Phoenix leads in Gay harassment

PHOENIX (AP) - Phoenix led a list of 45 cities and regions last year in which violence and harassment was reported against Gay men and Lesbians according to the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force.

Of 2,042 incidents reported in 1985, the task force said, 326 occurred in Phoenix. San Francisco rated second with 253 and New York third with 241.

The task force said the 326 incidents in Phoenix involved 200 incidents of verbal harassment or threats of violence; 35 assaults with or without weapons; one homicide; 40 incidents of police harassment or negligence; and 50 incidents of vandalism.

13 U.S. cities join to combat AIDS

CHICAGO, IL (AP) - Thirteen U.S. cities that account for 70 percent of the nation's AIDS cases are combining forces and sharing strategies to fight the deadly disease, the Chicago's health commissioner said.

"We at the local level are especially tuned in to the fact that control of this epidemic must be guided by the very best of our wisdom," Donald Edwards said. The cities' public health officials agreed in their first all-day session to hold regular meetings and share tactics and problems in the AIDS fight, said Edwards, who arranged the session.

AIDS patients who cannot afford expert treatment should be provided such care at public expense, they agreed.

While the group of public health administrators and epidemiologists did not act on

THE SUPREME COURT AND GARLIC SALT

The Supreme Court has heard arguments on sodomy, a vague term meaning "anything except missionary-position sex," that rare activity for many in our community. Logically, the Court should appreciate the case. Having already agreed that destroying unborn children is the right of mothers, the Justices now have the opportunity of overturning State laws requiring only sexual activity that assists procreation.

What the Court will do should make no difference in sexual preferences. All adults, regardless of sexual orientation, have sex in the same ways. The Court decision could affect heterosexual and homosexual activities equally. Regardless of the decision, sex will continue the way it always had.

Our legislatures have spent time creating unenforceable laws. When our narrow citizens are given the keys to governmental power, they often codify their personal opinions. So we now have abundant unenforceable laws being proposed, such as making it illegal to teach current scientific theories of the creation of the universe. Or mandatory seat belt laws. Or affirmation of low speed limits. Or two adults consenting to mutually agreeable sex.

Seek money for AIDS hospice in Phoenix

CHAPLAIN, NUN SEEK MONEY FOR HOSPICE TO HELP AIDS VICTIMS

PHOENIX (AP) - Fearing that victims of AIDS will become "modern-day lepers," a Roman Catholic nun and the chaplain at Adobe Mountain School have joined efforts to raise funds for a group home for people dying from the disease.

"Many of these people have no place to go and no one to care for them... They die alone and lonely," said Sister Teresa McIntier, who has been active in the hospice movement in the Phoenix area.

She and Rev. Ken van de Ven are working with the newly formed Housing, Hospice and Medical Care for AIDS in an effort to provide group care for victims of the usually fatal disease.

Marion Lazarus and John Rowell, two nurses who helped found HHMC, said they were convinced by their experiences in local hospitals that there is a need for such a facility. They said they asked for help from McIntier and van de Ven because the clergy has a reputation for understanding and helping dying patients.

"There is so stigma against persons with AIDS," said McIntier. "Society sometimes treats people as if their disease is a punishment from God. When they condemn (patients) that way, they are acting as judges, when God is the only real judge."

Nearly all of the more than 100 Phoenix-area victims of the disease are homosexual men, Rowell said. Van de Ven said many AIDS patients suffer additional emotional pain from condemnation, rejection and abandonment.



Jean Genet dies of cancer at 75

PARIS (AP) - Jean Genet, whose life and works made him one of the most controversial French writers of the 20th Century, has died, his editors at Gallimard publishing house said last Tuesday, April 15. He was 75 years old. The cause, date and place of his death were not immediately known.

Genet was a dramatist, poet, novelist and convicted criminal. A seedy, brutal world peopled with homosexuals, convicts, pimps and thieves was created by the works of Genet, himself a homosexual and admitted prostitute.

Genet was born in Paris on Dec. 19, 1910. Abandoned by his mother at birth, he was raised by a foster family of peasants in central France. Between the two world wars, Genet lived as a vagrant, traveling throughout Europe and living among beggars and pimps when he was not in jail. He was arrested and expelled from Poland.

Between 1940 and 1948 he wrote four works from prison: "Our Lady of the Flowers," "Miracle of the Rose," "Pompe Funebre" and "Querelle".

Gay paper asked to drop sex ads

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - One of the owners of the Bay Area Reporter has asked the San Francisco-based Gay community newspaper to stop running explicit sex ads because he believes they contribute to the spread of AIDS.

The request by Paul Lorch, former editor and owner of a 25 percent share in the newspaper, was denied at a Monday night board meeting by the paper's publisher Bob Ross. Ross owns 75 percent of the publication. "I'm not considering it at all," Ross said.

Lorch, who was ousted from the editorship nearly two years ago, said the steady increases in AIDS cases and in "hustler" sex ads run in the back of the publication lead him to believe the newspaper should "set a model for a safer lifestyle".

Most of the ads in question promote models, escorts and masseuses, and explicitly detail what services the advertiser

offers.

Although it is unfair to assume all advertisers are engaging in unsafe sex, Lorch said, the increase in number and general "anything goes" tone of many of the ads worry him.

Ross, who recently accompanied San Francisco Supervisors John Molinari and Harry Britt to Washington, D.C., to lobby against cuts in federal AIDS funds, scoffed at the comments.

"He's either found AIDS and/or religion or both," he said of Lorch. "All of a sudden, because he's not editor anymore, he's become a moralistic prude."

Other Gay newspapers also expressed reservations about banning such ads.

"People have raised the question and it's tough," said Don Michaels, publisher of the Washington Blade in Washington, D.C. "There are services that clearly a certain percentage of Gay men use but who's to say that the sex is going to be safe or not?"

The Blade has not run sexually explicit ads since 1979, when Michaels decided to market the paper to a wider range of advertisers who might not want to appear in a paper with such ads, he said.

"The difference is what kind of sex?" said Stephanie Poggi, news editor of the Gay Community News in Boston. "You're not going to educate anyone by not running ads."

Lorch said Ross is not willing to consider his motion to drop such sex ads because they are immensely profitable. Between 1984 and 1985, the classified ad section grew from nearly 19 percent of the paper's gross revenues to nearly 25 percent, he said.

Hospital excuses for barring AIDS patients criticized

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (AP) - Some hospitals use irrational, unwritten policies to exclude AIDS patients from intensive-care beds, says an ethics expert who urges clear guidelines instead of financially motivated discrimination.

An informal survey of seven hospitals in Florida, Georgia, Tennessee and Mississippi revealed much inconsistency when doctors decided whether to treat AIDS patients in intensive-care units or keep them in regular wards, said Ray E. Moseley, a University of Florida medical ethics specialist.

Moseley said his interviews with hospital officials, doctors and nurses showed most decisions to bar AIDS patients from round-the-clock intensive care were based on unwritten policies he called irrational. "These are not good reasons to exclude AIDS patients," he said.

Such reasons included a belief that aggressive treatment wouldn't help, claims that "we don't put terminally ill patients in our ICU (Intensive Care Unit)," and "fear that word will get out in the ICU that the patient in the next bed has AIDS," he said.

"Another reason I've heard for rejecting AIDS patients from ICUs is that AIDS patients are an easily identifiable class of patients that will eat up an unfair portion of health care dollars," Moseley said.

But he insisted all acquired immune deficiency syndrome patients shouldn't be lumped together. The disease cripples the body's immune system, resulting in wide range of infections and cancers, some of which can be treated with short-term success, allowing patients to leave the hospital even though they eventually will die, he said.

"AS I SEE IT....."

Long ago, in a distant land in the far east, stood the most beautiful Hindu temple in all the world. Built of mahogany, the facade was delicately carved with all manner of gargoyle, gods and garlands. The gold trim on the portico caught the setting sun and for a few brief moments each day, produced a picture of majestic triumph causing the spirit to soar.

The temple had been built over a period of one hundred and twenty years by a community of dedicated and caring artisans who passed the knowledge of their trades on from generation to generation, each taking great care that the craftsmanship and artistry of their work be preserved so that the workmanship of the temple would not fail. So well did they do their job that when the temple was completed, everyone who saw it said it was the greatest work of art in the nation - a tribute to both the divine and the humane.

One night the temple burned to the ground, set afire by an arsonist. The villagers tracked him down, caught him and returned him to the scene of his crime. Standing amid the ashes of the once magnificent building, the village elder said to the man, "Why did you set fire to our temple?" The arsonist stood erect and answered, "I could never have built anything so beautiful, but I will always be remembered as the man who destroyed it."

As human beings, I think we often seek recognition and enduring fame for ourselves from the work we do. Perhaps as Gay and Lesbians we strive even harder for such immortality, because so much with which we must deal is designed to undermine any legitimate recognition we might receive. None-the-less, most of us are "builders" and "creators", trying to leave behind a world better than the one we found. We truly want to leave behind a legacy worthy of the divine and the humane that is us.

From time-to-time, others come and they destroy. They seek a monument to immortality, they too need to be recognized, but they are not builders and they are not creators. I sometimes think that in our Gay and Lesbian communities today, we have more than our share of those who would destroy in the name of being noticed. So often lately we see our organizations, our friends, our leaders destroyed - so that somebody might be able to stand in the limelight for a fleeting moment.

That which they did not create, they still can destroy and thus have power over it. Or so they think. So hollow is that power; without nobility is that reign.

COURT ORDERS GAY FATHER TO TAKE BLOOD TEST

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - National Gay Rights Advocates has appealed a Chicago court order requiring a Gay father to take an HTLV-III antibody test in order to visit his children. In a dramatic move, NGRA attorneys have informed the court that the father will refuse to comply with the order. As a result, the Judge has agreed to reconsider the order and hear further evidence from both sides.

"The Judge's original decision was clearly wrong," declared Benjamin Schatz, Director of NGRA's AIDS Civil Rights Project. "The HTLV-III antibody test does not tell us whether a person has or will develop AIDS. Moreover, even if the father did have AIDS - which he does not - there would be no reason to keep him from visiting his children. AIDS cannot be casually transmitted, and it is time for the courts to recognize this fact."

NGRA Executive Director Jean O'Leary agreed: "The court room is not a legitimate place for AIDS hysteria. NGRA is

determined to fight the misuse of the HTLV-III antibody test wherever it occurs."

The dispute originated when the children's father filed a motion for expanded visitation privileges. This motion was opposed by his former wife, who feared that the children would "catch AIDS" from him simply because he is Gay. Although the father is perfectly healthy, the Judge ordered him to take the test, ignoring all medical evidence which was presented.

Over 1,000 members of the International leather community traveled from some 36 states and 9 foreign countries to watch him compete.

"The demand for spectator reservations is growing. Already we're receiving twice as many requests as in previous years, and we sold out last year," said IML spokesman Ron Ehemann. 

DAY FIVE



FEB 15 - 22 1986

Isla Mujeres is an island off the Yucatan Peninsula of Mexico; the ship was due to dock there around 10:00 a.m. The day was sunny, hot and steamy. We cruised along seeing long, flat islands covered with vegetation, scrubby pines and some palms (though many of these looked planted). Breakfast was open-seating that day, meaning no assigned seats, so we sat with some trumpy old queens pecking at grapefruit halves. Many people were going on a tour to some ancient Mayan ruins at Tulum (just think of "to lum" it may concern" for correct pronunciation). They would be

a very narrow stairway, without a rail, that ascended along one wall of the restaurant. At the top, one slid open a glass shower door and there was the bathroom!

We didn't buy anything, and returned to the ship to spend the afternoon sunning. Wayland Flowers rode the tender back with us amid a chorus of greetings. He had an entourage of 3 or 4 men with him - I never could count them.

The ship moved up the island about 3 miles to a night-time dock near a big resort hotel. I forgot the name, but it was



taking a tender from the ship and then transferring to buses for a (bumpy) ride to the ruins. John and I thought it sounded interesting, but decided not to go - after five days on the boat, we'd seen enough ruins!

We dropped anchor (they must have been 16 feet high, massive things) in the harbor off Cozumel right on time. The city was not a special looking place - low white buildings, buildings going up or coming down (one can hardly tell which), palm trees rattling in the breeze. At second glance, I was reminded, unfortunately, of Nogales. Sort of dumpy, no fantastic structures I would expect of a resort city. We boarded the first tender in and alighted ten minutes later at the city. The ship in the distance was an impressive sight, black against the deep blue sky and shimmering turquoise sea. The water was such a clear blue - colored fish flitted along the bottom amongst the urchins and anemones.

We began walking and peering into stores, most of which sold the same Cozumel t-shirts, cheap jewelry and assorted tourist junk. The most popular store among our ship members, it seemed, was the Polo Store. The boys descended and stripped that place like a horde of grasshoppers. I figure one day all the men will be wearings ruffles like in Elizabethan times, those silly turned-up Polo collars are just the beginning. After walking for several hours, 'till we were hot, tired and needing a whiz of death, found a little restaurant with a good menu off the main drag. The place had no glass or curtains in the windows - just holes in the wall and about 8 ceiling fans whirling away inside. The food was great and at 1/2 the price of something just a street away, a steal (we noticed mainly locals eating - supposedly a good sign). The bathroom there was at the top of

outrageous. Vaguely Mayan styling, all pyramidal and stepped with huge lion/lady statues flanking steps down to an outdoor covered cocktail place (the roof must have been four stories up). They had the obligatory swim-up bar and glass elevator.

At dinner that night we heard that one of the buses returning from Tulum had been in an accident. Apparently the bus had somehow over run a Volkswagen Bug and overturned beside the road. No one was seriously hurt, but I'm sure the cruise line's lawyers were girding themselves for a fight. It did precipitate one of Madame's jokes the next night: The bus overturned and "here I am lying under 50 hunky men and couldn't get my legs up!"

Cozumel didn't seem to have lots going, so we just meandered around on ship and watched Victor/Victoria at the movies. Lots of people were on board and the Safari Lounge became pretty active (almost got knocked down by my wiggly, but didn't recognize him without his blue swimsuit). We were actually getting tired from the trip and flopped out around 12:30.

A Gay Side Of Manhood

As Gay men we have had to invent ourselves, outside of approved norms for how to be men. Our stories have a common theme of self-creation. I'm not saying there's not conformity among Gay men; I'm saying that there is enormous diversity and experimentation with ways of being men. Since there were no role models, since our families often ignored or even disowned our Gayness, since we uprooted ourselves from our pasts to seek each other in urban centers, we were free to find and define ourselves from within.

I feel anxious: how can I summarize a movement so important to me in a way that will matter to you? And what if it doesn't? Coming out is always risky.

Part of the riskiness is that I would like not to be seen as totally "other," but would like you to consider your own Gay side. Each man presumably has a Gay side, and to acknowledge it is to be a fuller, richer person.

Most men first experience their Gay side during what Freud misleadingly called "latency," only to lose touch with it later, under the pressure of adolescence, amidst a conspiracy of silence, misinformation and misunderstanding.

Men think back to a male friend from your pre-adolescent days, a buddy, a playmate, who felt close. For almost one man out of three, this male bonding included sex-play (Kinsey, et al; Sexual Behavior in the Human Male).

For others, it was an emotional closeness, a Tom Sawyer-Huck Finn partnership in adventure, a secret club, a gang. In a culture which would prefer to ignore the homosexual potential of its children, such a period is comfortably dismissed as child's play.

Other cultures are not so denying. In Papua, New Guinea, boys are initiated into manhood by ritualized sexual activity with older men. In ancient Greece Gay love was refined and noble. In practically every culture, homosexuality exists.

Yet our culture conspires to disguise this legacy, sometimes unwittingly. I remember well my sense of betrayal when I learned that the standard editions of Plato systematically distort homosexuality, making overtly sexual passages into sublimated scenes more palatable to Victorian morality.

So Gay culture lies buried under multiple layers of moral judgment. The painstaking task of reclaiming our culture is a large part of the current Gay renaissance.

Each individual Gay man contributes to this task as he struggles to reclaim his own identity. Psychologists boasted the legitimacy of this quest in a major way when, in the mid-1970's, homosexuality per se was declassified as a mental disorder. The focus of treatment switched from changing one's homosexual preference - a path as fruitless as it was ethically dubious - to changing negative attitudes about oneself. But altering the diagnostic manual has not altered all the hearts and habits of

psychotherapists, and homophobia persists.

Gay therapists have suggested guidelines for a Gay-affirmative therapy which, at a minimum, would require therapists to come to terms with their own Gay side. And researchers have begun to outline the developmental process of a healthy Gay male identity. This process typically begins with vague feelings, fantasies or even sexual experiences, moves toward a labeling of these behaviors as "Gay," then to a gradual labeling of self as "Gay" - often with a negative charge.

Helping a client move to the next stage - a positively charged Gay identity (often militantly proud at first) - is a central task of psychotherapy with Gays. Ultimately, Gayness tends to become more harmoniously integrated with other aspects of the self.

But the current AIDS crisis is plunging Gay men into a collective identity crisis unlike anything since the advent of Gay liberation. The sex-positive euphoria that was so central to the Gay message to the world was played out to its logical extremes in lifestyles of multiple partners and sexual contacts.

Gay men are now charting a course between carefree sexual anarchy and the realities of a healthy sexuality. The crisis promises to have a maturing effect on the movement: more frankness about sexuality and safeguards, more dialogue on intimacy and relationships.

At the same time the AIDS crisis threatens to further define Gay men as "other," and this is dangerous for all of us. Dangerous because the male bond which Gay men manifest sexually and sexually is everywhere in our culture, in all cultures, and if we don't act it out lovingly, it may emerge in negative ways.

The male bond is a strong force in the military, in all-male or mostly-male institutions like the Pentagon and the boards of corporate America. I suspect one reason the ERA lost is that men sense in women a threat to their accustomed ways of male bonding, and if women shared in male power-holdings, men might be forced to confront their need for male intimacy in new, more frightening ways.

The liberation of Gay men touches all men, and indeed the well-being of the planet. As long as there is a bias against lovingly expressing the male bond, there will be a tendency to act it out only in contexts where traditional "masculine" values such as competitiveness, power and violence dominate.

We must dare to see the Gay man not as "other" but as part of every man. We must dare to teach our male children that it's all right to care for other boys. We must dare to confront the men who aim lethal nuclear phalluses at other men, and insist they learn to make love, not war.



PARENTS CONTEST GAY SON'S WILL

NEW YORK, NY - An attempt by the parents of an AIDS victim to overturn his bequest to his lover was rejected by a Manhattan judge. Judge Marie Lamberti ruled that the dead man, Richard Thaler, was "of sound mind and memory" the day the will was executed.

Thaler, an advertising executive, who died in May 1984 at age 36, left most of his estate to George Shetta, his lover of 12 years. But the parents, Charles and Ernestine Thaler, of Inverness, Florida, contested the will. Shetta, 44, said he was shocked at Mr. and Mrs. Thaler's action, adding, "I had no idea they were going to do anything like that. Their basic reaction was that he was dead and I was the queer."

GAY TOLERANCE TO BE TAUGHT?

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - Public school officials here are considering a program that would promote student tolerance and understanding of homosexuality. "We do it now with blacks, Hispanics and Chinese," said school board member Jo Ann Miller. "In this spirit we are making an effort to include Gay and Lesbian information in our curriculum."

The program would not involve study of homosexuality. Instead, selected school administrators and teachers (such as high school principals, counselors, and family life teachers) would receive copies of a book titled "Demystifying Homosexuality" to draw upon for discussing Gays and Lesbians.

Falwell helps church split by adultery

BANGOR, ME (AP) - The Rev. Jerry Falwell and his top aides have embarked on a "spiritual rescue mission" to a major fundamentalist congregation that has been torn apart by its pastor's public confession of adultery.

Falwell, founder of the conservative lobby Moral Majority, is to preach as interim pastor of the Bangor Baptist Church, where only about 100 people have been showing up to worship in a sanctuary that has seats for 2,000.

As recently as last fall, thousands flocked to the church on the outskirts of this city of 30,000 far from the Bible Belt to hear the Rev. Herman C. "Buddy" Frankland, who founded the church nearly 20 years ago and has become one of Maine's most outspoken advocates of fundamentalist causes.

Frankland first got attention outside Bangor in 1974 with his vocal opposition to the formation of a Gay rights group at the University of Maine.

Frankland, 50, also ran an unsuccessful independent campaign for governor in 1978 and more recently led a legal battle that won MAINE'S Christian schools some independence from state regulation.

But on Oct. 15, the walls came crashing down. "I am guilty of adultery," Frankland said at a news conference. "I have no excuse nor will I attempt to make one." He gave no details.

Frankland, married and the father of four, said he would step down from the pulpit within 30 days. But a month later, he appeared at a prayer meeting to say that God wanted him to stay remain in his post. All but a handful of the congregation walked out - and most have not been back.

Falwell and Frankland are graduates of Baptist Bible college in Springfield, Mo. Falwell has preached at Frankland's church before and the two have been identified as friends.

But five aides from Falwell's Thomas Road Baptist Church and Liberty University, who came to Bangor from Lynchburg, Virginia, last week are distancing themselves from Frankland.

Ed Dobson, vice president of the university, said one of Falwell's conditions for assuming control of the congregation at the invitation of the church deacons was that Frankland leave both the pulpit and the community.

Frankland has made few public statements about the crisis but told the Bangor Daily News last week that he has felt tossed around "like a yo-yo" with some church members telling him to resign and others begging him to stay. "Lawyers advised me to shut my mouth," he said.

Edward's proposal for a computerized AIDS information network, he said that plan would be discussed at future sessions.

Health officials from New York, San Francisco, Philadelphia, Miami, Florida, Los Angeles, Baltimore, Denver, Minneapolis, Dallas, Newark, New Jersey, Santa Ana California and Washington, D.C. attended.

Other issues took precedence over his proposal for computerized, inter-city exchange of AIDS information, Edwards said.

Paul Kawata of the National AIDS Network, a Washington-based alliance of AIDS service and education groups, said the proposal would duplicate a state-funded computer network that has been operating in California for more than a year.

As of March 24, AIDS had struck 18,576 people in the United States and claimed 9,865 lives, according to the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.
