Mecham Recall Committee Gathers Momentum For July Petition Drive

Over 6,000 people have contacted the Mecham Recall Committee to get involved in the Recall Movement. Callers are sent a copy of the newsletter, "The Watchdog", and their names, addresses, and phone numbers are entered on the Committee's computer list of volunteers.

Diana Stuart, Volunteer Coordinator for the Committee, is currently separating the volunteer list into regions of the State, then further into city and zip code groupings. Regional Managers in each major section of the state are now starting to contact a volunteer in each zip code grouping to act as a "Neighborhood Leader", who will keep lines of communication open and organize the volunteers to circulate petitions, starting in July.

Petition signing will take place in a number of ways, and will usually be paired with voter registration tables in shopping center parking lots, and at major events, such as concerts. In some cases, volunteers will walk door-to-door to get petitions signed. All of these methods will take large numbers of volunteers to sustain the effort.

Evan Mecham must be allowed to serve six months in office before the circulation of recall petitions may begin. Then the Recall Committee is allowed 120 days to collect 215,746 valid signatures. A valid signature is one from any registered voter in Arizona, signed in the presence of a qualified petition circulator.

At some point prior to the 120 day deadline, the petitions are turned in to the Secretary of State for verification of number. She has 10 days to do this. The petitions are then forwarded to the county of origin for certification by the county recorders. There is a statutory limit of 60 days for this process.

The Secretary of State will have between 100 and 120 days from that date to call a new election. Assuming Mecham refused to step down, his name will appear on the ballot, along with anyone who was able to meet the requirements for placing their name on the ballot. There will be no party designation on the ballot. The bottom line is that a new election can take place as early as March, 1988.

Naomi Barward is the new chairperson of the Mecham Recall Committee and the Recall Movement. She took charge when former head Ed Buck stepped down amid much furor after admitting that he is a homosexual.

Naomi comes to the position with very valid qualifications. She was born in 1907, and came to Arizona in 1953. No stranger to activism, she is most recently identified as the organizer of the Valley of the Sun Network of the Grey Panthers, serving as its Covenor, or Co-Covenor from 1978 through 1987. She was the Official Observer for the Grey Panthers at the 1985 United Nations "Decade for Women"

Convention in Nairobi, Kenya.

She holds two Bachelor's degrees - History and Political Science, and Divinity, as well as two Masters degrees - Social Service Administration and Religious Education. She received two major research grants for social service studies. From 1955 to 1976, she began as a lecturer, and progressed to a full professor in the Sociology Department of Arizona State University. In 1976, she became a Professor Emeritus at A.S.U. Author of numerous publications and three books, she has also been listed in "Who's Who of Women of the World," "Who's Who of American Women," and "Men of Science."

"My interest in the Recall of Governor Evan Mecham began when I participated with over ten thousand other people in a march from the Phoenix Civic Center to the State Capitol to protest Mecham's rescission of the Martin Luther King Holiday," Barward said. "The interest and enthusiasm of the crowd was heightened by a bumper sticker which read: 'Mecham for Ex-Governor.'

Barward continued, "When I was asked to become the new Chairperson of the Mecham Recall Committee, I was ready to do anything I could to help. We already have a strong organization that is open to all groups, and we plan to continue strengthening and broadening our base, so that we have a groundswell of community action and determination to win our goal: Recall Mecham! We urge the support of all of you."

Only 40% of all eligible voters are registered to vote in the State of Arizona. The Recall Committee wants to get the other 60% registered so they can sign the Recall Petition tool. The Committee Deputy Registrar Coordinator is Cheryl Cresser. If you are a Deputy Registrar, or would like to become one, call Cheryl for information at 870-4857 in Phoenix. As a fundraising event, riders from all over Phoenix will be invited to the "Phoenix Benefit Bike-A-Thon" on Sunday, June 7. Several starting locations will be set up, with riders meeting at the State Capitol for a rally. There will be food, refreshments, entertainment and voter registration. Also in the works are classes for Petition Circulators, a mass rally and a major benefit concert with a major entertainer. Additionally, the other regions of the state including Tucson and Flagstaff are well along in plans for benefit concerts and dances. Plans will be announced when they are finalized. There will be no lack of things to do for members of the Committee.

Pat Bond in Phoenix appearance



PHOENIX - On Saturday, June 13, Pat Bond will return to Kerr Center to perform "Beloved Hick". In this one-person drama, Bond plays the role of Lorena Hickok and focuses on the intense and loving personal relationship between Hickok and Eleanor Roosevelt which began in the 1930s.

Researched, written, and directed by Bond, "Hick" draws in part on the large volume of letters from Eleanor to Lorena (whom she addressed "Beloved Hick") which were opened to the public just a few years ago; the personal relationship between the two is portrayed within the setting of the turbulent politics and history of the period. Lorena, a colorful, cigar-smoking Associated Press reporter covering Washington D.C. events, and Eleanor, the wife of the Democratic presidential candidate, met during the 1932 campaign, and the two powerful intellects quickly responded to

each other. The deep love that the two shared is presented in the context of the great political and social events of the 1930's - Depression, widespread homelessness, hunger, and unrest and attempts to cope with these problems.

Pat Bond has become familiar to national audiences for her one-person portrayal of Gertrude Stein, which toured the country for six years, was shown on PBS television, and which she performed last December at Kerr Center. Other one-person productions she has performed are "Lizzie Borden," "Colette," and "Murder In The W.A.C." She has also appeared in the films "The Word Is Out" and "The House Of God."

Tickets for the June 13 performance are \$10 and are available at Gemmage and Dillard's ticket offices.

FOR \$3, YOU CANNOT GET THE SCOOP
PHOENIX (AP) - In June, Mountain Bell Customers in Arizona will have the option of paying \$3 a month to keep their phones from being used for calls to the phone company's ScoopLine service.

The Corporation Commission has approved a compromise proposal to block out potentially expensive ScoopLine calls, which commissioners said have been the source of numerous complaints.

Mountain Bell sells rights to ScoopLine numbers, which use the 976 and 676 exchanges, to other businesses, which operate a variety of services, such as talk lines, time and weather information and sports scores.

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KENNEDY ASKS \$450 MILLION FOR AIDS

WASHINGTON, DC - Senator Edward Kennedy has introduced the first comprehensive AIDS bill in congress last Friday, May 15. He wants to triple federal money for AIDS education and prevention - to \$350 million in 1988, up from the \$120 million the Reagan administration requested. His bills call for \$100 million more for innovative care and treatment programs.

Kennedy is committee chairman for the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee. Some of the provisions of his bill's include:

* Treatment and counseling of more drug abusers, who are at high risk of AIDS.

* Funds for TV and radio ads on how to avoid the virus.

* Making experimental AIDS drugs available through community doctors, not just big research centers.

* More home and day-care money to keep AIDS patients out of hospitals when possible.

* Ordering the National Institutes of Health to speed up funding to AIDS researchers.

A second AIDS bill is to be introduced in both the House and Senate this week. It would increase funding for voluntary AIDS antibody testing programs, protect confidentiality of test results - and make it illegal to discriminate against people who test positive.

GAY NEW YORK COPS TO HELP RECRUIT HOMOSEXUALS

NEW YORK, NY - According to a report from the New York Times the New York City Police Department has requested the help of the Gay Officers' Action League (GOAL) in a recruiting drive.

"Obviously, we're sending a message to the Gay community that we're not discriminating against you," said James Hargrove, the assistant police commissioner for community affairs.

The officers' league was founded several years and has about 150 members and includes city, transit and housing police officers, as well as probation and parole officers and members of the district attorney's staffs.

The group has done police recruiting in the past, and the department has provided help when asked, police officials said. But the current drive marks the first time that the department has solicited the group's help, they said.

"It was such a shock and surprised to be asked after all the controversy the last time we did recruiting in 1985, when it caused quite a stir," said James Seal, a probation officer who is GOAL's president. "The department has been most helpful."

On May 30, GOAL will sponsor a recruiting seminar at the Lesbian and Gay Community Center in Greenwich Village when members of the group and representatives from the department's recruiting section will answer questions.

EX WIFE OF HOMOSEXUAL WINDS

ACQUITTAL OF CHILD THEFT CHARGE
SAN DIEGO, CA (AP) - Five years of court battles have ended between a fundamentalist Christian woman and her ex-husband, a homosexual who retains legal custody of their teenage son.

Betty Lou Batey was acquitted by a judge last Monday, May 18, of felony child-stealing charges and Frank Batey approached his ex-wife with his hand outstretched, a gesture she rebuffed.

Betty Batey lost custody of son Brian to his father in 1982 and was distressed that the life-style of Frank who lives with his homosexual lover, would affect Brian, who was 11.

Following a scheduled weekend visit with Brian in September 1982, Betty took the boy and left California in violation of a court order. After 19 months on the run, the two surrendered to authorities in Denver in 1984.

Betty Batey was jailed briefly for violating the court's custody ruling. She and Frank then went to court over custody issues and she was found in civil contempt for the custody order.

Superior Court Judge Douglas Woodworth allowed the jury to remain in the court while the defense argued for acquittal, an argument usually made outside the presence of jurors.

Woodworth then threw out the charges, saying he didn't think Betty Batey ever meant to deprive Frank Batey of his custody rights.

AIDS CASES DECLINING?

WASHINGTON, DC - A new study of military recruits, that was released last Thursday, May 14, tends to indicate that the spread of the AIDS virus may be on the decline. The U.S. Health Department officials said that the findings was "encouraging" but warned that it was far too early to know whether a significant decline is in store.

The study which took place from October 1985 to December 1986 with about 790,000 military recruits from induction centers across the country, showed there was no increase in the number of people infected with the virus.

Among white men, there was a slight decline in the number infected. Of the 789,578 screened, 1,186 were infected, with an overall rate of 1.5 per 1,000. Blacks had the highest rate - 4.1 per 1,000, Hispanics 2.3 per 1,000 and whites 0.8 per 1,000.

Dr. Tim Dondero of the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta said a growing awareness of the military screening program may have led applicants at high risk of infection not to apply. "For a disease where the worst expectations seems to be realized we have to be encouraged," he said.

Researchers also reported encouraging news regarding the development of an AIDS vaccine. Dr. David Ho of Cedars-Sinai Medical Center said he had found that different strains of the AIDS virus have similar "soft spots" that can be attacked by antibodies and could be the basis of a genetically engineered vaccine.

Other researchers reported in the latest Journal of the American Medical Association that a genetically engineered hepatitis B vaccine worked as well as one derived from the blood of carriers of the disease. But a caution was expressed by researchers, who said it will be years, if ever, before there is a cure.

AIDS LINK: HISTORY OF SEXUAL VIRUS

WASHINGTON, DC - People with a history of sexually transmitted diseases are at higher risk of AIDS, a new study indicates.

The study confirms a widely held theory that the AIDS virus is more likely to strike and cause disease in people who've had viral infections that can suppress the immune system.

In addition, it suggests people infected with the AIDS virus should avoid exposure to sexually transmitted diseases.

"Even after you're infected (with the AIDS virus), if you're constantly being exposed to other infections, you may be putting yourself at risk" for the more deadly stages of the disease, says Dr. Thomas Quinn of Johns Hopkins Hospital.

He and colleagues in Baltimore studied 98 AIDS patients - 100 African male and female heterosexuals, 100 USA heterosexual men and 100 USA homosexual men.

They found that AIDS patients and those infected with the virus had a higher incidence of previous or current infection with hepatitis, syphilis or one of the herpes viruses (Epstein-Barr, cytomegalovirus or herpes simplex) than those who didn't have AIDS or weren't infected with the virus.

Rates of infection with these sexually transmitted viruses were almost 100 percent in African men and above 80 percent for the homosexual men - groups in which AIDS is widely prevalent.

The USA heterosexual men had the lowest rates of the infections and also no evidence of AIDS virus infection.

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As I See It

For the past four or five years, I've been involved in a teaching experience at the University Medical College. The experience is very unique, only one of two or three in the nation. I have been working with a hand-full of Gays, Lesbians and concerned heterosexuals in the teaching of a "short course" for first year medical students. The course is designed to prepare them for some of the realities of working in clinical medicine. This particular teaching unit is entitled, "Caring for Gay & Lesbian People: The Physician's Role."

There are four two-hour sessions, plus a four to six hour "pot luck" social. During the first session, the students are given basic information about the Gay and Lesbian lifestyles. The usual statistical information such as "one out of ten in any given population is Gay/lesbian", "all Gays don't wear dresses, and all Lesbians don't wear overalls", etc. Another session deals with the specifics of Gay and Lesbian health issues and the need that Gays and Lesbians have for holistic health as much as anyone else.

The session I've been involved with includes a panel of usually two Gay men and two Lesbian women involved in an open and honest discussion with the students, of personal health issues that includes everything from how to find a competent, sensitive and understanding physician to how to deal with same sex lovers during times of medical emergencies. The students have been very appreciative of the fact that the panel has been willing to be open, vulnerable and to share personal knowledge and insights. This session ends with the whole group, Gays, Lesbians and heterosexuals, paring off and practicing

the development of interviewing skills for these future physicians.

Later that same week, the students and a group of Gay and Lesbian people gather at the home of the instructor of the class, Dr. Kay Bauman, for a social evening of pot-luck dinner and small group discussions. These "small group discussions" deal with any related issue(s) that the group want to talk about.

This is usually the high point of the seminar, because everyone now knows each other from the earlier sessions and within the warmth of the social setting, everyone can share and articulate their concerns, observations, knowledge and fears. Misconceptions can be expressed and explained, moral and ethical issues can be addressed, human feelings can be explored and the people involved in the seminar become very "real" to each other no matter if Gay or straight.

It has been very revealing to me to talk to these medical students over the years and to hear how they feel personally about Gay and Lesbian people (hate, fear, misunderstanding, apprehension, misconception and, at times, even acceptance and loving). I continue to be surprised however by the number of them that, in this day and age, still say, "You're the first Gay man I've ever met, however, I think this fellow in my fraternity must have been....". No matter what level of awareness that may be when they start this elective seminar, they do not leave it without having given some thought to the issues of Gay/lesbian rights, health concerns, and yes, even to their own sexuality. They usually end with

the realization that we all have much more in common than we have that's different from one another.

This one short seminar in the first year of medical school is hardly the complete answer to "sensitizing" the medical profession to Gay and Lesbian concerns, but it is a beginning. And as far as I've been able to discover, there are only one or two other schools in the whole country that devote any part of their curriculum to this issue. Most of tomorrow's physicians are having no real discussion of these issues anywhere within a structured format in their training.

How interesting that here in Arizona, medical students have at least an elective they can take that does address issues of concern to a large minority within our society. As I said, it's a beginning.

Fort Detrick used for AIDS research

Since the days of World War II, Fort Detrick, an Army base in Maryland, has been connected with biological warfare. Until 1969, the connection was with research and development of defense systems based on biological warfare. Now, with the flurry of allegations encouraged most notably by the Soviet press, Fort Detrick is once again being linked to this kind of now-illegal warfare.

First carried in the Soviet "Literaturnaya Gazeta" and most recently in the Soviet military publication "Novosti Military Bulletin", allegations have been floating around that the AIDS virus—which has infected 35,518 persons as of May 11, 1987—was created by, and accidentally released through Fort Detrick. Various reports—including a front page story in the "London Sunday Express" of Oct. 26, 1986—allege that the AIDS virus is man-made (and) was artificially created by American scientists during laboratory experiments which went disasterously wrong. The United States Defense Department has stated very firmly that there was no truth to the allegations.

Charles Dasey, spokesperson for the U.S. Army Medical Research and Development Command at Fort Detrick said that research and development for biological warfare was terminated at the base in 1969

Other less widespread allegations connect the AIDS virus to reports that American military personnel released a man-made virus—called the African Swine Virus—into the pig population in Cuba in an attempt to kill Fidel Castro who established himself as President of Cuba after a successful overthrow of that government in 1959.

Reports of the number of AIDS cases in Cuba have not been made available at this time.

At least one medical source has stated that the African Swine Virus and the human AIDS virus are very similar in genetic structure.

Fort Detrick is now the site of research being done by the National Cancer Institute. Some of that research concerns testing drugs and treatment for AIDS, and the development of an AIDS vaccine

Mecham aide defends bumper sticker


PHOENIX (AP) — A bumper sticker reading "Queer Ed Buck's Recall" means "foil the recall" drive against Gov. Evan Mecham and is "a cute play on words," a Mecham aide says.

Donna Carlson, Mecham's legislative liaison, acknowledged Monday, May 18, that she had distributed the bumper stickers, which a GOP precinct committeeman, Bob Croft said he made independent of the Mecham administration.

"People asked for them, I handed them one," Carlson said. Croft said the stickers weren't meant to be offensive.

Buck had been a major spokesman for the movement to recall Mecham but stepped down shortly after acknowledging his homosexuality in response to comments at a news conference called by Mecham supporters. (OBSERVER, April 8).

Bob Hegyi, director of the Lesbian and Gay Community Switchboard, said he felt the bumper sticker "shows a great deal of insensitivity."




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

A Critics Review

A Phoenix group came to Tucson this past weekend to entertain. First on the run, they were at Colette's on Friday night, then The Graduate on Saturday night and finally at IBT's on Monday night. I caught the show at the Graduate. The opening number by Moosal and Pussy Le Hoot was sloppy. Not only was the lip-synchronization out of synchronization, those two couldn't even remember who was doing what voice when. The comedy skit following the opening number was humorous at times, but it appeared to be more ad-libbing than a prepared performance.

There were some good numbers by Moosal and Pussy Le Hoot, but their evening was inconsistent. The real highlight of the evening was Gaylia with her live voice renditions. Two local talents were also present at the Graduate, Tabatha Scott did a serious number which was entertaining and was in contrast to the more humorous acts. The most memorable act was Candy Plastique doing her number of Tammy Baker - the make-up with the mascara running down her face and on her costume was too much. The really best part of the whole show was when Pussy Le Hoot tried to sit on that three inch rail and fell off three times, the last time losing her wig and crawling off the stage. It was too perfect to have been rehearsed.

The Miss Gay Tucson Contest is coming up fast and I wanted to have interviews with all of the contestants. This week I had my interview with Scott Cole aka Tabatha Scott. You know, the more I get into these interviews, the more I find out that I am really liking these people. I hope that by giving some background on each one, that the public will accept them not as a costumed figure on a stage, but as real individuals doing what they can to entertain and hoping that the public will be pleased with their endeavors.

Scott was born in Yuma, Arizona on August 31st. He lived a totally different life growing up in Yuma than he does now. Scott lived in Yuma, but everything was more rural than urban, he was a real "outdoorsey" type. He is one of three children in his family, he has a younger sister and one older brother who is now deceased. Scott's parents divorced when he was eleven years old. His mother now lives in Phoenix and has accepted Scott as he is. Scott says that his most rewarding moment on stage was when his mother was at the performance when he did a rendition of "I Am Your Lady". His mother broke out in tears as the words to the song seemed to relate to their life together and it touched her deeply.

Scott began doing female impersonations in Phoenix about two years ago. His greatest backer was Penelope Poupe who encouraged him and taught him a lot. The costumes Scott wears now are still a reflection of Penelope's tastes. Scott has had

no professional training for the stage, but he did study with a modeling school in Phoenix which helps with his stage appearance. His costumes he buys at local stores on the "lay away" plan but for his comedy numbers he usually buys at thrift stores.

"Being Miss Gay Tucson is important to me", says Scott. "Not necessarily for the title but for my involvement with the community. I want to be a part of the community. Two of my closest friends are also running and my greatest fear is that the pageant might pull us apart. If I am not the winner, then I will give my full support to who does one."

Good luck to you Scott Cole/Tabatha Scott. We will be looking for you up in the front row.

The title of this column actually has nothing to do with the column itself. It just happens that I really enjoy the sound of the word...

Things are a bit slow this past week, so I thought I would review a few facts and bits of stuff with you. Okay?

A couple of weeks ago I reviewed the new film *PRICK UP YOUR EARS*, by director Stephen Frears. The film opens in Scottsdale this Friday, May 22. I hope you make plans to see it. The day I saw the film in Los Angeles, *THE HOLLYWOOD REPORTER* came out with its weekly look at box office grosses, and *PRICK UP YOUR EARS* was number 31, up from number 40, the week before. As of May 5, the film had been in release for only two weeks, and had grossed \$201,313 on only 5 screens nationwide. The manager of the Westside Pavilion cinemas in Los Angeles, Greg Truman, told me that the film had been very popular over the previous weekend—and they were showing the film on two screens.

Way back on November 5, 1986 I told you about a new Gay-themed film, *THE FRONT RUNNER*, based on the novel by PATRICIA WARREN. It's about a college track coach who becomes attracted to his star runner. Olympian GREG LOUGANIS is part of the cast, as is GRANT SNOW and MATT LATTANZI. However, the lead of the film has still to be cast. Apparently the big name stars who have been asked to play the lead are squeamish about playing a homosexual. The paperback book rights to the novel have just been purchased by the New American Library, planning a tie-

in when the film (if the film) is eventually released. The 1975 novel was a big seller going into 17 printings, and 5 million copies.

An article in the newspapers on May 9 carried a bit about Denmark banning discrimination against homosexuals saying the move is needed to "protect Gays at a time of increased concern about the deadly disease AIDS". The Swedish Parliament will consider, later this month, a similar law which would also grant homosexual couples all the privileges of a common-law marriage. Way to go!

And what about recently deceased nine-term Congressman Stewart McKinney who died from AIDS. The official first-word said he contracted the disease from surgery, but the next day, the story was that he had "homosexual encounters". It was reported that his wife "didn't deny" the reports. Apparently, Congressman McKinney had said he wanted the cause of his death to be known to help draw attention to AIDS. A bit odd that he didn't want his "homosexual encounters" known, too. It could have been a great boost to the cause of Gay Civil Rights.

Lastly, I picked up two great books when in Los Angeles recently—I got them because they are strangely not anywhere to be found in my neck of the woods... They are *GAY AMERICAN HISTORY*, by Jonathan Katz. The 1976 book, published by Harper and Row, is an extensive look at the history of Lesbians and Gay men in the USA. Filled with documented information, the book is a must for all

personal libraries.

Then, there is *THE GAY BOOK OF DAYS*, by Martin Greif. Published by Lyle Stuart, Inc. This book is a factual/gossipy look at famous birthdays and dates of important events involving those who "May have been, probably was, and almost certainly seems to have been Gay". (I know the tense is a bit off in that last quote, but bear with me, okay?)

That's the view from here. See you next week!
