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High Court ruling likely to help PWAs discrimination.

WASHINGTON, DC (AP) - The Supreme Court, in a ruling to likely help AIDS patients, said yesterday, March 3, that a federal law aiding handicapped protects people with contagious diseases against on-the-job bias.

By a 7-2 vote, the court ruled that all recipients of federal aid, including government contractors and virtually all public schools, may not discriminate against people with contagious diseases if those people are "otherwise qualified" to work or take part in some activity.

The decision, however, did not directly involve acquired immune deficiency syndrome, AIDS. It was the result of a lawsuit by former third-grade teacher Gene H. Arline, fired by the Nassau County, Florida School Board because she was diagnosed as having tuberculosis, an infectious respiratory disease.

The court, led by Justice William Brennan, rejected Reagan administration arguments that employers do not violate a 1973 law barring bias against the handicapped if they fire employees based solely on a fear that they may spread a disease.

"It would be unfair to allow an employer to seize upon the distinction between the effects of a disease on others and the effects of a disease on a patient and use that distinction to justify discriminatory treatment," Brennan wrote. He said allowing discrimination based on a disease's contagious effects "would be inconsistent with the basic purpose" of the 1973 law, "which is to insure that handicapped individuals are not denied jobs or other benefits because of the prejudiced attitudes or the ignorance of others."

His opinion noted that the court was not deciding [today] "whether a carrier of a contagious disease such as AIDS could be considered to have a physical impairment, or whether such a person could be considered, solely on the basis of contagiousness, a handicapped person as defined by the [law]."

Despite that limiting language, the decision represents a huge victory for Gay rights activists.

Bob Kunst, director of Cure AIDS Now, a Miami-based group, hailed the ruling as "a fantastic victory for all Americans" and a major defeat for the Reagan administration.

"I'm very, very happy. I'm very grateful," Arline said after learning of the court's decision.

The high court sent Arline's case back to a federal trial court so it can be determined whether she is "otherwise qualified."

The law relied on by Arline, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973,

says "no otherwise qualified handicapped individual... shall solely because of his handicap be... subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."

Brennan was joined by Justices Byron R. White, Thurgood Marshall, Harry A. Blackmun, Lewis F. Powell, John Paul Stevens and Sandra Day O'Connor.

Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and Justice Antonin Scalia dissented.

Homophobes attempt closure of local baths

TUCSON - At its regular monthly meeting of the Pima County Board of Health, two anti-Gay activists called for the closure of The Stables, a local bath house. Harry Spence and Nancy Evans in an impromptu call to the audience singled out the Stables as a "health hazard to our community". Spence and Evans stated they were members of the Southern Arizona National Federation for Human Decency, an organization whose stated objective is to promote higher community health standards.

Rene Guimond, co-owner of The Stables said, "The religious fanatics never stop. We have been here for eight years and are inspected regularly by the Pima County Health Department." "We have a good record of running a clean operation," Guimond continued.

"We inform our clientele about the dangers and prevention of AIDS. We give out safe sex information and condoms are available here," said Art Steele, Guimond's partner in the operation. "It's a few homophobic people who refuse to understand about Gays who are creating an upheaval. They're afraid of anything they don't know about," he said.

Spence told the health board that homosexuality was to blame for AIDS and that, "it is related to bathhouse orgies where people have sex with 10 or more partners." He also began describing what he said were certain homosexual acts, but board member Dr. Edward Gelardin cut him off. Gelardin called Spence's remarks a "one-sided diatribe."

Guimond said that the bathhouse is open and operating and will continue to offer its services to the community in a legal, healthy manner. A portion of members fees are donated to the Tucson AIDS Project. "We are fully aware of the animosity of these homophobes, and we are also fully aware of the AIDS epidemic. There are no orgies. People also come to socialize. We will protect the health and welfare of our members to the best of our ability," Guimond said.

The health board, an advisory group, recommended no action.

Unleashing The Flames Of Ignorance

(Statement of Urvashi Vaid for the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force on the Vatican letter on homosexuality)

Throughout its history the Catholic Church has embodied two traditions. On the one hand the church has pursued a tradition of compassion, love and respect for human life. This tradition is represented today in the efforts of clergy to promote human rights in Latin America.

But the church has also pursued another, darker course. Its history is replete with campaigns of persecution and terror conducted or sanctioned in the name of God. From the Inquisition to its persecutions of Jews and women to its modern-day efforts to stifle all dissent, the Roman Catholic Church has distorted the scriptures to achieve fundamentally political aims.

In the Vatican's statement on homosexuality, we see that this second, deadly tradition is still alive. Rather than preaching understanding and respect for other human beings, the church has unleashed its sword and raised it against Gay men and lesbians everywhere. The danger and terrorism represented by the Vatican's new statement cannot be understated: it will unleash the flames of ignorance and violence more effectively than any bomb ever could.

The Vatican's statement is full of outright lies, misinformation and a fundamental misapprehension of the nature of AIDS. Ignoring the fact that world-wide AIDS is overwhelmingly a heterosexual disease, the church implies that homosexuals are its source. The church has the gall to admonish Gay rights activist about AIDS when we have singlehandedly, until recently, waged the battle to secure more research, more funding and compassionate care for all those afflicted with AIDS.

When studies show that the Gay community has drastically changed its sexual practices to

control the spread of the AIDS virus, the church's charge that Gay rights advocates "refuse to consider the magnitude of the risks involved" is simply preposterous. And like the proverbial ostrich with its head in the sand, the church exposes its ignorance when it states that "the practice of homosexuality... rather than the practice of unsafe acts (involving the exchange of bodily fluids like semen and blood) by heterosexuals and homosexuals presents risks."

The Vatican's pronouncements against Gay and Lesbian civil rights are equally dangerous for several reasons. First, the moralizing of one church cannot be the basis of sound public policy for a nation of diverse religious and ethnic communities.

Second, the church goes far beyond mere opposition to Lesbian and Gay civil rights, it expresses tolerance and understanding for the "irrational and violent reactions" that calls for these measures have produced.

At a time when violence against Gay men and lesbians is on the rise, when Congress has held the first national hearing on this growing problem, the church's tacit acceptance of hate-motivated violence is unconscionable. The church would rather accept and understand the bigotry of the Gay-basher than endorse the right of Gay people to live free of fear, prejudice and violence.

The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force asserts the right of all people - Gay and straight - to live free of governmental or religious persecution. Gay people have existed since time immemorial because human sexuality is not exclusively heterosexual.

No church, no state, no police force, no program of extermination will ever make us disappear. NGLTF calls upon all Gay people to take heart, and continue our struggle for freedom - we will not bow down to injustice.

National Sexual Privacy Challenge Meeting in Tucson March 19

TUCSON - At 7:00 p.m., on Thursday, March 19, at the Tucson Women's Commission, the regular chapter meeting of N.O.W. (The National Organization for Women) will present a speaker from the National Sexual Privacy Challenge.

Arizona law which includes the language, "open and notorious cohabitation (unmarried sex) and the infamous crime against nature (oral and anal sex, married or unmarried)", criminalizes the private lives of sexually active adults in Arizona. These laws harm citizens in custody and divorce cases, housing discrimination, polygraph testing for employment and occupational licensing, in addition to sexually active Gay men and Lesbians. These laws grant states the

ownership of your body, and these laws must be repealed. Defend your right to sexual privacy, you are urged to take this opportunity to join the National Sexual Privacy Challenge.

In June of this year, the national group will challenge the privacy laws in 24 states. In Phoenix, request for prosecution to the Challenge will be delivered to the Maricopa county prosecutor on June 30, as evidence of protest to these laws.

CURRAN SEEKS INJUNCTION

WASHINGTON, DC (AP) - Dissenting theologian Charles Curran is taking his long-running fight with the Roman Catholic authorities into civil court, seeking an injunction returning him to his Catholic University of America classroom.

"There was no other avenue available to me," Curran said, two months after he was suspended from teaching and more than seven years after the start of a Vatican investigation of his sexual-ethics views.

TEXAS CAPITAL PASSES AIDS

ANTI-BIAS LAW

AUSTIN, TX - A bill prohibiting discrimination against people with AIDS was unanimously approved by the Austin City Council. The new law bars AIDS discrimination in employment, housing and city services.

Glenn Maxey, an organizer of the drive to get the bill passed, called its approval "A great victory for the Gay and Lesbian community," and cited a broad coalition, "ranging from lesbian and Gay groups to religious groups to organized labor and teachers' groups."

Austin, the Texas state capital and home of the University of Texas, is the only major city in the state with a Gay rights ordinance, despite a state sodomy statute.

Voters in this city, a politically liberal enclave in a very conservative state, defeated a fundamentalist-sponsored drive to repeal its Gay-right law in a 1980 referendum.

Three years earlier, another fundamentalist-sponsored drive to allow landlords to discriminate against Gays was also defeated.

LAW AND ORDER FOR TEXAS

FORM AGAIN BERMITE

TULSA, OK (BAR) - A Tulsa judge has sentenced the former sheriff of Montague County, Texas to eight years in prison after pleading guilty to charges he mailed sexually explicit material involving young boys.

Harry James Walker, 38, pleaded guilty to one federal charge of shipping child pornography in return for another similar charge being dropped, said Keith Ward, an assistant U.S. attorney.

Walker's sentence will run concurrently with a 10-year sentence he received last year after being convicted of three similar charges in Dallas.

WHITMIRE NIXES GAY-DEM 'DEAL'

HOUSTON, TX (BAR) - Mayor Kathy Whitmire rejected a deal worked out between Gay leaders and officials who tried to woo Democrats to Houston for their 1988 national convention.

Gays had threatened to oppose Houston's bid to land the convention and portray the city as anti-Gay unless organizers agreed to several demands, according to a copyrighted story in the Houston Post.

Democrats have since decided to choose Atlanta as their convention site.

The Gay activists reportedly wanted a "statement of philosophy" saying that if the Democrats choose Houston as a Convention site, the city must be "hospitable" to Gay people. They insisted on a "meaningful" role on the convention host committee and the committee help open "avenues of communication" between Gays and the Houston business community, according to the report.

Whitmire aide Paul Mabry told the Post that the mayor killed the agreement between Gays and the host committee because she opposes allowing any special interest group to use the convention to gain concessions.

"Let me stress to you that I think any use of the host committee other than as an all-out effort for this city to land the Democratic convention is inappropriate," Whitmire said.

City Councilman John Goodner, who was a leading figure in opposing the failed attempt in 1985 to pass an anti-Gay discrimination ordinance, said he was "greatly disturbed" by the agreement.

He described the affair as "another political blunder" by Gays in Houston. "It seems to me as if they are once again going to shoot themselves in the foot," he said.

FORCED AIDS TESTING OFFICED

ATLANTA, GA (AP) - Mandatory AIDS testing was criticized as bad medical and public policy by a broad range of doctors, health officials and homosexuals at the meeting called by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control last Wednesday and Thursday, Feb. 25 and 26.

Participants also agreed strong legislation is needed to protect confidentiality and legal rights of those who test positive for AIDS.

CDC officials stressed that the CDC is an advisory agency and cannot itself dictate health practices to state agencies. Blood tests to detect AIDS virus have been in use since 1985, most often to screen donated blood. Expanded testing has been advocated as a way of coping with the increasing number of cases spread through heterosexual contact. Heterosexual cases now number 4 percent of the reported 30,000 U.S. cases. More than 17,000 AIDS patients in this country have died.

Jeff Levi, executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force said mandatory testing "will chase people away." "The value of testing is the counseling that's associated with it," he said. "This is just a bad public health measure."

CDC Director James O. Mason said that whatever testing does take place should be accompanied by strong legal protection against the disclosure of AIDS victims' identities and safeguards against loss of employment, housing or insurance.

I haven't been involved in the hot line nor the Tucson chapter in nearly two years. In fact, Dignity/Tucson hasn't had a publicized number, to say nothing of a hot line, since 1985. So you can imagine my surprise and, yes, my anger when my personal privacy was violated by a raging homophobe, threatening to "kill" me and all Gays in Dignity.

Operating in the dark, the "hate mongers" of today, like those who went before, shroud themselves in white sheets, as well as anonymous phone calls threatening violence and they become faceless/nameless personal attackers. Intimidation is their goal, mental and physical violence is their weapon. They fear being identified and yet they project

3 studies find probable safety of oral sex

Three recent research studies into male sexual practices have recently uncovered evidence which may prove there is little or no correlation between ingesting semen and testing HIV positive. Researchers, however, have been quick to point out that these studies were limited in scope and they would prefer to err on the side of caution rather than take needless risks.

Researchers are wary of these limited research findings because there hasn't been sufficient attention paid to the sexual habit of Gay men. Most AIDS information services list ingesting semen as an unsafe practice and doctors are still urging people to never allow seminal fluid to enter one's body. Doctors have said that such problems as cuts in the mouth, gum disease and ulcers could substantially raise the recipients' risk. "We are dealing with a fatal disease and we should go with the side of caution," stated Dr. Dean Echenberg, San Francisco Director of Communicable Disease Control.

Dennis Osmond, director of the San Francisco General Hospital Men at Risk for AIDS Study, has stated that though his study is limited to about 400 men, "the risk of oral sex is low. But it would take a long time to demonstrate that there is no zero risk. None of the current studies (SJ General, SF Health Study and Vancouver AIDS Study) say there is no risk. No one can say that does not happen." Local AIDS information centers have been reticent about making changes in their safe sex guidelines.

Researchers are quick to point out that federal studies, (CDC) on the sexual practice of Gay men have long been ignored. There had been one oral sex study, but it was abandoned. "The CDC wrote off the Gay community a year


PISTA DE MAYO KING AND QUEEN

NOTES FROM NANCY

With the Academy Awards coming up, I've been thinking a lot about movies lately, especially because the yearly Academy Awards Party I go to awards cash prizes for those who guess the winners correctly. However, this year's fare is such a group of duds, I've practically given up all thoughts of winning.

Along those same lines, I thought I'd drop a note about what I consider some real prizewinners at your local video rental stores. The films I mention may not be the latest releases, but I did at least rent them during the past year.

My award for the best all-around film has to go to "Desert Hearts," a story about two ladies who get together in a love relationship. When I first saw the film, I was amazed, because my friend Vicki and I had just spent the preceding months writing a screenplay with exactly the same theme. The challenge was to write a tender, tastefully-done script about two women who fall in love, without 'grossing out' the homophobes, yet still remaining true to the story. I don't know if Vicki's and my script accomplished those objectives, but I do know that "Desert Hearts" sure did.

The dialogue in "Hearts" is a constant treat, with pearls of wisdom dropping left and right from the characters' mouths. The cinematography is really a work of art; most of the film is shot with only one camera. The subdued Western background offers an almost surreal environment through which the characters move with elegant grace. And, of course, I cannot say enough about the myriad talents of Patricia Charbonneau. A "Must See" movie - don't miss it!

Another film I appreciated was a sci-fi creation called "Enemy Mine." The theme of the movie is: a human space explorer gets stranded on a strange planet with an inherent alien enemy. However, the two must learn to survive together until help comes, and the way in which they accomplish that amounts to a tender, heart-warming adventure story.

The film is basically a thinly disguised social statement about differences in color, creed or sex, and how to overcome prejudicial attitudes. You definitely leave the film more enlightened than when you began - another "don't miss".

Another one I enjoyed was "Crimes of Passion" with Kathleen Turner and Tony Perkins. This thriller is a bizarre tale about "China Blue" (Turner), a fashion designer by day and hooker by night. The shadowy, seedy life of street prostitution is well-depicted in this film, and a surprise ending caps off the superb acting talents of Turner and Perkins.

In the horror category, or in this case suspense, "The Hitcher" with Rutger Hauer takes the cake. Hauer is the latest export from Germany, and you may have seen him in "Flesh and Blood" or "Ladyhawke", two other very good films. "The Hitcher" keeps you on the edge of your seat the entire movie; it's not what you see, it's what you don't see that is so horrifying. I am not a big fan of gory, "Halloween"-type movies, and this suspenseful thriller is a welcome relief. It is definitely worth the two bucks it costs to rent.

Two little gems I just have to include are "The Grey Fox" and "Cry of the Wolves". Both are docudramas; "The Grey Fox" about a stagecoach robber re-entering the modern world after thirty years of prison confinement, and "Cry of the Wolves" about a fellow who spends a year in the wilderness with a wolf pack. Space does not permit much more detail, but suffice it to say these movies are real treats. Richard Farnsworth stars in "The Grey Fox," and his masterful performance is definitely worth watching.

In the comedy area, "The Gods Must Be Crazy" is a touching yet funny little story about, of all things, an African bushman who accidentally comes across the modern world. This touching little story is an amusing premise to begin with, and is full of anecdotal surprises throughout. It's no 'belly laugh-er', but it keeps a smile on your face.

Last but not least is my award for best foreign film, which goes to "The Marriage of Maria Braun". This film is about a beautiful young German woman and how she "makes it" from the dirt-poor poverty to becoming a "lady of means". Even if you're not predisposed to foreign films, this one is definitely worth seeing.

In sum, there seems to be a lot better entertainment this year in your own living room, at a lot better price. And, if I do happen to fluke out and win some money at the Academy Awards party, it will be nothing short of a miracle.

THE LIBERACE LEGACY

It seemed to me that an awful lot of effort was being expended trying to make up believe that Liberace was dying from something "normal". Anemia was okay. Emphysema was okay. Any heart ailment was okay.

AIDS wasn't.

The fact that so much was being made of his ailments made us all conclude that he was indeed dying from AIDS.

We had all guessed --and the February 16 issue of PEOPLE magazine came right out and said-- that Liberace was Gay. He had tried throughout his life to hide the fact of his homosexuality from the American public --his adoring fans. His much publicized 1982 lawsuit, brought by his long-time "personal chauffeur" Scott Thorson threatened to expose the truth. Even in death, those members of his coterie rallied around the dying entertainer trying desperately --and, ultimately, in vain-- to hide the truth. Liberace's death itself turned into a media circus which put the flamboyancy of his concert performances to shame. He died the way he entertained: in a flurry of attention, and in the center of the stage.

Try as they might, the truth came out about a week after his death. The entertainer had indeed died from the deadly AIDS. Why does it matter that the death certificate said nothing about AIDS? Why does it matter?

The technical angle is that any death caused, or thought to be caused, by a contagious disease must be reported to health officials. Even though Liberace had previously been tested for

AIDS --a test which came back positive-- his death was not reported. After the autopsy confirmed a death from an AIDS-related illness, allegations of an intentional cover-up surfaced. But that doesn't matter as much as the impact that truth will surely have.

AIDS has now hit home to the thousands of his fans who might have had no other exposure to a death from AIDS than his. To these people, AIDS is no longer a disease of "filthy, child-molesting faggots who deserve to die anyway". AIDS is now the disease which ended the life and career of a great showman.

The end might have been less messy had a cover-up not been attempted. The truth is always so much easier than deception, and lies. But one cannot fault the doctor for trying to protect Liberace's image. Whatever the case, in the end, the truth did come out.

The good which will come from this unfortunate situation will far outweigh the pain and suffering caused to his family and friends. Thousands upon thousands of people died from AIDS, yet it takes the death of a famous celebrity to give the disease the attention it merits. But each and every celebrity death from AIDS helps to awaken some section of the sleeping populace to the unarguable truth: no one is immune from the deadly effects of AIDS.

After many years as the consummate showman, it appears that one of Liberace's greatest and most long-lasting legacies will be the enlightenment he brought to his legion of fans.

Today, March 4th is Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent in Preparation for Easter with fasting, penitence and self-denial. Lent is forty days, excluding Sundays, from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. Ash Wednesday, as the name indicates, is that on this day crosses of ashes are placed on the foreheads of worshipers as a sign of repentance. The ashes used are usually made by burning the palms remaining from the previous Palm Sunday. In many ancient churches, a veil was hung across the church on Ash Wednesday as a sign of the

Lenten season had begun. This veil was sometimes called the hunger veil because it proclaimed the Lenten fast was under way. Today this practice survives in the custom of veiling the cross or crucifix during Lent. Churches with pulpit and altar hangings also use the purple color for this season.

Because of the stress on fasting, some Lenten customs have to do with food and two types of bread or doughy products owe their origin to the practice of abstaining from meat. Bread was one of the staple diets of Lent and bakers began the practice of making pretzels during this period. Although few people think of prayers while eating pretzels, the crossed dough is supposed to represent a Christian praying with hands on shoulders. The hot cross bun, with its little sugary cross, was also made to remind us of Christ's crucifixion.

**Imperial Court to receive
Lynne Carter award**

NEW YORK, NY - On March 26, at the Night of A Thousand Gowns Charity Ball, the first Lynne Carter Award will be given to the Imperial Court System for its philanthropic work. For over twenty-five years the Courts lend their 10,000 plus members have quietly raised tens of thousands of dollars for orphans, seniors, AIDS funding and other causes.

Lynne Carter, known internationally as a female impressionist, died of AIDS in January 1985. Carter himself was a great philanthropist and raised considerable amounts of money for the Deborah Hospital for Heart Disease, the Provincetown Fire Department and through his friendship with Josephine Baker, to mention but one of the thousands of luminaries he knew personally, was involved with foster and adoptive care of children. In his later life he was one of the first to organize fundraising for AIDS organizations.

One of the highlights of Carter's career was his success in securing and selling out Carnegie Hall for a memorable performance. The first female impressionist to do so, he set the way for others to perform in this world famous concert hall. He also helped the careers of many current stars by offering the opportunity to perform with him or by advising them.

Lynne Carter brought humor and warmth to all who were privileged to see him perform. He truly was a great in the world of impressionism, and received gowns and original music from those he portrayed, including Pearl Bailey and Josephine Baker. One of Carter's own gowns is currently on loan to the Museum of the City of New York.

He is a legend in our own time. One of Carter's last wishes was that AIDS be conquered and he encouraged support for AIDS causes. "Night of A Thousand Gowns", to be held in the Grand Ballroom of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York will salute the role of impressionists and impersonators in our society, as well as honoring the Imperial Court charity organization. Impersonators from across the U.S. and Canada will be attending and performing at this history-making event, with proceeds benefitting AIDS-related organizations.

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
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Juicy Lucy

INS OFFICIALS LAY DOWN THE LAW
EL PASO, TX (BAR) - Aliens who are convicted felons, homosexuals, prostitutes, members of the Communist Party or of radical fringe groups are not eligible for amnesty under the new immigration reform laws, U.S. Immigration and Naturalization officials recently said.

Al Giugni, director of the El Paso sector of the INS, said all applicants for legalization of immigration status will be required to take a medical examination to prove they do not have AIDS or other contagious diseases.

Giugni said the new immigration reform law will grant amnesty only to those illegal aliens who would otherwise be eligible for admission to this country under normal circumstances.

The new law provides amnesty to those who have been living illegally in the United States since before Jan 1, 1982.

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

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
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
