High risk behavior continues in many cities

WASHINGTON - Although dramatic changes in sexual behavior have occurred among homosexual men in some cities with a high prevalence of AIDS, high-risk behavior persists in other cities and in areas with a low incidence of the disease, a report said.

The report, a draft of which was obtained by the Los Angeles Times, concluded that high-risk behavior among gay men is least common in San Francisco, as the likely result of "community organization and intervention." But in other cities - including New York, which has the highest number of AIDS cases in the nation - "there could be quite a bit of high-risk behavior still going on," said the study's author, Thomas J. Coates, co-director of the University of California at San Francisco's Center for AIDS Prevention Studies.

As of Monday, March 7, a total of 55,167 Americans had contracted AIDS. Of those, 30,932 already have died of AIDS. An estimated 1.5 million Americans have been exposed to the AIDS virus.

The study, funded by Congress' Office of Technology Assessment and expected to be released in June, examined data on sexual behavior changes among homosexuals from a dozen studies conducted in San Francisco, Los Angeles, New York and other cities.

The report called the changes in cities such as San Francisco "impressive and important," but said that "considerable proportions of gay men in these studies, especially from areas not at the epicenter of the epidemic, continue to engage in high-risk behavior.

Coates said that five years ago, 55 percent of San Francisco's homosexual men were practicing high-risk behavior, but that the figure since has dropped to between 6 percent and 12 percent. "That's a fairly dramatic change, but the data from other cities, including New York, indicate that the changes there haven't been nearly as dramatic," he said.

For example, the report said, one New York study indicated that in 1986, homosexual men had reduced the numbers of their male sexual partners and the incidents of anal intercourse by more than 70 percent, while a second New York study the same year reported only an 18 percent reduction in the percentage of people who had multiple male sexual partners.

The report said that data from other studies "raise serious concerns" about continued levels of high-risk behavior. For example, the report said, one study showed that "the mean number of partners with whom the average male homosexual had engaged in un-

protected anal intercourse in Los Angeles in 1986 was 1.6, compared with 1.0 in San Francisco.

Other examples cited in the report said that study participants in Mississippi "reported a mean of 19.7 partners with whom they had practiced unprotected anal intercourse" during the last year, and that 70 percent of the men at New Mexico's clinics for sexually transmitted diseases had said they had indulged in unprotected anal intercourse during the last year.

PORN STAR DIES, REPORTEDLY OF AIDS
LOS ANGELES, CA (AP) - Pornographic film actor John Holmes, who made hundreds of sexually explicit films during a career spanning two decades, has died. He was 43 years old and reportedly had AIDS.

Holmes, a leading sex film actor of the 1970s and early '80s, died last Saturday night, March 12 at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Sepulveda.

L.A. GAY RODEO MARCH 25-27

LOS ANGELES, CA - Personnel has been selected for the fourth annual Los Angeles Gay Rodeo which is hosted by the Los Angeles Chapter of the Golden State Gay Rodeo Association (G.S.G.R.A.). The Los Angeles Gay Rodeo is the largest Gay rodeo in the country, attracting over two hundred contestants, and 12,000 spectators from all over the United States and Canada. In addition, 350 performers participate in the Country Dance Festival at the Rodeo Grounds. This year, the Rodeo will be held the weekend of March 25-27, at the Los Angeles Equestrian Center.

Al Bell has been selected as this year's Rodeo Director. Bell is a founding member of both G.S.G.R.A. and The International Gay Rodeo Association (I.G.R.A.). Assistant Rodeo Director will be Mark Marshall, a founding member and former president of the New Mexico Gay Rodeo Association.

SOME U.S., FOREIGN CONDOMS FAIL TESTS

ATLANTA, GA (AP) - Twelve percent of U.S.-made condoms and 21 percent of foreign-made condoms failed in recent testing, federal researchers said. The prophylactics have been advocated as a means of slowing the spread of AIDS.

Officials of the Atlanta-based national Centers for Disease Control said that as of February, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration had tested samples from 430 batches of condoms. Of those, 165 batches had been manufactured in the United States, and 265 had been manufactured abroad.

The FDA reported previously that as many as one in five batches of latex condoms it tested failed to meet federal standards.

The FDA rejects a batch of condoms if more than 4 per 1,000 fail in water-leakage tests. If two or more batches from a foreign manufacturer fail, future shipments from that maker are stopped at their port of entry into the United States.

The CDC said condoms can help prevent sexually transmitted diseases, but that they don't always work. Lab tests have shown that latex condoms are effective barriers to the spread of AIDS, hepatitis B, gonorrhea, chlamydia and other sexually transmitted diseases. However, breakage or other mishaps during use can negate their disease-fighting effectiveness.

WESTERN STATES CONFERENCE A SUCCESS

PASADENA, CA - The Western States Lesbian and Gay Students United (WSLSU) held its seventh annual conference at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo in mid-February. There were approximately 150 representatives from 25 campuses in California, Oregon, Washington, Arizona and Nevada.

In keeping with the theme, "Sharing Our Identity," workshops were conducted under such titles as "Gay Politics and Politicians," "Being In or Being Out," and "Gay People of Color." Among the other concerns were the issues of media coverage, campus organizations, alcoholism, religion, and AIDS. Overall, more than thirty areas of Lesbian and Gay concerns were addressed.

Next year's conference will be hosted by the California State University at Fresno. WSLSU provides a network through which members of campus communities can share knowledge and experience in dealing with issues and concerns of Lesbian and Gay students. 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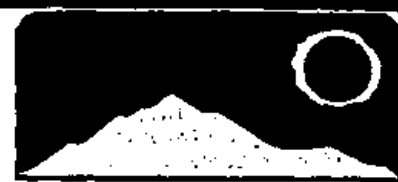

TALK SHOW HOST LOSTS COOL
SEACONDS, NJ (GON) - Hot words between a talk show host and guest have led to assault charges against the host, Sean Morton Downey Jr. The New York Times reports that AIDS educator Andrew Hum had been asked to appear on the show as a representative of the Coalition for Lesbian and Gay Rights.

According to Hum, Downey "went out of control" during a discussion of homosexuality and Catholicism and made "a vile statement presuming that because I was Gay I had AIDS." Hum responded with an obscenity. "And then Downey said, 'You can't say that on my show,' and hit me across the chin with the back of his hand," reported Hum.

A conviction for simple assault may lead to a maximum sentence of six months in jail and a \$1000 fine.

Gay/Lesbian War Conference held amid controversy

WASHINGTON, DC (GON) - A conference that gathered a "select group" of Lesbian and Gay leaders from around the U.S. to examine the state of the Lesbian/Gay movement was criticized by participants and observers for perpetuating racism. Others praised the event, which took place Feb. 26 to 28 at a conference center in Virginia, for providing a forum for prominent activists to meet and strategize.

The War Conference, tagged as such by organizers claiming they're making war against us, was open to participation by invitation only - another circumstance that led critics to wonder just what, and who, was behind the conference.

"A commitment to being inclusive was ignored," said War Conference attendant Pat Norman, a Black Lesbian activist from San Francisco and national co-chair of the March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights. "People of color are tired of having to deal with racism constantly... we already have to deal with homophobia at every turn."

According to Norman and a bevy of other participants, only about ten people of color were present at the conference of about 200 people. Critics said they believe few people of color were invited, and that some who were may have declined to attend because of racist conference planning. "To call it 'a very white event' would be the understatement of the year," said David Barr, staff attorney for New York's Lambda Legal Defense and Education fund.

Women were also under-represented at the meeting, which cost at least \$200 plus travel expenses to attend. Approximately 50 to 60 Lesbians participated. Conference organizers acknowledged that the process of distributing invitations was random and hurried, motivated by urgency in light of increasing homophobic backlash against Lesbians and Gay men.

For example, they cited the passage by Congress of the Helms' amendment limiting funds for AIDS education which "kicked [the movement] ins the gut" last fall just a few days after the March on Washington.

A statement of purpose included with the War Conference invitation read, "... the choice today - the choice in midst of the war which is being inflicted upon us - is a choice between being arbitrary and imperfect but doing something."

"We recognize that the 200 people we are asking to attend this conference will only crudely represent the breadth and depth and strength of Gay America. ... We recognize that the list we have assembled is arbitrary and faulted. It is neither comprehensively nor proportionately representative. It is not necessarily even half male and half female..."

Conference organizer Michael Shower maintains the weekend provided an open environment for exchange of ideas, and that participants experienced an "overwhelming sense of cooperation." He explained the idea for organizing a national Lesbian and Gay strategy meeting arose at a Human Rights Campaign Fund Dinner last fall in New York City.

According to Shower, an ad hoc group of individuals responded to rhetoric that was mentioned about a "war" against us and set to begin planning a coordinated fight. They hoped to work toward building a stronger movement. An initial round of invitations to the War Conference went out in mid-December.

"Those of us in the group dumped our rolodexes in a pile," Shower said, "and invited people we knew were activists at a community or national level. We made a relatively good faith effort to bring people in. I recognize and appreciate the concerns of people of color, but I have to disagree with any allegation that this conference was exclusionary."

A second round of invitations was mailed in early February to other Lesbians and Gay men whose name surfaced for consideration. Conference critics charge that most people of color were solicited in these final weeks....

Charles Stewart, acting chief of staff for state Senator Diane Watson (D-Los Angeles) and chairs the California Black Legislative Caucus created a stir at the conference by reading a statement of dissent. In his "minority report" he said the Anglo Lesbian/Gay leadership made it clear that inclusion of people of color was not a priority. Stewart also said that because his concerns were peripheralized, he could not maintain primary allegiance to the Lesbian/Gay movement, and that the movement could not expect to rely on people of color in its struggle given the ongoing pattern of disregard.

"I'm torn between the allegiance of my people and of my heart," Stewart told GON. "Our agendas overlap, but people at the conference made it clear where they stand - the conference was a microcosm of the pattern of neglecting concerns of people of color."

Stewart described the War Conference as worthwhile nonetheless. "Slap me on the face," he said, "and I'll still get on with the work. I got a lot out of the conference. The chief benefits were getting to know active people and focusing our mental energies for two and a half days. People left thinking along the same lines."

According to Stewart, the specific resolutions adopted at the conference were excellent. He said, however, he feared that people not invited to participate may resent the proposals. He also pointed out that no specific implementing body was formed to ensure that ideas are enacted.

"The conference made a ringing, eloquent statement about the nature of what we're facing, what the New Right is doing to us," said participant Jay Deacon, director of the Office of Lesbian and Gay Concerns for the Unitarian/Universalist Church in Boston. "However, I'd feel better if I were clearer about what happens next. Some stuff - like strategies for civil disobedience and boycotts - fell through the cracks. To my mind, the closing statement didn't say anything."

Urvasi Vaid, director of public information for the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), also expressed hope for more concrete ideas. "I would've liked to have seen the planning of one united, direct action," she said. "That can be an effective empowerment tool. But we need to be fighting on many fronts, with a multiplicity of visions."

One conference plan that seemed to garner broad enthusiasm among participants was the establishment of a "National Coming Out Day" to occur annually on Oct. 11 to commemorate the March on Washington. Most participants agreed that closets remain one of the key obstacles to Lesbian and Gay freedom.

Other specific recommendations that emerged from the War Conference include the development of an emergency response network and a coordinated national training and education center for activists in the Lesbian and Gay movement. A consensus statement describing War Conference resolutions is now being finalized for distribution among the Gay and non-Gay press.

"The conference was an incredibly moving experience," said key organizer Howard Katz. "Despite our different agendas, we came to a common agreement. We can't speak for everyone in the community, but ultimately it was a success. We learned our outreach wasn't good enough - people of color must be intimately involved from the beginning. But we'll do better next time."

Vaid described the War Conference as an effective retreat of motivated and involved people. "Frankly," she said, "it was a chance to get away and breathe and talk politics."

Fiesta de Mayo

TUCSON - The Third Annual Fiesta de Mayo will take place Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 6, 7 and 8 at the Joshua Tree/Back Pocket. This celebration is the Lesbian/Gay version of the Mexican holiday Cinco de Mayo. The Fiesta is the major fundraiser for the Tucson Lesbian/Gay Alliance (TLGA) to pay for the expenses of Pride Week each year.

As usual, candidates will compete for King and Queen of the Fiesta by obtaining votes. One vote equals one dollar. The candidate couple with the most votes (dollars on hand at the time of the final counting - no IOU's) wins. The winning couple reigns over this year's Pride Week activities. Queen Minerva and King Juan, winners of last year's Fiesta contest will reign over this year's Fiesta de Mayo.

In the voting last year, more than \$3,000 was raised by the various candidates which covered the Pride Week expenses, without having to go to businesses and organizations to help pay for the expenses of the weeklong events. The Pride Week Picnic alone costs over \$1,000 to produce - and was attended by nearly 3,000 people last year.

King and Queen candidates are now urged to register at the Back Pocket by the deadline of midnight, Wednesday, March 30. The candidate couples will then have the entire month of April up until the final vote is tallied on May 8 at 10:00 p.m., to gather votes.

Another aspect of Fiesta de Mayo is the party atmosphere at the Joshua Tree with nightly entertainment and the various food, game and crafts booths open each afternoon and evening. Organizations, clubs and individuals are encouraged to set up a booth for the Fiesta. These can be used as fund-raising booths for your organization. There will be room this year for only 12 booths, so those interested in setting up a booth need to register at the Back Pocket or call Jack Stockslager at 293-3515 by May 1st. This year there will be no charge for booths, and booths will be assigned on a first-come basis.

Registration for candidates and booths space is accomplished by leaving your name (organization, club, etc.) address and phone number at JT/BP or by calling the above phone number.

Legislative Alert On S.1220

WASHINGTON, DC - The most comprehensive legislation dealing with AIDS is expected to move on the Senate floor this week and so is Jesse Helms. Sponsored by Senator Edward Kennedy (D-MA), S 1220 amends the Public Health Service Act to provide for a comprehensive program of education, information, risk reduction, training, prevention, treatment, care and research concerning AIDS.

Preliminary vote counts indicate widespread support for such a comprehensive bill. However, when it comes to counting votes on damaging and restrictive amendments - such as amendments we are likely to see from Jesse Helms - support falls off dramatically. There is particular concern about amendments trying to restrict the content of AIDS education materials and mandate HIV testing in certain settings.

The bill was reported favorably out of the Committee on Labor and Human Resources with unanimous support. Senator Kennedy is joined by the following co-sponsors: Cranston (D-CA); Mikulski (D-MD); Dodd (D-CN); Metzenbaum (D-OH); Pell (D-RI); Simon (D-IL); Harkin (D-IA); Inouye (D-HI); Matsunaga (D-HI); Burdick (D-ND); Hatch (R-UT); Thurmond (R-SC); Stafford (D-NC); Weicker (R-CT); Cochran (R-MS); and Kerry (D-MA).

Letters, phone calls and mailgrams to Senate offices are needed immediately in the next two - three weeks. The message to Senators should be: Vote for S 1220 without restrictive amendments! Oppose efforts to restrict the content of AIDS education programs or impose mandatory testing!

Letters to Senators can be addressed to: The Honorable _____, Washington, DC 20510. See the advertisement on this page on how to send mailgrams and other information on the dangerous amendments that threaten S 1220. Act now.

The Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) is asking members of the Gay community across the country to personally lobby their Senators for passage, without hostile amendments, of the Federal AIDS Research, Information and Care Act - S 1220.

The Campaign Fund, the national political action committee of the Lesbian and Gay community, is launching an advertising campaign from coast to coast, to run in Gay community newspapers from coast to coast. The ad headline reads, "Jesse Helms is prepared to sabotage the nation's first AIDS research and education bill."

"This is our chance - the chance each one of us has - to stop Senator Helms and his cohorts from crippling the best, most responsible piece of federal legislation on AIDS that we have ever seen in this country," said Vic Basile, Campaign Fund executive director.

S 1220 at long last declares AIDS to be the public health emergency that it is. The legislation would enable AIDS education grants to be awarded to community-based organizations, allow the hiring of researchers at the Centers for Disease Control the Food and Drug Administration and the National Institutes of Health, enable the launching of a national AIDS prevention campaign and hasten processing time for AIDS research proposals.

"Helms and his henchmen are willing to gamble that members of the Senate, in their zeal to realize these fine goals, may be willing to compromise essential civil rights issues," said Basile.

Sen. Helms is poised with amendments to allow food and health care workers to be fired,

to cancel health insurance policies, to require mandatory HIV testing and reporting, and to impose ridiculous criminal penalties for transmitting the AIDS virus, among other possibilities.

"We desperately need the bill, and we just as critically want to pass it free of destructive debris. Our Senators must understand we will hold them accountable for irresponsible votes," said Basile.

Each ad encourages readers to visit, call or write to express their constituent right to a full-powered, unencumbered Federal AIDS Research, Information and Care Act.

As I See It

As the governor's impeachment trial grinds on and on in Phoenix, the gavel-to-gavel coverage by KUAT in Tucson and KATV in Phoenix also goes on. These two PBS affiliates have undertaken a rather daring venture in order to bring the people of Arizona the "live" view from the Senate chamber. With almost no financial support these stations have, made a commitment to be sure this historical event is available for any member of the community who wants to watch. That decision took guts and that decision may cost these stations a great deal of money and viewership as well.

When KUAT here in Tucson approached various companies and contributors in the community asking them to financially support the trial coverage, most said "no"; they felt the whole thing was "too political" and could have adverse effects on their businesses. Add to that the fact that the programming that is getting "bumped" to make room for the live trial coverage is the very popular PBS program "Sesame Street", among others and you have a situation that most commercial stations would have buckled under. Thus, we'd have had a situation of no station carrying the trial, gavel-to-gavel — "just not economically feasible" would have been the reasoning.

Why then is it important that some station carry it. After all, most people are bored with the whole situation anyway and for many, a quick digested version is all that's necessary at the end of the day. Why is more needed?

Gavel-to-gavel coverage, which opens the event for all to see and witness, is important to our American democratic process, whether it's economically feasible to individual businesses or not. We need to see that the American

democratic process DOES work and that it's fair, appropriate, protective of the rights of those involved and carries out the wishes of the voters. As those voters, we need to know exactly what the facts are and judge them for ourselves, not as some newscaster has interpreted them for us. After all, that's what a democracy is all about — the wishes of the majority being fulfilled.

In the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, many decisions in America came out of the concept of the "town hall". All those deciding on issues would gather, hear all the facts and then vote. Television allows us, the 1988 voters, to participate in the town hall kind of decision making that our forefathers and mothers used to such great advantage.

By the time the trial is over, KUAT management estimates that it could cost more than \$50,000 to carry gavel-to-gavel coverage of the impeachment proceedings. The chances of local businesses underwriting the costs are not strong as of this writing. The station may have to "eat" those costs which will greatly affect their ability to program for several months to come.

KUAT is currently involved in a fund raiser, trying to raise donations from viewers to support programming of the station for the next several months.

As I see it, this would be an excellent opportunity for members of the Gay and Lesbian communities to make a strong statement about our priorities. Pledges to the station (621-1600) on behalf of the community could show our concern for their plight and additionally would say "thanks" for the gavel-to-gavel coverage that benefits all of us, because it benefits our democratic process.
