Athur Bressan's *Buddies* is such an austere-looking film that its emotional complexity comes as a staggering blow. It isn't just a jolt of recognition, a sudden confrontation with familiar thoughts and feelings that have literally never been expressed on screen before, although *Buddies* actually produces that sensation. It's more a matter of suddenly seeing common lives turn out to be uncommonly precious, even heroic.

In its own quiet way, *Buddies* gets at the heart and soul of being gay—not in the big, theatrical sense (the "I am polymorphous and I am divine" school of homoerotic metaphysics), but rather in the honest representation of the workaday realities that govern our lives. In *Buddies*, nobody's fabulous on any level—the careers, the clothes, the faces, the aascs. These people aren't more *real* than anyone else, but in the way they act and think and feel, they evoke a magnificent awareness of the familiar

world, the astonishing shock of the ordinary.

Bressan achieves this acute sense of everyday existence without any of the dramatic conventions that give other melodramas (meaning melodramas about heterosexual relationships) their structure. In telling this gay story, Bressan was forced to pave his own road. Contrast *Buddies* with this year's other gay-themed films, *Consenting Adults* and *An Early Frost* built themselves around the conventions of family melodrama, with a strong focus on the parent-child dynamics, and *Kiss of the Spider Woman* patterned itself after classic tragic tales in which the heroine sacrifices herself for the man she loves. In Bressan's vision of gay life, there aren't any heterosexual models to fall back on when there's a plot problem to solve: like the director himself, his characters have to think things through on their own.

Despite its thoughtful account of gay suffering and death, *Buddies* isn't about AIDS; it's about two people. In the real world, with numbers growing and spirits declining, the gap between these two ways of conceiving the issue is getting wider and wider.

MARCH, 1976
"Tucson Gay Coalition" formed - first Gay 'political' organization.

JUNE 6, 1976
Richard Heakin bludgeoned to death by four teenagers at "Stonewall Bar" parking-lot (First Avenue near Glenn). Gay community mobilizes.

JUNE 1976
"The Observer" founded under its first 'name': "Tucson Gay Newsletter", the first publication in Arizona for the Gay community.

FEB. 7, 1977
Chapter 17 of Tucson City Code adjusted to include words, "...sexual and affectional preference" as Tucson becomes first city in Arizona to provide protection for Gays and Lesbians.

JUNE, 1977
First "Gay Pride" Picnic held in Himmel Park: Attendance around 150.

AUGUST, 1977
Dignity/Tucson founded, first Gay organization incorporated under Arizona law and first Arizona Gay organization granted tax exempt status by the IRS.

SEPT. 1977
"Integrity" and "Affirmation" (Episcopal & Mormon) formed in Tucson - both disbanded within their first year.

OCTOBER, 1977
"Tucson Knight Ovis" (TKO) founded - first levi/leather men's social organization.

NOV. 1977
"Tucson Gay Community Center" opened on 7th Ave. north of 6th Street - first non-bar facility opened for Gays in Tucson. (Disbanded in April, 1978)

FALL, 1977
"La Casa Nuestra" opened as a facility for Gays and Lesbians, later to become primarily a facility for feminist Lesbians (located on Dodge near Grant).

MARCH, 1978
"Tucson Human Rights Coalition" formed to demonstrate against homophobia resulting from Anita Bryant and rightwing religious groups meeting at Tucson Community Center - first open demonstration by Gays and Lesbians in Tucson.

JUNE, 1978
Second "Gay Pride Picnic" held in Himmel Park. Attendance 200.

FALL, 1978
"Gay Information & Referral" starts as a 'hotline' information phone service for persons needing information about the Gay and Lesbian communities.

First "Gay men's health clinic" started in MacArthur Hotel.

JUNE, 1979
Third "Gay Pride Picnic" held in Himmel Park. Attendance around 400.

JUNE, 1980
Fourth "Gay & Lesbian Pride" week celebration held (including first week-long activities) with picnic in Himmel Park on last day of "Gay & Lesbian Pride Week". Attendance around 800.

JUNE, 1981
Fifth "Gay & Lesbian Pride Week" celebration held with picnic in Himmel Park. Attendance around 1,000.

FALL, 1981
"Great Outdoors" forms in Tucson - first non-bar, non-religious, non-political Gay and Lesbian organization.

SPRING, 1982
"Gay Youth Group" founded - first attempt to answer needs of Gay and Lesbian youth (15-23 year olds).

JUNE, 1982

TUCSON - The Tucson Lesbian/Gay Alliance (TLGA) is presenting a panel discussion and presentation on the topic, "Sex Addiction" at 7:00 p.m., Monday, June 23 at the Pineline upstairs. This is scheduled as part of Pride Week '86.

The presentation will be on compulsive sexual behavior as a Gay lifestyle issue. The panel will be exploring what is behind Gay sexual behaviors. Why, to so many, does this behavior with multiple partners seem so unmanageable, especially considering the risk involved with AIDS? Along this same line, the question, is 'safe-sex' a realistic alternative to controlling compulsive sexual behaviors, will be discussed.

The safe sex concept seems to give a false sense of security for many to continue to be involved with numerous partners while not addressing the issue of the powerful sexual drive, many times unmanageable, for free sex without responsibility to ourselves or others.

Also to be discussed will be the use of masturbation, fantasies, pornography and voyeurism as ways to decrease the compulsive sexual practices that increases the risk of disease. Do these techniques work or do they possibly reinforce the compulsive drive for anonymous sex?

Everyone is urged to attend this very timely and crucial presentation and discussion. It is time that this subject be discussed in open forum not only to address the issue but to attempt to understand the causes for our sometimes dangerous sexual practices.

AIDS will escalate tenfold by 1991, cost \$16 a year, officials say

WASHINGTON, DC — The total number of AIDS cases and deaths from the disease will increase more than tenfold in the next five years as the virus spreads widely outside New York and San Francisco and infects a larger segment of the heterosexual population, the government predicted last Thursday, June 12.

Federal health officials, reporting the results of a conference of experts on acquired immune deficiency syndrome, estimated that by 1991, care of patients would cost \$6 billion to \$16 billion a year.

Dr. Donald Ian Macdonald, acting assistant secretary of health and human services, described as "staggering" and "devastating" the huge problems caused by the escalating AIDS epidemic.

To date, the government has recorded 21,517 cases of AIDS and 11,713 deaths from the disease which destroys the body's resistance. The public Health Service estimates that by the end of 1991 there will be a cumulative total of 270,000 cases and 179,000 deaths.

Actual diagnosed cases are but the tip of an epidemiological pyramid, federal health officials said. They estimated that 1 million to 1.5 million Americans had already been infected by the AIDS virus and were potential carriers. Of that number, they said, 20 percent to 30 percent would develop the disease — from which no one has been known to recover — by the end of 1991.

"We expect to see AIDS spreading geographically and occurring much more widely outside of the New York City and San Francisco areas," Macdonald said.

He recommended appointing a commission to decide how the nation should cope with the anticipated burden on the health care system. The problem, he

said, is "bigger than the Public Health Service," which is spending about \$234 million on AIDS this year.

Most of the people who will develop AIDS by 1991 have already been infected with the virus, and a vaccine may not be available for general use before 1993, the officials said. They added that projections for 1991 were conservative and might underestimate the situation by 20 percent.

The Public Health Service estimated that there would be 54,000 deaths from AIDS in 1991 alone, compared with 9,000 this year. By comparison, 45,800 people died in motor vehicle accidents in 1982, according to the Statistical Abstract of the United States, a Census Bureau publication.

A report on AIDS issued Thursday, by the Public Health Service saying that "increases in heterosexual transmission are likely" did not describe new methods of transmission or identify new groups with a high risk of developing the disease.

But it said, "Additional cases in heterosexual men and women are projected." The number of such cases, the agency estimated will rise from 1,100 in 1986, representing 7 percent of newly diagnosed cases, to nearly 7,000 in 1991, representing 9 percent of cases diagnosed in that year.

These cases include "patients who reported heterosexual contact with an infected person or someone in a risk group," as well as cases where heterosexual transmission appears likely, the report said.

In its report, the Public Health Service did not discuss the international incidence of AIDS. Dr. James D. Mason, director of the federal Centers for Disease Control, said: "I have difficulty making projections for either Europe or Africa. We just don't have enough data on trends."



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Mason said the number of AIDS cases in New York and San Francisco was expected to continue increasing over the next five years, but at a slower pace than in the past. In part, officials said, this reflects changes in the behavior of homosexual men, who have taken precautions to reduce the spread of the disease.

Dr. James Curran, director of the AIDS program at the Centers for Disease Control, said public health experts were concerned about the "insidious transmission" of AIDS from heterosexual men and women who are intravenous drug abusers. He also expressed concern about women who might pass the virus on to their children at the time of birth.

"We recognize now that the disease is transmitted through heterosexual contact as well as homosexual contact," Curran said. "This is not just a problem for Gay men, not just a problem for people whose kids are Gay, this is a problem that all people need to be concerned about."

The health service's report said "Temporary involuntary isolation of AIDS victims" should be considered an option only in rare instances and after due process of law, and that "enforced isolation is not a practical way to minimize spread of the infection, since infected persons remain infectious for life."

It recommended forming regional health care "consortiums" to provide AIDS patients with hospital care, mental health services, counseling, home health care and hospice care.

It said the care of an AIDS patient would cost, on the average, at least \$46,000 a year by 1991. The report did not specify how these costs should be paid, but it called for a coordinated effort by public and private health care providers at the national, state and local levels.

Shelley L. Lengel, a spokeswoman for the Public Health Service, said "the blood supply is safer than it has ever been."

Blood collection agencies screen blood for antibodies to the AIDS virus, she said, and homosexual men are generally not giving blood.

She acknowledged that there was normally a period of six weeks between the time of an individual's infection and the development of antibodies. In this period, she said, the virus can be transmitted through the blood.

CHICAGO, IL - Scott Tucker of Philadelphia, was selected International Mr. Leather 1986 on May 25th in Chicago. Sponsored by the Bike Stop bar in Philadelphia, Tucker was selected from a field of 28 leathermen competing for the title and the opportunity to represent the leather community throughout the world.

First Runner-Up was Peter Gallo, sponsored by the Detour of Los Angeles, and Second Runner-Up was Jim Ed Thompson, sponsored by the Powerhouse in San Francisco.

In addition to the competition, the contest was highlighted by Magatone Recording Artists, Jolo, the local lip-sync troupe, Replicai. After a moving speech by 1985 runner-up Richard Hennigh, a PWA, an intermission

collection netted over \$2,000 for the Chicago House residential AIDS hospice.

Scott Tucker was handed the title by his predecessor, Patrick Toner of San Francisco, whose term ended with Tucker's selection. In addition, Toner presented the 1986 winner with a trophy and \$1,500 which was raised as the "Richard Hennigh Traveling Memorial Fund", an ongoing effort to assist the International Mr. Leather title holder with some of his expected travelling expenses. Traditionally, the person holding the title spends much of his time making personal appearances at fundraising events for charity. Last year, 1985 title holder Patrick Toner successfully helped raise over \$155,000 for AIDS and other charitable work. The Richard Hennigh Traveling

Memorial Award was created by Toner and the men of San Francisco's leather community.

Tucker is a freelance journalist and artist whose works have appeared in "Christopher Street", "New York Native", "The Advocate", and "The Body Politic". A native American, Tucker was raised in San Juan, Puerto Rico and Buenos Aires, Argentina. Tucker also has a history of political involvement within the Gay and Lesbian community which began when he was 17 years old. He was one of the organizers of the 1979 Gay & Lesbian Rights March on Washington, DC and active in the forefront of the successful efforts to pass the Philadelphia Gay & Lesbian Rights Ordinance earlier this year.

International Mr. Leather title, Tucker told the gathered crowd, "Leather is more than style. It means playing with power and playing fair. I think the leather community deserves a lot of credit for taking the vanguard role in educating the community on safe sex.

In addition to the 1986 title, Tucker also picked up a number of prizes which included a motorcycle, \$650 in gift certificates, clothing, jewelry and artwork.

Over 1,000 spectators from 27 states and five foreign nations jammed Chicago's Park West Auditorium for the eighth annual contest. Every seat was sold-out by mid-May, and those who could secure entrance at the last moment, were relegated to standing room. Organizers indicate that they may be forced to seek a new and larger auditorium for the 1987 contest next Memorial Day. The contest was the high point of a four-day, event-packed weekend. Events included various bar parties and the "Black and Blue Ball," hosted at Limelight Disco.

Oh, good grief, but I wanted to avoid having to use such a damn cliched title for this week's column, but as I reviewed the information I had on two separate (and totally --I mean, totally-- different) topics, those horribly over-used words kept creeping into my mind: Profiles of Courage. On Thursday, June 5, twenty-one year old Marla Hanson had her face slashed open in three, inch deep cuts made with a window-washer's razor. Pride Week '86 packed full of fun and games

TUCSON - Lesbian/Gay Pride Week '86 officially gets underway this Sunday, June 22 at noon.

The tenth annual Picnic in Himmel Park gets the eight day period of events off to a roaring start. In past years this event has proven to be the 'spectacular event' that sets the tone for the other events to follow. This years 'picnic' is going to be no exception.

Bigger and better than ever, the 1986 version of this traditional event will see over 2,000 Gay men and Lesbians and their friends gathered in the Northeast corner of Himmel Park in the Bandshell area. There will be 25 kegs of ice cold beer on hand which has been donated by the six Gay bars in Tucson and which will be served free of charge by bartenders and employees of these same bars - another tradition. There will be free soda drinks available to those who prefer their drinks 'soft'. There will be many 'booths' set up around the area that will offer information, food, games, educational materials, etc. There will be live entertainment by Kathleen Williams and Rochelle Raya formerly from Flagstaff and Phoenix.

There will be lots of recorded dance music provided by the Joshua Tree's DJ Bobbie Bishop, Jr. There will be a continuous volleyball game going for those who want to be 'sporty'. There are lots of shaded areas to just relax and converse. You can bring your own picnic lunch or purchase food at the picnic. The purpose of the day is to get together, enjoy each other and celebrate our pride in being in such a community that is able to produce such an unusual festival.

There is plenty of shade or sun if you prefer. There is plenty of parking within a few feet of the assigned area.

Two things to remember, however. Park rules state that no glass containers are allowed, and they enforce that rule. The other is that with the dispensing of beer, only persons who are 21 years or older are to be served. No one underage will be served and if you look like you are underage, you will be checked several times by the Tucson Lesbian/Gay Alliance security patrols as well as by park police if the situation gets out of control. Your full cooperation is requested. As a result of the new, stricter liquor laws, more

stringent enforcement must be made. Please do not abuse the rules and make it difficult for everyone else.

The picnic will officially begin at noon and will be officially over at dusk, or when everyone is worn out - whichever comes first.

Then, after the picnic, on Sunday evening beginning at 8:30 there is a Pride Week Kick-off Show at Rita's Rendezvous which features Christi Lunden, Monte-Jon, Candy Plastique and stars, direct from Phoenix, the comedic talents of Classy Goldberg - the inimitable and the indomitable. There will be a \$2 charge for reserved seating, but for bar seating or standing room there is no charge.

And that's only Sunday! On Monday there are two very interesting workshops to be held at the Pineline beginning at 7:00 p.m. "Sex and Love Addiction" and "Gay & Lesbian Communication" will be conducted in a panel discussion and question and answer period following each workshop. Facilitators will include highly qualified persons who will be able to open up new vistas on these subjects. There will be a festive reception following the workshops. See separate story this issue.

On Tuesday, the Graduate will present the "Mad Hatter's Tea Party" which begins at 9:00 p.m. There will be a short show hosted by Aviva Diamond, Queen of Fiesta de Mayo along with Candy Plastique, and then the 'Hat Contest' begins. There will be a \$50 prize for the person with the hat that portrays the best Gay Pride theme. The two other winning categories which will receive \$25 each are the most Original and the most Degenerate. Plus, there will be consolation prizes for the losing contestants who enter also. See the Graduate ad in this issue.

On Wednesday, June 25, there will be a special showing of the critically acclaimed film "Buddies" at the Modern Languages Building Auditorium on the UofA campus at 7:30. This film was flown in from New York for this special showing at considerable cost to the Tucson Lesbian/Gay Alliance. There will be a \$2 donation at the door to help defray costs. Directions to the Auditorium will be printed on the back of the tickets which will be available beginning Sunday at the ILGA booth at Himmel Park. Check the ad for "Buddies" in this weeks OBSERVER.

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

"Parting Glances" - A Review . . .

"Parting Glances" which is scheduled to open at Showcase Cinema, 3233 E. Speedway, in Tucson is not a movie about AIDS. It is also not about coming out, murder, drag queens and/or dancers. This film is about an average everyday Gay man and his relationship with his current and ex-lovers, a woman friend and just his life in general. How nice to see a film about Gay people with normal everyday problems and joys.

Michael and Robert (expertly played by Richard Gancino and John Bolger) are lovers who are undergoing a separation due to work schedules. Additionally,

minor characters are just as deftly drawn and portrayed. Cinematography and costumes are adequate, but overshadowed by the wonderful musical score. As with independent films, the movie was produced on a tight budget, but in this case I think that that had a positive effect in that it made the story tighter and added to the coziness of the film.

Bill Sherwood wrote the screenplay for "Parting Glances" in December 1983 and then spent six months assembling the money to begin shooting. After showing the script to what seemed to him like hundreds of people, Sherwood and his colleague Arthur Silver-



Given his background, it is not surprising that Sherwood paid particular attention to the music in "Parting Glances". "The music is all figured out -- certain music goes with certain characters and it all reoccurs. There is a shape to it -- classical and rock 'n roll, sometimes both going on at the same time," says Sherwood. The recording of Brahms' Piano Quartet, G minor, Op. 25 heard in "Parting Glances" was produced by Sherwood and some of his musician friends. After listening to hours of tapes of known and unknown 'new' rock musicians, Sherwood decided on a selection which features New York's Stuart Bright and England's Bronski Beat.

After a number of screenings of the rough-cut for potential backers, in May their problems were solved when Paul A. Kaplan -- who had helped bring the play "As Is" to Broadway -- saw "Parting Glances" and a week later gave Rondo Productions the full amount needed to finish the film.

The idea for "Parting Glances" grew from Sherwood's irritation with the usual content and style of Gay-themed films and his distress at the growing AIDS crisis. He confined the story to a 24-hour period and a specifically delineated cast of characters so the film would not be construed as an attempt to represent all Gays. However, Sherwood hoped that showing the lives of a group of Gays living in a city where Gay politics and social issues are in the foreground would result in a degree of universality. The AIDS crisis figures in "Parting Glances" as it does in real life, as a given part of a larger portrait of present-day life in New York.

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their relationship is somewhat strained by Michael's relationship with his ex-lover who is a person with AIDS. Rather than an epic portrait of a relationship, or Gay relationships, this is a cozy study of seven people and how their lives are intertwined in a twenty-four hour period.

Writer and director Bill Sherwood has constructed an intimate portrait of these people. Don't look for heavy symbolism or deep messages, this is a character study of the best kind. By the end of the movie we have gotten to know six of the seven characters quite well. The seventh character, Peter, described as a twinkle in the film, has no place to go and nothing to do with the story, but he is pretty to look at, so twinkle is probably an accurate description of the role as well as the character.

Outstanding performances by comedienne Kath Kinney as a sort of everywoman for a woman with Gay male friends, and Steve Buscemi as a rock near-great who has contracted AIDS, shine in a cast of talented newcomers. The

men managed to raise \$40,000 from friends and acquaintances by June 1984, enough to start up production.

The Screen Actors Guild decision to do away with the low-budget pay scale it had been offering independent producers obliged Sherwood and casting director Dan Haughey to cast the film with non-union actors only six weeks before the shooting was to begin. August was spent auditioning hundreds of actors, most of whom were recent graduates of New York acting schools. To avoid any misunderstandings, casting ads placed in trade journals specified that the call was for a Gay film. However casting was done without regard to the actors' personal orientation and in "Parting Glances" Gays play Gays, Gays play straights, straights play Gays and straights play straights.

Cast and crew were assembled by the end of August. Eventually over one hundred people were involved in the production as with most low-budget films, many deferred portions of their salaries or donated their services.

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
