## Gays speak to Demos Platform Committee

WASHINGTON, DC - National Association of Gay and Lesbian Democratic Clubs Executive Director Christine R. Riddiough testified before the Democratic Platform Committee last week, calling for the platform to send a strong message to the American people. "Today what is smart and what is right for Democrats is to write a platform that clearly shows what the Democratic party stands for ... It is vital that such a platform state ... that the Democratic party is the party for social justice for all Americans, the party committed to full civil and human rights for all Americans," she said.

Riddiough called for the Democratic party to address key concerns of the Lesbian and Gay community. "Each of the Democratic presidential candidates has stated their support for action to protect the rights of Gay people. Our party's platform in addressing civil and human rights issues must clearly state its support for the rights of all people including Gay men and Lesbians," she stated.

Riddiough also said that it would be criminal for the platform not to discuss AIDS, noting that, "All the candidates have outspokenly criticized the Reagan-Bush administration for their inaction on AIDS - inaction that has led to the loss of many lives.

Executive Director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, Vic Basile exhorted the platform committee to reaffirm its commitment to the civil rights of minority groups, including the nation's

Gays and Lesbians. Basile linked the issues of AIDS and Gay and Lesbian civil rights. He said bias and prejudice toward Gays and Lesbians in the Reagan Administration has created a danger to the health and welfare of American society.

The result, testified Basile, has been hundreds of thousands of people needlessly infected with AIDS because of the administration's failure to accept responsibility. "The next administration will be saddled with the consequences of the Reagan Administration's failings" with respect to AIDS, Basile said, adding that "the American people must know that a Democratic administration will be committed to responding to those consequences with courage, compassion and resolve."

Basile singled out discrimination associated with AIDS as particularly offensive to civil rights. "As the effects of AIDS begin to be felt in every corner of our society," said Basile, "more and more people begin to know - the consequences of discrimination. People who viewed discrimination as someone else's problem now recognize it as everyone's problem."

Basile also complimented the many Democratic candidates and elected officials for paying the Gay community the "highest possible tribute" during the campaign - that of including us, as opposed to singling us out.

"Gays and Lesbians do not wish to be singled out," he said.

"We simply wish to be included in the vast quilt of American society."

In addition to presenting platform testimony to both parties, The Human Rights Campaign Fund will participate in both nominating conventions this year and will work aggressively with the presidential campaigns of the nominees.

Riddiough discussed the increasing problem of violence against Gay people, stating, "The Democratic party should support efforts to decrease crime and violence against everyone in our society. Such support should include support for efforts to combat violence based on bigotry." She also commented that concerns about family issues must include Gay and Lesbian families. She said, "The Democratic party, in recognizing the need for greater support for the American family, should also acknowledge that the American family today bears little resemblance to the nuclear family of 'Dick and Jane' books. Support for the family must include support for adequate child care, support for seniors and support for Gay and Lesbian families.

The Human Rights Campaign Fund is the country's largest organization representing Lesbians and Gays in the nation's capitol. It is a bi-partisan organization founded in 1980. The Campaign Fund has contributed more than \$600,000 to candidates running for the Senate and House of Representatives in the past eight years.

## Couples takes on AMTRAK Family Plan

LOS ANGELES, CA - Same sex couples and Gay/Lesbian families are eligible for reduced fares on AMTRAK under the Family Plan according to John Jacobsen, Director of Community Affairs. Apparently not all ticket agents understand the corporate policy.

On May 10, Walter Wheeler, President of Couples, Inc., was not permitted to buy a Family Plan Ticket for himself and Carey Junkin, his partner for over five years. The round-trip ticket from Los Angeles to Santa Barbara normally costs \$34 for adults. Under the Family Plan, the head of the household pays full fare, and the other adult family member pays half fare, children between 2 and 11 pay 1/4 fare.

"This is just another example of the day to day discrimination that costs our families more money for the same service," said Wheeler. He added, "I believe we must stand up for our rights, even over small issues. Otherwise we will not receive equal treatment and may even lose the rights we already have. We were just not willing to accept the opinion of the ticket clerk in this issue."

In a telephone conversation with Mr. John Jacobsen, Director of Community Affairs for the National Railroad Passenger Corp.

(AMTRAK), the official policy was clarified. AMTRAK issues Family Plan tickets without regard to the sex of the family members. The policy, changed in 1985, is meant to be non-judgmental and no inquiry is to be made of the family's legal status, with no proof being required.

Anyone can obtain a Family Plan ticket by presenting themselves as the Head of the Household and the others as members of their family. The couple must be willing to say they are "married" because the official policy requires that the half-fare adult be a spouse. It does not define "spouse". A Head of Household and children under 12 can qualify in any case. The policy is being rewritten to eliminate family requirements for reduced fares. Couples, Inc. will be following this policy as it is developed.

Oliver Childs, a ticketing supervisor in the national ticket center held to his position that Family Plan tickets are for legally married couples only. On Wheeler's continued insistence, he called Charmaine Freeman, Director of Fares and Tariffs in Washington. She told Childs to issue the reduced fare ticket. Mr. Childs immediately stated it was a one-time instruction because of the trouble caused and he would not

issue such tickets in the future. In another telephone call to Mr. Jacobsen, Wheeler was assured that ticket agents and supervisors who refuse to issue Family Plan tickets to same-sex couples and Gay/Lesbian families will "be properly educated".

"While it is true that we only saved \$17 on this ticket, it is another example of the extra money we constantly pay because individuals tell us that our families are not recognized," said Wheeler. "I hope our success in this minor case will encourage others to automatically challenge service providers who offer reduced fares or fees for families to extend those benefits to our families."

To obtain Family Plan tickets from AMTRAK: (1) Make reservations well in advance for yourself and your family. Request a Family Plan ticket. Do not allow the ticket agent ask your legal status, tell them you are "married". (2) Take this article with you when you go to buy your tickets.

(3) Purchase your tickets during East Coast business hours. If challenged ask to speak to a supervisor. If they will not issue

COUPLES, INC. ADOPTS NEW LOGO  
LOS ANGELES, CA - Couples, Inc., has adopted the above logo. The new logo includes two intertwined hands both wearing wedding bands representing a committed relationship. To indicate the open membership policies of Couples Inc., the hands are not identifiable as to their sex, race or ethnicity.

The hands are superimposed on a lavender heart symbolizing love and in keeping with the groups slogan, "Love makes a family. Nothing else, nothing less." The heart is completely surrounded by a pink triangle, the Nazi symbol for homosexuals in concentration camps during World War II. The triangle is used to show that today Gay and Lesbian families are surrounded by the repression and homophobia of our society.

Couples Inc., the National Organization for Family Diversity, adopted the logo to represent them as a couples' rights group. Their Executive Director, J. Carey Junkin explained, "Last year we were totally involved in organizing The Wedding at the October March on Washington. We just used the logo that Couples, Inc. had designed for The Wedding on everything to help promote that demonstration. We needed a general symbol to represent more than a one-day event, so we asked Deborah Hanan to help us design an appropriate symbol." Hanan is a graphic artist and calligrapher in West Hollywood.

Couples is a single issue political advocacy organization believing that same-sex couples and other Gay and Lesbian families should be entitled to the same rights and privileges as married heterosexual couples. 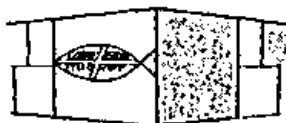

## Senate Judiciary Committee okays anti-porno bill

PHOENIX - An anti-pornography bill aimed to restrict the operation of "peep shows" and the sale of sexual devices has been passed by the Senate Judiciary committee and will be placed before the Senate.

The committee unanimously passed the bill after members agreed to change the standard of obscenity from community acceptance to community tolerance. A stronger version of the proposal cleared the House last month.

The bill, which is being guided through the legislature by Rep. Leslie Johnson (R-Mesa), initially provided that jurors decide obscenity cases based on what is "accepted" in the state as a whole. However, as amended, courts would continue to instruct jurors to consider what is "tolerated" within the state in determining whether sexual activity is patently offensive.

The legislation would require that all "sexually oriented" businesses, defined as commercial establishments that show films, videocassettes or live performances depicting explicit sexual activities, file an ownership disclosure statement with the local health department.

The bill also mandates that managers of businesses with peep show booths have an unobstructed view of customers inside such booths.

Another provision in the bill would make it a class 5 felony, punishable by up to one to six years in prisons, to knowingly transport, sell, exhibit or

commercially distribute sexual gadgets. Possession of six or more such items, defined as "a device designed or primarily used for the stimulation of human genital organs," would be prohibited.

"Why six devices?" asked Louis Rhodes, director of the Arizona chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU). "What was the magic of this number?" Rhodes also called the bill an "obtrusive attack on First Amendment rights."

Rhodes said that there could be constitutional problems with the acceptance standard, noting "almost everything in this language is going to be litigated over," and courts have set a precedent of tolerance. He also told the committee that, "there are already laws on the books that can deal with this particular problem." If the committee decides to pass the bill, he said, they should first "rip it to shreds."

Diane Kusack, a former Scottsdale City Council member who served on the federal Meese Commission study of pornography, said these arcade areas are "conducive to public sexual conduct" and therefore could contribute to the spread of AIDS. Other opponents speaking before the committee were prosecutors and representatives of Concerned Women for America and Citizens for Decency through Law.

Opponents of the bill were lobbyists representing theater owners and the Motion Picture Association of America.

## AIDS cases up, most victims in Americas

ATLANTA, GA (AP) - The number of AIDS cases jumped at least 72 percent worldwide, with the disease concentrated in the Americas and spread in three distinct geographic patterns, the World Health Organization (WHO) reports.

In a report published last week by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, the WHO says 34,913 cases of AIDS has been reported for 1987 as of March 21.

That brought the global total to 88,091 in the seven years since the disease was detected, the report said. It also noted that 1987 reporting is not yet complete and the total so far represents a 72 percent increase over 1986.

By comparison, the number of cases of acquired immune deficiency syndrome increased 92 percent from 1985 to 1986 and 110 percent from 1984 to 1985.

The WHO has reported AIDS cases in 138 countries since 1981. Thirty six other countries have told the Geneva-based organization that they have had no cases.

The real number is thought to be much higher because reporting has only just begun in some places, such as some African countries.

The WHO said AIDS reporting indicates "three broad yet distinct geographical patterns of transmission:

\*\* Regions containing industrialized countries with large numbers of AIDS cases, such as North America, Australia, Western Europe, New Zealand, and parts of Latin America.

In those areas, most cases have occurred among homosexual or bisexual men and among abusers of injectable drugs. Male patients outnumber females as much as 15 to 1.

\*\* Areas of central, eastern and southern Africa and some

Caribbean countries. In these areas, most cases have occurred among heterosexuals, affecting as many women as men. In some urban areas, researchers estimate up to 25 percent of the sexually active population is infected with the virus that causes AIDS.

\*\* Areas of Eastern Europe, the Middle East, Asia and most of the Pacific. Here, the AIDS virus was apparently not introduced until the early to middle 1980s, and only small numbers of cases have been reported. Generally, cases here have occurred among people who have traveled to AIDS-epidemic areas or had sexual contact with people from such areas, according to the WHO.

FOUR CHARGED IN ACTORS DEATH  
SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) - George Rose's adopted 18-year-old son and the youth's natural father were among four people charged with murdering the Tony Award-winning actor, police said.

The natural father said Rose had sexually abused his son, Domingo Antonio Ralfe Vazquez, as well as other youths.

Police and doctors also said cocaine was found on the 68-year-old Rose and that laboratory tests performed in Miami showed traces of a cocaine derivative in his body at the time of his death.

In a sworn statement distributed to reporters by police, Juan Antonio Vazquez Padilla, the natural father of Ralfe Vazquez, said the British-born performer was held for eight hours on May 4 before being clubbed to death.

Vazquez said the killers tried to make the death look like the result of a single-car accident. That was how his death was originally reported.

Hemophilia patients: 652, or 1 percent.

Undetermined transmission cause: 1,967, or 3 percent.

Childhood cases (under age 13): 973, or 2 percent.

Cases among whites: 36,196, or 59 percent.

Cases among blacks: 15,955, or 26 percent.

Cases among Hispanics: 8,882, or 14 percent.

## A REMARKABLE PEOPLE

Funny, sometimes the routes we take to get to where we are, the decisions we make which become the basis of our value systems. Recently the media has become enamored of Viet Nam. In the last two months I've seen two movies, "Good Morning Viet Nam" and "Full Metal Jacket" - and several episodes of the two TV series about Viet Nam, "Tour of Duty" and "China Beach". They started me thinking about the war and how it affected me and ultimately, how it affected me as a Gay man.

One of the first things (of course) that I noticed about these movies and TV shows was the great number of semi-clad young men. I remembered being eighteen years old, sheltered, just out of high school and terribly aware of my sexuality and my decision, made at age 12, never to act on that sexuality.

And I remembered not knowing much about the ideology of the conflict in Viet Nam or the history of that poor divided country, but knowing what effect living in a barracks full of semi-clad young men, often naked young men, would have on me. I knew I could not allow that to happen, the very least

that would happen would be that everyone would laugh at me for my constant hard on. The most that could happen would be far worse I thought, someone might know I was queer, that the sight of those naked young men turned me on.

When I knew I had to get out of my military obligation, I also knew that I wanted to do it honorably, not by lying, not by running to Canada, and of course, not by telling them I was homosexual. I began checking into the political and religious objections to the war. I quickly discovered Mahatma Gandhi and the principle of "satyagraha" (truth force) which is still an important part of my life.

I read everything I could get my hands on about non-violence - Dave Dillon, Daniel Berrigan, Martin Luther King. I spent long hours discussing the principles these men preached with everyone who would talk to me. Eventually my personal code of values became established around non-violence and activism, all very much out of my fear about my own sexual orientation. I have never told this story before.

Now, twenty years later,

after bouts with alcoholism and addiction, fear and depression, poverty and prosperity, these principles still guide my life, my commitment to the world in which I live. Now, in another era of historical transition, when homosexuality has become on the surface at least, more accepted, but when AIDS threatens that acceptance as well as our very lives, I wonder what decisions eighteen-year-old, sheltered young men right out of high school will make.

I hope they have an easier time accepting their homosexuality than I did. And I hope they become infused with pride in our community and in its response to the crisis we face. If they must look to others as I had to to codify their beliefs I hope they find some of our Gay thinkers and leaders - Whitman, Apuzzo, Milk. And finally, I hope these young men and women are not led into lives of fear by this damned plague, but come to love themselves, their community, and their heritage as homosexual people.



#### THE ADVANTAGES OF MISTAKES AND FAILURE

There was a story on CNN recently about a farmer and his wife who had lost their farm. A common story, as was the added fact that when farmers lose their farms, the cities around those farms also suffer.

What struck me about this report was the added story of a woman who had a store in the town, a store which was slowly but assuredly going out of business. What was this woman's plan for the future? Causing a fire in her home and killing herself and her entire family. Why? To avoid the "embarrassment" the failure of her store would cause.

Strange, but true.

What is wrong with this woman? She is so ready to end her life and that of her entire family for no better reason than to avoid the perceived embarrassment failure would bring. Has she never stopped to think that her business is failing not because of her own inabilities, but because of reasons beyond her control?

And what is so wrong with failure anyway? Is this woman so blind to the fact that life is nothing more than a string of failures and successes? (Unless she is one of those rarities whose life has been exactly perfect. I believe not).

Mistakes and failures are two of the most valuable tools humans have—as well as many other animals. Our brain has evolved to readily learn from, and adapt to, errors which it makes.

Think about it. People tell you fire is hot and will burn, but hold a lit match to your hand once and you are not likely to do that again. A mistake in judgement ("The fire will not burn me.") has taught the human animal that fire is dangerous. Mistakes are a tool by which we learn and advance. Edison did not discover the filament for the light bulb first time out. In fact, he tried thou-

sands and thousands of materials as filaments before discovering carbon (a burnt piece of thread). Each attempt—and each failure—taught him more and more—until finally, success was the result.

Yes, failure is hard to accept; so, too, are mistakes. I have been a professional writer for over 12 years and have failed many times. Each failure makes me try that much harder the next time out. For these failures I am better at my craft, and more determined than ever to maintain success.

And what about perfection? The desire to achieve perfection is perhaps the single most important tool humans have; for it is that single goal which has made us try. If you are like me, you believe the thrill of the chase is far more gratifying than the actual capture; the challenge of trying to achieve a goal more satisfying than the actual achievement.

No, perfection will never be attained; mistakes and failures are but the by-product of the attempt and should be seen as no more than that.

A mistake is only wrong if you do not admit it and if you make the same mistake more than once; in either situation it has not served its purpose—for you have not allowed it to—if you do not learn from it. Likewise, failure is wrong if it is the end-product of a less-than-wholehearted attempt. If you try to do the best you can and fail, it is not a failure, but a chance to do better next time.

Be not afraid of making a mistake, or trying and failing; be afraid, however, of never making a mistake or never failing for that means only one thing: You have wasted your life by never trying.

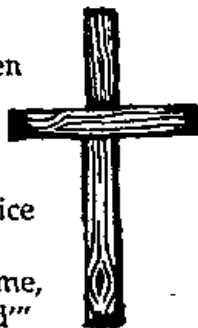

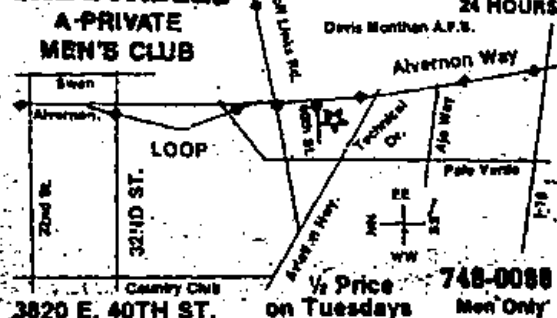

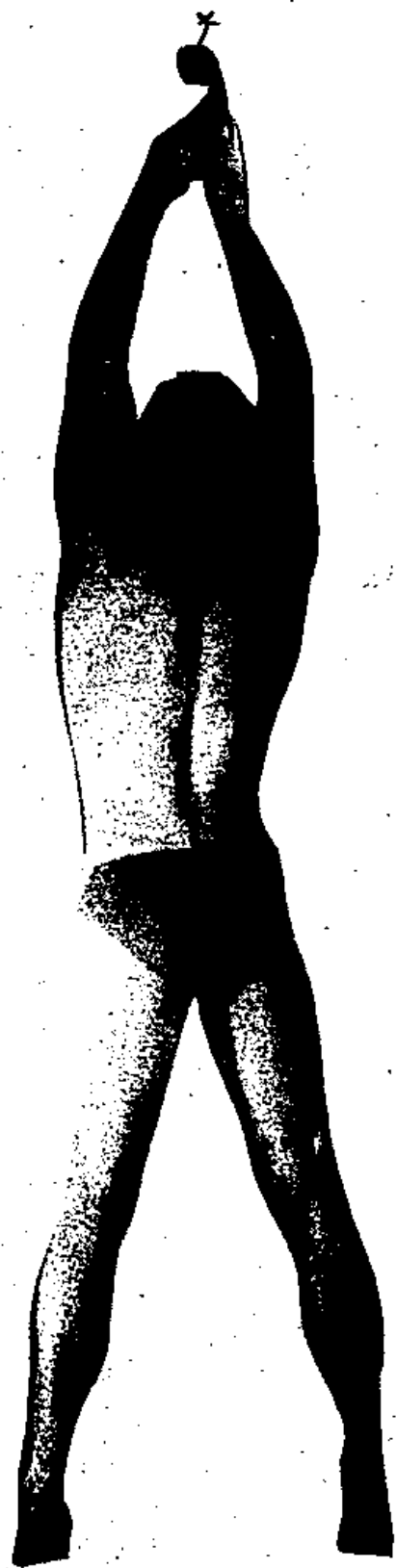

## News From MCC / TUCSON

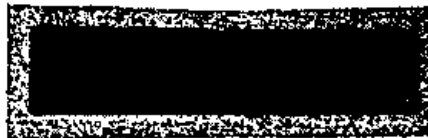

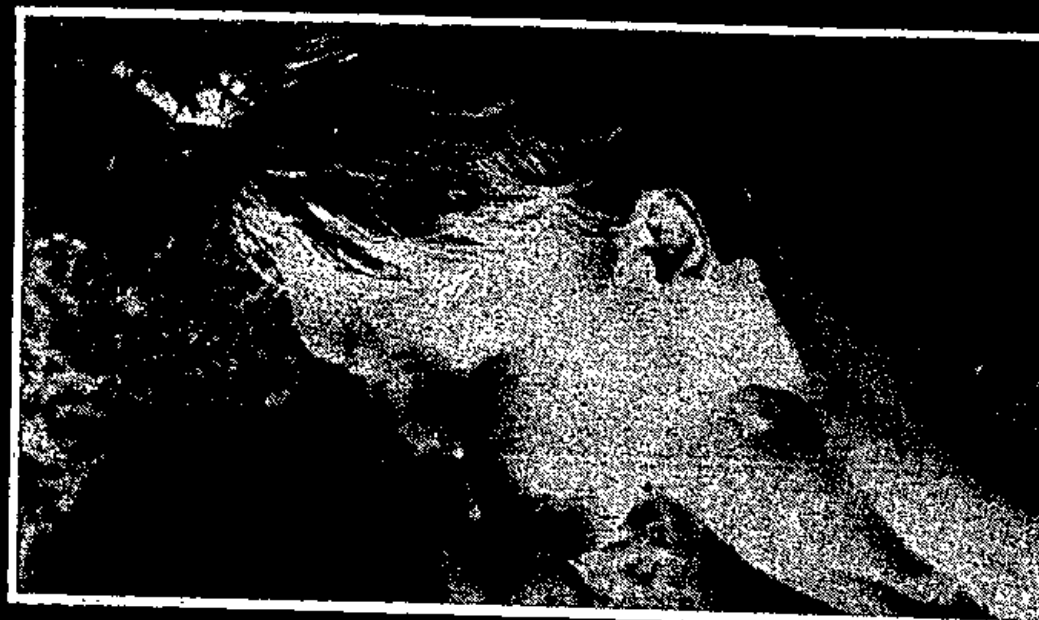
