Two lawmakers differ on handling of AIDS patients

PHOENIX - Two state lawmakers on opposite sides of the political and philosophical fence are proposing substantially different measures to deal with AIDS patients.

Rep. Peter Goudinoff, D-Tucson, wants to prohibit discrimination in employment, education and housing against those suffering from acquired immune deficiency syndrome or any AIDS-related condition.

Goudinoff's bill essentially extends the same protections to those with AIDS that are now used to prevent discrimination based on sex, race or disability.

But Rep. Trent Franks, R-Phoenix, is preparing a measure to bar those with AIDS from donating blood. It would also require that those with AIDS and those who carry the virus must be reported not only to state health officials but also to hospitals and blood banks. He also wants to fund a state program to provide testing for people who think they have AIDS. Federal funding for a testing program set up in June could be lost in April.

Goudinoff and Franks will push their bills in the legislative session that starts in January.

Goudinoff said that although Arizona has apparently not been infected by mass AIDS hysteria, some individuals apparently want to separate AIDS patients from the general population. For example, he said, some parents want to exclude those with the incurable, generally fatal, disease from schools.

Earlier last week, the Tucson Unified School District approved policies allowing the school superintendent to consider attendance by students and employees with AIDS on a case-by-case basis.

Goudinoff's bill would prevent a school from denying admission, imposing different conditions or restricting access to facilities to those with AIDS. But he said that would not likely affect new policies approved by TUSD. "In practical fact, the school board is saying it is not going to discriminate," Goudinoff said, even though board members might have had to include options in the policies to show they were not rejecting parents' demands outright. "The law would give the school board some backbone."

Goudinoff dismissed concerns that the disease could be spread among young children who play together. There is some evidence that the disease can be spread through tears and saliva and that youngsters who bite one another might infect others. "A kid who's got a biting problem can be excluded from school, not because

he's got AIDS, but because he's biting others," he said.

Another section of the bill would bar health workers from refusing to serve AIDS patients. Goudinoff said health workers already take precautions against other types of diseases that should protect them. "My dentist uses rubber gloves and a mask routinely," he said. "That's just competent medical care. It has nothing to do with AIDS."

Franks said he believes in the need for increased compassion for the victims of AIDS. But he said that compassion must be tempered with the public need to prevent the spread of the disease.

State health officials already have enacted an emergency rule barring sperm or blood donations by people with AIDS and requiring that confirmed cases be reported to the health department. (OBSERVER, Nov. 20) They are proposing similar restrictions for those who have been exposed to the disease - and could spread it - but who have not been affected.

Franks said the state should continue the testing program to protect the blood supply when federal funding runs out. "There are people in high-risk categories donating blood," Franks said. "People who think they might have been exposed to AIDS are deliberately donating blood not to hurt anyone but to find out if they have AIDS." Blood banks now routinely test for the disease.

The problem with that, Franks said, is that blood banks test only for the HTLV-III antibodies that individuals produce when they are infected. "As far as we can tell, about 4 percent of the population does not produce the antibodies," he said. And, he added, there apparently is a period following infection when no antibodies are present in the blood. Thus, the test results could be negative, but a person could still spread the disease. "I've heard this period is up to six months, or longer," Franks said. "No one seems to know how long."

Franks acknowledged that the requirement for notification requirements might increase the risk that the names of AIDS victims would become public. "I'm not sure what to do about that," he said. "We have to weigh the safety and health of the public against the individual rights of the carrier."

Regarding Goudinoff's proposal, Franks said he could support those sections that do not endanger others. He said, though, that AIDS victims should not be allowed in schools. Franks said such segregation would protect both the AIDS victim and other students.

Can we talk?

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (GCN) - Comedian Joan Rivers is facing the heat after comments she made recently to a San Francisco Examiner columnist concerning Rock Hudson's AIDS diagnosis.

According to the Bay Area Reporter, Rivers stated that she felt Hudson handled the entire situation improperly. "His [Hudson's] people knew all along and should have just come out and acknowledged it was AIDS," Rivers said. "Instead, there were all those lies and deceit until it was impossible to hide the truth."

Rivers went on to express her reluctance to kiss any of her co-stars in the future. "If I had to kiss a co-star...I'd want assurance he doesn't have AIDS....I can tell you, there's no kissing, no touching. I'm a doctor's daughter and I'm careful," she said.

Critics of Rivers say her remarks reveal her ignorance about AIDS and only serve to fuel AIDS panic.

Rivers, an active supporter in AIDS benefits for the past two years, is "extremely upset" by the negative reaction to her comments. According to her press agent, Joan may stop participating in AIDS benefits in the future.

Rivers helped to raise over \$300,000 for the AIDS Medical Foundation's Scientific Committee at New York's "Comme Relief" benefit last July. (OBSERVER, July 24).

New Oklahoma law
hurts teachers

TULSA, OK - Oklahoma has a new law against Gay and Lesbian teachers. The new law signed by Democratic Governor George Nigh, prohibits the employment in a school of anyone who "has engaged in criminal sexual activity or sexual conduct that has impeded the effectiveness of the individual's performance of school duties." It defines "criminal sexual activity" as sodomy and "sexual conduct" as "soliciting or imposing criminal

COUNSELING CONCEPTS

A holiday is upon us and it happens to be one in which we are going to give thanks for whatever reason. It's good therapy for us to be challenged in such a way. Our psyches tend to focus on the negative. You're aware that good news doesn't sell many papers. People flock to the bad things. Is this a learned human trait or biologically inherited? That we really don't need to get into. We need to program into ourselves a little time to look at things. Where have we been? Where are we going? Are you pleased with the way things are going? How would you change things in your life if you could? Are you dreaming or being realistic?

Think about those kinds of things and see if you can't dig out some answers. Use this as a backdrop for doing these two things. First, make a list (Counselors are always making lists) of all the not-so-good kinds of things. We tend to think on the negative side so begin there. There may be a lot of things to list too, with the AIDS crisis and the uncertainty it has caused in the Gay and non-Gay communities. The second thing is to go to the positive side and make a list of all the good things affecting you that are happening. Now, before you discard the not-so-good list, look it over carefully and see just what's there. Ask yourself this: "Has this bad thing produced any good results?"

It's a process of negating the negative. Take for instance the advent of AIDS.

How has it changed the way you conduct your life? That may not be all bad. It may mean that: I take better care of myself. I eat better, drink less, get plenty of sleep. I deal with potentially stressful situations before they are full blown. I exercise regularly. I'm working on my relationships with other people. I think about the things that really count, sort out my priorities. The word 'friend' has taken on new meaning. I work harder on communicating with my spouse. I don't take that special person in my life for granted anymore. I value people who put their common sense and character above their desire for sex.

Our minds are more complex than any computer but there are things that we program that are wrong or worthless. When we're running a certain program, those things can cause the whole thing to crash. The process of figuring out what's going on and how to correct the error is not an easy one. This simple process of listing is a start to getting things put back where they should be and to help us get a view from a proper perspective. It is not a bad thing to know what counts and has meaning for your life.



"If crime against nature presents itself, we'll make the charges. We're just not lucky enough to run up on this kind of thing very often."

- Nashville, Tennessee Vice Squad Major Harold Woods, as quoted in the Nashville Banner. The otherwise unfortunate Woods was referring to the arrest of two men for committing a 'crime against nature'. The actual arrest was made by Vice Officer Lonnie Stevens, who reportedly "chased a known prostitute and her customer" into an adult bookstore, but happened upon two men having sex. The men were held on \$500 bond and face five to 15 years in prison if convicted.

Nashville public Defender Kuel Dean, however, has asked that the charges be dropped, calling the city's crimes-against-nature statute "an outrage." Dean also pointed out that the men "were on private property in an area that was enclosed. There were no allegations of coercion or prostitution."

The crimes-against-nature law, originally enacted in 1829, describes as 'crimes' acts including sodomy, fellatio, and cunnilingus either without consent or out of wedlock.

EPISCOPALS SAY NO

TO GAY PRIESTS

ANAHEIM, CA (AP) - Lay delegates of the Episcopal Church have defeated a change in the church laws that would have allowed homosexuals to be priests. Although it was approved by the House of Bishops and the clergy of the lay-clergy House of Deputies, its lay delegations narrowly rejected it during the recent convention held here.

The lay delegations turned down the proposed canon change by a margin of only four ballots, 53 in favor, but with 57 needed for passage. Their vote came after two days of jockeying over the measure.

BLOOD SUPPLIES DROP

Unfounded fears of getting AIDS are being cited for a critical drop in blood supplies in scattered areas of the nation. The fall has prompted the Red Cross's Atlanta office to issue an emergency appeal for donors. AIDS fear is also cited for shortages in Nashville, Oklahoma, Southern New Jersey and the Philadelphia area. Health officials say, "You cannot contract AIDS by giving blood."

Researchers have discovered what they believe is an early warning sign of AIDS. The Centers for Disease Control say a relatively rare mouth fungus [Hairy Leukoplakia] has been detected in a number of AIDS patients.

activity...during school or school-related activities or...during non-school times and is directed toward a student.

The law was written to replace the law struck down by the U.S. Supreme Court earlier this year. (OBSERVER, Feb. 6 and Apr. 3). Since it purports to be enforceable only against those found to have engaged in acts that are criminalized under Oklahoma law, it will be more difficult to attack than the previous law, which could have been enforced against people who simply spoke in favor of Gay rights.

At the same time, the Governor signed a housing discrimination law that specifically limited protection to the classes listed in the law. The law omitted sexual orientation. Previous versions, which were changed in committee, specifically excluded "homosexuals or Gays" from protection.


Platter Chatter






A View From Within

THERE IS A LOT TO BE SAID FOR TELEVISION

The week of 10 November 1985 through 16 November 1985 was a week that spoke well for the medium of television and the effects it could have (when it tried) on the pace of society and culture. During this seven day period, there were no less than three (count them) programs dealing directly with homosexuality on television. One of these was on NBC (*An Early Frost* — which was a movie dealing both with homosexuality and AIDS), and the other two programs were on the PBS station KAET in Phoenix and KUAT in Tucson (*The Times Of Harvey Milk* — which profiled the murdered San Francisco Supervisor; and a program about senior homosexuals.)

The quality of these three shows is not in question when one considers that the documentary *The Times Of Harvey Milk* won an Academy Award in 1985 for Best Documentary Feature of 1984, and the NBC movie *An Early Frost* took the top rating spot for its night against such contenders as a football game, and a highly publicized, and highly controversial episode of CBS's *Cagney and Lacey*.

Is it just morbid curiosity that people would want to watch a film about a murdered Supervisor who effected such great changes across the face of the city of San Francisco? Or a movie about a young Gay man who discovers he has AIDS and must tell his family both that and the fact that he is Gay?

I think not.

I would rather think (and this might be so much optimism) that people who are not directly affected by homosexuality, (but then, who isn't?) are genuinely beginning to show an interest in the world that they feared so much for so long. I believe that the artificial barrier of religion is parting enough to allow people to explore the truths about homosexuality without fear that they (or their children) would drop dead on the spot, or catch AIDS from reading a book about homosexuality.

The times we are living in are changing (as has every generation's times) but we are in the midst of a change with regard to civil rights — the basic civil rights of all minority peoples.

Club Events

As I have been telling you for the past few weeks, this is the weekend that will undoubtedly make a great impression on the Tucson community. This weekend is the occasion for the annual "Arizona Brotherhood Run '85". Beginning on Thanksgiving day and continuing on through Sunday, Dec. 1, the five men's social and fraternal organizations in Arizona will be in Tucson for this annual celebration.

The host city rotates each year. This year the event is held in Tucson with Tucson Arizona Levi/Leathermen acting as host club. Next year it will be Phoenix' turn to be host city again. It is expected that there will be over 100 members from the Arizona clubs as well as others coming from around the country to join in the fun and frolic.

Representing Arizona from Phoenix will be the Sons of Apollo; Arizona Rangers and the Copperstate Leathermen. From Tucson TALL and the Tucson Knight Owls. Persons interested in participating in this year's run should contact Lee Ridinger, President of TALL or check with bartenders either at It's 'Bout Time or Graduate for more information. The run will consist of dinners, brunches, games, outings, bar hopping, parties, etc. Registration will begin at the Graduate at 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 28. Fee for the run is \$20 and it entitles registrants to a number of free meals as well as drink specials and lots of other goodies.

I will report next week on what happened to who and why. I look forward to this annual event with great anticipation and I hope to see you all on the run or at least enjoying the comaraderie of this great group of men coming together in friendship. Be sure to give them our friendly Tucson welcome when you run into them around town this weekend.

Part of this change comes from the legal system which we have developed to enfold our democracy. (For example, the United States Supreme Court is hearing arguments this session about the constitutionality of the sodomy laws for one of the states, and may finally decide the privacy of the individual). Part of this change is coming from within our own groups. (As a friend told me last week, "we have -- as Gay men -- moved out of our 'horny adolescence' and into a more mature attitude about sex and relationships").

And television has a lot to do with these changes. By taking the first step, and showing the "others" more and more about the worlds they so strongly object to, those "others" will begin -- probably slowly -- to understand more and more about us. And it is not just homosexuality which will benefit from this. Look at the -- obvious -- good that has come so far from the new NBC show *Golden Girls*. Last evening's program dealt with the very prominent habit of treating older men and women like children. It very visibly illustrated how many older people can care for themselves, and how they prefer to be treated like adults, not children. It was very, very effective.

Television has a hand in these social changes. And television will do more if you tell them to. Please take the time to send thank you letters to the following:
