

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

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Feds charge Boston cops in Gay bar shakedowns

BOSTON, MA (UPI) - A federal grand jury has brought a fifty-eight count indictment against three current and four former members of the Boston Police Department. Nineteen of the fifty-eight counts involve extortion from Gay establishments. Sources close to the situation say they expect many more officers, and at least one member of the Boston Fire Department will be indicted before the FBI investigation is completed.

The Grand Jury indictment resulted from a six-year federal investigation prompted by complaints about police officers who solicited bribes and harassed owners of Gay establishments.

According to the indictment, the seven police officers extorted substantial amounts of cash and property from bar managers and owners. In return the police officers offered to overlook violations, provide police protection and not harass the clubs. In total, the officers illegally collecting more than \$200,000, according to the indictment.

Joseph D'Onofrio, the former manager of the Gay after-hours club, the Loft, said Gay bars are "sitting ducks" for corrupt police officers. "Gay establishments are traditionally... the easiest victims," said D'Onofrio. "No one will come to the aid of Gay people. Most people would rather believe police officers than Gay people."

Joseph McGowan, a partner of the Gay bar, The 1270, gave at least \$8,200 to five police officers between December 1982 and August 1985, according to the indictment. McGowan told reporters that he was proud to have cooperated with the FBI in

their investigation. McGowan's conversations with the accused police officers were reportedly secretly recorded for the FBI. McGowan would neither confirm nor deny these reports.

Investigators also allege police officer Matthew Kilroe blocked a Boston Licensing Commission hearing regarding an alleged rape of a woman at The 1270.

Norman Chaletzky, the owner of the now-closed Gay bar, the Boston Eagle, and a partner in The 1270, paid at least \$3,000 to officers, according to the indictment.

The Loft, which operated from 1977 to 1985, was plagued by police harassment shortly after opening. The club was frequently raided by the now-defunct Boston Vice Squad.

Two of those who were indicted were part of the vice squad and took part in the Loft raids. According to D'Onofrio, who was a partner and manager of the Loft, nearly all of the men who were indicted harassed the Loft at one time. D'Onofrio identified police officer Francis X. Sheehan as the mastermind behind the operation.

During the last Loft raid, which took place in October 1985, police officers destroyed the club: walls were kicked in, wires were hacksawed and sound equipment was destroyed.

Not too long before the club opened, "we figured out that [Sheehan and another officer Thomas Connolly] were looking for money," said D'Onofrio. "It was well known that we were not going to pay anyone - our attorneys made it clear."

D'Onofrio and Paul Cadoret,

also a partner in the Loft, believe their failure to pay the officers resulted in harassment by the police. D'Onofrio said police officers took at least \$100,000 during raids in the eight year history of the Loft. Tens of thousands of dollars of property, liquor and soda were also confiscated by the police, he added. D'Onofrio and Cadoret also said Sheehan even threatened to kill their dog.

D'Onofrio estimated between 40 and 50 police officers were involved in the Loft raids. "Paul and I and a lot of people who worked at the Loft waited ten years to see some of these people arrested," he said. "We look forward to seeing the prosecution of hundreds of others who benefited by, cooperated with, and protected by these people."

The indicted officers pleaded innocent to all charges in U.S. District Court. They were released on \$100,000 unsecured bond and are scheduled for a January 11 trials. Some of the counts carry penalties of up to 20 years in prison and \$250,000 fines.

976/676 lines draw Commission ire

PHOENIX (AP) - The Arizona Corporation Commission staff is urging the commission to limit or abolish the pay-per-call and pay-per-minute Scoopline service offered through Mountain Bell Telephone Company officials propose lesser restrictions.

The telephone company said it was willing to ban use of Scoopline for pornography and to reduce rates for customers who want to prevent any Scoopline

calls from the residence.

But Wayne Rueter, the commission's utilities division head, said in a memo that commissioners should consider limiting or abolishing the lines which have prefixes of 976 in Phoenix and 676 in Tucson, marketed by Mountain Bell.

Rueter said his staff has received numerous complaints about:

- * Minors having unrestricted access to sexually explicit and obscene conversations.

- * Complaints by parents that some children have racked up thousands of dollars worth of calls in a single month.

- * Claims that some providers have failed to disclose charges or have given misleading information.

- * "Arbitrary and unfair" Mountain Bell policies towards customers who can't or won't pay for the calls.

- * High charges for residential blocking service and lack of the service for business phones.

Gus Miller, a spokesman for Mountain Bell, said the company now charges \$8.50 for installation of a residential block and \$1 per month thereafter but proposes to offer blocking services for free for the first 60 days, with a one-time-only charge of \$8.50 thereafter.

In addition to reducing its charges for residential blocking, Miller said the company's proposal would have it give providers of obscene or pornographic Scoopline 30 to pull their plugs.



News from MCC Tucson

CHURCH ASKS AIDS' VICTIMS

TO STAY AWAY

SAN ANTONIO, TX (AP) - A church is urging AIDS victims to stay away from services out of fear that others might be exposed to the deadly disease.

Elders of the Northside Christian Church read a statement saying, "Your elders decided not to bar anyone from attending our assemblies. But for the sake of those who could possibly be exposed, no matter how minute that possibility might be, we ask known AIDS victims to voluntarily refrain from attending our gatherings."

Dean Duncan told the San Antonio Express-News that the elders' decision was not made "without great anguish". "The decision is not set in concrete," he said.

NYC CENTER RECEIVES \$100,000 GRANT
NEW YORK, NY - The Lesbian & Gay Community Services Center has received a \$100,000 contract from the New York State Division of Alcoholism and Alcohol Abuse for a program of alcoholism prevention and intervention in the Lesbian and Gay community.

Entitled Project Connect, the program's primary objective is to expand support services to historically underserved Lesbian and Gay alcoholics in New York City and to educate the community about alcoholism.

Alcohol abuse - and substance abuse in general - occurs much more frequently among Lesbians and Gay men than in the general population, according to social scientists. They ascribe this high incidence of abuse to many factors including alienation from society, lack of family units and the central place of bars in the recreational activities of Lesbians and Gay men.

The Center developed Project Connect to confront alcohol abuse in the Gay community. The task is especially urgent now with the AIDS struggle AIDS and the understanding of the immuno-suppressive effects of alcohol. Historically, the Center's limited resources have allowed it to offer only low-cost space to the many groups serving alcoholics. Project Connect will enable the Center to expand and enhance the delivery of support services and to disseminate information.

"This program will begin to fill a long-standing prevention and education void," says Dr. Philip Spivey, the Center's chief advisor for the project. "Drinking problems are about to come out of the closet."

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

WHAT THE HOLIDAYS MEAN TO ME

Last Wednesday was Hanukkah; Friday is Christmas; One more week until 1988.

What does this repetition of the obvious matter? Well, people who know me well know I am not very fond of the holidays. Oh yes: I give presents, visit friends, send notes of holiday cheer; My problem is that the Jekyll/Hyde transformation most people undergo this time of year not only annoys me, but worries me.

For a small period of time each year —charitably, let's give them three weeks— people are all nice, and sweet, and loving: giving presents, visiting friends, saying please and thank you. The other 49 weeks in the year, they are the same old shits we have grown to know and love.

And shopping: I refuse to shop any closer than two weeks before Christmas. When people see the word "sale", they become animals, charging through crowds, grabbing, pulling, shoving. Yes, welcome the holiday spirit of good will and all that crap.

All religious connotations aside, the holidays have a special meaning —a secular meaning—which is often overlooked. (You don't have to be religious to enjoy the fun-spirit which the winter holidays embody). The holidays have come to represent a traditional time when families get together, when people take pause to realize the value of friends, when we all acknowledge the benefits which we enjoy, however few or meager.

Lately, however, the holidays have begun to mean material benefits. You know you are in trouble when the day after Halloween sees the stores decorated with Christmas trees and the traditional trimmings. Suddenly, Christmas has become the marketer's boon: the great majority of profits made by the stores are made during the time from Thanksgiving until the end of the year. This period of time makes or breaks a company which depends on good holiday sales.

When one shops, one is barraged by surly sales clerks who do

not even recognize the words "please" or "thank you", let alone know how to say them; fellow shoppers who care more about getting in and out of the mall than being polite, courteous, and kind. Manners and politeness are all-too-rare during the best of times; they all but disappear during the holidays.

I am not a social person during the rest of the year; to be forced to attend social events during the holidays makes me cringe: the same people who are nice to me during these social fêtes forget who I am come the New Year. The job in which I find myself rather invites two-faced persons: Nice to me when they need something; rude and curt when the tables are turned.

For me, the holidays seem to gather about them all the things which —when taken in small doses—make my stomach turn. Come winter, I feel my stomach knot as I brace to deal with the throngs of "well-wishers", and "revelers". They have no idea the true meaning of the holidays.

Christmas doesn't have a special meaning anymore. It is too commercial, almost too sterile: a game whose rules the players seem to have either forgotten, or never been taught. Politeness, respect for one another, manners, consideration: these things do not become

meaningful once the Thanksgiving turkey is put away; they exist year 'round, although you might never notice it.

Perhaps, one day, Christmas and the other winter holidays will mean a time to be thankful for the friends and advantages we have; not who gets the most gifts, or what can be bought on sale.

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


