Stop "GAY \$" U.S. Attorney Says

CHICAGO, IL (AP) - Despite a "cease and desist" order from the U.S. attorney, organizers of a campaign to demonstrate Gay economic muscle by stamping dollar bills with a red "GAY \$" said they won't quit. (OBSERVER, Oct 29).

"Until our attorneys determine the legality of any action ... we cannot in good conscience continue to urge others to join us," said Frank Kellas, a Chicago bar owner who helped launch the "GAY \$" campaign.

"However, we have already received assurances from many that they will continue the campaign," said Kellas.

The "GAY \$"-stamped greenbacks first appeared days after the Chicago City Council voted on July 29 to reject an ordinance that would have guaranteed equal rights for homosexuals.

Marge Summitt, a bar owner and campaign organizer, said at a news conference that within 45 days of the campaign's inception, more than \$4.7 million in stamped currency had been turned into the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago.

But fed spokeswoman Suzanne Reffner said there is no way to estimate how much currency had been marked, since the bank makes no special provisions to count "GAY \$" separately.

Kellas estimated that only about 200 "GAY \$" stamps were in circulation initially and that as many as 600 have been passed out to Gay-owned businesses and individuals by now.

Both Kellas and Ms. Summitt said they would continue to stamp currency until the ordinance is passed. They also said homosexual individuals and businesses would withdraw their money from a North Side bank which has removed the money from circulation.

Kellas circulated copies of a Dec. 5 letter addressed to him by U.S. Attorney Anton Valukas advising that federal law makes it a crime for anyone to "write, print or otherwise impress ... any notice or advertisement whatever" on U.S. currency.

The letter noted that Kellas admitted personally stamping federal currency and assisting others by selling stamps in violation of federal law. "Upon receipt of this notice, you must cease and desist from such conduct," the letter concluded.


Kellas called it ironic the Justice Department took note of the "GAY \$" campaign "in view of the fact they can't seem to find \$30 million CIA dollars" reportedly connected to arms sales to Iran and later diverted to the Contras fighting in Nicaragua.

Kellas said Valukas' letter was evidence of the "Reagan administration's determination to

FACTOT CATS AND QUEER CURES

JACKSON, MS (GCN) - According to the Advocate, an animal rights group has criticized the University of Mississippi Medical Center for experiments that reportedly involved shocking cats into homosexuality.

The Human/Animal Liberation Front of New York City accused the university of electrically shocking eight male cats in the early 1980's in an effort to find a "cure" for homosexuality in men.


Medical center officials countered that the discontinued research was actually a "brain study of reflexive and automatic sexual behavior" aimed at understanding "hypersexuality," an involuntary state that can afflict those with strokes, tumors, brain viruses, brain injuries and aneurysms.

A male cat was considered by researcher to be "hypersexed" when it displayed sexual behavior toward another male cat; castrated cats were found to be more quickly induced into "hypersexuality" by the shocks.

LEAP IN CONDOM SALES

CHICAGO, IL (GCN) - According to a recent Chicago Tribune business article, the sale of condoms has undergone a dramatic growth over the past few years, attributed in part to the threat of AIDS.

Condoms now constitute a \$200 million-plus industry, and industry experts estimate that sales will increase by as much as 40 percent over the next few years. Since the late '70s, stringent laws which once restricted and even prohibited commercial sale of condoms have been relaxed; condoms have made their way out from under the drugstore counter and into plain view. Manufacturers are launching extensive advertising campaigns to reach a wide audience, including women, who constitute nearly half of the market.

The condom enjoyed its heyday in the '30s and '40s, when like today, its chief role was in preventing venereal diseases. In later decades, condom sales fell, especially in the '60s with the introduction of the birth control pill.

The condom is still viewed in some quarters as an illicit, pornographic device unfit for advertising. Newspapers, magazines and commercial television, still refuse to carry condom ads.

'CREATIVE' IS NOT THE WORD
DALLAS, TX (GCN) - "Another Voice" reports that a person with AIDS who pleaded guilty to his third charge of drunk driving has been sentenced to electronically-monitored house arrest.

The PWA's attorney had requested that state District Judge Jack Hampton consider the house arrest instead of a prison term due to the defendant's diagnosis of AIDS sixteen months ago.

Bill Nelson, president of the Dallas Gay Alliance praised Hampton's sentencing decision. "Just because a man has AIDS doesn't mean he shouldn't be responsible for his actions. He should have to pay for his crime. But I think the judge picked a very creative way and effective way of dealing with it," said Nelson.

Under the terms of the sentence, the PWA, who is an unemployed chef, will be monitored with an electronic tracking device attached to his ankle. The device emits a signal which his specially equipped telephone transmits to a computer which lets officials know whenever he is more than 150 feet from his telephone.

ANTI-GAY BILLS PASS IN MICHIGAN

LANSING, MI (GCN) - The state House of Representatives here has overwhelmingly approved two discriminatory AIDS bills. On Sept. 18, by a vote of 75-22, a bill passed that would require HTLV-III testing for anyone arrested for soliciting or engaging in private or public homosexual activities, or for prostitution or drug use. Test results would be reportable to the courts and could be used as a basis for denial of bail.

A second bill, which passed the House the same day on a vote of 68-29, would require persons in "high risk groups" seeking marriage licenses to be tested for HTLV-III antibodies. Positive test results would be recorded in government records, but would not be a basis for denial of a marriage license.

"These bills could usher in a frightening new era for Gay men and Lesbians in Michigan," stated Liz McGough, lobbyist for the Michigan Organization for Human Rights, which has organized against the legislation.

Nevada children 'reach out' for Santa but get 'Dial-A-Porn'

ELY, NEVADA - Santa Claus, appearing in a Salt Lake City television commercial, told kids to call him at a 976 number - but eastern Nevada children got dial-a-porn instead.

Rather than Old Said Nick, Nevadans heard a sultry voiced woman explicitly describe a sex act that is legal in most states. The mix-up came about because Nevada and Utah have different 976 systems, and they don't cross state lines.

Utah kids got the Santa recording, but Nevada's youth got a big surprise. The two Salt Lake City stations that broadcast the "call Santa" advertisements into the Ely area have yanked the spots.

The ads ran once at each station - one time too many for some eastern Nevadans. Jennie Griffin of Lund helped her children, ages 7 and 5, place the call after the television Santa promised a North Pole holiday update.

"I dialed it myself and handed the phone to them," I said. "Hurry, or you'll miss it," Griffin said. After listening to the recorded message, the children said the people on the phone didn't sound like Santa. "They didn't know what was going on," Griffin said. She called the special toll number herself and found the kids had listened to dial-a-porn, a service Nevada Bell wants to discontinue.

On Dec. 3 and 4, the Nevada Public Service Commission will hold hearings on Nevada Bell's petition to end the 976 service.

"I blame myself," said

Griffin, who lives in a Mormon pioneer community about 30 miles south of Ely. "I'm very gullible. I thought it would be Santa Claus."

When McGill School Principal Dick Munson went to a Nov. 18 PTA meeting, the mothers were talking about the Santa snafu. "During the PTA meeting, I called to check it out," he said. "I listened for a while. It was deplorable. I enjoy freedom, but I think there is a limit. That (the explicit sex phone service) is beyond anything I dreamed of," said Munson, head of a 130-student school 12 miles north of Ely.

Gordon Acker, operations manager for KTVX in Salt Lake City, said a dial-a-santa commercial ran last Christmas seasons. And an ad urging children to call a 976 number for a story reading has run for some time. There have been no complaints from Nevada regarding those ads, he said. It was an unfortunate coincidence the Santa 976 number in Utah was a dial-a-porn number in Nevada, he said.

Cross-checking 976 numbers in Nevada is difficult because they can't be dialed from Utah, where Mountain Bell runs the phones, Acker said. Nevada phones don't have access to Utah's 976 numbers either.

Kent Capener, of the First Marketing Group, the ad agency that placed the dial-a-Santa ads, said a new 30-second television commercial - with a new telephone number - has been produced. "I feel sorry for the mothers and for the kids who called," he said. "Can you imagine a 6-year-old calling and getting a porno message?"





With the advances being made in biogenetics, chemistry and other fields, it's only a matter of time before a "cure" will be

found. On that day we'll all have a question to ask ourselves. Will we take the pill.

There is no doubt in my mind that a large number of people will. All who currently live in a closet of fear and guilt will probably be the first in line to buy the new cure.

Behind them will come those of us who are just tired of the hassle and near willing to "sell our soul" to be "normal", acceptable and hassle-free.

But somewhere there will remain a group sincerely proud of who they are. They are convinced that God made no mistake when they were created Gay and Lesbian. They fully intend to live as fulfilled, complete and independent persons. Persons of integrity. Persons of completeness. Persons at peace with themselves. They will refuse the "cure". I personally hope to be among this latter group.

On stage: erotic lesbian dancers

WOMEN WHO DANCE (AND STRIP) FOR WOMEN

SAN FRANCISCO, CA — Question: what does San Francisco have that attracts tourists from all over the country, is underappreciated by the locals and is unique to the city? The answer is that for the past two and a half years, the City has been the home of first one, then two Lesbian erotic dance companies, women who strip exclusively for women. Every Tuesday night Blush Entertainment Group's "BurLEZk" takes over the dance floor at the Baybrick Inn, while Fridays Rainbeau's Productions' "Erotic Dance Theatre" plays to a packed house at Talk of the Town.

What can you expect if you go to a Lesbian strip show? At Talk of the Town, Rainbeau emphasizes creativity. Her dancers do more than take off their clothes to music. Each dancer performs a skit and every performance is different. You might encounter Kisha in blue jeans and Levi jacket playing a boyish butch one night, and the next she may appear as a clone of your bratty teenaged sister bopping to her radio on the way to the beach. Chomping her gum, she spreads her towel, sits down and basks in an imaginary sun. Eventually the cutoffs and T-shirt peel away to reveal a bikini, which in turn is shed to expose a G-string. But that's not the end of the dance. In a parody of adolescent transformation, Kisha will reverse the strip and slowly don satin lingerie to become a sophisticated woman. Exit the mature Kisha. Next, Sandra Dee, another of the dancers who looks like her namesake, may appear in a white bridal gown, spoofing the concept of the virgin bride and reveling in the unstated sexuality of the marriage ceremony.

Rainbeau herself has appeared in a variety of roles. One night she's mimicking Liza Minnelli in "Cabaret", and another night she's a sullen leather-clad left bank punk who decides to take it all off. She's also got a wonderfully amusing Lesbian love act, performed with her butch dancer. The two are at first infatuated and swear eternal love.

They can't get enough of each other sexually and make passionate love in the living room. As time goes by, though, they tire of their stifling relationship, pray for the end of eternity and wind up as two couch potatoes sniping at each other. Rainbeau is also likely to include at least one elegant, sinewy, nearly nude modern dance which she performs with aerobic grace, bringing the audience to an awed silence.



One of the newer members of the troupe, Phoenix, has also given some of the most exquisite performances. The first time she appeared as a dowdy secretary, wearing a brown tweed suit and a long-sleeved blouse buttoned so tightly at the neck that the blood in her carotid artery was almost cut off. She arrives at work, sits down at her desk, and, like most people who are bored with their jobs, proceeds to peruse the "Examiner". She reads aloud to the audience, "Hmmm. The Meese Report. Pornography increases exaggerated behavior." The audience laughs and the secretary ponders the report's implications.

She goes on, "The Georgia Supreme Court ruling. Sodomy is defined as any kind of oral or anal sexual activity." Then the music begins. It seems that the "Examiner" is a great source of sexual stimulation to this repressed office type. The secretary stands up and begins to move tentatively to the rhythm. She starts to really get down as the music gets louder, unbuttoning her blouse and sensuously chewing the bow. She appears shocked by her own sexuality and briefly retreats from expressing it. But women's voices are singing, "Are you really sleeping with that girl?" The frumpy secretary dances again with more confidence and verve. With the music switching to "Soul sister, Soul sister," the blouse and skirt come off. By now she's on the floor removing her chemise and the voices on the tape as, "Voulez Vous Coucher Avec Moi?" At this point, a member of the audience in a black raincoat blunders across the stage and accidentally gets involved in Phoenix's dance routine. The act ends with Phoenix strutting to the table to collect tips from onlookers.

So why does a woman with a feminist background go from activism to stripping? "Curiosity. It's that simple," Debi reveals. "I wanted to find out if it was exploitative," she says. "I found out it's not. People in the sex industry are from all walks of life. They're very smart, avant garde types who tend to be involved with the theatre. They're nice to be around."

So what's the difference between stripping for men and stripping for women? "Stripping for women is much more exciting," says Debi. "They give back energy. Women clap. They get excited. Men just drain energy. They're a boring audience." About 95% of "BurLEZk's" dancers are Lesbians and the rest are bisexuals. Debi says she's asked straight women to dance, but they have proven hesitant to appear before an all women audience. The pool of Lesbian dancers, as it turns out, is a large one. By Debi's own estimate, 50 percent of the strippers she's met are Lesbians, usually of the butch type, and she's heard the same estimates from others in the business.

What kind of criticism has she gotten from Lesbians? "Surprisingly," says Debi, "not much at all." She can recall only one negative incident. "One time," she recounts, "a woman came in who looked like trouble. I don't know how I sensed it, but I knew she was going to complain. She looked around at my dancers and announced, 'They're all men!' Then she stalked out. Well, she shouldn't have done it, because Tony, one of my biggest, tallest dancers didn't exactly like that. Tony followed her outside and let her have it. I saw Tony lecturing her on the sidewalk for minutes. The woman never came back."

According to Debi, "Lesbians have had no sexual entertainment materials or live shows," and so she founded Blush Entertainment Group about three years ago to fill the need. In addition to the "BurLEZk" shows, Blush Publishes "On Our Backs", a Lesbian erotic magazine, and produces and markets Lesbian videos under the name of Fatale Video. As Debi sees it, Lesbian erotic entertainment represents women claiming a right to their bodies and to their sexuality. Most of the women who come to the shows seem pretty shy at first, but Debi notices that they come back bringing friends. She sees this as proof that the strip shows are carrying out their liberating mission.

"Rainbeau's Lesbian Erotic Dance Theatre" was formed about a year ago. Rainbeau started stripping about ten years ago in clubs along Massachusetts' North Shore. Since the clubs she worked at were couple's clubs, Rainbeau has been stripping for women from the beginning. "All women," she thinks, "have appreciated my shows on a deeper level. They want more than bump and grind, the straight men like the aloof type of strippers." She adds, "They like to be put down."

Rainbeau studied dance for eight years and, when she has the time, she still returns to study the art form. After moving back to California five years ago, Rainbeau resumed her professional dance career starting with non-erotic dance. She's danced at various clubs around the Bay area and has even appeared on television on the Oprah Winfrey Show where she and a partner did male impersonations — Rainbeau was David Bowie. In fact, her long-run goal is to emulate people like Shirley MacLaine and Liza Minnelli. She prefers the cabaret style of entertainment which includes singing, dancing and comedy and admires those two women both for their dancing and for their political messages in their entertainment. She feels that a lot of modern dance is too deep and too heavy, leaving audiences less entertained than wondering what they have seen. The cabaret style, on the other hand, suits Rainbeau because it represents fun entertainment with a consciousness-raising undertone.

Rainbeau returned to stripping two years ago when she applied for a job with Blush Entertainment Group. After interviewing her, Debi Sundahl accepted Rainbeau with some reluctance, unsure whether Rainbeau's style would mesh with what the Blush entertainers were doing.

taken from women by the patriarchy," she says, explaining, "men say that we're not good girls if we take off our clothes. We're reclaiming our sexuality, our eroticism, through these strip shows. I hope the women who come to watch will obtain power over their own eroticism."

She wants to present a rainbow spectrum of women, younger, older, all colors and varying physical types. According to Rainbeau, "women were stripping for women long before they stripped for men. There used to be cults and ceremonies exclusively for women."

"I relate to North American religious concepts," she says, adding "Dance is my spirituality." Rainbeau's company is made up of two groups, one which does the erotic dancing and is exclusively made up of Lesbians, and the other which performs cabaret style, non-erotic entertainment. All of the shows are choreographed by Rainbeau.

So, if you're tired of the pathetic parody of human sexuality that's being sold to tourists who flock to the Broadway strips, and you're sick of the oppressive Andrea Dworkin types who equate any display of female eroticism with exploitation, take the time to visit the Baybrick Inn on Tuesdays and Talk of the Town on Fridays. You may not be able to do both much longer because "BurLEZk" will cease regular shows after Christmas. (They may be back for the tourist season next year). Rainbeau's Productions, however, will continue and new acts will include a belly dancer and a New Year's Eve cabaret extravaganza.

She goes on to describe the women's community here as "great, close-knit and very supportive." At one point, when she had to go into the hospital, she was forced to give a benefit for herself to raise the money. Rainbeau says, "It felt weird asking for money, but people were incredibly supportive. One woman asked me, 'If I got sick and had to go to the hospital, would you do a benefit for me?' I said 'yes,' and the woman said, 'OK. Then I'll give you money!'

About a year ago, Susan at A Little More (the club has since changed its name to Talk of the Town) asked Rainbeau to come over and perform on Fridays. Rainbeau agreed to come, thinking it would only last a few weeks. The weeks stretched into a year and Friday night audience at the club has increased about fifteen times over what it was when Rainbeau started.

It's actually new for Rainbeau to be so completely sexual on stage. She describes stripping for women as "a source of healing".

"The erotic element has been



HOUSTON, TX (GCN) - A South Houston man was sentenced to 10 years in prison for attempting to murder his wife who had called him "Gay" during an argument.

According to an Associated Press report, Charles Wilson testified that he shot his wife, Sandra Wilson, because she "kept calling me Gay, Gay, Gay." Charles said he "just flipped" and shot his wife in the face, leg and buttocks. Minutes after shooting his wife, he returned to ask her, "Are you dead yet?" and shot her again in the back. Sandra survived, as did her husband, who shot himself in the chest when the police arrived.

In addition to the prison sentence, Charles was fined \$8,000. He stated that he was not Gay, but just had sexual problems.

'SLICK BUTCH LAWYERESS' WINS 20K
IN DEFAMATION SUIT

LOS ANGELES, CA (GCN) - Feminist attorney Gloria Allred has won \$20,000 and a public apology from former state Senator John Schmitz, who called her a "slick butch Lawyeress" in a 1981 press release, according to the "News".

Allred, who has won a number of Lesbian/Gay related cases, filed suit against Schmitz after he released a press statement attacking her for presenting him a chastity belt during hearings he chaired on abortion.

The 1981 release, headlined "Senator Schmitz and his Committee Survive Attack of the Bullykies," called Allred and other abortion rights supporters "imported Lesbians from anti-male sand pro-abortion queer groups in San Francisco and other centers of decadence." The anti-abortion former legislator also said his hearings had been "filled with a sea of hard, Jewish and (arguably) female faces."

Public outrage over the release eventually resulted in a 3-0 vote by the Senate Rules Committee to strip Schmitz of his chairmanship of the Constitutional Amendments Committee. He was also removed from his position as vice-chairperson of the Industrial Relations Committee and as a member of the State Committee on the Status of Women.

Schmitz is a member of the John Birch Society National Council, a U.S. Marine Corps Reserve Colonel, and was a 1972 presidential nominee of the American Independent Party.

Allred said she intends to divide her settlement of \$20,000 among groups "maligned in the press release." The money will go to the National Council of Jewish Women, the Gay and Lesbian Community Services Center, The California Abortion Rights Action League, the National Council of Churches and the Women's Equal Rights Legal Defense and Education Fund.

LOS ANGELES, CA - Lesbian and Gay organizations and women's groups applauded last Saturday's (Nov. 8) episode of "The Golden Girls," in which Lois Nettleton played a college chum of Dorothy's (Bea Arthur) who reveals she's a Lesbian and may be in love with Rose (Betty White).

The show was handled with humor, sensitivity, and understanding. No one could have taken offense with the show and it should prove to be a wonderful educational program to the general public.

destroy the movement for Gay and Lesbian civil rights in this country."

Kellas also displayed a handful of bills with a variety of bank markings and personal greetings, including, "Kim loves Randy," "Don't Buy the Chicago Tribune," "Straight Dollar," "Happy Birthday Jimmy, Love Grammy."

He then questioned whether Valukas intended to prosecute the people who either wrote or stamped those phrases.

Valukas did not return repeated phone calls to his office. Assistant U.S. Attorney Joan Safford, who handles financial matters for Valukas' office, said she could not comment on the case.





YOU'LL ALWAYS LIVE, NOT ONLY ON SCREEN, ROCK HUDSON

You know, it is a rare occasion when I watch I LOVE LUCY on television anymore. Long ago, I got all my favorite episodes on tape. So when I watch, it is almost always on my VCR, not on TV. This afternoon I looked at the clock and saw it was one o'clock and somehow felt compelled to watch I LOVE LUCY.

It is bizarre how these things work, but it was an episode I don't think I had seen before. It was called "In Palm Springs". It was episode #123, which was part of the fourth season the show was on the air. The original airing date was April 25, 1953. (I have this neat book which tells me all of these facts about the show).

Well, the episode was okay. It was a story about how much of the four main characters have these annoying habits, and how they annoy each other. It was one of the many shows done while the characters were in Hollywood --although the show was actually filmed in Hollywood, the characters lived in New York somewhere.

With Lucy, Ricky, Fred and Ethel loose in Hollywood, you can imagine the high-jinks which ensue --and the stars which seem to get involved with our comical foursome.

This episode, "In Palm Springs", featured a then 29-year-old contract player at Universal Studios. It was Rock Hudson.

which had come over me. I had never really looked back at Rock Hudson as a homosexual. Sure, I said to myself, he's Gay. It's too late for him to come clean now. He should have admitted his sexual proclivities instead of living a lie. Et cetera, et cetera.

I sat watching this episode, and marvelling at just how handsome he had been then; how he moved with such grace, and power; how personable he had been. The camera fell in love with him --as, I suppose, did thousands of women. And men.

I looked at him as a Gay man. He didn't kiss any women in this episode. He didn't talk butch or act straight. No, for the first time, I was able to see Rock Hudson, portraying himself. It was eerie, to say the least.

He acted just like you or me. He pulled over a chair, turned it around so he sat on it backwards, resting his arms on the chair back, and told this insipid story which has no real bearing on anything. The camera moved in and held his magnificent face in close-up. His eyes smiled, his mouth turned and opened, and his eyebrows lifted and fell. His black hair was combed in a manner which is again contemporary.

I guess what I'm trying to say is, that I would almost expect to see him standing next to me at one of the clubs one night. He was perfectly natural.

I now feel differently toward this man, and his memory. I will look at him when I watch GIANT, or PILLOW TALK in a different light, and wonder just how different things could have been.
