Carolyn Warner issues Gay Rights statement, receives Observer endorsement for Governor

TUCSON - A news article appearing in the Arizona Republic last Sunday, concerned a report prepared by Independent candidate for Governor, Bill Shultz, on homosexual rights. (See separate story this issue).

In light of this Shultz report, written in 1983, OBSERVER sought a statement from Democratic candidate for Arizona Governor, Carolyn Warner. With presstime drawing near, Warner Press Secretary, John DeWitt, obtained two statements from Ms. Warner. One concerned a statement on Gay rights and the other concerned Warner's policy concerning the AIDS issue.

The statements as given to OBSERVER are as follows:

"Gay Rights statement by Carolyn Warner, candidate for Governor.

"I believe that every human being is an individual of sacred worth. I believe that we must insist that all persons are entitled to have their human and civil rights ensured. I believe in full human and civil rights for every citizen of whatever race,

creed, color, belief or sexual orientation.

"I believe government has no place in the bedrooms or intimate private affairs of its citizens.

"If a consenting adults law is sent to me as governor, I will support it."

Statement on AIDS by Carolyn Warner, Democratic candidate for Governor.

"I believe that we must fund AIDS research at a worthwhile level and I believe we must give serious thought to any law or policy that would force identification of persons who test positive for the HTLV-III virus.

I further believe that home health care and other non-institutional care for AIDS victims must be included in a comprehensive program for care of persons with long-term and terminal illnesses.

"The dignity of those who are afflicted must be maintained."

Progress, a Gay and Lesbian Political Action Committee, has endorsed either Bill Shultz or Carolyn Warner for governor in the upcoming November 4th elections. BILL SHULZ AND GAY RIGHTS

TUCSON - Last Sunday, Oct. 26, an article appeared in the Arizona Republic concerning Bill Shulz, Independent candidate for Arizona governor, and his stand on Lesbian and Gay rights.

It seems that in 1983, Shulz spent 22 months preparing a report, "The Arizona Governor", which he hoped would be a cornerstone in his bid for governor in 1986. When he abruptly called off his campaign last year, because of a daughter's illness, he promised to publish the report anyway and donate it to Arizona State University. Shulz reportedly spent \$600,000 in publishing the treatise.

In the light of Shulz's unexpected re-entry into the race, the 3-month-old report has attracted renewed interest.

Ideas in the report included many items ranging from national defense waste, economics, welfare, education, etc. and homosexuality.

Conferring the "rights of citizenship and respect" to homosexuals.

"If one believes that God controls all, then he knew what he was doing in creating both (Leonardo da Vinci and Michaelangelo) as homosexuals," Shulz wrote.

"My position is that we must face the historic facts of homosexuality and welcome homosexuals to all the rights of citizenship and respect which their attainments otherwise command."



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TUCSON MAN ELECTED HEAD OF GREAT OUTDOORS

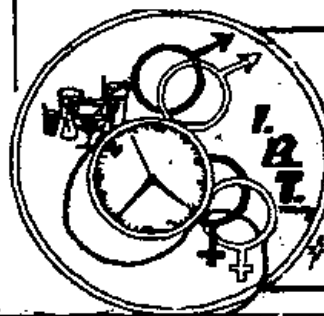

'Gay dollars' show power in Chicago



Millions of dollars bearing "gay \$" may be circulating in Chicago

CHICAGO, IL (AP) — If money is power, Gay activists reason, then money that passes through the homosexual community -- and is marked accordingly -- may translate into Gay power.

For the last few months, Chicago homosexuals have been circulating greenbacks stamped in red with "Gay \$" as a demonstration of their strength. Activists estimate million of dollars have been stamped so far, and say the movement is spreading to other large cities. Federal officials say the bills are likely being re-circulated to other Midwestern states as well.

The campaign was sparked by the July failure of a proposed city ordinance to guarantee equal rights for homosexuals, said Frank Kellas, owner of a bar in the Near North area who helped launch the campaign.

"What buys rights but dollars?" said Kellas.

"All we're asking for is equal protection under the law and not to be beaten up because we're Gay -- or fired," said the Rev. Niture Saunders, co-chairman of the Illinois Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "To judge by what I've seen, it's given a little more kick in the pride of Gay and Lesbian people," Ms. Saunders said. "It's been interesting to watch how people ... have been reacting, and now they're taking it as a matter of course," she said. "And that means a little more acceptance of Gay people."

The protest has broadened its aims since the ordinance's defeat. For one thing, Kellas said the marked bills are helping dispel "the myth of catching AIDS through (casual) contact. By showing how many dollars are touched by homosexuals, heterosexuals may learn that acquired immune deficiency syndrome cannot be spread by casual contact," he said.

He said plans originally called for the marked-bills campaign to end this month, but "we decided to stamp indefinitely" and go national. Groups in San Francisco, New York and Dallas have expressed interest, he said.

Gay-owned businesses are stocking the stamps and stamping all the money that passes through their tills, said Ms. Saunders.

Some homosexual activists estimate that millions of dollars have been stamped since Aug. 1.

Kellas said the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago is keeping the bills in circulation.

At least two Chicago banks with branches in the homosexual community have turned the marked money into the Fed, but the money center is not destroying the dollars because the sorting machines do not detect the inch-long stamp, said Fed spokeswoman Nancy Goodman.

"One mark on a currency would not render it unfit for circulation," she said. "As a result, the Gay dollars will turn up in the four other states the Fed serves: Iowa, Michigan, Wisconsin and Indiana."

Some banks, however, are refusing the bills. R. Kennedy Alger, senior vice-president of Lakeview Bank, said that bank will return the marked currency until the Justice Department officials "come out with a pronouncement that it is a legal activity, then we'll start processing them tomorrow."

The U.S. Attorney's office is not investigating the marked bills, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Joan Safford. "We have no case," she said.

Joel Harris, president of Aetna Bank on the North Side, said, "We are sending them back to the Feds primarily because we had complaints from our customers who would rather not have marked bills." He said the bank's action is not intended to reflect a moral stand and that there has been no backlash from the Gay community.

Kellas said that possibility is still open. If a business "would refuse to accept our money, then we would boycott," he said.

As I See It

With the general election only a few days away, I'd like to devote this column to some observations of the state of American politics in 1986 and the relationship to human rights for Lesbians and Gays.

Since the late '70s, right-wing religious groups have become more and more actively involved in the American political process. One of the avowed objectives of these right-wing groups is the denial of all human rights for homosexuals. Some groups even open advocate placing Gays and Lesbians in "detention camps" and forcing individual Gays to be tattooed for "identification purposes". Our enemy is obvious - it is the right-wing (religious or not). If we are to be free, then our enemies, those who would deny us our freedom, must be defeated.

The obvious seems so simple - the right-wing must be defeated and the polling booth is the best place to start. Gays and Lesbians still have the power of the ballot. And yet, between the members of our community who don't vote and those that believe, "we are better off" under Reagan's (right) wing and continue to vote an ultra-conservative ticket, we support our own demise. So long as we think our pocket-books are the most important issue of any campaign, so long as we feel it really doesn't matter if we vote or not, we cast our ballot for the eventual loss of our own freedom. Even if we don't vote, we have voted indeed!

On November 4th there exists the opportunity to say "no" to any further erosion of our rights. We have no choice, we must vote and we must cast an informed ballot. We can no longer afford to vote for candidates that do not support our rights.

As an example, when Richard Kimball comes openly before us and speaks with us and acts on our behalf, how can any Gay or Lesbian cast a vote for John McCain?

There are any number of other candidates who also support our rights. If we fail to support them during elections, who can we blame for the eroding away of our freedom but ourselves?

The voting booth is a private place; even those who are not out of their closets can vote without fear of being 'found out'. No Gay nor Lesbian need fear taking a stand for our own future. No lover of freedom can deny that justice and equal rights for ALL people is the real issue here.

Protection of our rights must be our primary concern this November and again in November, 1987 and especially in November 1988.

I'm going to the polls on November 4, and I'm going informed. Will you join me?

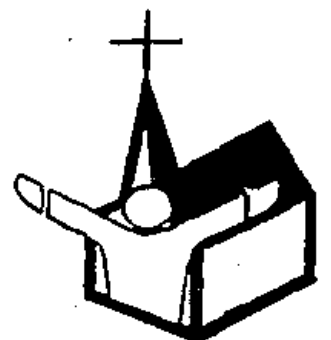

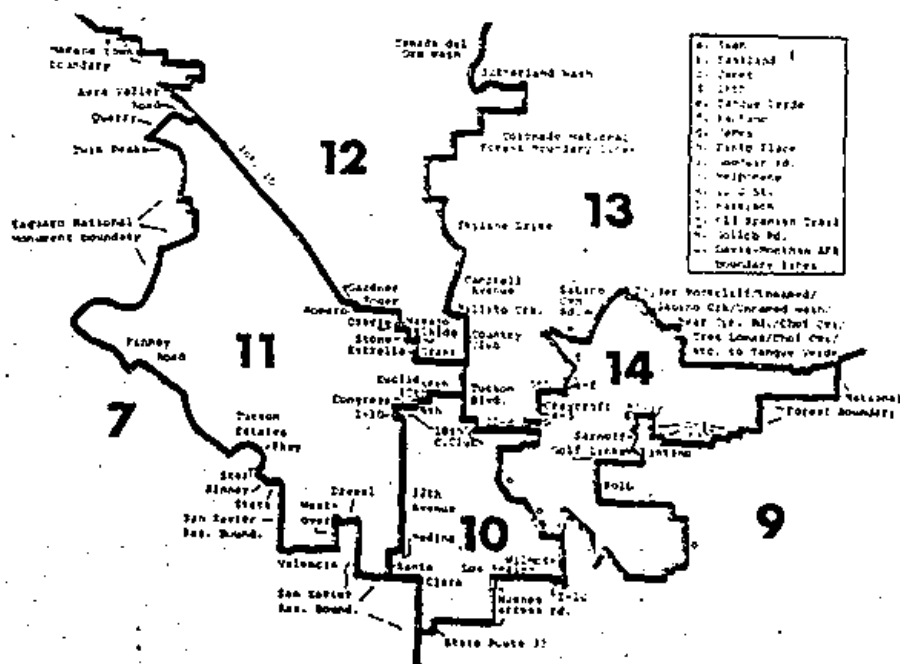

EDITORIAL

It is always difficult to make political endorsements on a state-wide basis, and one can only go by a politician's past record of service, his political promises of the future and the individual politicians' stand on particular issues - in our case Gay and Lesbian issues.

Just because a person makes a positive statement regarding Gay and Lesbian issues is not reason enough to push for that person to be elected to office. We as Gay people should also be concerned with the environment, the national defense, the foreign policy, our local water problems, nuclear energy, etc., etc., etc. While an affirmative statement on issues that might affect the homosexual lifestyle is all well and good, it is important to know the past performance of a person in the political arena, to see if that particular person is capable of following through with campaign promises.

Another very important thing to remember about endorsements. Just because OBSERVER or any other Gay or Lesbian organization might endorse a person, it should not be construed as indication of the sexual orientation of that person.

The Phoenix-based State Committee For Progress, the Lesbian and Gay Political Action Committee has addressed the political candidates via personal interviews and questionnaires. Admittedly very few questionnaires were returned of the over 100 sent

out. Several of those that were returned were very homophobic.

OBSERVER believes that it is quite politically correct to try to put out of office those incumbents who are homophobic as well as concentrating our efforts to keep homophobes from being elected to office in the first place.

The list of endorsements listed herein are made up of candidates qualified to be elected to the office they are running for even though some may not have issued a public pro-Gay statement. It must be remembered that many politicians are still unaware of the potential power of the Lesbian and Gay vote, and are unwilling to 'come out of their closets' to accept Gay and Lesbian endorsements.

One of the more important races that is on the ballot this election is that of U.S. Senator. Without question, the person for the job is Richard Kimball. Beside the many campaign promises that Kimball has made (clean water, clean air, fair government, lean government, fiscal responsibility, a stronger America, safer world, quality education, concern for senior citizens, etc.), Kimball has addressed himself to the homosexual community.

His appearance and short talk at the last Tucson Lesbian and Gay Pride Picnic in June was an indication that this man is concerned and will work for our civil rights. He is qualified for

the job of United States Senator, and a concerted Gay vote will put him in the United States Senate.

Another important post that a 'friend' of the community is running for is State Treasurer. Mike Morgan is vying for the office of Arizona State Treasurer. Governor Bruce Babbitt as well as Sen. Dennis DeConcini among others have endorsed Morgan and the OBSERVER also highly recommends Mike Morgan, ex-Tucsonan, and Vietnam veteran whose qualifications are impeccable and whose concern for the homophile community is well known.

Other important considerations for this year's election are the United States Congressional races. Everyone is in agreement on the District 2 race that Morris Udall is the correct choice. Even Mr. Udall's Republican opponent has practically conceded defeat. As in many past elections, OBSERVER endorses Morris "Mo" Udall.

But the district 5 race is another story. State Committee For Progress (SCP) has endorsed Democrat Joel Ireland over incumbent Republican Jim Kolbe. OBSERVER agrees with the Tucson Citizen who says that Ireland "is a liberal, idealistic, sincere Episcopal priest. Ireland is a very likeable person but woefully unqualified to become a congressman."

Jim Kolbe has racked up "an impressive record as a fiscal conservative with the guts to put national issues ahead of spending in his own district. But far from slighting his own district, Kolbe covers it like a blanket on the

weekends and has looked out for Southern Arizona on wilderness issues and the emergency help to feed women, infants and children in Tucson." OBSERVER endorses Jim Kolbe for re-election.

For Corporation Commission OBSERVER agrees with SCP endorsing Sharon Megdal and Renz Jennings, and for Superintendent of Public Instruction we agree that C. Diane Bishop is the obvious choice.

The rest of the candidates that are running for the state legislature are listed in the box with all OBSERVER endorsements. Most of these endorsements are the same as those of SCP with some exceptions and these occur in Districts 9, 10 and 12. OBSERVER has placed these endorsements in a convenient size so that it may be clipped out and taken to the voting booth with you to assist you in making your choices more conveniently.

BUT ONLY IF IT'S GENUINE

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA (GCN) - Permanent residency status may now be awarded to non-Australian Lesbians and Gay men who are in "genuine relationships" with Australians. 'Pink Triangle', a New Zealand Lesbian and Gay publication, reports this move came after "intense lobbying" from the Gay Immigration Task Force.

The Task Force is comprised of Australians and their non-australian partners who are trying to obtain permanent residency.

While the new policy will have some effect, proof of a "genuine relationship" may not come easily. People seeking residency will have to provide evidence that they have lived with their partner for at least four years. A temporary resident visa will be available to couples while they attempt to establish the four year period.

Under the new guidelines, approximately 40 applications for permanent residency or temporary residency have been approved for Lesbians and Gay men.

Bar head criticizes Meese for remarks

WASHINGTON, DC (AP) - The head of the American Bar Association has criticized Attorney General Edwin Meese's statement that the Supreme Court decisions on the Constitution do not represent the absolute law of the land.

In a speech Tuesday, Oct. 21, at Tulane University in New Orleans said government officials should be guided by their own views of the Constitution rather than always deferring to the Supreme Court.

"Supreme Court decisions are the law of the land just as acts of Congress are the law of the land," Eugene C. Thomas, president of the 200,000 member association, the largest lawyers' professional organization in the country, said in response to Meese's comments.

"Both can be tested in the courts, but unless and until they are overturned, they are the law of the land," Thomas said.

"It would shake the foundations of our system to say that a Supreme Court 'holding is not law,' he said.

A supreme Court decision "binds the parties in the case and also the executive branch for whatever enforcement is necessary," Meese said. But he added that "such a decision does not establish a 'supreme law of the land' that is binding on all persons and parts of government henceforth and forevermore."

The ABA president said, however, that until a court decision is overruled, "public officials and private citizens alike are not free simply to disregard that legal holding, for it is a part of the body of binding constitutional law of the land."

Terry Eastland, head of the Justice Department's public affairs office, said Meese had not been suggesting defiance.

Eastland said that "proper and appropriate ways of disagreeing with the Supreme Court" include seeking to have the court overturn its rulings, as has been done successfully more than 180 times in its history.

Ira Glasser, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union, said Meese "is fast establishing himself as the most dangerous public official since Richard Nixon."

Harvard University law professor Phillip Heymann, head of the Justice Department's criminal division during the Carter administration, called Meese's remarks "out of contact with reality."

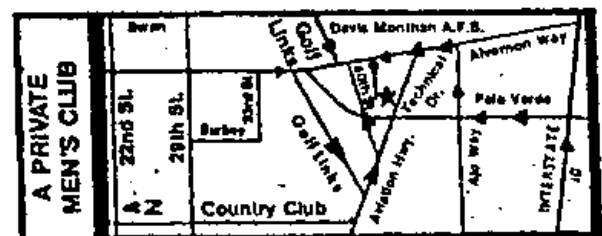

Women's Fest raises \$17,000 to fight LaRouche

YOSEMITE, CA (GCN) "Festle-goers" at the West Coast Women's Music and Comedy Festival raised \$17,000 to fight Proposition 64, an initiative that could lead to the quarantine of people with AIDS in California.

The initiative which will be on the November ballot in California, is sponsored by a group affiliated with right-wing activist Lyndon LaRouche.

"A lot of women thought [the initiative] is not a women's issue," said Robin Tyler, Lesbian comedian and producer of the Labor Day Festival. Apparently Tyler quickly convinced the over 3,000 Lesbians attending otherwise.

"The backlash against Gay men is not to cure AIDS. It's just to stop the queers," Tyler told GCN. She added that the backlash is also aimed "at the entire civil rights movement." At least 80 percent of the children with AIDS in the U.S. are people of color, as are 40 percent of the adults.

The rights of Lesbians are also specifically under attack, said Tyler, noting for example, that a number of the women's music festivals were forced to cancel this year because they were denied space. While the West Coast event did take place as planned, Tyler is suing the city of San Francisco for revoking a contract to provide a campground for the festival.

According to Tyler, the festival was held at Camp Mather, a city-owned facility, in 1980 and 1981. In 1982, however, camp officials told Tyler they would no longer be able to house the event because it had grown too large.

Tyler filed suit for ten million dollars on Sept. 12 after

discovering that a predominantly heterosexual festival, twice as large as the mostly Lesbian event, was later allowed to rent Camp Mather.

The Arizona Brotherhood is an annual get-together sponsored by brother clubs in the state of Arizona. The event switches back and forth between Tucson and Phoenix each year. This year's event is being organized by the Sons of Apollo Motorcycle Club of Phoenix.

Throughout the four days, each club will be dishing out their favorite food and entertaining with various events and contests, culminating on Sunday, Nov. 30 with the presentation of colors and awards ceremonies.

Applications are available from any of the participating club members, and anyone is welcome to participate in the four day event. Run fee for non-members is \$20 and for host club members, \$10.
