**Ontario court overturns ban on 'Joy of Gay Sex'**

TORONTO, ONTARIO (GCN) - "The Joy Of Gay Sex", may be repugnant to heterosexuals, but it is not obscene, according to a ruling by the District Court of Ontario.

The decision handed down by Judge Bruce Hawkins ends a ban on the book enforced by Canadian Customs since last April. The ban was based on Customs' determination that depictions or descriptions of "buggery" - anal sex - violates Canada's obscenity legislation.

Hawkins stated that Customs had misinterpreted the obscenity law, which states that materials, may be prohibited if their dominant characteristics is the "undue exploitation of sex, or of sex and any one or more of the following subjects, namely crime, horror, cruelty and violence."

According to Hawkins, "[The Joy of Gay Sex] deals rationally and unsensationally with the sexual practices of a substantial segment of the male population."

"However, repugnant the concept of anal sex may be to the heterosexual observer, it is, I find, the central sexual act of homosexual practice. To write about homosexual practices without dealing with anal intercourse would be equivalent to writing a history of music and omitting Mozart."

Hawkins' ruling appears to effectively deny other prohibi-

tions by Customs based on the equation of anal sex and obscenity. Representatives of Toronto's Glad Day Bookshop, which brought Customs to court on "The Joy of Gay Sex" ban, expressed guarded optimism that the decision will halt seizures of at least some Gay/ Lesbian material bound for Canada. "The effect will be that that part of the guidelines Customs uses to stop Gay books depicting or describing anal sex can no longer be justified," said Charles Campbell, lawyer for Glad Day.

"But the only test is in the pudding," said Jearld Moldenhauer, owner of Glad Day. "We've signaled for shipment from various sources - of both magazines and books. We'll just have to see what they do."

Campbell added that other aspects of Customs interpretation of obscenity law, including guidelines barring descriptions or depictions of dildos, submission, bondage, spanking, display of fecal matter, etc., are used to censor Gay/ Lesbian material.

Hawkins did not rule on the part of the suit charging that the obscenity law and the interpretations of it in the Customs Tariff Act violate constitutional guarantees of equality and freedom of expression.

Even more alarming, said Campbell, is a proposed amendment in Parliament to the obscenity

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
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## 'AIDS Panic' defense fails in murder trial

MINEOLA, NY (CNN) - Lorenzo D. Owens, who admittedly killed Kenneth Grice after having sex with him because Grice told him he had AIDS, has pleaded guilty to first-degree manslaughter. The case has been closely watched by Gay rights advocates because the defense argued Owens' action was an understandable response to AIDS exposure.

According to courtroom testimony presented last month, Owens, 19, and Grice, 22, had a prior sexual relationship. On April 17, Grice, who had been discharged from the army for having a positive HIV test, offered Owens, who was homeless, a place to stay for the weekend. On April 20, according to Owens, Grice initiated sex with him, and the two engaged in unprotected anal intercourse.

Owens told police he became outraged when Grice told him he had AIDS right after they had sex. In his videotaped confession, Owens said that when he learned he had been exposed to AIDS, he told Grice, "You've got AIDS! Why don't you treat me better. I'm involved with a young lady... Why do you want to do this to me?" Then, he "just burst out in a rage," got a knife from the kitchen, and grabbed Grice by the neck. "I cut his throat," said Owens. Later he wrote with a crayon on the mirror and a door: "We hate homosexuals. Move out."

Grice was also robbed by Owens, who took several cameras and radios and later sold them. Owens surrendered to police on May 10, 1986, and was charged with second-degree murder and petty larceny.

John R. Lewis, who is Owens' attorney, argued that Owens' behavior was a justified response to exposure to the AIDS virus, and said that his client was "reacting to the pronouncement of death." Owens tested negative for exposure to the virus after the killing.

David Wertheimer, executive director of the New York City Lesbian and Gay Anti-Violence Project, characterizes Lewis' strategy as a variation of the "homosexual panic" defense. Such an argument had been used recently in New York to gain the acquittal of a man who killed a priest (wearing regular street clothes) after engaging in sex with him. In this case, the defense arguments were based primarily on legitimizing Owens' fear of AIDS and the panic which ensued when he found out he had been exposed.

According to Wertheimer, the prosecutor, Assistant District Attorney William Dempsey, seemed reluctant to attack this defense head-on, perhaps because of its recent success. Courtroom observers from the Lesbian and Gay Anti-Violence Project said it was clear Owens understood the modes of transmission of AIDS, and that, knowing the risks involved, certainly had equal responsibility to take measures to protect himself.

The case for the defense unravelled due to the testimony of Owens' girlfriend, Alicia Thompson. Alicia, who was 16 at the time of the killing, testified in court as to Owens' emotional state on the night of the killing. She later met with the D.A. and told him that she was very upset that she might have AIDS because she and Owens had unprotected intercourse hours after the killing took place. The D.A. asked for permission to have Thompson testify again. The Judge, Richard Delin of Nassau County Court, cleared the courtroom of the jury, but not the press, and heard the D.A.'s arguments. One of the court observers said that when Thompson's story came to light, "I thought the defense attorney would melt right

into the floor."

Delin, however, initially seemed reluctant to admit the testimony, and adjourned the court for the weekend. Lewis, the defense attorney, knew the Thompson story would appear in the papers over the weekend, and since the jury was not sequestered, planned on obtaining a mistrial on the basis of Thompson's inadmissible testimony becoming public knowledge. When the court assembled, the judge decided the Thompson testimony would be permitted, and the defense then decided to accept a plea bargain for first-degree manslaughter.

Thompson's admission was problematic on two fronts. As D.A. Lewis said during the trial, "It put a lie to the self-serving statement that he [Owens] gave to the police. If this defendant killed another man believing he caught AIDS, he would not have sex with this young woman." Also, since Thompson was underage at the time, it opened Owens up for a charge of statutory rape. The penalty for first-degree manslaughter is 8-25 years.

Gay and Lesbian rights activists are pleased with the outcome thus far. Thomas Stoddard, executive director of Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, said acceptance of the defense arguments would have "set a terrible legal and social precedent, and would serve to validate irrational responses to people with AIDS. This defense was shown to be the sham we believed it to be."

A MEDAL AND A DISCHARGE  
WASHINGTON, DC (CNN) - "When I was in the military they gave me a medal for killing two men and a discharge for loving one." This inscription appears on a large black granite headstone in a prominent Congressional cemetery here. Inscribed above the epitaph are the words, "A Gay Vietnam Veteran."

According to the Bay Area Reporter, the headstone which is inlaid with two pink triangles belongs to a man still living. The man, whose identity is undisclosed, wants the stone to serve as a symbol for those U.S. citizens who played a role in the country's history, but who remain ignored.

The stone is placed close to the plot of J. Edgar Hoover. Cemetery officials approved the headstone without complaint.

Legislators of the amendment show an effort to prohibit depictions of "anything that shows sexual connection: oral, genital, animals and people," and even heterosexual intercourse, said Campbell.

On the other hand, the proposed revision appears to loosen up restrictions against sexually explicit writing. Campbell said the proposed changes are the subject of "great debate in the country. The writers are up in arms." A vote on the amendment is not yet scheduled.

In the meantime, Gay-activists face a new dilemma - whether to continue to fight current censorship by Customs or to reserve their energy for fighting enactment of the law.



It is an honorable attempt to unify and improve the informational outlets which supply you, the Gay reader, with info about your community.

Anyway, I decided to enter some of the very columns you may have read in this space during 1986 in two different categories, sincerely not expecting to win. Actually, I am the type of person who thrives on competition, and I hope to learn more about my peers and the quality of work which exists in other newspapers across the country. (Of course, if I do win, I will be happy. It is just a high honor to be amongst the competitors.....)

A couple of weeks ago, I got the entries which I shall judge as one of three judges. I expected some good work, and I was very curious to see what others in the Gay press were doing, but I never expected to see the quality of work entered.

I guess it would be in poor form to tell you which individuals and newspapers were entered, but let me assure you I saw some amazingly good work.

The entries came from California, across the country to Atlanta, and represented a major diversity of events which occurred in the Gay and Lesbian community during 1986. Without exception, the work was of a high quality on par with that which appears in the mainstream press. The reporting was as good, the photographs as good, and the advertisements as good.

Most of the newspapers in which the entered works appeared are --I gathered-- of a small circulation, comparable to the circulation of this newspaper. To see such good work in a small newspaper --including the work you see in the OBSERVER-- never ceases to amaze me. Not that we don't have the competence to do the work, but that such good work is done in light of the very limited budgets under which most newspapers in the Gay press must operate.

That a newspaper like the OBSERVER even exists at all, let alone three newspapers in our state, and the large number of publications of the Gay press across the country, is evidence of the complete and sincere dedication of those men and women not only proud to be journalists, editors, photographers, artists, and staff, but proud to be Gays and Lesbians as well.

I have not seen the film, which stars Gary Oldman, Alfred Molina, and Vanessa Redgrave, but a review in the New York Magazine Details was hysterical, and makes the film look like a real winner. Watch this space for updates.







### JUDGE BARS TESTING OF GAY MAN'S BLOOD

SAN DIEGO, CA (AP) - Police must return, without testing for AIDS antibodies, a blood sample taken from a Gay man who allegedly bit two officers during his arrest last year, an appeals court has ruled.

The ruling reverses a judge's order allowing the testing of blood taken from Brian Barlow, 40, of San Francisco.

"While some cultures require a leper to ring a bell to warn the passer-by, our Legislature has not so stigmatized the victims of AIDS," Justice Edward Butler wrote.

**THEOLOGIAN HIRED BY CORNELL U.**  
WASHINGTON, DC (AP) - Theologian Charles Curran, suspended from Catholic University of America for his dissent on sexual issues, (OBSERVER, Jan. 14), will take a post as visiting professor at Cornell University, officials at the New York school announced.

Curran, a Roman Catholic priest, is fighting the suspension from his tenured professorship at Catholic University in court and has said repeatedly that he has no plans to leave the school permanently.

Curran was suspended in January - though he remains on the Catholic University payroll and still lives on campus - more than seven years after the start of a Vatican investigation of sexual ethics views that church leaders find too liberal.

Among his points of disagreement with church teachings are his views that contraception and sterilization "are not intrinsically evil."
