Lesbian officer wins discrimination suit

after five hours of deliberation.

Superior Court Judge Daniel M. Hanlon is expected to rule on whether Sheehan should be reinstated. If he rules that there is too much hostility for reinstatement, she will be awarded an additional \$100,000.

Sheehan had asked for \$4 million in the lawsuit, but after the verdict, she said, "I feel wonderful. Hopefully there will be major changes in the state university system."

During the ten day trial, three witnesses testified to hearing campus police chief Jon Schorle say he would not hire Gays as police officers. Schorle denied all three conversations and testified that he has no bias against Gays. He also said he knew Sheehan was Gay when he hired her.

Sheehan had been openly Gay at her previous job as a police investigator at Cal Poly. After four years, she took a promotion to sergeant and transferred to San Francisco State. "I thought it would be easier to be openly Gay here," she told Bay Area Reporter.

Sheehan had worked for 19 months at the \$28,000-a-year job in San Francisco when she was fired. Schorle said she lost her tenure and automatically start a two-year probation period when she transferred. A probationary employee can be fired without cause, he said.

Two work evaluations were submitted by her supervisor, Lieutenant Richard Van Slyke. The first was a glowing report. In the second, Sheehan was rated as competent in every category until Schorle changed it, claims Sheehan's attorney, Alan Davis.

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (BAR) - A Lesbian campus police sergeant was the victim of discrimination when she was fired from San Francisco State University and must be paid \$200,000 in damages a jury ruled last week.

Myra Sheehan, 31, was awarded \$200,000 from the California state university system, \$7,500 from the campus police chief, and \$750 from her former supervisor for her dismissal in March 1983.

The jury of five men and seven women reached the verdict of guilty of discrimination for sexual orientation

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Man charged in UofA murder

TUCSON - The Tucson Gay community was shocked when it learned of the brutal murder of Debra Slowikowski on Nov. 30. Her body was found near Red Rock by a motorist who had stopped to rest along Interstate 10. Slowikowski, 28, had been killed by a blow to the head, and then her body had been burned.

Richard David Phipps, 28, was arrested last Wednesday, Feb. 12 and charged with the crime. Phipps had been employed at the Village Inn Restaurant on Miracle Mile. Phipps was arrested in December and charged with forging a \$700 check drawn on Slowikowski's account. At that time he was awaiting trial on six counts of sexual assault and kidnapping.

Slowikowski, a pharmacist at Tucson General Hospital, attended Duquesne University in Pittsburgh. She was on the dean's list for four-and-a-half years while attending Duquesne and was selected for membership in the Omicron Delta Kappa national honorary society and received the History of Pharmacy Award. She also played varsity volleyball for 4 years and varsity basketball for two.

After graduating from Duquesne, Slowikowski came to the UofA because of its superior Pharmacy program. Her adviser throughout her time as a graduate student, associate professor of pharmaceutical sciences Karl H. Schram, described Debra as a "competent scientist" who "did excellent work."

A friend, and former pharmacy student, Debbie Kluttz, who now lives in Kentucky said that she and Slowikowski frequently played racquetball and rode their motorcycles up to Mount Lemmon or Sabino Canyon. "She was a very good person - honest, warm, real intelligent," Kluttz

Saliva may have AIDS antibodies

BOSTON, MA (AP) - The discovery of AIDS antibodies in victims' saliva may explain why the disease isn't transmitted by kissing and could give doctors a new way to check for exposure to the AIDS virus, scientists say. The researchers found that most people who carry AIDS antibodies in their blood also have the substances in their saliva.

Experts believe AIDS is spread only through sexual intercourse or the injection of tainted blood. The disease is not spread through kissing or other contact with saliva, even though the AIDS virus has sometimes been found in saliva of victims of the disease.

"Saliva seems to be very uninfected," said Dr. David W. Archibald of the Harvard School of Public Health.

The discovery of antibodies in saliva could help explain why saliva isn't dangerous. The researchers speculate that the antibodies deactivate AIDS viruses in saliva so they don't infect others. Archibald's research on 93 people is being published in the March issue of the journal 'Blood'.

The presence of AIDS antibodies in the body reveals past exposure to the AIDS virus but does not necessarily mean the fatal disease will develop. Blood banks routinely screen donations for the presence of antibodies to keep AIDS-tainted blood from being passed on.

Archibald said new screening tests could be developed that would sample saliva rather than blood. Such tests might be cheaper and easier to perform. Even a home AIDS test could someday be possible, he said. But with current technology, such a test

Calif. realtors balk at disclosure report

Should Sellers Be Required to Tell Buyers That Previous Owner Had AIDS?

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (BAR) - "We do not believe that disclosure that a former homeowner or tenant had AIDS should be legally required," an official of the California Association of Realtors (CAR) pleaded last week. Kevin Sweeney, communications manager of CAR, denied press reports to the contrary, calling it "a very bad job of reporting." Sweeney said his organization has appointed a study group to explore the problem. In the meantime, he said, "We are educating our members to scientific and medical evidence accumulated to date which concludes that there is no known risk of AIDS virus transmission in occupying the same environmental space formerly occupied by an AIDS victim."

Sweeney told Bay Area Reporter, "realtors have no place to run. If they disclose information about a former owner having AIDS, they are violating privacy rights. But if they do not disclose, they are running the risk of being sued." He cited a case where a Bay Area realtor was sued by a prospective buyer for not revealing that a former tenant had been murdered on the property. Currently there is no California state law that would require or prohibit disclosure. Sweeney said, "We do not know how to solve this problem and we are seeking a solution."

Two courts have ruled that "material fact" about a property that might affect resale value must be revealed. But there is no legal precedent as to whether that must include notification of an AIDS condition. A San Francisco attorney, Jayne Roberts, recently filed a lawsuit to void her purchase of a local home because she was not told that the seller is dying of AIDS. The

SALIVA MAY HAVE AIDS ANTIBODIES would be too difficult to perform outside a lab.

Researchers disagree on how often AIDS victim's saliva contains the virus. A co-author of the journal report, Dr. Jerome E. Goodman of New England Deaconess Hospital has found the virus in the saliva of 46 percent of victims of a pre-AIDS syndrome called AIDS-related complex, or ARC.

However, more recent work by Dr. Martin S. Hirsch and others at Massachusetts General Hospital found the virus in the saliva of only one percent of homosexual men who carried AIDS antibodies in their blood.

The researchers found AIDS antibodies in the saliva of 70 percent of victims of AIDS and in 83 percent of people with ARC. They also found them in the saliva of 45 percent of sex partners of AIDS and ARC patients and in 22 percent of healthy homosexual men.

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

Dear President:

As a result of an article that was printed in the Tucson Citizen titled, "Big Brothers has no place for Gays", much concern has been raised here in Tucson about this policy of discrimination. This issue is of great importance to the Lesbian/Gay Alliance as many of us are bowlers in leagues throughout the city and have recently been approached to participate in the 'Bowl for Kids Sake', a fundraiser for your organization. The concern, quite simply, is that since you are after the money to support your program, do you also screen out potential volunteers that you think are Lesbian or Gay?

Are people that apply asked directly what their sexual preference is or does the interviewer ask indirect questions and make an

educated guess? In either case why is it important to you what someone's sexual preference is? If the Lesbian or Gay applicant is not screened out do you tell the child's parent of the applicant's sexual preference. If you do tell the parent, how is the subject approached? How do you maintain confidentiality regarding the applicant's sexual preference? Would you hire a Lesbian or Gay?

I do believe that there are many Lesbians and Gays that would be willing to donate to your organization both with time and money if we felt that Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Tucson did not have the same or similar policy as the organization in Los Angeles. We only expect to be treated with the respect and dignity that you would afford any heterosexual applicant.

To clear the air, and to insure that Lesbians and Gays in Tucson will participate in your fundraisers in the future, would you please respond to the questions raised here as soon as possible. Both this letter and your response will be printed in our weekly paper, The Observer.

Schorle reprimanded Sheehan when her girlfriend, Holly Smith, once came to the office, Davis said. Schorle also warned her not to have a relationship with the Physical Education Department chairwoman, Jean Perry, he said.

The attorney representing the state university system, deputy attorney general Robert Murphy, said there was no proof that Sheehan's homosexuality was the reason for her dismissal. "The crickets sang and the moon rose," he said allegorically, "but did the moon rise because the crickets sang?"

Sheehan was not fired because she is homosexual, said Murphy, but because she was not good enough to pass probation. "She didn't do the things a sergeant was supposed to," he said. "She didn't want to be desk-bound. She wanted to be out touring the campus, meeting people."

Murphy accused Sheehan of being self-righteous. Her attitude was, he said, "If you don't like what I'm doing, you're discriminating against me for my sexual orientation."

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
