## Local officials see no porn crackdown here

**TUCSON** - Despite the fear expressed by many, concerning a crackdown by local law enforcement officials about sexually explicit materials and videotape rental stores, there does not appear to be a public outcry from Tucsonans for such action, according to a forum held at the Doubletree Hotel last Thursday, August 7.

Speaking at a Tucson Trade Bureau Forum were Pima County Attorney Stephen D. Neely; Helen Mautner of the Arizona Civil Liberties Union and Tucson Police Sgt. Kermit Miller.

Neely, who is charged with enforcing state statutes on obscenity, paraphrased a U.S. Supreme Court justice: "I'm not prepared to define pornography, but I know it when I see it." From a legal standpoint, Neely said, "the community standard is all-important." State statutes say that an item is obscene when the "average person" finds that the item "appeals to the purulent interest" and when "the item, taken as a whole, lacks serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value."

In practice, Neely and Miller said, the "handful" of recent prosecutions in Pima County have concentrated on so-called "kiddie-porn" - the depiction of children involved in sexual acts - and on bestiality and violent portrayals of sexual sadomasochism.

Neely, asked if a recent Maricopa County crackdown on videotape rental stores could be repeated here, said, "Sure it can... if you want it to." But because there has been little "public outcry" against purveyors of pornography here and because resources are limited, law enforcement officials are concentrating their efforts elsewhere, Neely said.

Helen Mautner said that even if the public were crying out, government should refrain from telling adults what they can read or watch. "No one wants their 8 or 9 year old reading 'Screw' magazine or watching 'Wanda Whips The World,' or whatever those things are called," Mautner said. She also warned about those who "use government to inflict their moral views on everyone else."

Instead, she said, anti-

pornography activists should exercise the same right invoked by producers of pornography: Freedom of speech. Boycotts, pickets and letters to elected officials are some ways the public can reject pornography without infringing on the rights of others, she said.

The three speakers had different opinions about how harmful pornography is to society. The issue comes about from the results of the federal study on pornography commissioned by Attorney General Edwin Meese III. (OBSERVER July 30). The commission reversed findings of a 1970 study which found no evidence that pornography was harmful. Critics of the new study say it inaccurately tries to establish a causal relationship between certain pornography and violence.

Neely said he doesn't know if "there is a direct connection, and the Meese report notwithstanding, I don't think anybody knows." Although some people might be stimulated into committing crimes, Neely said, "there are probably also people who are deterred."

Miller said he felt pornography was harmful to society partly because of its "unrealistic" portrayal of sexual relationships. For example, in films and tapes depicting rape, "they always show the woman enjoying it," Miller said.

But Mautner said that "if you accept the argument that tapes which depict explicit sex are harmful to the family, and that all pornography is harmful to women, then what about literature that puts Jews in a bad light?" Tucson is more tolerant," Mautner said. "Many people would be uncomfortable with the government telling them what they can view."

Mautner cited a survey conducted this year by the Behavior Research Center. She said 64 percent of Pima County residents interviewed said it should be legal for adults to rent or buy sexually explicit tapes. The same poll showed that 73 percent of the men and 35 percent of the women interviewed said they oppose laws restricting the sale or rental of such tapes.

Sgt. Miller said although pornography is available in

adult bookstores here, few complaints are made to police. Most of the complaints concern Playboy and Penthouse magazines that are accessible or uncovered in convenience stores, he said. "We want to prevent children from being able to pick them up," he said. But he said police don't wait for complaints to move against those selling or buying child pornography.





Falwell was appealing a lower court ruling that directed him to pay the \$5,000 to Gay activist and Baptist minister Jerry Sloan after Sloan produced a tape proving that Falwell had said that there would be rejoicing in heaven when the Metropolitan Community Church was annihilated.

Falwell had promised Sloan \$5,000 if Sloan could prove Falwell had made the remark. The additional \$2,875 for attorney's fees was added to Falwell's bill by Judge Michael Ullman "for prosecuting this frivolous appeal."

## INTERESTING CLIPPING

The EMMY AWARDS were announced a couple weeks ago, and without surprise the film *AN EARLY FROST* -- a television movie about AIDS -- was one of the top five nomination getters.

Nominated for 14 awards, *EARLY FROST* continues to get much deserved attention. Just this past May, *EARLY FROST* received a George Foster PEABODY AWARD for meritorious service in broadcasting.

Among the awards *EARLY FROST* may win are acting awards for stars Ben Gazzara, and the wonderful Adrian Quinn as best lead actor in a miniseries or special; Gena Rowlands as best lead actress; John Glover and Sylvia Sidney as best supporting actor and actress. Technical award nominations include best directing, writing, cinematography, art direction, music and others.

Even with the stiff competition *AN EARLY FROST* faces, I am sure it will make a good showing during the ceremony which is scheduled to be aired Sunday, September 21.

Next, did you see the interesting piece in USA TODAY on August 1st? It was an article which told about a study which found that Gay men are five times more likely to have Gay brothers than non-Gay men. Although the study doesn't determine if this result is inherited or environmental, researcher James Weinrich of the Boston School of Medicine said in the article that "Being a Gay male is a family trait. It isn't randomly distributed."

He goes on to say that "The possibility is still open that it is a genetic trait". More of the study can be found in the current issue of Archives of General Psychiatry.

The study was based on 101 men, 50 Gay and 51 heterosexual, between the ages 25 and 35, and their 178 siblings.

A big PAT-ON-THE-BACK Award goes to ex-Dynasty star Paul Keenan who recently went public with the news that he has been diagnosed as having AIDS. It is generally agreed that this public admission has ended his growing career in Hollywood, but he has attained greater success as a man of strength, courage and conviction. He has chosen to use his celebrity status to fight for improved monetary, and environmental conditions for other AIDS patients.

Along with Rock Hudson, Keenan is the second one-time Dynasty cast member to be diagnosed with AIDS.

And speaking of Rock Hudson, here is a big KICK-IN-THE-PANTS Award for book publishers MORROW who held a book publicity party in the dead star's mansion in Beverly Hills. They were trying to boost the sagging sales for the book *ROCK HUDSON / HIS STORY* written by Hudson and Sara Davidson.

It is tacky enough to have this press party at the now-for-sale mansion, period, but it was held so soon after the star's death. Has no-one any shame. Apparently no-one at MORROW does.

**As I See It**

Thursday evening of Gay Pride Week I was sitting with my lover and perhaps thirty or forty others in the choir and front few rows of Grace Episcopal Church in Tucson. We were there to take part in the chartering ceremonies of Integrity-Tucson.

The auxiliary bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Arizona celebrated Mass as several Episcopal priests took part in a show of unity and support. Rev. David Gunton of MCC/Tucson also took part as a show of unity of the Gay and Lesbian religious community. The whole celebration was impressive.

As a long-time Gay activist, especially within an organized religion in southern Arizona, I am very pleased to know that Gay and Lesbian Episcopalians and their friends have found the strength and unity necessary to have pursued the long process of chapter formation and finally brought an Integrity chapter to Tucson. As co-founder of Dignity/Tucson, I know the personal difficulties, anxieties, fears and frustrations the members had gone through and have yet to face. But that night a new legacy was born as several Gays and Lesbians made the personal choice to become actively involved not only in the Gay/ Lesbian communities but within their Church community as well. As a result, we are all richer because of them.

With the chartering of Integrity-Tucson, there are now three official religious Gay/ Lesbian organizations in southern Arizona (MCC, Dignity & Integrity). Over the years many others have appeared as well. I can't help but ask a question that I know is on the mind of others as well: In our community where many of us see "The Church" as the major oppressor of Gays and Lesbians, why do we have such a strong attraction toward formal religion?

As I see it, we are all "called" to maturity. I think that's one of the main purposes of life. Each individual must grow and mature or they will wither and die. I think that maturity needs to be total - physical maturity, psychological

maturity, sexual maturity, emotional maturity, etc. and spiritual maturity.

When we struggle with our homosexuality, we often put aside those other parts of our being we think are in conflict with our sexual orientation. We place them on the back burner and spirituality, because of its close connection with formal church, is usually the first to be so placed. We often ignore our spirituality for years. None-the-less, we have this nagging feeling that something in our life isn't complete. Something from our past needs to be dealt with in a more realistic manner. It's at that point that I think we often are attracted to organizations like MCC, Dignity, Integrity, or perhaps other "spiritual/metaphysical/supernatural" organizations that offer us a safe harbor where we can go to work on the maturing of our spirituality within a context of acceptance as individual persons who happen to be Gay/ Lesbian.

Groups like Dignity, Integrity and Affirmation have made their position clear from the start: they are not attempting to start homosexual churches, but rather they provide temporary shelter in a Church and society not yet ready to face the issue. Gabriel Moran, Professor of Religious Education at New York University has said, "These Gay groups, with their self-conscious attention to suffering members, can turn narrowly narcissistic. At their best, however, they bring a new meaning of power to political life and Church life. Such groups need the larger Church, but in turn the larger Church is in desperate need of their invigoration."

In religious circles we hear much about the "sin of homosexuality"; if there be "sin" here it is the sin of refusing to grow and mature, or worse yet, of preventing others from reaching their fullest maturity. Groups like Integrity, Dignity, MCC and others can offer the "safe harbor" necessary to each of us so that we have the time and space necessary to find our own path to spiritual maturity.
