There are several bills concerning AIDS testing that are currently being heard by various committees in the Arizona State Legislature. There is still a lot of support for people to not take the test. OBSERVER has taken the stand that one should not take the test because of the possibility of discrimination, loss of job, insurance, home, etc. If a person feels that a test is necessary, certainly do not take the test without first getting some counseling.

Presently Arizona laws do not assure confidentiality and there is little or no legislation that prevents discrimination for those who are tested, whether positive or not.

Next week we will go into more depth regarding legislation presently being considered by the Arizona State Legislature along with names and numbers of your legislative representatives who are considering such legislation. It behooves everyone in the community to be aware of what is going on in our state regarding laws and legislation on AIDS.

AIDS testing: Myth, Facts

TUCSON - Being tested for AIDS is not a simple matter.

While tests for other disorders may yield a simple yes-or-no result, the test for AIDS antibodies is not as clear-cut. And being tested has, in some cases, led to the loss of one's health insurance, job or home.

Because of the complications surrounding AIDS testing, the Tucson AIDS project and the University of Arizona Student Health Service offer counseling to those considering undergoing the procedure.

Marian E. Binder, a clinical psychologist who directs both counseling programs, said she counsels five to 10 UA students a week. At TAP, she said about three people show up each Sunday night for counseling.

The TAP telephone hotline provides counseling about AIDS testing for about 65 callers a month, TAP Executive Director Craig Snow said.

Misconceptions about AIDS testing are common, Binder said.

"A lot of people believe the test tells them if they have AIDS or not, and that's not correct," she said.

The test reveals only whether a person is carrying antibodies to the AIDS virus, Binder said. She often has to correct the assumption that if a person receives a positive test result, he or she is going to get very sick and die.

"This is not necessarily true at all," she said.

Gayle Lloyd of the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, Ga., reported that 20 to 30 percent of those who are exposed to the AIDS virus develop AIDS within five years.

Another mistaken belief is that a test result indicates whether someone is a safe sex partner.

It can take up to six months after exposure to the disease before AIDS antibodies can be detected in the blood, Binder said.

Thus it is possible that a person exposed to the virus three months prior to testing may not receive an accurate test result.

A negative test result is also meaningless as an indicator that a person is a safe sex partner if that person has had unprotected sexual activity or has shared an IV needle with someone since the test, Binder said.

At UA, Binder said, more than half of those interested in being tested believe they might have been infected during an unprotected sexual contact.

"Sometimes people seek testing immediately after an event in which they fear exposure," Binder said.

In many of these cases, Binder said, people suffer unnecessary anxiety and depression because of the mistaken belief they might have a fatal illness.

"A lot of times," she said, "when they learn about the actual transmission risk, they realize they were not at the risk they thought they were."

Counseling those who are considering being tested for AIDS antibodies always includes presenting information on transmission, Binder said.

People who may have had casual contact - a social embrace or eating at the same table - with someone who they think might be infected sometimes think they've been infected too.

The CDC's Lloyd said that of the nation's 243 million people, 1 to 1.5 million, or less than 1 percent, are believed to carry the AIDS virus.

In addition, Binder said, people need to understand that there is "a lot of discrimination against people not only who have tested positive, but also against people who have chosen to be tested at all."

In California, health insurance companies have cancelled policies of people who have tested positive for AIDS antibodies, she said. People who have tested negative also have been denied health insurance policies.

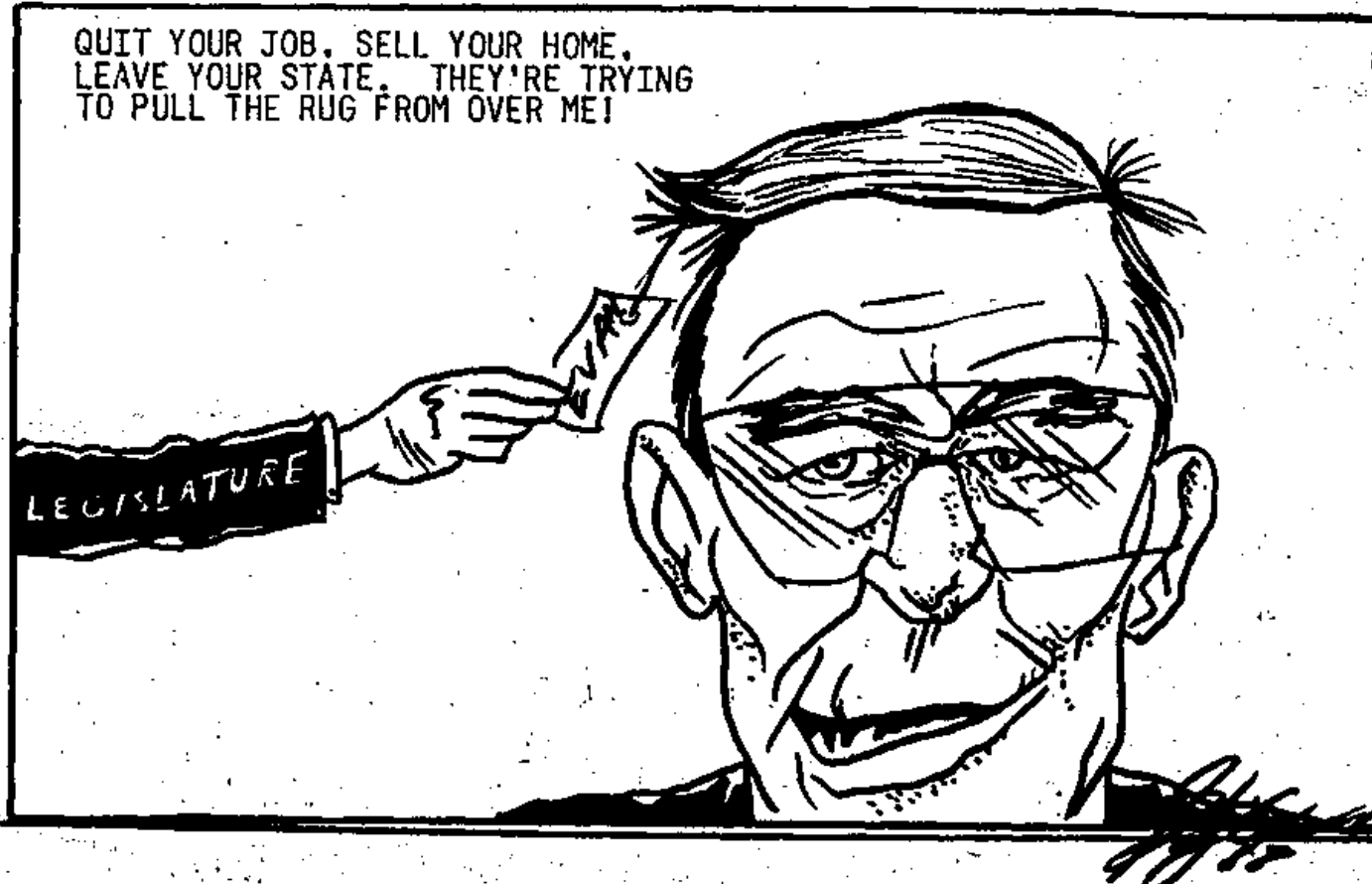
This was done, she said, "on the basis that if a person voluntarily chose to get tested, then they probably believed they were at risk."

Alice Philipson, a California attorney who specializes in AIDS cases, said that it is illegal in California for an insurance company to cancel the policy of someone who tests positive for the AIDS virus, but she routinely sues insurance companies that avoid health, life and disability payments by alleging that the AIDS conditions pre-dated the effective date of the insurance policy.

Philipson also said insurance companies also deny coverage to individuals who have simply chosen to be tested under the assumption that, "where there's smoke there must be fire." This denial of coverage, she said, also is illegal.

Paul Albert of the National Lawyers Guild AIDS Network in San Francisco said the insurance industry in California is trying to obtain a legal right to conduct AIDS antibody tests on applicants without the person's consent.

Stephanie Johns, executive assistant to the director of Arizona's state insurance department, said that in Arizona, insurance companies are permitted to ask applicants if they have been

PHOENIX - The NAMES Project, the National Memorial to the tens of thousands of Americans lost to AIDS, has confirmed the schedule for its National Tour beginning this Spring. As reported in last issue of OBSERVER, the Quilt will be on display in Phoenix April 16 and 17. The tour will actually arrive on April 14 and depart April 18.

"We are bring the Quilt to 20 of the largest American cities," said Cleve Jones, Executive Director of The NAMES Project. "The country needs a mechanism for generating money and support for people with AIDS and their loved ones."

Funds raised from the National Tour will stay in the communities in which the Quilt is displayed to support local organizations providing direct services to people with AIDS and others facing the epidemic.

"The Quilt began in the hearts and minds of the Lesbian and Gay community, yet embraces all people with AIDS and those affected by the epidemic," Jones said. "As we spread the Quilt in city after city, so we continue to spread the message of compassion and love for people with AIDS, and we look once again within our own community nationwide for support and assistance in this immense undertaking," Jones added.

In addition, this Sunday, Feb. 14, the group is sponsoring a meeting for Gay persons of color at the Joshua Tree beginning at 2:00 p.m. The meeting will consist of an open forum to discuss issues relevant to the Tucson community. The meeting will be followed by food and dancing to a variety of music.

A.S.P.S. has begun videotaping a series of Public Service Announcements that will reflect the diversity of Arizona's ethnic composition. The PSA's will be done in both Spanish and English.

diagnosed or treated for AIDS or AIDS-related conditions, but are not permitted to ask if a person has ever been tested for AIDS.

They also are not permitted to ask questions related to lifestyle or sexual preference, or whether or not a person has ever received a blood transfusion, or whether or not a person has ever been exposed to the AIDS virus.

These guidelines are preliminary, Johns said, adding that the insurance department is holding a hearing next month at which any interested parties may present their views on the guidelines.

Bider said people considering being tested also need to realize in some cases, people who have tested positive have lost their jobs and been evicted from their homes.

"We're dealing with a disease where there is a large stigma," Bider said, "and if people are going to make decisions that are healthful to their well being, they need accurate information." [Reprinted from the Tucson Citizen with permission].

NO VACATIONS FOR GAY MEN

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - National Gay Rights Advocates filed suit on Feb. 1 against a Florida and Tennessee company for not allowing Gay men to participate in a vacation sweepstakes. Vacation America and Trans World Vacations sent Ed Patrick a postcard offering him his choice of vacations to Mexico or Florida. He accepted, agreeing to listen to a sales pitch for real estate from Trans World, and payed a \$90 "processing fee".

A confirmation was mailed to Patrick, along with the "terms and conditions" of the trip. He was surprised to find that he was not eligible as the offer was open only to "married or co-habiting heterosexual couples, or two unmarried, unrelated women arriving together." When Patrick informed Vacation America that he would be traveling with his male lover of 7 years, they refused to change their terms or refund his money.

"The terms and conditions of Vacation America's offering clearly violate the Federal Fair Housing Act, and California's Unruh Civil Rights Act," said NGRA Legal Director Leonard Graff. "Since they accepted Ed's payment, but refused to let him and his lover participate in the program, we're also suing for fraud and false advertising. Vacation America's actions were intentional, malicious and oppressive, and NGRA is going to hold them accountable in court."

Ed Patrick is 33 years old, works as a baker and lives in Sebastopol, California. The suit was filed in the United States District Court in San Francisco. NGRA's cooperating attorney in the case is Sherri Conrad of the San Francisco firm of McCutchen, Doyle, Brown and Enersen.

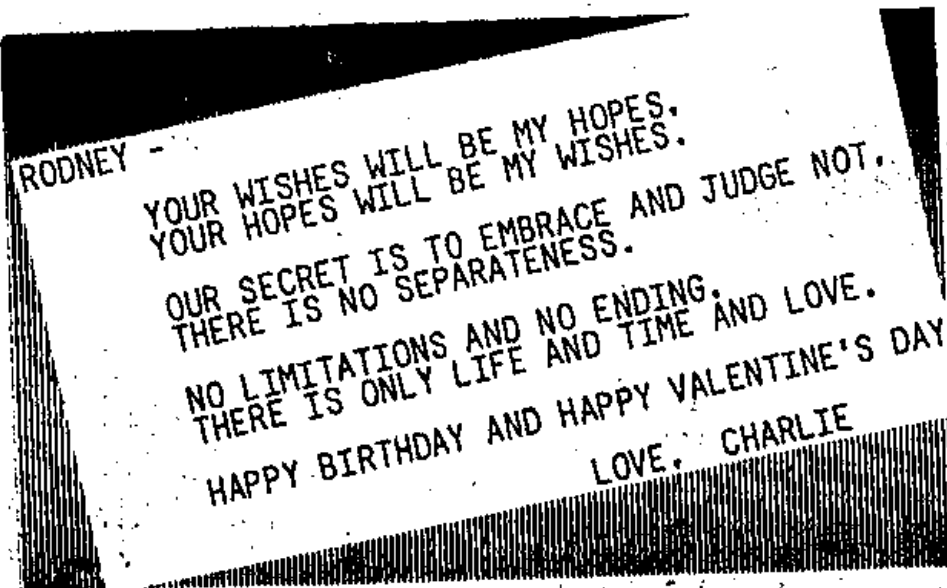

Phoenix Shanti to host seminar



LOUISE L. HAY

PHOENIX - Louise L. Hay, nationally known metaphysical counselor, teacher and author, lecturer and workshop facilitator, will appear in a seminar presented by the Phoenix Shanti Group on Friday, Feb. 19 at the Unitarian Universalist Church, 4027 E. Lincoln Drive from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. There is limited seating and there will be a donation at the door.

Hay is a metaphysical teacher who has assisted individuals and groups with alternative healing therapies. Louis has developed a philosophy and the techniques to improve individual self-esteem. She is the author of four books and seven audio tapes. Her first book, "Heal Your Body," has been translated into ten languages and her book, "You Can Heal Your Life," has sold over 300,000 copies and has proved to be one of the most important and

meaningful books in the self-help and holistic health fields. It is used by colleges and universities as required reading.

As a practitioner and minister, Louise began her work in New York City, subsequently devoting much of her time to terminally-ill patients, alcoholics and the Gay community. In 1980, Louise moved back to her native Los Angeles because of its openness to alternative healing centers, so she could expand her work.

Louise's involvement with the Gay community mushroomed as she began weekly meetings with a group of men diagnosed with AIDS. Several years before, Louise herself had been diagnosed with terminal cancer. She considered the alternatives to surgery and used her illness as an opportunity to practice what she so ardently pro-

fessed. In six months, after an intensive program of using affirmations, visualizations, therapy, and a nutritional program, Louise cured herself of cancer. It is this experience she brings to those now faced with AIDS.

"...the thoughts we think and the words we speak create our life experiences, including our illnesses. Release the need in your life for your condition and your illness can disappear," says Hay. "The word 'incurable' really only means that the particular condition cannot be cured by 'outer' methods and that we must go within to effect the healing."

Since her work with people with AIDS, Louise's healing methods have gained attention from doctors, the public and the media. She has been the subject of many newspaper and magazine articles on AIDS. A videotape entitled "Doors Opening: A Positive Approach To AIDS," produced by filmmaker Colin Higgins during one of Louise's weekly meetings with PWAs is an incredibly moving documentary and a powerful statement on self-healing.

Because of the positive response, Louise's work has touched thousands of people. Requests for her workshops have been received from all over the world, and she has traveled to Australia and will be facilitating workshops and lecturing in Europe. A REMARKABLE PEOPLE

It's now been four months since the Gay and Lesbian March on Washington and most of that experience has become a part of my memory, but there is one portion that continues to be a vibrant, living entity. The more I try to describe the Names Project quilt and its impact on me and the others who saw it, the more I resent the terrible restraint mere words put on the description of feelings.

I can describe the basket-sized panels each one for a person dead from AIDS or anti-Gay violence, and I can describe the reverent ceremony of the quilt's unfolding and the reading of the names on each section as it was unfolded and tied into the quilt as a whole, but I can't really tell why I still choke up when I talk about it or why my eyes tear up when I read about it.

Through the centuries, we, as homosexual peoples, have created things of beauty and timelessness — the poetry of Sappho or the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel for instance — and now, in the ongoing creation of this quilt, we are party to a particularly American thing of this kind of beauty and timelessness. I realize that many of those contributing are not Gay, nor are many being commemorated, but let's face it, we are the ones bearing the brunt of the epidemic. We are the ones afraid, or dying. We are the ones losing our friends and lovers. And we are the ones responding with love, anger, money and energy as is necessary. And in this instance, we are American Gays and Lesbians doing something especially American, re-creating ourselves and our lives in quilting "bees".

That morning in Washington, watching the sections of the quilt being opened and spread like flowers in the "dawn's early light" I cried and was proud to be Gay and American. The two are not incompatible. And I was purged of a lot of fear and hopelessness. I began to believe that if, from our loss and suffering could be fashioned something of such dignity and such love, then from our strength and our determination could come hope and power.

The quilt will be in Phoenix April 16 and 17. In an effort to get panels in memory of Tucson's dead to the Project by March 15, so they can be incorporated into the quilt for the Phoenix presentation, there will be a meeting to coordinate our efforts at the Shanti offices, 602 N. 4th Avenue this Monday, Feb. 15 at 8:00 p.m.

Names Project/Arizona is a one-time chance for anyone, seamstress or not, to participate in a loving and affirmative action that will touch the hearts of millions of people for years to come. The only currently scheduled quilting "bee" that I know of will be at the Shanti/FWA Coalition pot luck picnic and softball game at Himmel Park on Sunday, Feb. 21 at 1:00 p.m.

This quilt and our making of it are our gifts to those who are gone and to those yet to come. Shanti will be chartering buses to Phoenix for all who want to be a part of this gift. I can't encourage people to go strongly enough. I've already seen it and I'm taking time off work to see it again. Hopefully I'll see a lot of Tucson faces there stained with tears and strengthened with pride.

As I See It

Catholic priest/psychologist Martin Padovani, has a new book out called, "Bealing Wounded Emotions: Overcoming Life's Hurts". Fr. Padovani says that neurotic views and feelings about God and religion are the most frequent barrier to genuine healing for people with personal problems.

In over 20 years of working with people having emotional problems, he says that from his experiences, most people cannot resolve the emotional and religious binds which complicate their personal lives. Many psychological problems are founded in religious problems.

"We as humans are not simply disengaged spirits. We are also mind and body. We are going to have a bumpy ride through life if we try to be spiritual without also trying to be human," says Fr. John Powell, SJ, in the forward of the book. He continues, "Theology must somehow include consideration of the human, just as true psychology must attend to the spiritual part of the human composite."

We Gays and Lesbians are often in need of holistic healing that realistically speaks to the emotional-religious experiences we have had in our lives. Most of us have been badly hurt by formal religion. Many have been in a state of crisis at one time or another over issues of being Gay/Lesbian and being Christian, Jewish, Moslem. The pressures on us to conform are beyond comprehension at times.

If we are neurotic, is there any wonder why, when society and religion band together to terrorize us? And yet, at the same time, our very beings call out to be healed, call out to be whole, call out to be at peace. The conflict is often overwhelming. But how can we reconcile this conflict within us when we live in a world that is filled with formal religions that so quickly condemn and cast aside?

We must resolve the religious-emotional confusion that has existed in our lives. And we often have to do it ourselves, because there is no one to do it for us. Running away doesn't do much more than buy us a little time. At some point in our lives, we have to stop and resolve that confusion that so haunts us, that confusion of being Gay/Lesbian and being spiritual too.

We are human beings and as such we are body and mind and spirit. Resolution of the conflict will bring freedom to live more maturely and will lead to a reassurance that we have basic emotional and spiritual goodness. God made US too! And God does not make inferior persons - "God does not make junk."

If we are in conflict with the physical and spiritual essence of our personhood, we should seek out and find persons to help us work through our conflict. The person we seek for guidance will need to be capable of helping us resolve the psychological and religious conflicts by removing unnecessary guilt, for we often harbor many religious distortions that need to be addressed.

A counselor will need to help us deal with our realities and will need to understand those realities his/herself. And most importantly, a good counselor will always help us foster inner peace. To do otherwise is to add to our neurotic conflict.

We have suffered enough from unexpressed feelings of anger toward our religion which we feel has called us to be spiritual without concern for our humanity. At the same time, we know the shallowness of our humanity that ignores our spirituality. There is a way to be religious and human at the same time. Our call to maturity can show the way if we're willing to explore the possibilities.

IN THE NEWS

In recent weeks, two items of interest have appeared in the news, taking place several thousand miles apart. Both of which are of important to the homosexual community.

Firstly, there is the recent ruling by U.S. District Judge Paul E. Plunkett regarding a 17-year-old boys perceived right to wear an earring while attending high school.

The boy had been suspended from class on several occasions and asked the court to allow him to wear the jewelry he chose, saying to ban his wearing of an earring infringed upon his First Amendment right to freedom of speech and expression.

In a leap of credibility, the court agreed with the school which said—for the safety of the male student—earrings were not allowed because they signified gang-membership. Plunkett said the policy of the school was, "rational and does not unconstitutionally curtail a student's freedom to choose his own appearance."

Now, I don't know what kind of gang problems the school has, but this reasoning seems far fetched—to be charitable. I would hate to cry discrimination here, but why not outlaw girls' wearing earrings because they

might overly stimulate the boys' libido complex leading to unrest and dissension in the school—to say the least.

Here again, is a society's attempt to limit freedoms of many things by outlawing the symbolic representations of those things—earrings being only one such incidence.

Nextly, and with a respectful nod toward reason, I come to an item regarding the legal status which Gay couples will soon receive in Denmark.

It was recently voted upon, and approved by a majority of members of the 179-seat parliament, that Gay couples could register as partners and will automatically gain the same rights to most things which married couples take for granted. Denmark is thought to be the first country in the world with such a law—due to take effect July 1, 1988.

As a nod to the influence of the hysterical coalition, the bill was amended—before voting—to preclude Gay couples from adopting children. This was seen as a way to please the anti-homosexual lobby—which seems to be everywhere. Oh well, is not 90% legality better than none at all?
