Names Project comes to Arizona April 16 & 17

PHOENIX - As reported earlier (OBSERVER Jan. 5) the Names Project, the massive 'quilt' made of panels containing names of those who have succumbed to AIDS, will be on view in Phoenix Saturday and Sunday, April 16 and 17. The display will be at the Phoenix Civic Center.

The 'Quilt' was originally on view at the National March on Washington for Gay and Lesbian Rights in October where it was viewed by thousands and thousand of people. The 'quilt' returned to its home base of San Francisco and now is preparing to go on a national tour. Phoenix will be

the third city on the tour.

An initial meeting of local Arizona organizations who will be in charge of everything for the viewing, from security to setting up to putting the display away, met last Friday, Jan. 29.

There is an extensive list of things that must be done to prepare for this project. Among those things is the opportunity to include panels containing names from our Arizona brothers and sisters, which must be made up and shipped very shortly to be included in this Phoenix viewing.

It is also in the planning stage to provide bus transportation at a cost basis to allow Tucsonans the opportunity to view this moving exhibition. Plans will be discussed this coming Sunday, Feb. 7 at the Community meeting to discuss the Gay Resource Center for Tucson. The meeting is to be held at the Unitarian Universalist Church, 4822 E. 22nd Street beginning at 2:00 p.m.

Next week's paper will include complete information concerning the project and Tucson's plans for participation.

The Taming of

January issue of Cosmopolitan

NEW YORK, NY (GON) - About 150 loud, visible and angry demonstrators rallied at the offices of 'Cosmopolitan' magazine and its owners, the Hearst Corporation on Jan. 19. The Women's Committee of the AIDS Coalition To Unleash Power (ACT UP) called the action to protest an article in the January issue of Cosmopolitan claiming that straight women have little risk of getting AIDS and advising straight women not to use condoms or practice safe sex.

Another target of the protest was the article's racist assertion that heterosexual transmission of AIDS in Africa occurs because African men "take their women in a brutal way... closer to rape by our standards."

Author Robert E. Gould argues in the Cosmo piece that "there is almost no danger of contracting the [HIV] virus through ordinary sexual intercourse,"

which he defines as the non-rough "penile penetration of a well-lubricated vagina." He claims only terrifically "rough" penile penetration - occurring in cases of "rape or violently macho thrusting" - can transmit the virus to women. According to Gould, the "only" women who should consider using condoms are those who might have vaginal lacerations.

"Gould's statements clearly have no basis in fact. It's obvious that women have gotten AIDS solely from unprotected heterosexual intercourse," said ACT UP member Neil Broome. ACT UP members cite the Centers for Diseases Control statistic that more than one quarter of all women with AIDS in this country are thought to have contracted the disease through heterosexual sex. The CDC does not publish data about heterosexual practices these women engaged in.

Activists also pointed out

that most women have vaginal lacerations due to childbirth, intrauterine devices (IUDs), tampons, sex without lubrication and other diseases of the reproductive system.

According to Mathilde Krim, chair of the American Foundation for AIDS Research (AMFAR), cases of HIV transmission via unprotected sex have been documented in heterosexual women with no risk factor and who did not have vaginal lacerations. Krim and four other women leaders of organizations providing services to women with AIDS have stated in letters to ACT UP that artificial insemination, "a totally gentle, non-bruising way" for semen to enter the body, is a documented means of HIV transmission.

Barbara Gibson, director of AIDS education for the Addiction Resource and Treatment Center, Marie St. Cyr-Delpe of the Women's AIDS Resource Network and the Haitian Women's AIDS Task Force, Chris Norwood of the National Women's Health Network and Joanne Mantell of the Gay Men's Health Crisis called Gould's article "the most deceptive and dangerous article about women and AIDS ever published in an American magazine."

Krim commented that "the 'you' to whom Dr. Gould addressed his article [subtitled 'A Doctor Tells Why You May Not Be At Risk'] are obviously not the young, minority women who gave birth to HIV antibody-positive babies at the rate now of one out of every 61 births occurring in New York City."

AIDS is now the leading cause of death for women between the ages of 18 and 34 in New York; 84 percent of women with AIDS in New York are Black or Latina.

Gould, a psychiatrist and professor of psychiatry who also teaches obstetrics and gynecology at New York Medical College, is chair of the committee on Gay and Lesbian Issues of the New York Branch of the American Psychiatric Association, and a member of its committee on AIDS. Gould refused to comment on this article with GON.

The lunchtime demonstration began with a crowd of about 30 and

swelled to 150. Chanting "For every Cosmo lie, more women die," protesters marched in front of the Cosmopolitan offices, making noise by banging their cardboard signs on the building's metal scaffolding. The protesters, about an equal number of women and men and about 15 percent people of color, then blocked traffic in the course of a deliberately slow march to the nearby Hearst Corporation Building.

Demonstrators attempted to enter both buildings to meet with Cosmopolitan and Hearst staffers, but were blocked by doormen at the Cosmopolitan offices and by police at the Hearst Corporation. (Cosmopolitan had refused previous requests to meet with women from ACT UP).

Typically inventive and visible ACT UP signs bore such messages as "Step into my (funeral) parlor, Cosmo girl" and "2-4-6-8 - I'd rather masturbate than have unsafe sex". Before rally-goers left the Hearst Corporation, they threw condoms at the blocked building entrance and handed them out to passersby and police.

The event was the first to be organized by the newly formed Women's Committee of ACT UP, an organization that until recently had overwhelmingly male membership. The Women's Committee which now consists of both heterosexual women and Lesbians, was organized about three months ago as a social and support network for Lesbians working in ACT UP.

"We were trying to figure out 'What we were doing in this movement?'" said Women's Committee member Maxine Wolfe. "What made it a Lesbian issue for us? How did we feel about going out and getting more women [to join ACT UP] when it was so difficult in meetings for us [because of gender disparity]?"

ACT UP has called for an international boycott of the magazine and has demanded that all advertisers withdraw their ads until Cosmopolitan prints a retraction. ACT UP also urges people to call Cosmopolitan at (212) 262-5700 to protest Cosmo's irresponsible AIDS coverage.

RHODES WOULD BEAT WARNER AND MECHAN

IN RECALL ELECTION SAYS POLL
PHOENIX - A poll of about 500 registered voters from throughout Arizona revealed that retired Republican Representative John Rhodes would beat both Carolyn Warner and Evan Mecham if a recall election were held now.

The poll was conducted in mid-January as part of the Rocky Mountain Poll's independent series of surveys.

Rhodes received 38 percent of the statewide poll, with Warner running close behind with 33 percent. Mecham trailed with 16 percent. Approximately 13% were undecided.

Rhodes, from the Phoenix area, was especially strong in rural areas and Maricopa County. He has been mentioned as a possible compromise candidate.

Mecham's popularity was waning, the poll indicated. It was evident because 47 percent of the voters said that they would "definitely not" vote for him again in an earlier Rocky Mountain poll conducted 1st October. In this poll, that figure rose to 62 percent.

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SUPERMAN WON'T "PLAY GAY"



HOLLYWOOD, CA (GON) - A ten-year-old screenplay for a movie with a Gay theme continues to have problems with casting for its lead roles. The film has been shuffled from producer to producer and has been rewritten several times.

According to the Weekly News, Marshall Mason, the director of "The Front Runner" offered \$1 million to Christopher Reeve to play a Gay track coach who falls in love with his star athlete. The former Superman turned down the offer, apparently because he "played Gay" once before in the film version of "Deathtrap", and is worried about his image.

FLORIDA FAIR TO INCLUDE GAYS

TAMPA, FL (BAR) - The 1988 Florida State Fair will be Gay affair. The Tampa Bay Business Guild will be allowed to set up an exhibit documenting the history of the Gay rights movement. The exhibit will be "tasteful, factual, and educational - something everyone will be proud of," said organizers of the project.

"We would like to chronicle the Gay rights movement in America up to and including the recent March on Washington," according to the letter of application by the Tampa group.

"An exhibit like this will help dispel myths and promote understanding of Gay people everywhere," stated the group.

ROYKO APOLOGIZES FOR COLUMN

CHICAGO, IL (BAR) - Chicago Tribune columnist Mike Royko apologized for a column he had written smearing Gay people and people with AIDS. Royko told the audience of a Chicago call-in show that the column was "in poor taste" and "may have been one of the worst columns I've ever written." He'd just "had a very bad day," said Royko.

In the offensive column, Royko had written that people administering mouth-to-mouth resuscitation may want to be careful of contracting AIDS. He warned that rescuers may want to "check to see if he [a person needing resuscitation] has needle marks on his arms and is wearing lipstick."

LOG CABIN CLUB OF PHOENIX TO MEET FEB 17

PHOENIX - The February meeting of the Log Cabin Club will be held on Wednesday, Feb. 17. The Log Cabin Club is an association of Republicans concerned about the rights of Gay men and Lesbians. This will be the first regular meeting of the club since its organization last December. Persons interested in attending should call 837-2936 in Phoenix for location.

The meeting will be informal, giving members and guests the opportunity to get to know one another. The business portion of the meeting will attempt to define the purposes and goals of the club and to establish an agenda of activities for 1988 to meet those goals.

Anyone interested in the rights of Gay men and Lesbians is welcome. Membership in the club should not be construed as an indication of a person's sexual orientation or behavior.

QUOTE OF THE WEEK

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Jesse Jackson responds to survey

[ED NOTE: In our January 20 issue we printed responses to a survey taken by the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force by the presidential candidates concerning their views on Lesbian and Gay issues. In that issue, responses were printed from Paul Simon, Richard Gephardt, Michael Dukakis, George Bush and Bruce Babbitt. The following is the response from Presidential candidate Jesse Jackson and it expresses the candidates strong support for full civil rights for Lesbians and Gay men. Mr. Jackson's responses in three substantive areas are summarized below].

CIVIL RIGHTS

- * Supports passage of federal Gay/Lesbian rights bill and supports full civil and legal rights for Lesbians and Gay men; will fight any restrictions based on sexual orientation.

- * Is committed to issuing Presidential Executive Order banning discrimination in the federal government, including the military; would extend the order to cover all government contractors; sees order being supplemented by a congressional Gay rights bill.

LESBIAN/GAY FAMILIES

- * Supports Lesbian and Gay partners being afforded benefits accorded to heterosexual partners.

- * Platform of campaign recognizes diversity within the human family; supports full civil rights for Gay people.

- * Supports right of Gay people to designate survivors and dependents; supports Gay people's right to child custody.

AIDS POLICIES

- * Supports National Academy of Sciences \$2 billion target, but notes that this may not be an adequate amount.

- * Supports making catastrophic insurance available as a right; supports federally guaranteed access to treatments and care; supports creation of stop-loss or re-insurance pools.

- * Believes we need to develop a national health care program that is federally funded and equally accessible to all.

- * Believes burden of health care coverage should be borne by federal government, not the states.

- * Supports broad, frank AIDS education; believes such education should "confront homophobia, the irrational and divisive fear, the racism, the victim-blaming that impact our efforts to combat this disease".

- * Supports federal legislation banning discrimination against people with AIDS or HIV infection.

- * Opposes Reagan Justice Department's interpretation that federal disability laws do not cover people with AIDS or HIV infection.

- * Supports Federal AIDS Policy Act, H.R. 3071/S. 1575.

- * Opposes mandatory testing.

- * Supports the creation of an office of Gay/Lesbian Health Concerns in the Public Health Service.

A REMARKABLE PEOPLE

My immediate reaction when U.S. Surgeon General Koop revealed his new plan for AIDS testing was a loud "No way, we're not playing guinea pigs while every right wing politician with an eye on the polls plays doctor." I couldn't believe that Koop, whom I had come to think of as a newly converted "friendly" had called for wide-spread testing so soon after admitting that he didn't think a cure for AIDS would ever be possible and that a vaccine probably wouldn't be available in this century. I guess my reaction is what's been called a knee-jerk reaction.

Make no mistake about it, I am angry about all the conservative ideologues trying to make a political forum out of a major medical emergency, but that does not make it permissible for me to do the same. People — men, women, children — friends of mine — strangers — are dying, facing death, or already dead and I am not in the unenviable position of Ronald Reagan of ignoring their deaths, or California representative William Dannemeyer of trying to profit by them.

I believe in Koop, he has taken an honest and courageous stand while serving in an administration that only equates courage and honesty with firepower. Koop has advocated not only recommending the use of condoms, but a wide-spread public education program that amounts to sex education for grade schoolers. Such an educational program could only have a positive impact on future Gay legal issues which of course is why people like Mr. Reagan, Mr. Helms et.al oppose such a program. Ignorance is their greatest tool

if not their only one.

So, now that Dr. Koop is advocating wide-spread anonymous testing to gain more knowledge about the extent and the patterns of infection, can we, remembering our dead friends and lovers do anything but cooperate? We must continue our struggle for legal rights and recognition, but, as the group most highly affected by AIDS, we must not be guilty of "playing doctor" ourselves.

Rather, we must do as we have already done so well, care for the sick and the scared, educate, lobby in the political arenas and cooperate with proper medical professionals. And we must then raise our voices to make sure that word of our suffering, our compassion and our lives gets around to all those who have ignored our existence. The only political legitimacy that can come from AIDS is the increasing visibility of Gay men and Lesbians. And we must insure that it does. We're the only ones that can.

*Carter appointment spent most of
his professional life in the closet*

[ED NOTE: As reported in last week's issue, Former Legal Services Director in President Carter's administration, Dan Bradley, died of complications from AIDS. We present here a story by Neil Miller who had known Bradley and recently interviewed him for a book he was writing. It gives an insight into a man who was forced to live in the "closet" most of his life, and his thoughts about finally "coming out"].

CORAL GABLES, FL (GON) — Dan Bradley, Miami lawyer and Gay activist, died Jan. 8 of complications from AIDS. Bradley, 47, was best known for having served from 1979 to 1981 as president of the Legal Services Corporation, the independent, federally sponsored agency which funds legal representation for the poor. In 1982 after leaving the agency which funds legal representation for the poor. In 1982 after leaving the agency, he came out as a Gay man in an article on the front page of the New York Times. At that time he was the highest ranking official ever to publicly announce his homosexuality.

Bradley was born in south Georgia, orphaned at the age of five, and grew up in the Georgia Baptist Children's Home. He received his undergraduate and law degrees from Mercer University in Macon, Georgia. He began work for the federal legal services program in 1967, providing legal aid to migrant farmers in Belle Glade, Florida.

After holding a variety of posts in legal services in the Atlanta and San Francisco regional offices and in Washington (as well as a brief stint as Florida Racing Commissioner under Florida Gov. Reuben Askew), he was appointed to head the Legal Services Corporation by President Jimmy Carter.

When Ronald Reagan became president in 1980, one of his major priorities was to abolish federal legal aid for the poor. However, the administration left Carter appointees, including Bradley, in place to preside over the demise of the agency.

Bradley spent the first year of the Reagan administration lobbying Congress to continue funding the program. When Congress authorized funding for three more years — in one of the few early defeats of the Reagan administration — Bradley was given much of the credit for saving Legal Services.

Bradley and other Carter appointees were fired on New Year's Eve, 1981. Three months later, on March 31, 1982, the New York Times published its front page article with the headline "Homosexual Takes Leave of Agency and Lifetime of Agony". Soon after, Harper's Magazine published a long and detailed account of Bradley's struggles with his sexuality and his coming out.

After a stint on the talk and interview show circuit, Bradley returned to Miami to practice law. He was active in Dade County Gay politics, on the board of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, and chaired the American Bar Association's committee on Gay rights. As a person with AIDS, he spoke at the March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights last October.

When I interviewed Dan Bradley almost a year ago for a book I am writing on Gay and Lesbian life in the U.S., he had already been diagnosed with AIDS. A kind, gentle man who spoke with a warm Southern drawl and painstaking detail, he still gave the impression of the poverty lawyer he once was. In talking with him, it

Community Awards Committee to meet Feb. 10

TUCSON - A committee for an annual Community Awards has been established. This committee is comprised of business, clubs, religious organizations, bars, community affairs organizations and individuals, for the purpose of showing recognition to those individuals and groups who have shown their interest in the Tucson Gay/Lesbian community with their outstanding efforts for the community during the past year.

The First Annual Community Awards of Tucson will be held in conjunction with the Observer/Community Benefit Dinner and Show on March 26 at the Americana Hotel. The Committee will decide what awards will be given and who will be the recipients of the awards.

Each of these individuals and groups will have one vote, but each ballot will contain all awards and recipients. Each member of the committee will work jointly with the Committee, their own group that they are representing and the community-at-large in casting their votes.

A breakdown of the Committee is: 1. Six individuals-at-large in the community. 2. Six Gay-oriented bars. 3. Six businesses owned or operated by and for the community. 4. Seven clubs from the Tucson community. 5. Four religious organizations. 6. Three community affairs organizations (TAP, Shanti and FWA Coalition).

The next meeting of the Community Awards Committee will be held on Feb. 10 at 7:00 p.m. at Colettes to determine the classification of awards and nominees for the awards and finalize plans for the method of the final voting.

Present plans are for a final meeting in March to cast bal-

lots. This voting will be by secret ballot. The tabulation and counting of the votes will be by Bob Ellis, Editor of the OBSERVER. No one except Bob Ellis will know the results until the awards are given on March 26.

A sample ballot will be published in the OBSERVER next week with a list of the committee representatives, and the final plans for methods of selection and voting. It is important that each of those organizations and businesses be in attendance at this Feb. 10 meeting for your input on this important undertaking.

BAPTIST LEADERS REFUSE CASH FROM CHURCH WITH GAY MEMBERS

FRESNO, CA (AP) - State Baptist leaders here have refused to accept a \$3,000 cash donation from a Baptist church whose membership includes homosexuals. The executive board of the California Southern Convention turned down the offer to have the convention's Cooperative Program made by the Dolores Street Baptist Church of San Francisco. The Cooperative Program sponsors missions, seminaries and other church activities.

The board said its decision was "based on interpretation of biblical principle which places the Dolores Street Baptist Church in conflict with, and not in sympathy with, the purpose of the convention."

The Rev. Jim Lowder, Dolores Street Pastor, said the congregation at his church is about 30 percent homosexual. He has contended that the Bible affirms homosexual relationships that are faithful, loving and caring. Southern Baptists maintain that the Bible teaches that homosexuality is an unacceptable lifestyle.

Center for Human Development continues support group

TUCSON - The Gay and/or Bisexual Married Men's Support Group begun by the Tucson-based Center for Human Development in 1984 is continuing its weekly Support Group activities. The program is not a counseling or therapy group, but rather an opportunity for married Gay or Bisexual men to examine those issues that are central to healthy adjustment and optimum personal functioning. The format of the group includes (a) a weekly meeting of approximately one hour and (b) an opportunity for the men to meet together on a social basis for friendship and support.

The informal meeting is held on Tuesdays from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. A small group size assures each man an opportunity to become well acquainted with all of the other members of the group, and to share feelings, interests and goals in a close supportive environment. The group operates on the premise that each man's marital and Gay/Bisexual status is a highly individual and unique situation. As such, each man must decide for himself:

...whether he wishes to work toward sustaining and strengthening the marital relationship or instead move toward dissolution of the marriage;

...whether to come out to his wife (and/or family) or to keep his homosexual identity, interests and activities in the closet;

...whether he will be open to, or insulated from, the possibilities of an emotional, affectional relationship with another man, and the implications of either decision;

...how he can best cope with the ambivalent feelings of love, caring, guilt, resentment, confinement, etc. that can be experienced

as he tries to express his full sexual and emotional self and still maintain the socially prescribed roles of husband and father; and

...how he will cope with the desire for Gay sexual outlets and the interpersonal and health issues that can arise.

Thus, during the ongoing series of meetings, each participating married Gay or Bisexual man will have a positive, self-enhancing opportunity to explore and examine his values, beliefs, sexuality and capacity for personal intimacy. All matters involving the group are discreetly managed and confidentiality is assured.

In addition to the weekly meeting, the men are encouraged to get together at other times during the week for a more social, casual exchange of ideas and interests. E.g., many of the men use the time after the meetings to get together in small groups for coffee, drinks at a Gay or straight bar, or just sharing time with another person of similar likes and interests. In this way, the group facilitates the beginnings of friendships and a supportive network of other caring men in similar circumstances. The group can be invaluable for married Gay men who feel alone and overwhelmed by their situation.

The only eligibility requirements are that the participant must be (1) Gay or Bisexual and (2) planning marriage, currently married, or divorced but still coping with the emotional residuals from the marriage. Any interested man should call Dr. Overbeck's offices in Tucson at 884-0476 (Carolyn, secretary) for a 30-45 minute interview prior to the first group meeting.

THE HOMELESS

Those two words bring to each of us differing scenarios, different emotions, and handfuls of answers; most of the answers, however, miss the point.

Those of us who work for what we want find the plight of the homeless not only hard to swallow, but distasteful as well. I hear their every night on the news crying for a place to live, food to eat, clothing, and more.

Once, many months ago, I heard the pleas of a man for who I actually felt concern. He said, "All I need is a job".

In my view the rest are hopeless parasites wishing to live off of what you and I work to attain.

I hear complaints that a minimum-wage job does not pay enough to support a family, find a decent home in which to live, and provide food to feed the family. I am sure that is true. But tell me, who forced them to have twelve kids? Who forces them to spend money on drugs, alcohol and cigarettes?

Yes, many hard-working people are forced onto the streets because they lose their jobs. Well, get another one. Work two jobs if necessary. Have the wife get a job. Get two.

Before I get to some solutions, let me tell you I am not a man without concern: When I first went out on my own, I worked a full-time job, and a night job to make the money I needed to live. I look back now and wonder how I made it. Then I realized how I made it: I did not tie myself down with the weight of responsi-

bilities; I did not father a handful of children; I did not waste my money on drugs, alcohol, or other useless things. I have been there: just short of homeless.

The answers are not guarantees of food, shelter, or clothing. No, the answers are spending tax money on affordable housing, and affordable child-care. AND NOTHING ELSE. Let them begin at the minimum-wage jobs and work up like the rest of us did. Provide a place to live for a reasonable amount of rent — they don't need a dishwasher, microwave and sauna in the house.

There are food-stamp programs to make ends meet, and other methods of government assistance to help them get re-started. Beyond that, if they cannot make it, then they obviously must not wish to make it.

Yes, I know about the mentally disabled, those who cannot survive on their own: I worked in Berkeley, California for several years. I know the plight of the mentally disabled who are on the streets.

I am addressing those able-bodied men and women who spend so much energy picketing government agencies, lobbying presidential candidates, complaining loudly when the television cameras focus on them.

If they spent half as much energy looking for and maintaining a job, they would have nothing to complain about.

PEPTIDE T

The University of Southern California is conducting Peptide T studies:

HIV is believed to cause problems in thinking, concentration and memory in many persons with AIDS and ARC. Peptide T is an artificially produced protein. Its structure is similar to the protein coat of HIV. Peptide T has been shown in test tube studies to block the HIV's ability to infect and reproduce in human cells. The studies are attempting to find out if, Peptide T improves thinking ability in people who are

experiencing difficulties caused by HIV infection and/or slows down replication of the virus by protecting immune T4 cells from HIV by blocking the T4 cells receptor site. Applications for this study are available at P.A.C.T.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR AZT

Federal money is now available for AZT through the Arizona Department of Health Services. Applications can be obtained at your doctor or a local AIDS service organization.

Other financial aid programs are also available. Call P.A.C.T. for details, 792-3775 in Tucson.



seemed that the conflict between continuing public service and coming out as a Gay person dominated his life for many years.

He said that by 1975, after finally accepting his sexuality, he wanted to go home to Miami to practice law and lead an openly Gay life. But public life still beckoned and one post after the next was offered him - the Racing Commission job, the position as president of Legal Services - and he found himself unable to refuse. To accept those jobs, though, he had to remain in the closet.

"If I had attempted to be openly Gay in the Carter administration, I would have been gone before sunset," he said. But with each new position, the personal frustration of being in the closet became less and less bearable. When Reagan was elected, Bradley said he was "grinning from ear to ear" - he could finally go home and practice law and be openly Gay.

When he finally did leave public life and come out, he was not disappointed. "I know I would never have been able to do some of the things I had done, had I been openly Gay," he said. "But I used to say to my closeted Gay friends, 'If you could just smell the feeling of acceptance and honesty, no one would stay in the closet.' There is no job. there is no family, there is no material asset, there is no political office, there is nothing that is worth the feeling I used to feel of being in the closet." JUDGE KENNEDY

CONFIRMED TO THE COURT
WASHINGTON, D.C. U.S. Senate today unanimously confirmed U.S. Appeals Court Judge Anthony M. Kennedy's nomination to the Supreme Court. The Senate Judiciary Committee endorsed Kennedy by a 14-0 vote last Wednesday, Jan. 27.

Kennedy became the 104th person ever appointed to the nation's highest court. His appointment would precede the court's Feb. 22 recess and gives the court a full nine members for the first time since Justice Lewis F. Powell retired June 26.

Kennedy's appointment could be a key to the court's future rulings on abortion, affirmative action and church-state relations.

Kennedy, who has been a federal appellate judge for 12 years, was President Reagan's third choice to fill the vacancy. The first choice was Robert H. Bork, a federal appellate judge whose nomination was rejected, 58-42, by the Senate in October after a bruising fight in which foes called him a dangerous extremist.

Arizona Senator Dennis DeConcini, a conservative Democrat who voted against Bork, said Bork was defeated because senators "didn't think he would interpret the Constitution in a meaningful, fair way."

Reagan then nominated Douglas H. Ginsburg, another federal appellate judge, but Ginsburg withdrew after admitting he smoked marijuana nine years ago.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., praised Judge Kennedy's "mainstream judicial philosophy." The judge is not related to the Senator.


