As Jackie Rothenberg said in her article last Saturday, March 28, the "flap over the use of official stationery to make derogatory biblical references to homosexuality has prompted Gov. Evan Meacham's office to ensure that it won't happen again."

The cover story of last week's OBSERVER raised quite a few eyebrows. Beside receiving considerable media coverage in Tucson, the story caught quite a few people in the Phoenix media by surprise.

The letter and the reply, were hand delivered by the writer a Tucson Lesbian, to The OBSERVER. The original letter was in response to statements Meacham made on his radio call-in show on February 12. The reply was made by special assistant Mac Matheson and was written on official stationery from the Governor's office.

The woman's letter was written in a straight forward Christian manner and ended with the sentence, "I feel I am due the same respect, rights, and loving Christian attitude as any other human."

At almost every function, she is always there lending her help and support in any way it is needed. She has opened her home to various groups and organizations for meetings and parties and shelter. She has opened her heart to numerous individuals who need a shoulder to lean on. She is active in an official capacity in several organizations and clubs in our community. Throughout the years she has adopted many, many sons and daughters in our community. This woman is total love and understanding. Affectionately known to all as Annie, the first T.O.G.A. award of the 1987 was presented to Mrs. Ann Corbin.

The second award of 1987 was presented to a man who has served this community extremely well for the past several years. When there was no one else to take the ball and run with it - he did. He can often be found writing letters, folding flyers, stapling brochures, during his off-hours, when no one else was available.

AIDS may stay dormant 15 years

NEW YORK, NY (AP) - The AIDS virus may lie dormant for an average of 15 years before causing disease, according to a new study that suggests millions of AIDS cases may yet appear in people already infected with the virus.

The study released March 26, by economist Malcolm Rees estimates 2.5 million Americans who were infected with the virus by the end of 1984 will develop AIDS during the next 30 years or so, barring medical advances.

The calculations giving the 15-year average incubation period also suggest two-thirds of the AIDS cases will arise between 10 and 20 years after infection, but Rees stressed that the numbers are not firm. The study is "a picture of the thing. It's not the last word on it, I'm not claiming it is," Rees said.

He also said that if AIDS patients survive longer in the future with the disease, the 15-year average would refer more to time until death than time to the appearance of the disease.

Rees, who is studying the cost of AIDS for the British government, reported his calculations in the British journal Nature. They are based on data from AIDS patients who had been infected by transfusions, and national data on numbers of AIDS cases.

The estimates differ from some prior research. While Rees calculated that 2.5 million Americans infected by the end of 1984 who would get AIDS, the federal government has estimated a

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RECALL DRIVE LOOKS BETTER, WARNER SAYS

TUCSON - In just three months Gov. Evan Mechem has managed to make Arizona the "laughingstock" of the nation, Carolyn Warner said last Sunday (March 29). Warner was in Tucson last Saturday, March 28, at a fundraiser for the Clarion a local women's newspaper.

Warner said that "Six weeks ago I would have told you a recall will never happen - it's too difficult. But now there are too many whose emotions are running too high." "I would not be at all surprised if there were a recall," Warner said. "I would also now not be surprised were it successful."

Warner also said that should there be a recall drive and it resulted in another election, she might seek the governor's office again. Warner, a Democrat, received 35 percent of last November's vote in a losing cause to Mechem's 40%.

2,139 HAVE VIRUS

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon's screening program for AIDS so far has found 2,139 men and women on active duty testing positively for exposure to the deadly disease.

The test results were found during the screening of 1.27 million military personnel, or more than half of the 2.1 million men and women on active duty, Pentagon officials said last week.

Recruits who test "positive" for exposure to the virus are denied entry to the military, but active-duty personnel are allowed to remain on duty as long as they show no signs of the actual disease.

MECHAM DRAMS FIRE OVER 'PICKANINNIES'

PHOENIX (AP) - House Minority Leader Art Hamilton blasted Gov. Evan Mechem for saying blacks had referred to their children as "pickaninnes."

"Our children are as precious to us as they are to any community, and anybody who suggests that the term 'pickaninnes' is OK is wrong, wrong, wrong," said Hamilton, who is black.

Hamilton, (D-Phoenix), was referring to remarks that Mechem made last week in the Phoenix Gazette in response to criticism of a book he wants used in celebration of the U.S. Constitution's bicentennial despite its use of the word 'pickaninnes' in a 1934 essay.

VOLUNTEER TEAM READY TO TEST AIDS VACCINE

BETHESDA, MD - The first American volunteers to be human guinea pigs in tests of potential AIDS vaccines have been selected by researchers, who hope to begin experiments soon.

Dr. Allan L. Goldstein of George Washington University said his team is ready to use 24 volunteers in testing a vaccine against acquired immune deficiency syndrome. The volunteers are members of high-risk groups who have not been infected with the AIDS virus.

Goldstein, speaking last Wednesday, March 25, at an AIDS vaccine workshop sponsored by the National Institutes of Health, said his proposal for experimental administration of the vaccine to volunteers was submitted to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration last month.

Some human experiments have already been conducted in the African nation of Zaire, but no conclusive results have been released. One scientist, Dr. Daniel Zagury of the University of Paris, has tried a prototype vaccine on himself.


us to the happenings in that area of our community. Most recently he has been reporting on the sporting events of our community - Volleyball and Bowling - Mr. Jack Stockslager.

But the more I think about it, the more I realize that what happened is not just a woman's issue, nor is it just a homosexual issue. It is an overt slap in the face to human dignity, to human rights.

For those of you who aren't familiar with Mecham's recent travesty, a Gay woman from Tucson wrote a very respectful letter to the Governor, saying she felt she was due "the same respect, rights and loving Christian attitude as any other human". 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
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

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
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A View From Within

LET'S JUST TALK

When I started writing my weekly column 130 columns ago, I thought I would have just enough material for a handful of columns or so, then just dry up. Surprisingly, there has been enough material for me to write every week for two-and-a-half years without any trouble.

Usually, I begin thinking about my next column on the weekend. I work it up usually by Monday or Tuesday, then drop it in the post by mid-week. This week, I didn't have a burning issue to write about, so I thought it would be nice just to talk to you, and share some thoughts I have had for a long time but have never written about.

Firstly, here are a couple of laws I would like to see enacted: First, outlaw marriage or involvement in a permanent relationship until a person reaches the age of 25. There is so much life to live that a person is practically cutting his/her own throat to get tied-down at 17 or 18-years old. They have kids, work at jobs they hate because they have "responsibilities," then wake up when they're 45 or 50-years old resenting their lover and kids because they wasted the best years of their lives.

Next I would like to see every person, when he or she turns 19-years old, forced to move to a big city, say New York, or Los Angeles, or San Francisco. The world is so huge and diverse that it can only be seen in the microcosm which is a major American city. Too many people I see live their lives in a virtual vacuum, ignorant of the world around them. They cower like frightened animals at the smallest deviation from the limited world they know. Ignorance breeds fear, therefore, the more you know, the less there is to be afraid of.

Lastly, I would like to see all other laws thrown away, and new laws written based on this one simple principle: "Once I turn 18-years old, I will do with my life whatever I choose. I will

replaced by some other pushers.

To get back to the point, women have got to unite on this one. I wonder what will come next? The possibilities seem too endless to name, but just don't be a Gay black woman cohabitating with another woman should you want to apply for a state job.

The women's movement will really be put to a test during this recall effort. If the women of this state, who are assumed to be aware of this incident through the media, don't sign the petitions, then we can assume either they just don't care or, in some off-hand way, they support the Governor's narrow-minded, archaic views.

Talk to your friends, Gay and straight alike. Ask them if they want this state governed by a man who would rather see you repressed and back in the closet. Are all these years of progress doomed to go down the tubes because of one car dealer's personal biases? I say NO! We must support the recall effort. We must get involved. We must care!

And would you want to meet this man's God???

succeed or fail based solely on my own choices. I know that I may do anything I desire up to the point that it prevents any other person from doing this same thing." This is sort of like a "consenting-adult" law: "Any sexual act two adults choose to do in the privacy of their own homes is legal."

Those who follow the above principle would know murder is wrong because it prevents another person living his life as he chooses. Burglary would be wrong because it prevents another person from living his or her life as chosen.

What other laws would be necessary? A man or woman would achieve the most they could, or not: The choice would be theirs and theirs alone.

I guess this would cancel-out my first two laws-to-be. Well, I think if someone wanted to be the best he or she could, a person would want to know more about the world. A person would want to explore as much life as can be explored before settling down.

Let's face it, we're all adults -- those of us over 18-years-old. We should be allowed to do what we wish, within the limits of the above principle.

But these ideas are not new. Nor, actually, are they really mine. I have just adapted for my own use some ideas which have existed for many, many years. Existentialism has been around for some time. Also, Objectivist Epistemology -- Ayn Rand's theories.

But, perhaps the best summation would be this quote from Rand's eternal novel ATLAS SHRUGGED: "I swear by my life and my love of it that I will never live for the sake of another man, nor ask another man to live for mine. She has a lot of other things to say. Stop by a library sometime and check them out.

That's the view for now: see you next week!

As I See It

Why would any Gay or Lesbian person who is affiliated with any of the formal religious groups in our society remain a member, especially so for Roman Catholics in light of the recent actions taken by the Vatican?

I hear the question asked more and more often lately by not only Gays and Lesbians, but by all sorts of people in our society. With all the "wrath" coming down on us from formal religion, why would we want to remain and submit to the increasingly hostile and frequent condemnations of our personhood?

Articles have appeared in several different Gay and Lesbian magazines and newspapers lately promoting the idea that all Gays and Lesbians still remaining members of any formal religion should quit, throw-in the towel, resign and turn to some other form of spiritual development. I noticed that most of these articles were written by people, usually Gay or Lesbian, who long ago left their churches and synagogues and now seem to have need to say to the rest of us, "See, I told you so! You ought to get out too."

Sorry, but I disagree with this advice. As a Gay Catholic who belongs to and is active in a local parish, I speak from my perspective and it brings me to a different conclusion.

My church is not perfect. It's an institution, governed by humans who often say one thing and then do something else. Hypocrisy is a human condition which does not seem to be any less a reality in religious institutions, certainly not within my church. At the same time, that same church does nurture my spirituality and provides me with a great deal of support on a personal level. I firmly believe 90% of the doctrine and find answers to my questions about the meaning of life and the nature of my place in the universe. But all of these personal reasons aside, there are logical, political reasons for me as a Gay man to remain an active Catholic as well.

As a practicing Catholic, I have access to many decision-making leaders - they will listen to me, a member, when they will not listen to someone who has left the church, has become inactive or who has never been a member. I am respected for my membership, my theological knowledge and understanding and especially for my dedication to be a Gay Catholic, even in light of persecution. I may well become a martyr in the effort, but that's the price many of God's faithful have had to pay. My point is, I have a better chance to affect change in the church from within than I do from outside.

But why would anyone care what the church teaches, especially if no Gays or Lesbians belong. The answer is very simple - the churches of the western world and especially the Roman Catholic Church have the power to set the agenda and decide what public concepts of morality are to be. If they go unchallenged from within, then they win the battle and are allowed to determine morality for all societies and ALL peoples. Like it or not, issues such as those involved in Gay and Lesbian rights are moral issues and our churches still set the agenda for society's approach to law and order. If you want to change the laws and policies, then you have to affect the thinking and the philosophy of the law and policy makers - we're talking about religion in all its aspects, no two ways about it.

A Catholic bishop once told me that I had to be twice as good a Catholic as he was because of my being Gay put my acceptability as a respectable Christian into jeopardy and raised serious questions

among other Christians about my credibility. And after I was twice as "good" a Catholic as he was, I still would have to spend hours and hours educating myself and other Christians on the issues involved in Gay and Lesbian rights. And that's exactly what I am doing. I believe in my church, so I will remain an active Catholic, but I also believe there is no sin in my homosexuality and I'll spend the rest of my life, if need be, educating my church to that fact.

I have to stay and be active in my church, because I believe in the basic doctrine of that church and because I see no other way except through education to ever change things. In the meantime, I would appreciate the support of my Gay and Lesbian friends, especially those who have had to leave. I understand your need to leave, please try to understand my need to stay. By what we do, we both are making a strong statement about this injustice.



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AIDS FROM US ARMY, SOVIETS SAY
MOSCOW (AP) - A Soviet military publication claims the deadly AIDS virus is man-made and leaked from a U.S. Army lab in Maryland, the official Tass news agency said.

The Novosti Military Bulletin report did not directly charge the United States with creating AIDS but said the virus leaked from the U.S. Army laboratory at Fort Detrick, Md., which was once the army's biological weapons center, Tass said.

The Pentagon, which no longer responds to such Soviet reports, has denied similar charges in the past year.

MECHAM UNSWAVED BY BOYCOTT PLANS
PHOENIX (AP) - Gov. Evan Mecham says a campaign to persuade convention planners to boycott Arizona won't change his opposition to a state holiday for slain civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr.

Phoenix Mayor Terry Goddard, a supporter of the King holiday, joined Mecham in criticizing the boycott, saying it would unfairly penalize Phoenix.

The boycott effort, announced last Thursday, March 26, by Arizonans for Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday, is "another part of the political side of the play," Mecham said in response to the campaign.

The Republican governor rescinded the state's King holiday shortly after he took office in January, claiming that it was created illegally by former Gov. Bruce Babbitt.

The Doobie Brothers have joined singer Stevie Wonder in deciding not to play in Arizona in protest of Mecham's action. The rock group decided to play a planned reunion benefit concert in Las Vegas, Nevada instead of Phoenix, Doobies publicist Phil Lobel said. The benefit for a San

Francesco hospital for the elderly is scheduled for May 21. The group has not appeared together since 1982.

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

Recall group changes leadership

PHOENIX (AP) - The group that wants to recall Gov. Evan Mechem from office got a new leader last Thursday, April 2, as Mechem Watchdog Committee Chairman Ed Buck stepped down.

The new chairwoman, former Gray Panthers leader Naomi Harward, acknowledged that in some people's eyes, Buck's leadership had become a liability because of his indictment on a drug charge and his admitted homosexuality.

Buck said at a news conference he will remain involved in the anti-Mechem campaign as operations director, and that he decided to quit because "someone more qualified stepped forward."

Harward said she plans to draw on the contacts she has built over the years in an attempt to make the campaign more broad-based.

"Obviously Naomi's base of support is in the 50-plus crowd," which voted heavily for Mechem last fall, Buck said.

Harward added: "I feel very strongly that there are lots of people in our state that are very disturbed with some of Mechem's actions, including his cancellation of a holiday honoring Martin Luther King Jr. and his appointment of Ted Humes to head the Residential Utility Consumer Office."

Buck was indicted Feb. 5 on one felony count of attempting to fraudulently obtain a narcotic and one count of fraudulently obtaining a narcotic. He was arrested after attempting to fill a photocopied prescription from his dentist for the painkiller Percocet. He has applied to enter a drug treatment program in an effort to get the charge dismissed.

Buck also was the target of criticism by Julian Sanders, head of Arizonans for Traditional

American Values. Sanders held a news conference in mid-March to say that Buck was a homosexual. (OBSERVER, March 18).

Buck acknowledged that he

was a homosexual and accused opponents of his committee of trying to center the controversy on himself rather than on Mechem.

Mechem, when told of the leadership change, said, "I haven't paid a bit of attention to them."

"If they were going to get serious they would have to have people of substance who would appeal to something besides just a small extremist fringe," the governor said.

Meanwhile, Buck said the committee had received a "sizeable financial contribution" from members of U2, an Irish rock group that opened its tour with a concert in Phoenix last Thursday. (See U2 story elsewhere in this issue).

Buck said the committee hoped to stage some benefit concerts to raise money for the recall, adding that musicians around the country were being asked.

The committee hopes to raise \$200,000 to \$300,000 to help gather up to 350,000 signatures starting in July, after Mechem has been in office for six months. The law requires 215,746 valid signatures to force a recall vote.

Pima County begins anonymous testing

TUCSON - Five people took advantage of the first day of 'anonymous' testing for exposure to the AIDS virus, Pima County health officials said. Opening day of the so called anonymous tests was last Monday, April 6.

Six people had shown interest in the testing, said Jamie Miller, director of the sexually transmitted disease program. She said only five showed up.

Miller said interest seemed to be up and officials expect to be testing as many as eight people a day by the end of this week.

Those tested were primarily users of injectable drugs, one of the groups at high risk on contracting acquired immune deficiency syndrome, Miller said.

Persons who test negative may remain anonymous, however for those who test positive, Pima County officials must turn their names over to the State Department of Health. Members of the community are advised that if they feel they must take the test, and if you are asked for your name, use a fictitious one to avoid having your name placed on the state computer.

OBSERVER hopes to have a clarification of the 'anonymous' aspect of the Pima County testing in the next issue.

Reagan finally acknowledges AIDS

WASHINGTON, DC (AP) - President Reagan is vowing that "we will find a way" to cure AIDS.

For the first time in his more than six years in office, Reagan talked extensively last Wednesday, April 1, about deadly acquired immune deficiency syndrome. He defended his administration's commitment to alleviating the health threat.

"We have increased the spending on that more than anything we've increased in the budget," the president told reporters.

Reminded that Congress actually had approved more than he recommended for AIDS in recent years, Reagan replied, "Well, Congress is made up of spend-thrifts."

At a wingside of Air Force One after landing at Philadelphia International Airport and before a conference of physicians, Reagan said AIDS education programs should stress avoidance of sexual intercourse.

"I don't quarrel with Surgeon General C. Everett Koop's advice that youngsters unwilling to remain abstinent should employ other means, such as the use of condoms, to protect themselves," Reagan said.

In his speech to the College of Physicians of Philadelphia, Reagan said schools and parents, rather than the government, should decide what children should be taught about the dangers of AIDS.

"But let's be honest with ourselves," he added. "AIDS information cannot be what some

call value-neutral." after all, when it comes to preventing AIDS, don't medicine and morality teach the same lessons?"

Reagan noted that the AIDS virus has been isolated and identified and that a test has been developed to help ensure that blood transfusions are free of AIDS contamination. He pointed out the recent approval by the Food and Drug Administration of the drug AZT, which "may help" AIDS patients.

"This is unprecedented progress against a major virus," the president said. "It took 40 years of study to learn as much about polio. It took 19 years to develop a vaccine against hepatitis B. But then our battle against AIDS has been like an emergency room operation - we've thrown everything we have into it."

"...When the Carthaginian general Hannibal was preparing to cross the Alps and was told there was no way across, he said, 'We'll find a way, or make one.' And that's the kind of determination we all have about curing AIDS," Reagan said. "We'll find a way or make one. We've declared AIDS public-health enemy No. 1."

Health officials estimate that between 1 million and 1.5 million Americans have been exposed to the virus.

ARMED SOLDIER CHARGED WITH EXPOSING TWO TO AIDS

FORT HUACHUCA, AZ - A fort Huachuca soldier faces military criminal charges on suspicion of having sexual relations with two other soldiers despite knowledge that he has the virus that causes acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

Pfc. Adrian G. Morris, 27, of Caseyville, Ill., assigned to Headquarters Company, was accused by his company commander, Capt. Bernard E. Kullifay Jr., of:

1. Sodomy with another male soldier, in violation of Article 125 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice..

2. Aggravated assault against the same soldier by knowingly and wrongfully exposing him to human immunodeficiency virus (known to cause AIDS) through sexual acts.

3. Aggravated assault against a female soldier by knowingly and wrongfully exposing her to the virus through sexual acts.

4. Two violations of Article 134 of the code, having to do with the conduct of a soldier.

Lorena Edlen, a Fort Huachuca representative, said Kullifay's charges will be forwarded to the battalion commander and the post commander, either of whom could dismiss the charges.

Morris would face up to 31 years in prison if he were convicted on all the charges. Morris, who was not being held in custody, was an administration specialist who was assigned to Fort Huachuca last April. He joined the military in 1985.

Officials said Morris has been identified as having the virus but has not been diagnosed as having the disease.

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Report to the community on the NLGHF Conference

The purpose of the National Lesbian/Gay Health Foundation's Conference is to bring together people to share ideas dealing with Lesbian and Gay issues. This year, in Los Angeles; more than 1000 people, representing almost every state in the country, and at least six foreign countries, including Australia, Norway, United Kingdom and Finland, shared their experiences.

The conference ran for four days, from 8 to 10 hours per day. Each hour was filled with workshops dealing with such issues as chemical dependency in the Lesbian and Gay communities, anti-Gay violence, educating adolescent male prostitutes, the antibody positive employee, alternative treatments, to name but a few. There were over 200 workshops offered over the 4-day period.

Of significance was a study looking at behavioral changes in Gay men from four major metropolitan areas - New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Chicago and San Francisco. All participants were volunteers recruited from STD clinics. At the beginning of the study, which has been in progress for almost three years, all participants had blood drawn for HIV antibody testing, but no one was told whether they were positive or negative unless they asked specifically for the results.

The researchers knew the results and found in every study area from 40% to 60% of this self selected study population was antibody positive. Using the statistics from the Chicago group, of 1,100 men, only 182 men wanted to find out their antibody status. Their behavioral changes, measured by reductions in drug and alcohol consumption, and reductions in unsafe sexual activity, when compared to those not knowing their antibody status, showed that knowledge of antibody status made no difference in inducing healthier behaviors. All participants were reducing their risks. This study, in effect, undermines our government's rationale that antibody testing is the answer to the AIDS epidemic by inducing behavior changes through

knowledge of one's antibody status.

There were discussions about blood testing, and Arizona's joining a very few other states where all 'Positive' test results are reported to the state with names, to be kept on a list for future reference. This is the issue of confidentiality versus anonymity. A very important issue. One suggestion repeated over and over was: If you have a need to be tested, do not use your real name. There have already been scores of "Nancy's" and "Ronnie's" and "Ev's" tested, and a few more on the lists couldn't hurt.

Many more of the issues brought up and dealt with at this conference will be presented in the OBSERVER in future issues.

Deserving of special thanks for their support and concern for Tucson's Lesbian and Gay community by sponsoring a representative to this very important conference are: Bob Bishop, Sr. of the Joshua Tree/Back Pocket; Mark Elenz of IBT's; Dick Plowman of the Fineline, and Michael Holman of Speedway Adult Books.

U2's lead singer, Bono, at Thursday's Tempe concert.

TEMPE, AZ (AP) - U2, the renowned Irish rock band known for its social conscience, opened its world tour here with angry words about Arizona's governor and left the stage worried about the health of their lead singer.

The band played to a packed house in Tucson last Sunday, after the Saturday performance was postponed due to lead singer Bob's sore throat.

Bono, whose real name is Paul Hewson, struggled through a shortened 16-song, 91-minute performance in Tempe because of a throat virus and left the arena immediately after the sold-out concert.

Group members announced earlier that they were "embarrassed and aghast" about opening a tour in a state where a Martin Luther King Jr. holiday for state executive branch workers was canceled.

In January, Gov. Evan Meacham canceled the King holiday declared for the state's executive branch workers by his predecessor, Democrat Bruce Babbitt.

Before the show, promoter Barry Fey walked on stage and read a prepared statement by U2 which said: "We are outraged when we arrived in Arizona last weekend and discovered the climate created by Gov. Meacham's rescission of the holiday honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Meacham is an embarrassment to the people of Arizona. We condemn his actions and views as an insult to a great spiritual leader. We urge all forward-thinking Arizonans to support the campaign to recall Gov. Meacham. We support the Meacham Watchdog Committee and thus have made a financial contribution to this cause. We urge all other artists to make a similar protest."

The three other band members - drummer Larry Mullen Jr., bassist Adam Clayton and lead guitarist-pianist The Edge (Dave Evans) all said U2 would not have played here if they were aware of Meacham's rescission earlier.

Meacham scoffed at the band's statements. "A group of entertainers doesn't impress me very much," Meacham said. "I think it's all a bunch of hot air, actually. There's no substance to it."

U2, which has worked with Amnesty International and the Live Aid and Band Aid fund-raisers, has two hit songs "Pride (In The Name Of Love)" and "MLK" - which honor the slain civil rights leader.

"The Meacham thing, it's an insult to everything we've ever done," said Clayton.

U2's widely publicized criticism of Meacham had cooled some by the time the band played Tucson. Not until the last song before the encores was any mention made of the governor's decision to rescind the state's observation of

the King holiday.

Then, Bono, in introducing a song dedicated to King, said: "I have a message for Governor Meacham. The message is 'Boo! Boo!'"

Just the mention of Meacham's name brought a chorus of jeers from the Tucson audience. Many people at the concert had decorated their clothing with bumper stickers urging the governor's recall. Booths providing anti-Meacham merchandise had been set up outside the arena before the concert started.

Booths are rented by individuals, clubs and organizations for use as fund raising events for clubs and organizations or money-making booths for any renter. If last year is any criterion, the booths run the gamut of food, arts & crafts, games, etc. The possibilities boggle the imagination. The event last year drew over 1,000 people in a two-day period. These couples are voted King and Queen based upon the amount of money they each raise from contributions received at various fundraising events each couple holds. This money goes to TLGA to defray costs of Pride Week '87 and the many other yearly events produced for the community by TLGA.

There are at least three candidates entered for this year's competition. They will be announced next week, and they will be introduced in person to the community on Saturday evening. After the 'votes' are counted Sunday evening, the actual crowning of the 1987 King and Queen of Fiesta de Mayo will take

NOTES FROM NANCY

My personal sexuality has never been an issue, primarily because I don't consider it anyone else's business, and because I have always just gone about my way of doing whatever I felt like doing as long as it did not hurt anyone else. Only since I have been hanging out in the Gay community have I been asked to assign myself a label, because I guess it is too mind-boggling for some to comprehend that I am married to a man yet still have many Gay women friends.

When I was first asked to give myself a "handle", I proclaimed bisexuality, because I think that word defines as nearly as any my personal feelings on sexuality. I feel that sexual preference is up to the individual and is none of anyone else's business, since it does not really affect anyone else's life. Before I was married, I always looked at the person first and considered their gender later. I considered this a perfectly natural thing, and still do. Some people in the Gay community call me "straight" with disgust and disdain in their voices, and some people in the straight community call me "Gay" with similar sentiments. But I simply consider myself Nancy.

The reason for this subject is that recently at the Observer Benefit, Publisher Bob Ellis introduced me as a Lesbian. I was sitting in the audience with my husband, Eddie, who Bob had met on several occasions. While I am sure that Bob's introduction was not intentionally incorrect after it was repeated on the front page of the Observer, I started thinking seriously about all this "labeling" business. Plus I thought I would take the opportunity to talk about bisexuals, a group of people who have no real home community.

At any rate, the man I am married to happens to be the most wonderful person in the world, in my opinion, and I don't like seeing him or our beautiful relationship publicly discounted. I also don't like being labeled, since I make it a point not to label myself - or others. Eddie, my husband, also supports my views on sexuality. We both feel that no one should ever be discriminated against because of sexual preference, and we are both avid

supporters of human rights - and Gay rights. Our plight is difficult, too, in that we are not fully accepted by the Gay or straight communities.

It is the same for bisexuals. There is always some joker ready to criticize those who don't really have a gender preference. And they do exist, more, probably, than we realize. It is difficult to comprehend that someone actually does not prefer one sex over another, and enjoys the two sexes equally. It depends of course, on the person first, and the gender just happens to come along with the person, as does the color of his/her eyes or hair. And bisexuals are generally not accepted by either the Gay or straight community, so they float along in limbo without a whole lot of support, which is not a terribly easy thing to do.

So, if my sexuality in fact has anything to do with my writing, my present preference is a monogamous relationship with my husband, Eddie. I believe our sexuality moves and grows with our lives as they progress, and this is where I am right now. I plan to continue to support human rights and Gay rights, and if I am ostracized for it by either the Gay or straight communities, then so be it.

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





A View From WithinA COMMENTARY BY
CHRISTOPHER GEOFFREY MCPHERSON**THE PUZZLE-PIECES ARE FITTING INTO PLACE**

Last summer, I wrote in my column (Aug. 13, 1986) about a newspaper article which appeared in USA TODAY on August 1. It dealt with a study done at the Boston University School of Medicine which was reported in the magazine, "Archives of General Psychiatry".

Basically, the results of this study showed that Gay men were five times more likely to have a Gay brother than a heterosexual man. The study showed that 20% of Gay men had brothers who were bisexual or homosexual, while non-Gay men had a Gay brother only 4% of the time. (The study also showed that Gay men were no more likely to have Lesbian sisters than non-Gay men).

At that time, I told you that these results --while interesting -- did nothing to determine if this likelihood was due to inheritance or environment. It took the recent work of Dr. Richard Green to shed new light on this question.

Green, who is professor of psychiatry at the UCLA Neuropsychiatric Institute, and a team of behavioral scientists studied dozens of boys (The UPI release did not specify how many boys were included in the study) over a period of 15 years.

The study consisted of two groups. Group One consisted of boys who said they preferred to be girls, dressed like girls, avoided rough-and-tumble sports, and had fathers who did not spend a lot of time with them. Of this group, 75% of the boys -34 of them- grew up to be homosexual or bisexual.

Group Two consisted of boys who showed conventional masculine

behavior during boyhood. Only one of these boys grew up Gay. These boys had fathers who spent more time with them and actively encouraged traditional "masculine" activities.

The result of this study showed that contrary to popular misconception, it is not a domineering mother which influences a boy's sexual orientation, but, rather, an inattentive father.

This study's results could easily explain why Gay men are more likely to have Gay brothers than non-Gay men. But are the results of this study as clear as they may seem at first glance?

It is a commonly held belief that a child is born without feelings of hatred or prejudice. Is it possible that a child is open to influence with regard his or her sexual identity? In other words, is a boy born with a predisposed position as either Gay or non-Gay, yet susceptible to outside influences which will ultimately mold his sexual identity as either Gay or non-Gay?

The recent study shows that fathers who are inattentive to their sons have a high percentage of Gay sons. Is this because they didn't instill traditional masculine traits in their sons? Or is it that an inattentive father serves to allow a son to fully develop his own, already determined sexual identity?

There is outside confirmation of this possibility: studies have shown a child with an alcoholic parent is more likely to become an alcoholic only if the child actually begins to drink himself. In other words, the child is already predisposed to

being an alcoholic. If that child drinks, he is more likely to become an alcoholic; if he doesn't drink, he won't become an alcoholic.

Could traditional masculine traits be forced upon an otherwise Gay child? Look at the two groups in the recent study. Group Two boys enjoyed traditional masculine activities enforced --in part, at least-- by their fathers. Are these boys then trained to be masculine? Would more boys in Group Two have been Gay had their fathers not forced masculinity on them? Group One boys were left alone --they had inattentive fathers. Did these boys predisposed to being Gay become Gay while those predisposed to being non-Gay grew up that way?

How many Group Two boys --in another twenty years-- will have "become" Gay? Will they rebel against their "brainwashing"? Will they identify their "true selves" as being Gay? It is truly an interesting premise.

This week's PAT-ON-THE-BACK Award goes to L.A. LAW and their episode of March 26, 1987. One character, who is worried about dating again after her recent divorce, gets advice from another. During their conversation, condoms, AIDS, and previous sexual histories were brought up. It was so natural and real. It avoided proselytizing, moralizing, and inanity in order to deal with the subject intelligently, and realistically.
