an oddball from the very beginning. I have been Gay since I saw Dorothy in the Wizard of Oz. I am twenty-six years old and last year I was diagnosed with AIDS.

"From the bubonic plague to cancer, no epidemic has struck hysteria in the human heart like AIDS. They will talk of it years from now as an epidemic, syndrome, whatever you like, that wiped out thousands of homosexuals. A disease that made a clean sweep through a society that worshipped only two things - physical beauty and our own sensuousness. And so I come to you here on my soapbox to tell you what

"It's like sitting on a time bomb, what do you think. I think the most difficult time for anyone who gets AIDS emotionally is when they first find out. Their first thoughts is that they have been given an automatic death sentence. Death is everywhere. Not only death, but guilt. And worst of all - fear. If the patient continues in this state of mind for too long a period, then he must surely die. But, if he has the courage and the stamina to make the decision that he will fight this monster, then maybe, there's no guarantee he won't die, but maybe miraculously he will live.

"There's a small handful of men who were diagnosed in 1979 who are still alive. They are the survivors, and it seems to me, that we must look to them if we are to survive. The first thing they possess is hope. But how do we find hope when we know that the medical profession can do only so much? I believe they can and will find a cure, but it will take time. To those people already affected, time is running out. So the hope I am referring to is not a cure for the masses immediately, but rather a cure for the individual.

"AIDS is an individual disease. It affects everyone differently. And if we are to be cured, then we must pay attention not only to the body, but to the mind and to the spirit as well. To deal with the spirit means to deal with whatever emotional turmoil we may be going through. The stress of everyday living is taxing enough. To be told you are a terminal case is enough to drive you a little batty. Some people will be overwhelmed by fear, some by guilt. I can feel only anger - anger at God. It was beyond me why I should get this thing. Why it should exist. I can't answer that, no one can.

"But I've been comparatively lucky. I've had only Kaposi's Sarcoma, a skin cancer that is not, in and of itself, a life threatening condition. But since about last June, my life has become a parade of doctor's offices, Kimo therapy, waiting rooms, and blood tests. My life has changed immeasurably. But in many instances, it has changed for the better. First of all, I know who my real friends are. There have been instances where I told some person or another that I have AIDS, and I can see their eyes kind of glaze over, and I know that because of their fear, they have shut me out of their lives. That is understandable, fear is everywhere. But my real friends have stood staunchly beside my side. They have given me not sympathy and pity but rather respect and love, and I am grateful. They have not treated me like a sick person, and I think there is a lot of truth in the old adage, 'If you're treated like a sick person, you're apt to act like one.'

"Don't think, however, that everyone is as lucky as I am. Thousands of men, women and children are dying, and I am young. They need our care. They need our prayers, they need our money. And they need to feel they are not lepers. How do you deal with an AIDS patient? If you have any intelligence at all, you'll treat him like anyone else.

"I'd like to take a few moments to talk about politics. For me, this is a very dangerous subject as I believe that actors should stay out of politics. Ronald Reagan is clear proof of that. But, like our dear sainted Katherine Hepburn, I cannot bear to keep my mouth shut.

"The government's handling of the AIDS situation has been, up to this point, abominable. I am ashamed to live in a country that has so idiotically ignored the largest public

## LIZ VISITS ROCK IN HOSPITAL

LOS ANGELES, CA (AP) - Actress Elizabeth Taylor visited longtime friend Rock Hudson at UCLA Medical Center, where the actor is being treated for acquired immune deficiency syndrome. Taylor, who is one of the organizers of a star-studded extravaganza planned for next month to raise money for AIDS research, met with the stricken actor last Sunday.

"Mr. Hudson is gaining strength and is in good spirits, however his condition remains fair," said a statement released on Monday. "His physician will decide on a day-to-day basis whether he should have visitors," the statement said.

Miss Taylor starred with Hudson in the 1956 movie, "Giant," the only film for which Hudson received an Academy Award nomination. Hudson's most recent role was in the "Dynasty" TV series.

Shirley MacLaine, Bette Midler, Burt Lancaster and Burt Reynolds will join Miss Taylor and other stars at a September 19th extravaganza to try to raise \$1 million to combat AIDS.

As of July 29, there were 12,067 reported cases of AIDS in the United States, and 6,079 of the victims had died, said officials of the National Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

health problem, not only of the decade, but of the century. The government is only too glad to ignore the homosexuals. We are considered an eyesore. But AIDS is no longer just a homosexual problem. It is affecting women and children, and still the government will not wake up. How many people will we have to bury? Money is needed not only for research but for support groups, and financial assistance for those people who are too sick to work.

"We can no longer sit placidly by and be ignored. Make no mistake, I am raising a battle cry. And having moved in Gay society for quite some time now, I know a lot of cats, and no one fights better than a cat. I call upon you to use whatever wiles you possess to put an end to this ridiculous prejudice that goes not just with having AIDS, but with being Gay.

"In closing, I would like to point out that from the beginning of this crisis, we have been barraged with only negative information. If we are to survive, then we must look to the positive aspects, no matter how slim they seem to be. We must reach out to whatever source that will contribute to our own individual wellness. There are many alternate methods of healing that we are just beginning to become aware of.

"In my own experience, I have found that the idea of Holistic Medicine, healing the whole person, is an important idea that will unleash the body's vital healing force that we all possess. My friend, Fay McCoy, has been treating me with Homeopathy, which bases its philosophy on the body's natural ability to heal itself. I have experimented with nutrition, exercise, meditation, and religion, and have found that they are all helpful in making me feel better when I have been ill.

"Reach out to your friends, forgive your enemies, and you can begin to find peace, and courage, and happiness. And some day, we will be the victors. We will conquer AIDS.

"Thank you."

MONUMENT TO LESBIAN/GAY MEN  
KILLED IN CONCENTRATION CAMPS

HAMBURG, WEST GERMANY (CON) - The first monument dedicated solely to the Gay men and Lesbians killed in Nazi concentration camps was unveiled here recently, according to a United Press International report in the Washington Blade. Made of pink granite, the monument was placed at the site of the Neuengamme concentration camp by a group of Independent Alternative Homosexuals. It bears the inscription, "Dedicated to the Homosexual Victims of National Socialism, 1935." Approximately 150 people attended the dedication ceremony.

It is believed that between 250,000 and 500,000 Gay men and Lesbians died in Nazi concentration camps.

EGYPTIAN COURT BANS  
'A THOUSAND AND ONE NIGHTS'

CAIRO, EGYPT (CON) - An Egyptian court ordered the confiscation of new editions of the ancient classic, "A Thousand and One Nights," charging the tales pose a threat to morals, according to the Boston Globe. The order capped a heated battle between the Interior Ministry and three booksellers trying to distribute the editions.

According to Sohair Kalamawy, a professor at Cairo University who wrote her doctoral dissertation on the centuries-old stories, "The words on sex constitute less than one-tenth of this book... There are many more graphic details of sex, even homosexual sex, in our heritage of literature and poetry." Kalamawy added, "It is our heritage and, of course, we will not change it."

In "A Thousand and One Nights," Scheherazade, bride of King Shehryar of Samarkand, tells the king stories, including some with homosexual sex scenes, to stop him from beheading her as he has done to a series of virgin brides after their wedding nights.

SERUM HE TOOK  
HAD AIDS VIRUS, MADDOX SAYS

ATLANTA, GA (AP) - Former Georgia Governor Lester Maddox has said that serum he was given by a cancer clinic tested positive for AIDS virus and hepatitis, and his blood will be tested to determine whether he has either disease.

The serum came from the Immunology Researching Center in Freeport, Bahamas, where Maddox underwent treatment for cancer several years ago. The clinic was shut down by the Bahamian government a few weeks ago after its serum was found to contain the virus that causes acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

"I got a report that shows that mine is positive like hundreds of others run all over the United States," said Maddox, 69.

Maddox said tests were conducted at Emory University Hospital Clinical Laboratories on 19 vials of serum from the cancer clinic. He said he administered about 2,500 injections to himself over the past 2 1/2 years under the program. His blood test will be conducted next week, he said.

He added that he is optimistic about reports that as many as 90 percent of those who come in contact with the AIDS virus do not contract the deadly disease.

ASPIRIN-HORMONE MIX FOUND  
TO STIMULATE IMMUNE SYSTEM

WASHINGTON, DC (AP) - Common aspirin has been found to stimulate the body's immunological system, thereby raising the possibility of combining the drug with certain hormones to treat deficiencies in the body's infection-fighting defenses, including an AIDS-like condition.

Scientists at George Washington University Medical Center said Monday they have discovered that aspirin indirectly boosts the immunological system by blocking synthesis of substances called prostaglandins, which inhibit key immunity cells. Test-tube work indicates that combining aspirin with thymus-gland hormones that also stimulate the immunological system produces an effect greater than using each alone, and the researchers said they are beginning testing in humans.

Dr. Allan Goldstein, chairman of the biochemistry department and chief researcher, said that there is not yet any evidence that aspirin will help people with AIDS, or help to prevent AIDS.

Certain thymus hormones called thymosins have been given to people with a condition called AIDS-related complex or ARC. Goldstein said thymosin boosted their bodies' levels of an important anti-viral infection-fighting chemical called interleukin-2, but did not decrease the signs of immunological suppression. This effect also was noted in tests on healthy people.

Goldstein said the next step, which has begun, is to test the combination in ARC patients.

## Tucson AIDS Project: Update

Recent months have seen the conception, organization and strong beginning of the Tucson AIDS Project (TAP), a volunteer group whose primary purpose is to provide necessary support for people with AIDS (PWAs). TAP is already supporting the current PWAs of Tucson with various services, and is ready to help those who are diagnosed with the disease.

TAP has presented two forums to people in high-risk groups, providing further information on AIDS, methods of risk reduction, coverage of legal and other social aspects, and an opportunity to ask questions of a panel of local professionals who deal with AIDS.

Currently, TAP is set up to quickly process a PWA as soon as he/she contacts the group, to assess the person's needs and provide information about TAP. This first visit opens access to TAP's various services.

One primary service is counseling and support, provided by qualified professionals in both private and group settings. A local PWA group has already formed and is meeting regularly. TAP is also aware of local clergymen who are willing to provide spiritual counseling. In addition, a counselor for people concerned about AIDS is available at the Men's Clinic held Friday evenings at La Cilafrica del Pueblo, 101 West Irvington from 6 to 8 p.m.

Another TAP service is providing in-home assistance to PWAs as needed. These services range from such simple items as helping with laundry or grocery shopping to daily visits by a nursing care professional.

Volunteers are also available to assist with transportation, to insure PWAs are able to make their medical appointments and handle other transportation needs.

Tucson AIDS Project is also affiliated with the Arizona AIDS Fund Trust (AAFT), and oversees disbursement of funds from the Trust in the Tucson area. Funding from AAFT is available for daily or emergency needs such as shelter and food, but generally not granted for medical care.

Other groups within TAP are in the process of forming, and should be providing services in the near future, including public assistance advocacy, help in legal and insurance matters, education, recreation and socialization.

As with any all-volunteer organization, TAP needs more volunteers. General meetings are held

the second Thursday of each month at the University Medical Center. The next such meeting will be this Thursday night, August 8th at 7:30 p.m. If you are interested in learning more about the group or want to help, but are unable to attend the meeting, feel free to contact the group via the mailing address below.

TAP has set up two avenues for inquiries and information requests. A hotline is available -- (602) 792-3772 for emergency and general calls. The service is being provided jointly by TAP and Gay Information and Referral volunteers. Written requests can be sent to: Tucson AIDS Project, 3242 E. Speedway, Tucson, AZ 85716. A brochure further describing TAP is also available at various locations, or by writing the above address.

## TLGPC REPORT

A few months ago the Committee was made aware of discrimination based on sexual preference against two employees by the Tucson Women's Commission. A meeting was held with the two people involved and a representation of our political subcommittee. It was decided by unanimous vote to support the complainants and to issue a formal letter of complaint to the TWC. I wrote the letter and read it at an open public meeting of the Tucson Women's Commission. Since then, through the City of Tucson Human Relations Commission, the agency through which complaints of discrimination are filed, a no-fault settlement has been reached. The results of the charges were reported on the front page of the Arizona Daily Star, Friday Aug. 2. Unfortunately the chairwoman of the TWC admitted no guilt and instead claimed that she was discriminated against. The two former employees did receive financial settlements and changes in the bylaws including Lesbians and Gays as a protected minority.

The Tucson Women's Commission is a tax-funded group whose goal is to fight discriminatory attitudes and promote equality which is very similar to one of the goals of the Tucson Lesbian and Gay Pride Committee. It was my position and that of TLGPC that especially a group funded by taxpayers must not be able to get away with discriminating against Lesbians and Gays from where at least 10% of their money comes. Gay money is Gay power.

This action is of great significance to us. First of all it demonstrates that the city law protecting us in employment works and is enforceable even when the employer who discriminates is an agency funded

by the Tucson City Council. That the law is there for us and we must use it. Secondly, that there is developing in Tucson some recognition that TLGPC is a viable organization whose support does carry some weight. This is borne out by the fact that the charges of discrimination made the front page of the paper which included two paragraphs of direct quotations from our letter of complaint. When we are organized and united as men and women we can make a difference in effecting issues that touch our daily lives such as job discrimination.

To be able to grow and have a much more resounding effect we need more active help from you. Please attend our next meeting on Monday, Aug. 12 at 6:30 p.m. at Ruby's, 2512 E. Grant Road. We will be discussing this issue and many more.

Recently, because of rapidly increasing numbers of PWAs in the Tucson area, the Tucson AIDS Project was formed to handle our 'own' PWAs, with financial assistance from the Phoenix-based AAFT. TAP and AAFT work directly with the AIDS patient. Volunteers visit hospitals, transport PWAs to doctors, shopping, recreation, assist with legal advice, pays bills when patients are no longer able to work, counsels and provides encouragement and support among a myriad of other efforts.

Hegyl informs us that for the 30-day period ending July 6, the expenditures for AAFT were \$7,524 paid out to Arizona AIDS patients. Hegyl said that as of July 6, the Fund had just over \$10,000. But here we are at August 6, and the treasury is now down to where it probably cannot continue its present service unless something drastic is done.

It is clear that the Gay community of Arizona is not able to contribute enough to keep such a costly operation solvent alone. We are sure that every Gay and Lesbian community nationwide is facing the same hard facts of life.

Even the annual fundraising effort "Get Physical" to be held on September 14 will not net enough capital to continue operations at the present level of increase. What can be done?

There is only one solution. The Gay community must seek additional funding from outside. From government, from individuals. Large fundraising drives have been held in the past and more are planned. Couldn't this money be placed with an administrator who would be charged with giving out sufficient monies to each city according to its needs. This, in addition to local fundraising in the Gay community, would be a positive step forward.

Rock Hudson's recent disclosure has prompted several of Hollywood's top stars to have a fundraiser. This benefit alone should raise millions of dollars. Isn't there a way to get some of this down to the grassroots level - where the PWAs are and need it. Why isn't the National Gay Task Force behind an idea of this kind? Where are our other national organizations when in this time of emergency, we need them.

A very conservative estimate for our state of Arizona is that AAFT will need at least \$100,000 to continue its operations for the next twelve months, and as the increase in the number of AIDS patients goes up, so does that budget figure.

Something drastic must be done N.W.

### JUDGE ANNULS

#### TRANSSEXUAL'S MARRIAGE

BALTIMORE, MD (AP) - A judge has annulled the marriage of a student who learned after the wedding that his wife was born a man.

Circuit Judge Hilary D. Caplan ruled last week that the marriage between M.K. Ofosu-Apiah and Delores Buchanan, 38, was void from the beginning because Maryland law prohibits men marrying men. "The evidence here is that there was no sexual relationship, although it's hard for any court to believe it," Caplan said.

Ofosu-Apiah, 28, of Liberia, testified the couple had some sexual relations, but had not had intercourse. He also said he had never seen his wife in the nude during the seven months they lived together before separating. He testified he first suspected his wife might be a man in September, when he examined her birth certificate before an immigration hearing to change his status from visitor to resident.

The Johns Hopkins University student testified that the name on his wife's birth certificate, John William Buchanan, had been covered with white ink and the name Delores Buchanan had been typed over it. The sex on the certificate was listed as male, he told Caplan.

When confronted with the discrepancy, Ofosu-Apiah said his wife told him she was transsexual. "I just - I can't deal with that," Ofosu-Apiah stammered in court. "I was inclined to end the marriage at that time."

Ofosu-Apiah testified he married Buchanan because he "really admired her for her intelligence," not to obtain U.S. citizenship, and that he began annulment proceedings knowing it could jeopardize his immigration status.

Samuel Blibum, Ofosu-Apiah's attorney, said his client chose annulment because it could be obtained more quickly than a divorce. Caplan granted the annulment based on the original name and sex listed on the

birth certificate.

"There was no consummation and the factual circumstances show that there was no marriage under the law," he said, referring to state law which makes marriages between two males or two females illegal. Buchanan failed to appear for court-ordered physical and psychiatric examinations and did not appear at the annulment proceedings.

### GAY FATHERS INTENSIFY EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

LOS ANGELES, CA - The Gay Father's Coalition International, a worldwide support organization for Gay parents, will initiate an intensified campaign to educate members of the judicial system about the realities of being Gay and being a parent, according to Don Harrelson of Los Angeles, president of the 2000-member GFCI.

The announcement was made in the wake of news reports that Frank Batey, a Gay father who has waged an expensive and highly-publicized battle for legal custody of his 14-year-old son, was dropping the case. Batey told the Gay press earlier this month that he has decided to give up the protracted fight for custody of his son. The decision means an end to more than two years in the courts at a cost of several hundred thousand dollars, according to news reports.

"Frank is making the ultimate sacrifice," explained Harrelson, who spoke in length with Batey shortly after revealing that he would drop all legal action. "He wants to protect his son from the stress and emotional turmoil that has been created by the controversy."

"As usual, ignorance is our enemy. Through the implementation of a judicial education program under the auspices of GFCI, we hope to open some minds. If you believe in the American system of justice as a whole, you have to also believe that judges really want to make informed decisions. GFCI will see that adequate information is readily available."

## A View From Within

### WHO IS ROCK HUDSON, AND WHY IS HE DYING FROM AIDS?

It was just after 12:30 in the morning on the 24th of July. I was watching CNN Headline News, when the anchorwoman began a piece about Rock Hudson being so gravely ill, and in a foreign hospital. I was concerned, but not overly so. It was just after 1:00 a.m. that same morning when I was watching the next CNN show: There was another story on Rock Hudson which ended with a comment like, "...And it is rumored that he has been diagnosed as having AIDS...". My attention grew.

The next day, I spoke to three friends of mine about Rock Hudson being ill. The official word that he was being treated for AIDS had not come out in the press at this time, and it was still all conjecture. I said that I hoped he DID have AIDS. I must admit that I was rather surprised when all three of my friends replied how awful a person I was that I wished this. Did they not see - as clearly as I did - what a great event this was?

For the very first time, a person of prominence was in the media as suffering from AIDS. And a movie star on top of it all: NOW, I thought, we will get some action on the AIDS funding, and some more serious concern from the government and the press.

Two days later, it was official that Rock Hudson did indeed have AIDS -- he had been diagnosed in 1984 -- and that he was being treated with a (rather) experimental drug. On the AIC network news that night, a story about AIDS research ended with the same hope as I had: "many Gay advocates" were hoping that this would make the government move faster... et

cetera.

Well, it has been a big help. Rock Hudson told Armistead Maupin -- the journalist and author -- some time ago (in 1976) that one day he wanted to do something positive with the fact that he was Gay, and in a position to make a statement that would carry some weight.

He most certainly has....

Now, however, we are seeing the backlash from this whole affair. Hollywood, and many industry insiders, are up-in-arms about having to work with Gays in television or films. It is even rumored that Linda Evans is very concerned because of her kissing scenes with Rock Hudson, that she may be vulnerable to contracting AIDS. And a lot of other people are mad at him for continuing to work a year after having been diagnosed.

One must take the good with the bad.

It is sad that he has AIDS. It is sad that anyone has AIDS. It is sad that there is no cure or treatment yet. Yes, it is sad.

What Mr. Hudson has done took a lot of courage, and we should all thank him. Any person who eventually survives AIDS, will have him to thank for their survival -- of course, all of the doctors and scientists, and other AIDS patients who have died, or who are surviving have helped. But no other single event will have done so much so fast.

I am sure we all wish him well.
