Obscenity bill passes State House

PHOENIX - According to Rep. William English, H.B. 2359, defining community standards on obscenity has "unfortunately made it out of the House" and is now ready for Senate action.

H.B. 2360, the "Moral Nuisance" Bill is still pending, but according to English, I still have hopes that we can beat 2360. In order to beat H.B. 2360 in the House requires immediate action of those concerned with the passage of repressive laws such as these. Telephone calls and letters to your representative concerning the "Moral Nuisance" bill (H.B. 2360) are urgently needed now. This bill will shut down all adult bookstores or any other establishment deemed by the legislature, any law enforcement official or any individual for that matter that each establishment is a "moral nuisance".

Mecham recall leader assailed as homosexual

PHOENIX - Governor Evan Mecham's supporters attacked Ed Buck, one of the leaders of the Mecham Watchdog Committee, saying he is a "Sexual-disoriented" person. Buck claims that the issue is not his sexual orientation but Gov. Mecham's actions.

The allegation concerning Buck's sexual orientation became public at a news conference called by the chairman of Arizonans for Traditional Values, Julian Sanders, last Friday, March 14. About 100 people attended the conference held in a restaurant.

After Buck was roundly assailed, he stepped forward to speak, saying he had been "misquoted long enough." He then was heckled by members of Sanders' group and the Arizona Breakfast Club, a conservative organization that met before the press conference.

Buck, spokesman for the Mecham Watchdog Committee, later called his own press conference in his house overlooking Phoenix. Buck, 32, told reporters he has been a homosexual since he was 16. "Ed Buck is not a saint," he said, and though his opponents "want to make the focus Ed Buck," the real issue is Mecham's recall.

What began as a recall campaign was renamed the Mecham Watchdog Committee since no recall effort can be undertaken formally until Mecham has been in office six months.

Sanders contended Buck lacks stability, integrity and fair play. He also said Buck, a self-described conservative-to-moderate Republican, has deceived people because he was a registered Libertarian until May 4, when he became a Republican.

Sanders also presented a sworn statement from Lavern P. and Sara E. Biesterveld. The couple says they met Buck on election day last Nov. 4 when they were campaigning for Trent Franks, a conservative Phoenix Republican who ran unsuccessfully for re-election to the Legislature.

At that time, Buck was campaigning for Franks' Democratic opponent, the couple said, and Buck told them he was a homosexual and did not oppose pornography or abortions.

At the first news conference, Sara Biesterveld added that in speaking for the recall drive, Buck had "set himself up as a leader... for the good of the citizens of Arizona, therefore he has some kind of a role model to play."

She added that with Buck "being a sexual-disoriented person, one who favors many of the things that our society does not agree as being desirable... the people ought to know where this leadership is coming from."

Buck responded by saying that he didn't intend to debate homosexuality or his credibility, that the campaign didn't depend on him, that the committee has 3,000 members, and that much of what the Biestervelds said "was inflated and distorted."

"Whether or not Ed Buck is qualified to be a Republican is of very little concern to me right now," Buck said. "While all of you out there find it very convenient to take the sling and fire shots at Ed Buck for being a homosexual, you are dealing with a mere fragment of Ed Buck. Ed Buck is also intelligent and articulate."

National March on Washington: Update

WASHINGTON, DC - On March 1, the Coordinating Committee for the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights received a report outlining the basic plans for The Wedding for October 10, 1987. The Wedding is a national demonstration officially sponsored by the National March on Washington to emphasize the demand that Lesbian and Gay domestic partners in committed same-sex relationships be entitled to the same rights as married heterosexual couples. The demonstration will include a non-sectarian union ceremony to celebrate existing on-going relationships followed by a reception for the participants, guests, sponsors and media representatives.

The report was presented by Cary Junkin representing COUPLES, Inc. This Los Angeles-based group is the National Organization for the Advancement of Lesbian and Gay Couples.

The goal of The Wedding is to have at least one thousand couples celebrate their existing on-going committed relationships in such a way to draw attention to the March demand for couples' rights. The Wedding is not intended to be a marriage ceremony for new couples, nor will the organizers restrict participation by defining couples or acceptable relationships.

COUPLES, Inc. will be inviting representatives of numerous religious groups and non-religious leaders to serve on an advisory board to help define

UPDATE

JURY DEADLOCKED IN VIDEO-FORM TRIAL

MEMPHIS, TN - A criminal court jury here declared itself hopelessly deadlocked in the trial of a video store accused of violating the state's obscenity statute by renting X-rated adult videotapes.

Courtroom sources said that the jury was deadlocked 8 to 4 in favor of acquitting Michael Goode, a Memphis attorney who owns Video, Etc. Goode was indicted following an FBI undercover investigation that resulted in the seizure of adult videotapes at 17 family video stores and six adult bookstores in Memphis.

A federal grand jury is preparing to hand up indictment against the distributors of the adult videos. Prosecutors in the Goode case said immediately that they would seek a new trial, but Goode's attorneys said they would mount a legal challenge to the obscenity law.

WHITE SUPREMACIST ATTACKS PWAS
ATLANTA, GA (GCN) - White supremacist J.B. Stoner, recently released after a prison term for the bombing of a Black church in Alabama, announced that he will seek to promote the segregation of people with AIDS. The Advocate reported that Stoner said both Black people and white Gay men are being punished with AIDS by God. Thus, he concludes these groups should be removed from the rest of society.

Stoner is a disbarred attorney from Marietta, Georgia, and a former head of the National States Rights Party, a white supremacy group. He has recently launched a "Campaign Against Corruption," and he is also writing a book called "Praise God for AIDS".

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AIDS education plan calls for abstinence

WASHINGTON, DC - The federal government last Monday, March 16, released its new AIDS education plan, which stresses sexual abstinence and monogamy as preventive measures and recommends "safe sex," using condoms when these measures are impossible.

The long-awaited and much-debated plan stresses the need to leave local jurisdictions free to decide what information should be passed on to young people, according to Dr. Robert E. Windom, assistant secretary of health and human services.

The plan calls for the federal government to develop television advertising, school curricula and other material for national distribution.

The plan has been the center of controversy for months over how explicit it should be about sex and condoms, and whether it should adopt a strong moralistic tone.

The report was released unexpectedly, following a congressional hearing at which the administration was criticized for delay in addressing the need for education about acquired immune

deficiency syndrome.

AIDS, caused by a virus transmitted through sexual intercourse, infected needles, blood or from mother to infant during birth, has struck 32,000 Americans, killing more than 18,000 since 1981.

The report does emphasize sexual abstinence, fidelity in marriage and letting local moral values determine what information should be offered in schools and advertising campaigns. It also prominently recommends, "if it is not possible to practice sexual abstinence until infection status can be determined, always use condoms during sex, because use of condoms can reduce the risk of transmission of the AIDS virus."

"No cure for the disease currently exists.... Our best hope today for controlling the AIDS epidemic lies in educating the public about the seriousness of the threat, the ways the AIDS virus is transmitted and the practical steps each person can take to avoid acquiring or spreading it," wrote Health and Human Services Secretary Otis R. Bowen in the preface to the 60-page report.

As I See It

The society in which we live has much to do with how we develop. That society can encourage us to grow as total persons, or it can try everything in its power to discourage us and stunt our growth. As Gays and Lesbians, we can allow this to go on or we can resist it and develop our own growth patterns.

Despite the flak we take as Gays and Lesbians, we often find ways to grow as sexual human beings. And yet in our rebellion against society to be allowed to grow as Gays and Lesbians we may feel that we have to reject formal religion and in doing so, we may be closing the door on our spiritual growth, a price we have to pay if we want to come out of the closet and develop our

physical, psychological, emotional needs.

Is there any way to do both? Is there a way in which we can grow in our totality and fulfill all aspects of our being? Can we find a growth pattern that allows for complete development without jeopardizing any aspect of the total person we are? I think we can.

Those of us who are on the journey out of our closets have already embraced much of who we are and who we are becoming. If we have had to put aside our spiritual side in the name of that mission, then perhaps it's time to give some thought to how we can develop that aspect too.

Traditional religion works for some of us, especially so long as we understand what it is and the history it comes from. For others something less traditional may be the answer and for still others, something totally radical may be the place to look. Where we start this journey isn't as important, I don't think, as the fact that we DO start it.

To ignore a whole aspect of my being and allow it to wither only assures that the total package I call "me" is not complete and whole. I will do serious harm to myself if I do not encourage growth in every aspect of my being. I will be stunted and maimed. Perhaps as stunted and maimed as any fundamentalist homophobe who has denied his or her sexual growth. If I develop my sexuality and not my spirituality, how am I any different from that religious "nut" who has developed a spirituality and not a sexuality?

MONA LEO: Another Theory

PARIS, FRANCE (CCN) - Artist and computer technician Lillian Schwartz has proposed what may be the most creative theory yet explaining the enigmatic and captivating smile of the Mona Lisa: Mona Lisa is actually Mona Leo. Schwartz, writing in 'Art and Antiques' magazine concluded that the model for the much-admired portrait was none other than Leonardo da Vinci himself.

Within hours of the disclosure of the latest in a 500-year-old series of Mona Lisa theories, cocktail parties and elevators were abuzz with the news, and crowds at the Louvre in Paris swelled around the painting.

Using a computer to juxtapose a self-portrait of Leonardo as an old man with an image of the Mona Lisa, Schwartz observed that all of the major facial features - the nose, eyes, the forehead, the mouth - aligned almost perfectly. The historical facts, she argued, bolster her theory. Although legend identifies the Mona Lisa sitter as the wife of a Florentine merchant, Francesco del Giocondo, the theory remains unproven. Furthermore, Schwartz notes, Leonardo worked on the painting in Milan and later in France, so that he would have been the only consistent model.

Schwartz also suggested that Leonardo's homosexuality, which is historically undisputed, may have

motivated him to create the cryptic portrait. Keith Christiansen, associate curator of European paintings at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, commented in the New York Times that in the last decade, both scholarly interpretations and popular notions of great Renaissance art have increasingly taken the homosexuality of the artists into account.

"You have Caravaggio, the homosexual outcast; Michaelangelo, the tortured romantic homosexual; and Leonardo as the solitary genius isolated by homosexual dreams that he couldn't share," says Christiansen. Although he dismisses such interpretations as a projection of 1987 values onto 15th and 16th century artists.

Sir Kenneth Clark, who wrote what is considered a definitive essay on the Mona Lisa in 'Burlington' magazine in 1973, also interpreted the portrait in light of Leonardo's sexuality. While not casting the artist in a stereotyped, anguish-ridden role, Sir Kenneth did argue that Leonardo's sexuality left a trace in the work. In Sir Kenneth's words, "Leonardo, who could depict a fiery ascetic of the desert with a smile and a gesture of feminine allurements, was quite capable of transferring the attributes of one sex to the other, and of expressing some of his obsession with Salai's [his young homosexual assistant] smile in the smile of the Mona Lisa."

enough not to get down there in the gutter with Mr. Sanders and argue over garbage like this."

Buck said the effort to recall Mecham "is happening because of Evan Mecham" and that personal attacks against him will not hurt the effort. "I am not key to the campaign," he said.

Buck formerly owned an insurance information service in Phoenix. He sold the business for more than \$1 million about a year ago.

ART - THEATRE - CINEMA - BOOKS - TELEVISION

As a person, I consider myself fortunate in that I have been witness to some of the most beautiful musical performances. As a reviewer of art and entertainment events, I have seen the San Francisco Symphony, the Phoenix Symphony, amongst others. I see life that which I can; I see on television that which I cannot see live. But perhaps one of the most intrinsically magnificent musical moments in my life occurred last evening, March 13, when I listened to the Warsaw Philharmonic Orchestra under the direction of Kazimierz Kord, at Gammage Center in Tempe.

After an odd beginning (I still do not understand the point of the Liszt's "Livre Pour Orchestre"), the renown pianist Misha Dichter took center stage and literally wowed the audience with Liszt's "Concerto No. 2 in A major". So much so, in fact, that Mr. Dichter was graciously inclined to thrill us with an encore. After intermission,

though, the real power, and virtual flawlessness of this orchestra shone through with a -I have to say- brilliant and perfect presentation of Rachmaninoff's "Symphony No. 2 in E minor, Op. 27". Long a favorite of mine, Rachmaninoff's power, grace and freedom, heard so perfectly in his music, has given me the feeling of upliftment.

The Warsaw Philharmonic's feeling and empathy with the Symphony transcended mere "musical interpretation". It fairly left the boundaries of the material earth and moved gracefully upwards toward the.... I suppose I am becoming a bit removed from reality here, but I was truly moved. It was perhaps the best performance by a symphony orchestra I have ever heard. And apparently the audience agreed with me, as we demanded --and got-- not one, but two encores!

It is experiencing beauty like that that makes life worthwhile.

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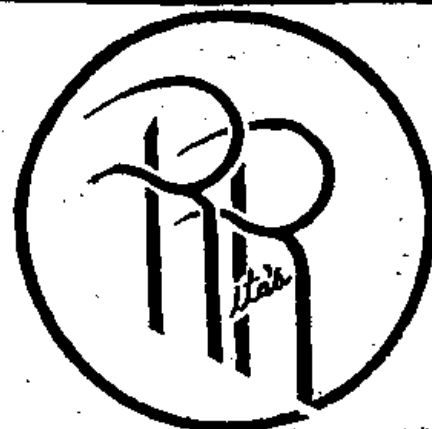


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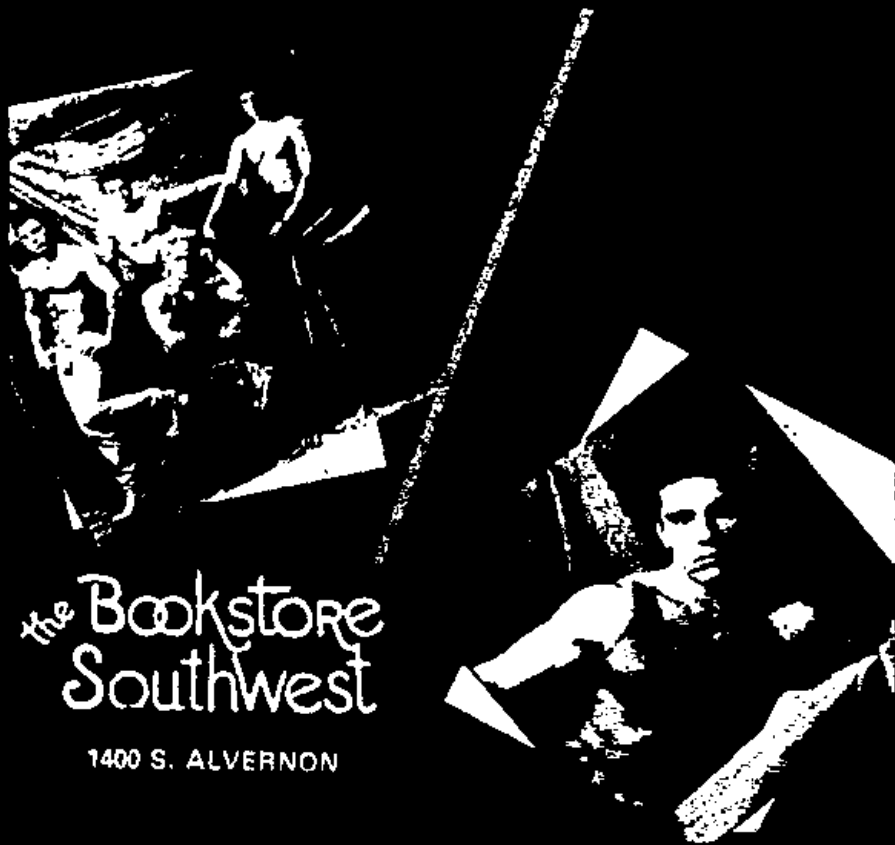
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Juicy Lucy

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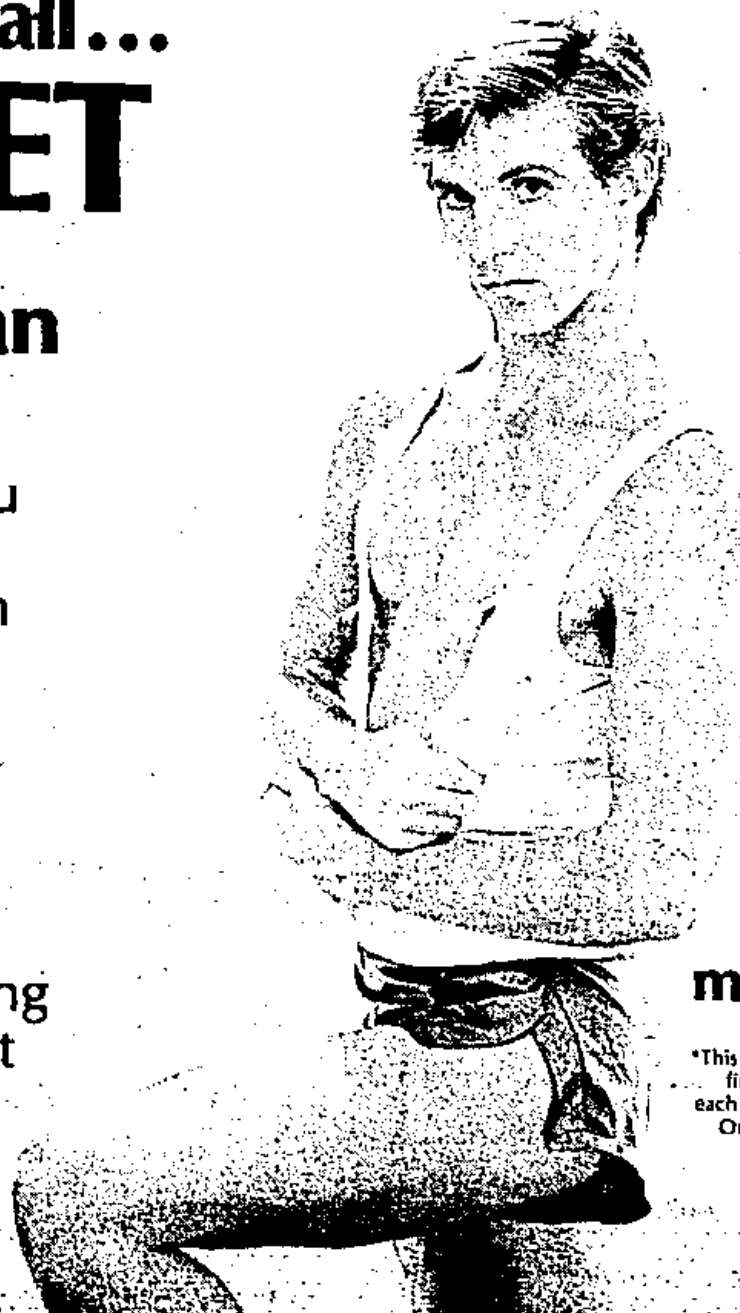

A View From Within

Well, the flurry of activity across the nation regarding condoms is hard for anyone to escape. The Feb. 19 announcement by CBS saying that its owned and operated stations will be allowed to run advertisements for condoms is only one of the happenings.

The week of Feb. 9 saw Congress entering the debate on condom advertising by accepting testimony from witnesses at a hearing for the House Health and Environment Subcommittee. The subcommittee's chairman, Henry Waxman (D-Calif.), strongly urged the three television networks to begin running advertisements for the product. The hearings found representatives from ABC, CBS and NBC sticking to the current policies, of not airing the ads, but adding that the matter was still under review.

(A recent Wall Street Journal/NBC poll showed that 78% of those surveyed did not oppose condom advertisements. A recent Entertainment Tonight telephone poll showed 30,000 favoring the ads, with 20,000 against).

(Fox Broadcasting is expected to announce shortly that it will accept ads for condoms. It is expected that these ads will begin airing on The Late Show With Joan Rivers. The seven owned and operated Fox stations are also considering the ads. It is expected that all seven will approve running the ads during adult viewing hours).

But perhaps the most interesting item to cross my desk lately details the complaints of major Gay publications that are upset that condom makers are avoiding advertising their products in their publications.

Apparently, makers of condoms, including Ansell-Americas, Carter-Wallace, and Schmid Laboratories, have consistently refused advances made by Gay publications. Joe DiSabato, who represents 125 Gay newspapers and magazines on Madison Avenue, says, "On the one hand, Gays are happy to see condom advertising hitting the general media. On the other, there is a growing sense the condom industry is capitalizing on the deaths of thousands of Gay men to force the general media to accept its advertising."

(Until the advent of AIDS, condom advertisements were unofficially banned from the airwaves. It has only been since the threat of AIDS, that any serious consideration has been given by the visual media to accept these advertisements).

The condom makers say they are not discriminating knowingly. Instead, they insist that they're merely going the most efficient route, by advertising via the mass media. They use a compelling argument, "Very simply, there are more heterosexuals than homosexuals."

The use of condoms by the Gay population is estimated at 60%, based on a study for The Advocate. This majority use is noted as the reason for the recent upturn in condom sales. In line with this, DiSabato is soon to begin a campaign aimed at the condom makers. The protest will demonstrate the financial clout of Gays by urging Gay condom users to send the wrappers of used condoms to the company which holds a 55% share of the condom market. Carter-Wallace, maker of Trojan condoms.

The protest will urge Gay men to buy condoms made by competing companies and send the wrappers to Carter-Wallace. It is hoped that this show of strength will encourage makers of condoms to aim their advertisements to the market which is being hurt most by AIDS: Gay men.

If you want to get a jump on this protest, begin to buy condoms other than Trojans, and save up the wrappers. If you want to send them, or a letter to Carter-Wallace encouraging them to reconsider their position on condom advertising, the company's address is:

Carter-Wallace, 767 Fifth Avenue, New York, NY 10153. Send them to the attention of Mark Klein, Marketing. Be sure to include a letter telling him why you are sending the condom wrappers.

But, whatever you do, remember: When having intercourse use a condom. It is the only way to be relatively safe when engaging in an "un-safe" sexual practice.
