TUCSON: A Gay History (Part One)

The history of Gay Tucson and Arizona is a fairly easy essay after the year 1977 when a regular weekly newspaper actually kept the 'Gay Diary' from which to cull. Before that date, however, is quite another story. OBSERVER is publishing this history, but it is not intended as entirely accurate before the year 1977. Persons who are familiar with Tucson, Phoenix or Arizona before that time, and who can give information concerning activities, bars, meeting places, clubs, organizations, etc., is encouraged to please come forward so that this 'history' can be made complete and placed in some archive for future generations.

There are some trivial items noted here as well as some very important ones. While attempting to be primarily a History of Tucson, there are some national notes as well since they affect everyone in the country. There are also notes on activities from Phoenix and other Arizona cities as they also reflect our local scene.

OBSERVER hopes that this part one of "Tucson/Arizona: A Gay History" will be of interest and will spark some of the older Gays and Lesbians in our communities to give us additional information so that we can complete our history.

Part two of this history will be forthcoming within the next month. There promises to be at least six parts, plus catching up on the years prior to 1976. Your help is encouraged.

THIS PORTION OF TUCSON HISTORY HAS BEEN CONSTRUCTED FROM MEMORIES OF VARIOUS PEOPLE WHO HAVE WRITTEN TO THE NEWSPAPER OR WHO VERBALLY COMMUNICATED SUCH INFORMATION:

Jim's, located at 23 W. University was opened in 1965. Jim O'Malley and George Rederus sold it to Bruce Stratton in 1969 and the place was renamed Kumu's and operated as a straight bar when it was sold to Don Nelson on the 19th of January 1970 he renamed it The Graduate

HISTORY OF TUCSON BEGINS WITH JUNE 1975 ISSUE OF THE POST.

BARS IN AREA INCLUDED:

Graduate, Stonewall and River 'R', 3686 E. Speedway. P.S. Club opened in September 1975 by George Rederus as a private after hours club.

First annual Gay Fair and Carnival at Stonewall over July 4th, 1975. Patio open on March 15, 1976 during a freak snowstorm. Patio was called Stonyhook.

Tucson Gay Coalition was founded in April 1976. Founders were Carmine Cardamone and Al DeLabio. It was the first organized Gay political organization in Tucson. The Gay Students Organization (GSO) on the University of Arizona campus and the Metropolitan Community Church were the only other two organizations operating at this time.

On June 6, 1976, 21-year-old Richard Beakin, a visitor from Lincoln, Nebraska was fatally beaten as he was leaving the Stonewall bar. Four young men, who were part of a larger group of high school-aged youths, were subsequently arrested in connection with the death.

FROM VOL. 1 ISSUE 1 (Sept. 29, 1976) OF TUCSON GAY NEWSLETTER:

Bars and clubs in Tucson were: Graduate (Dale Yount), Stonewall (Tom Seward and John Morgan with Rick Norman DJ), Lucky Pierre's (John Richtars), the P.S. Club (George Rederus), and the Back Door Baths (Lloyd Wilson). Jekyll's and Hyde's opened on Labor Day at 1455 N. Miracle Mile owned by Ed Persellin. Gay Community Services was in operation with Norman Blosas as Director. Hair Tiz bar (Polly Stadelman and David Pepin) opens where the old Black Door was in the MacArthur Hotel downtown. The Black Door which was owned by Jean and John Gartley, opened in the early 1950's and closed as the Black Door in early 1976.

10/6/1976 - Police liaison begins with Officers Ken Magoch and Mark Thomas making the rounds at all the bars. This in response to Beakin murder at Stonewall, to cool community's anger.

10/13/1976 - Buff Fisher takes over as Pastor of MCC/Tucson.

10/20/1976 - Judge Ben C. Birdsell grants probation to Beakin murderers. Because of the youths ages, they were tried as juvenile offenders. Despite testimony to the

A fitting photograph, especially with Pride Week '87 upon us. In addition, the beginning of part one of "Tucson: A Gay History" in this issue, the above photo is particularly interesting. Although the number attending the picnic each year has grown by about 2000 people, it gives credence to the slogan so often used that "We are not going away!"

TUCSON - The 10th Annual Lesbian/Gay Pride Picnic will be held this Sunday, June 21 from Noon to dusk at Himmel Park in the Northeast corner Bandshell area as in the past. This year's event promises to be the biggest ever.

Last year over 2,000 persons attended the event throughout the afternoon hours enjoying the music and dancing, cruising, food and refreshments. It is expected that the number of those attending will increase sharply because of the number of new arrivals in the Old Pueblo, plus the fact that the Pride Rally was held in Phoenix last Sunday, June 14, with no formal Pride Week activities this weekend. So, come on out and enjoy a wonderful afternoon in Himmel Park with your friends. There is plenty of shade.

Music for the major part of the afternoon will be played by one of Tucson's foremost DJ's Bobbie Bishop, Jr., from Joshua Tree. There will be other guest DJ's throughout the afternoon. Domino Theory, the popular local band will be playing live for listening and dancing. Loren Johnson, from Phoenix, will sing live; Jim Shafer, Tucson's local baritone, will sing, plus other local talent is scheduled throughout the afternoon. Mostly it will be fun and dancing, volleyball and fun, refreshments and fun. There will be some short political and informational

statements from visiting dignitaries. Governor Mechem will not attend.

30 kegs of beer, up six kegs from last year's supply, will be offered no charge to those who show proper age identification. There will also be free soft drinks available. There will be food booths plus informational tables set up around the perimeter by various organizations and clubs. One of the more important will be a voter-registration table where everyone who is not registered, can sign up now in preparation for the Mechem Recall effort which begins in July.

As in the past, bartenders for the dispensing of beer will be supplied by the local Gay bars. In order of time, they are:

2:00 to 3:00 - Colette's Nest
3:00 to 4:00 - Joshua Tree
4:00 to 5:00 - Rumor Bar
5:00 to 6:00 - IGT's
6:00 to DUSK - TIGA

There is no need to reserve space for booths or tables. Anyone can set up a table and it's on a first come, best space available basis. If you plan on selling merchandise (food, crafts, etc.) you must have a permit to sell. If you plan on an informational or donation booth, there is no permit necessary.

SMALLPOX VACCINE TIED TO AIDS

The 'Times' of London' reported last month on the possibility that the AIDS epidemic may have been caused by 'the mass vaccination campaign which eradicated smallpox'.

In a story written by Times' science writer Pearce Wright, it was reported that the World Health Organization (WHO) is currently studying evidence that immunization with the smallpox vaccine "Vaccinia" may have awakened the "unsuspected, dormant human immuno defence virus infection". The article which appeared May 11, 1987, quoted an advisor to the WHO as saying, "I thought it was just coincidence until we studied the latest findings about the reactions which can be caused by Vaccinia. Now I believe the smallpox vaccine theory is the explanation to the explosion of AIDS."

One case which would seem to support this theory was given. It concerned an otherwise healthy, non-high-risk group 19-year-old male who was inoculated during a routine military vaccination. Two and a half weeks later, the young man developed symptoms of AIDS infection, and died a short time later. Due to this and other evidence, many doctors now accept the smallpox theory, and say it answers many questions which otherwise were unanswerable, including how the AIDS organism, previously considered "weak, slow and, vulnerable" began to behave "like a (virus) capable of creating a plague."

The World Health Organization recently dismissed this theory "on grounds of unsatisfactory evidence."

The smallpox vaccine was given routinely to all children until 1971, when it was discontinued. In 1967, the WHO began a world-wide eradication plan to wipe out the smallpox infection. In 1970, 17 countries reported cases of smallpox infection; in 1973 only 6 countries. In May 1980, the WHO announced the eradication of smallpox.

The smallpox virus now exists only in labs, and is not known to exist naturally anywhere in the world.

ANNUAL PRIDE PICNIC THIS SUNDAY JUNE 21, HIMMEL PARK AT NOON

Recreation rules specify no liquor, no wine, no drugs, and no glass containers in any of its parks, this means Himmel Park on Sunday also, and these rules will be enforced by TLGA security.

The Tucson Lesbian/Gay Alliance (TLGA) has planned this event for the past four months, and have put a lot of effort into ensuring that everything comes off smoothly. There will be security people, identified by a colorful armband throughout the Bandshell area of the park. If any problem is encountered, contact one of them to resolve the problem. There will be first-aid people at the TLGA tables.

Because of the ultra successful fundraising efforts of TLGA this year, there has been no need to ask for funding from any of the Gay oriented business as has happened in the past. All refreshments, all prize monies, all costs related to the picnic or other TLGA sponsored events throughout the week have been absorbed by TLGA. TLGA is passing the money raised, back to the community as a means for the community, along with their supportive friends, to set this week aside to celebrate their being Lesbian and Gay.

The picnic area, while centered around the bandshell area covers several acres and is in essence the entire northeast corner of Himmel Park, near the Library building located one block south of Speedway Boulevard, between Tucson Boulevard and Treat Avenue. There will be plenty of flags and balloons to identify the area. 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Tucson AIDS Project awarded \$25,000 by Tucson City Council

TUCSON - In response to a grant request for salaries for staff positions, the Tucson City Council awarded \$25,000 to the Tucson AIDS Project (TAP) at its meeting June 15. "Although the amount was less than the \$66,700 we had requested, we are very pleased with the outcome," said TAP board member, Craig Snow. "The grant will allow TAP to hire full time staff in order to manage the increasing workload more effectively than is possible with a totally volunteer organization."

The number of clients being served by the project at one time has grown to 32 compared to 9 one year ago, Snow said. The award is significant because it indicates that the City Council is concerned about AIDS, about the needs of people with AIDS, and about the people who might avoid infection because of exposure to TAP educational programs.

The award also represents a turning point in TAP's development, according to board member, Bob Henry. At a retreat held in January, the TAP Core Group recommended a change in TAP's structure to include paid staff to provide better continuity, coordination and supervision as the demand for services increases. During the next few months, a dynamic fundraising committee was organized who explored numerous possibilities including preparation of the application to the City Council.

Concurrently, TAP developed a board with a broad-base in Tucson in order to enhance its funding potential and to increase community input to decision making.

At its annual meeting held June 11, TAP membership elected

Howard Barron, Marshall Burke PhD, Guillermina Contreras-Arriola, Shannon Davis, Kathleen Erickson, Pam McNair, Eskild Petersen MD, Sue Rusch RN, and Tom Wilson to its board. Henry and Snow, who had served previously as Co-Directors, were also elected to the board. Henry stated that he anticipates one of the first actions of the new board will be to recruit and hire an executive director using the grant money from City Council.

Entertainment Review

Fresh on the heels of controversy at CBS NEWS, a new insider book comes out. Written by former CBS NEWS President Bill Leonard, "IN THE STORM OF THE EYE: A Lifetime At CBS" tells about the behind-the-scenes formation of one of the big-three networks.

Dotted with anecdotes, and fascinating stories, "IN THE STORM OF THE EYE" is a wonderful read for anyone interested in what goes on in preparation for election night; how Dan Rather really became the anchor of the CBS NIGHTLY NEWS; the formation of one of the most brilliant shows on television, SIXTY MINUTES; the early days of radio talk shows; and all about bobbing for apples at Grand Central Station in New York.

The only obvious fault with this otherwise compelling book is the lack of biting stories about Leonard's contemporaries. Where is the vicious, inconsiderate DAN RATHER we've heard so much about? Not in this book. One senses Leonard's attempts to step lightly around the controversy which crops up so often in the daily newspapers. Otherwise a wonderful book, "IN THE STORM OF THE EYE" is wonderful history.



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
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Dance to your requests

This past weekend, Tucson was invaded by an electrifying personality from West Hollywood. For those of you who missed the show at either Colette's on Saturday night or at IBT's on Sunday night, you'll have to listen to those who did see the show. I was lucky enough to see the show at IBT's.

The show was scheduled to start at 8:30 p.m. - but true to Tucson's starting times, the show got underway at 9:10 p.m. There must have been some "word of mouth" advertising from Colette's because IBT's was filled to capacity. I even ran into Colette and Bob Ellis who were back for more.

The lead-off number was performed by our own Miss Tucson III, Tabitha Scott. Tabitha is improving with her performances, all of her numbers went smoothly and Tabitha seemed more sure of herself than in previous shows. The only fault with her performances was during her first number when the wig was removed. This has a great effect on the audience, but the "shock" becomes less shocking when done too early in the number. This bit of theatrics would be more effective if done at the end of the number.

Grace Jonz followed with her initial performance, which was breathtaking with her costume consisting mainly of chains and hand-cuffs. Her bare breasts were, believe me, eye-openers. The lip-sync and staging approached perfection. Her following numbers were equally entertaining but were not quite the sensation of the first rendition.

Felicia is another fine entertainer in her own rights. The first number was well executed and she held the audience captive. After the performance by Grace

Jonz, I was expecting a 'let-down' but Felicia kept the pace and there was no disappointment. The other numbers performed by Felicia were also entertaining. She followed Grace Jonz throughout the show and each number was equally well done.

Jamie De Sario gave an unparalleled performance in her renditions and again gave proof why she is Miss Gay Arizona II. Her renditions were good, her costumes outstanding and her stage appearance was flawless. Her one number, "Nasty Girl" let the audience know how versatile this entertainer is. She let everyone have it right between the eyes, especially those who were 'entertained' individually.

The show, as a whole, was well-paced, evenly balanced and the evening was enjoyable. The lighting and sound, which is very important with lip-sync, was well executed.

HRCF in top twenty PACs

WASHINGTON, DC - A May 19 report from the Federal Elections Commission, overseer of the nation's more than 4,500 political action committees, has formally ranked the Human Rights Campaign Fund as the 16th largest independent PAC in the United States.

The report also listed the Campaign Fund as the 39th largest PAC overall. "Independent" PAC's are those not affiliated with a parent organization.

"I think a lot of people — both inside and out of our community — are going to be surprised at the news," said executive director Vic Basile. "We have clearly become a big league PAC, which means the Gay and Lesbian community has increasing power in American politics."

The campaign Fund achieved its ranking by raising more than \$1.4 million during the 1986 election cycle, enough to put it in the top 1% of PAC fundraisers nationwide. During the same period, the Campaign Fund increased its giving power by an average of 26%, with more than \$250,000 going to 112 campaigns.

"This means we have recognizable clout in the election and in the legislative process of this country," said Basile. "For better or for worse, politics in

this country responds to money, and politicians now know they had better respond to our community."

The tremendous growth in Campaign Fund fundraising is attributed to a broadening level of support from the national Gay and Lesbian community. More than 18,000 people contribute to the Campaign Fund annually, giving it the largest donor base of any Gay organization in the country.

"Inasmuch as our fundraising gives us power, I'm happy to see us ranked this high," said Basile. "But the bottom line for the Campaign Fund is not dollars — it's enacting our legislative agenda on Capitol Hill. Being in the top 1% is a key part of that effort, but it isn't the ultimate goal. But thanks to our supporters, that goal is closer than ever."

The Human Rights Campaign Fund is the nation's only Gay political action committee which contributes to candidates running for the U.S. House and Senate who support increased federal funding for AIDS education and treatment, and Gay and Lesbian civil rights.

The Campaign Fund recently hired three new lobbyists to help increase their lobbying efforts on AIDS. "Lobbyists give this community strong and visible presence on Capitol Hill at times when our involvement is so crucial," said Basile.

Diverse groups contribute to M.O.W.

WASHINGTON, DC — Over \$30,000 has been pledged to the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights by Gay and non-Gay groups. The March will be held on October 11, 1987 in Washington. To date, nearly one-half of the pledged amounts have been donated by over a dozen national Gay, feminist and progressive organizations.

"The support shown for the March by Lesbian and Gay civil rights, religious and AIDS-service organizations has been critical to the National March effort," noted national staff-person, Lee Bush. "We were very excited when the first sizeable contribution of \$500 came in from Black and White Men Together. Then the National Organization for Women gave us an immediate \$2000 followed by \$2000 from National Gay Rights Advocates and pledges for \$2000 from the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and Human Rights Campaign Fund, we knew that diverse organizations were making a powerful statement about our need to march for Lesbian and Gay rights."

The budget for the national March planning totals over \$300,000 and includes expenses such as outreach, staging and sound, printing, office rent and phones. Regional and local March organizing committees must also raise substantial amounts of money to subsidize travel and to help promote the March on local levels. The national office is not in debt and plans to hire its second full-time staff person.

Other organizations which have made pledges of or have already given \$2000 include: Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches, National AIDS Network, Dignity, Lambda Legal Defense Fund, Gay Men's Health Crisis (NYC). Christopher Street West (LA) has given \$10,000 to the national March committee and several thousand to the Southern California region.

10/30/1976 - Imperial Court of Tucson is inaugurated as Empress I Cicely is crowned at Jekyll's before a crowd estimated at 600 persons. Emperor Contest to be held in January with the simultaneous investiture of the Court de Tucson.

11/17/1976 - Stonewall celebrates 4th anniversary Glenn Thomas chosen Mr. Tucson at Stonewall. Bud Sherrick is operations manager at Jekyll's.

11/24/1976 - Mike Heimbuch and Mitchell Bunting open Bookland at 3244 E. Speedway.

12/1/1976 - Adrian, Empress I de Arizona honored for 30 years as female impersonator at Graduate. Big George hired as bouncer at Jekyll's. Lucky Pierre's Cocktail Hour Prices were .40 well, .25 draft and .40 bottle beer.

12/15/1976 - 2nd annual Hayride to Winterhaven from Stonewall. H.E. Bar opens (Bill and Barbara), 1906 S. Craycroft. GCS moves to a building at 627 N. 7th Ave.

1/5/1977 - Due to failing business because of Heakin murder, Stonewall bar closes, Back Pocket bar remains open. Lucky Pierre's changes hands. Roger Barger begins bartending at Graduate.

1/19/1977 - Grand Opening of Hair Tiz

2/4/1977 - First issue of Arizona Gay News in tabloid form. Fernando Ochoa crowned Emperor I of the Empire of Tucson. First Court Included Fernando, Empress -I Cicely, Grand Duchess I Mahogany; Lord Prime Minister Bud Sherrick. Coronation ceremonies were held at Jekyll's and Hyde's.

2/11/1977 - With the Tucson Gay Coalition spearheading the drive, the Tucson City Council passed by unanimous vote, an amendment banning discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations based on sexual or affectional preference and/or marital status. The amendment is part of the Human Right Ordinance passed previously.

2/18/1977 - Lucky Pierre's closed and the club put up for sale. Kay Elledge, owner of Kaye's Happy Landing in Phoenix died of cancer. The Landing was under Kaye's ownership for some 25 years and was one of the first Gay bars in the state of Arizona.

3/11/1977 - Old Stonewall changes name to Joshua Tree and opened on March 9, with some major decor changes at same address. Polly Stadelman, Dave Peppin and Norman Bross announced that they had purchased the MacArthur Hotel which houses the Hair Tiz bar. The hotel was built in 1909 as the Heidel Hotel and changed to MacArthur during WWII.

3/24/1977 - First VD clinic opens at GCS community center on March 28, in conjunction with Pima County Health Department.

3/31/1977 - Large contingent of Gay Tucsonans ride bus furnished by Jekyll's to go to State Capitol Senate hearing on revised criminal code. Over 600 in total attendance.

4/7/1977 - Gay Film Forum sponsored by the Tucson Public Library and funded by the Arizona Council on the Humanities was held at Rincon High School April 14.

4/21/1977 - Steve Rau was voted Royal Baby at the Graduate. P.S. Club moving from Ft. Lowell address to the MacArthur Hotel downtown.

5/12/1985 - Front Runner opens May 16, where old Lucky Pierre's was on Stone Avenue (Currently Rumor Bazzit). David Sperry and Larry Altherr managers. P.S. Club reopens as Toole Box in MacArthur Hotel May 13, George Rederus operator. First Annual Mother's Weekend sponsored by Mother Johnny Lorton.

5-19-1977 - First Fundraiser for Anti-Anita Bryant forces held May 10. Ed Persellin sold Jekyll's and Hyde's to Joel Maisano and Bernie Busfield. Club to change name to Jekyll's Last Culture. AGN moved into MacArthur Hotel office.

5/26/1977 - Gay volleyball league forms in Tucson. Court de Tucson returns from San Diego Coronation of Emperor and Empress VI.

6/2/1977 - Anita Bryant Roast at Joshua Tree nets \$565.85. Front Runner Grand Opening, show had Moosala, Woo-Hoo, Casandra, Dani Reid and Moose.

6/9/1977 - Dade County Ordinance repealed by Anita Bryant Forces.

6/16/1977 - Mr. Fatfingers and Forum Boardwalk open in Phoenix. First Christian Church of Tucson barred MCC/Tucson the use of their facility. MCC continues to meet at Truth Chapel, 920 N. 1st Ave. Police arrests in Himmel Park in increase.






WHAT GOOD ARE TESTS?

On June 8, the Phoenix Gazette newspaper released results of a telephone poll conducted between May 12 - 18, 1987. The survey asked 1,001 Arizonans their opinions regarding testing for AIDS. The results show the lack of good information about the disease, and flies in the face of all the medical experts tell us.

To the question, "Should a blood test to detect the AIDS virus be a requirement of obtaining a marriage license?" an extremely surprisingly large amount answered "yes": 82%. This result shows that education about AIDS is desperately needed, and obviously not reaching those who need it.

I am still puzzled as to exactly what good a pre-marital test for AIDS would do. Consider these points: No current blood test is perfect. In fact, many companies using results from tests have been criticized for not double-testing every positive result. Costly, yes, but current estimates say up to 5-7% of all positive results are false-positive, meaning a blood sample with no AIDS antibodies present is tested positive — an error.

Let's assume, then, that our pre-marital couple have been tested, and the results come back negative for each. (Remember that if a sample can falsely test positive, it can also falsely test negative: a situation which has indeed occurred in more than a few instances). Our happy Dick and Jane marry, then topple into bed to consummate their union. Six months later Jane begins having night sweats, fever and vomiting. She's taken to the hospital where she dies 72 hours later. Well, at least... she took the pre-marital blood test....

(Remember also that it can take anywhere up to four months, it is estimated, for the presence of AIDS antibodies to show up after a person has been infected).

Then of course, we have the obvious: if you want to avoid testing, avoid getting married — or at least avoid marriage in Arizona. Las Vegas is geographically right-around-the-corner, as is Los Angeles, and New Mexico. Some big deterrent pre-marital testing is to the spread of AIDS.

Also, we hear the argument: Well, pre-marrieds were tested for syphilis for years, why is AIDS any different? Aside from the many differences, this is the 1980s, not the dark ages. Once, Ingrid Bergman was virtually forced to leave the country when she was discovered to be having an affair with someone other than her husband. Today, people left and right are having each other's children with nothing more than an understanding keeping them together.

In other words, people will

First Ladies Brotherhood Weekend

A fee of \$30 will cover the entire weekend. This fee will include dinner on Friday night, breakfast, lunch dinner and show

happily live together thereby bypassing the AIDS test altogether. (Just for the sake of argument, we will overlook the fact that "co-habitation" is still illegal in Arizona... Just thought you'd be interested in that little fact).

Going back to the Gazette survey. It is surprising that 71% classified themselves as either Protestant or Roman Catholic. Not to be too rude, the church is not what I would call very intelligent on this whole AIDS matter. Let us not forget that for quite a long while, AIDS was a "Plague visited upon homosexuals from God." Remember? That dirty little lie was not begun by a group of atheists, I'll tell you that for sure. The church's stand is to ignore the truth and allow their congregations to blissfully walk through life, then wonder why —after they get AIDS— God was punishing them.

But, back to the survey: 24% also said it was a good idea to test for AIDS as part of getting a driver's license. Another brilliant idea. Then, too, 22% said names of those who test positive for AIDS should be publicly disclosed. I would love to be there when one of them got a positive result for AIDS —just to see their face light up as the press gleefully ran to the pay-phone to phone their names into the newspaper for inclusion in the next edition. Yes, what I would give to be a fly on that wall.

Alright, I'm through with my complaining for now. But before we part this week, let me offer a few solutions. (I cannot abide people who complain about something without offering some suggestion as a counter-idea).

Instead of wasting money testing, spend that money on education. Education in the Gay community has already proven helpful. Evidence in San Francisco has shown the number of new cases among Gay men to be dropping off. More new cases come from intravenous drug users than any other high-risk group.

Then the rest of the money should be spent on making new drugs available to persons afflicted with AIDS. Stop wasting all this time on useless testing of the new drugs. I am sick of this line about "Well, we don't know about the possible side-effects..." Big deal! If I was dying of AIDS —which is so far sporting a 100% mortality rate— I would suffer through some inconvenient side-effects if there was even the slightest chance this new drug would help me.

We should stop all this talk about blood tests, and get to the heart of the matter: education of everybody, and research for treatment and cures.

That's the view from here! See you next week.

FRIENDS:

On behalf of the 5,000 members of the Lesbian and Gay Caucus of the New Alliance Party nationally, I am writing to protest the exclusion of the New Alliance Party (NAP) from a delegate seat at the recent meeting held in Los Angeles of the National Steering Committee of the March on Washington. Not only was the New Alliance Party the only organization denied access in this way, but our exclusion was accompanied by an unprincipled attack on the integrity of the Caucus by members of the National Steering Committee.

As a member of the steering committee or as a Lesbian or Gay activist involved with the March, you no doubt agree that this unfortunate episode calls into question your commitment to the inclusion of all Lesbians and Gay men, especially Lesbians and Gay men of color, a commitment made at the initial March meeting in New York, a meeting I was proud to attend as a representative of the Lesbian and Gay Caucus.

During the fight over whether NAP should be seated as a legitimate, national organization, one national Lesbian leader was heard saying that NAP's understanding of homosexuality as a political choice (a lifestyle decision that is the right of all Americans) was "antithetical to the beliefs of the people represented in the room". I can only presume she was referring to the National Steering Committee. I am deeply alarmed that her statement has gone unchallenged by other members of the Steering Committee. However, since the Committee is diverse, and made up of many different political organizations, I hope you will take this opportunity to publicly clarify whether you in fact agree with her statement, a statement

which argues that a progressive and political definition of homosexuality has no place in our movement.

All this said, we are not writing you simply because NAP has been excluded but because this exclusion represents a continuation of a fight that has been brewing in National March discussions for many months now. In talking with leaders of the Black and progressive communities about the Los Angeles meeting, there is a shared perception that the exclusion of NAP is just one more attempt to undermine the New York mandate to make this March a multi-issue event, fully representative of the needs and demands of all oppressed peoples, including the broad spectrum of people within the Gay movement. For to capitulate for even a moment to the call by some for a return to a single-issue March, that is, a march that is representative of Gay rights in the most narrow sense of those words, is to ignore the long history of politics in this country where a single issue orientation has been used as little more than a racist attack on the Black community, whose organizations and demands have historically been multi-issue, concerned with the liberation of all human beings oppressed in this most racist of countries.

This is the actual history of single issue vs. multi-issue organizing and I strongly urge you, both personally and as a representative of the National March, to step forward and guarantee that this March does everything it must do to give voice to a broad range of concerns and project in strong and militant fashion the diversity and progressivism of the national Gay community.

We would be the first to agree that there are many disagreements on how to empower Lesbians and Gay men, but we would

all surely agree that the solution to these disagreements cannot be the sectarian exclusion of progressive Lesbian and Gay organizations, organizations which represent Lesbians and Gay men of color, or Gay organizations who for whatever reason have gained notoriety because of their commitment to fighting for Gay rights. If this is our position it is a sad statement of how little our movement has to be proud of at a time when the Right Wing in this country is waiting in the wings to prey on those we leave behind because we failed to achieve progressive unity.

I have enclosed a copy of the National Alliance, a national independent newspaper, which contains a reprint of two talks, one by Barbara Smith, the nationally known Black Lesbian activist and the other by Dr. Lenora Fulani, National Coordinator of the Women of Color Caucus of NAP, which were presented at the 3rd Annual Blacks and Gays Conference held in New York recently. I think you'll find Dr. Fulani's talk particularly enlightening. Also included in this issue is a personal response to the fight in Los Angeles by Alvaader Frazier, a prominent Black Lesbian attorney and long-time activist in the Gay community. I'm eager to hear your response to both, and urge you to use these articles to open up this very important dialogue among your organizations, friends and colleagues.

Between Two Deserts is a window on a troubled land in troubled times, a chronicle told from the points-of-view of all parties to the conflict—Muslims, Christians and Jews.


