## Joshua Tree Hayride

Thursday, Dec. 22

TUCSON - The 11th Annual Hayride to Winterhaven, sponsored by the Joshua Tree, will take place this Thursday, Dec. 22. The hay-laden truck will leave the parking lot at Jt's at 7:30 and visit all the local Gay bars to sing carols, have a drink or visit and pick up additional passengers.

The Winterhaven "Festival of Lights" is also an annual event that began in 1949. This year there are more than 300,000 Christmas tree lights, sleighs, reindeer, several versions of Santa Claus, large wrapped Christmas packages, mangers and angels are sprinkled over 80 percent of the lawns in the 270-home subdivision in north-central Tucson. Each year a 100,000 people pass through Winterhaven to view the spectacle.

The extra large Joshua Tree Hayride stake truck is scheduled to go to Rumor Hazzit first, then, in order, Outrageous, Graduate, IBT's, Colette's and Rita's, and then on to view the Christmas lights and decorations at Winterhaven. The truck will return directly to the Joshua Tree at approximately 10:30. Make sure you have arranged for transportation back to your original point of embarkation if you joined the Hayride enroute. And be sure to dress warmly in case of cool weather.

## Dr. Gallo comments on AIDS crisis

TUCSON - Dr. Robert Gallo, the scientist who helped discover AIDS, was in Tucson last week to speak at the Arizona Cancer Center. He probably knows more about the AIDS virus than anyone else. In his talk he covered a variety of thoughts. Here are a few.

"We are a lot closer to cures for a whole host of cancers than we are to a cure for AIDS."

"There is much more to learn about this virus before we can control it. It is possible we will need new insights into its most basic nature first."

"AIDS will never sweep through us the way epidemics of plague and influenza did, but it is there, and it will continue to move in a very slow, insidious way."

"This is one of the most complicated viruses medical science has ever faced."

"The most exciting research we are doing is in understanding the virus and how it works, and in finding the drugs that work against it - and they do work," Gallo said specifically talking about AZT.

"These discoveries are launching a whole new era of anti-viral drug therapy that can be compared to the discovery of antibiotics to control bacterial diseases," he said.

## Dallas Judge Rails Against Gays In Sentencing Killer

DALLAS, TX - A Texas judge says he sentenced an 18-year-old killer to 30 years in prison instead of the maximum life term partly because the two men he shot to death were homosexuals.

Richard Lee Bednarski, a Richmond College student at the time of his conviction Nov. 19, was found guilty in the May 15 slaying of Tommy Lee Trimble, 34, and Lloyd Griffin, 27.

"These two guys that got killed wouldn't have been killed if they hadn't been cruising the streets picking up teenage boys," State District Judge Jack Hampton told the Dallas Times Herald. "I don't care much for queers cruising the streets picking up teenage boys," he said. "I've got a teenage boy."

The judge said he would have given a harsher sentence to Bednarski if his victims had been, for example, "a couple of housewives out shopping, not hurting anybody." Hampton expressed no reservations about his statements, the newspaper reported. "Just spell my name right," Hampton said. "If it makes anybody mad, they'll forget it by 1990 (election year)."

Testimony revealed that Bednarski and a group of nine friends drove to the Oaklawn area of Dallas to harass Gay men the night of May 15. The boys testified that they were standing on a street corner jeering at passers-by, when Bednarski persuaded another boy to join him in beating and robbing Trimble and Griffin who had invited the boys into their car.

Testimony did not reveal that the victims solicited sex from Bednarski or his friend. The four drove to a park and walked to a hilltop clearing. The other youth testified that Bednarski immediately pulled a pistol and ordered the men to take off their clothes. When the men refused, Bednarski started shooting. Trimble died immediately. Griffin died three days later.

A Gay rights leader warned that outraged voters will remember Hampton's statement that he gave a lighter sentence to the murderer partly because his two victims were homosexuals. William Waybourn, president of the Dallas Gay Alliance, said the organization's eight telephone lines began ringing constantly after the newspaper published the judge's statement.

He said he hopes Hampton's remarks will prompt the public to work to remove him from the bench when he comes up for re-election. "Being at the wrong place at the wrong time is just a tragedy," Waybourn said of the killings. "I'm sorry for the families of the men who were killed. They don't deserve this. And Hampton doesn't deserve to be a judge."

Robert Flowers, executive director of the state Commission on Judicial Conduct, declined to comment on Hampton's statements and said the 11-member commission would investigate if a complaint were filed. "A judge's discretion is his or her own," Flowers said. "And generally we haven't had too many occasions where the judge has spoken about what his thought process has been (in sentencing)."

## Competency evaluation for Kowalski completed

WASHINGTON, DC - "The positive results of Sharon Kowalski's competency evaluation by the Miller Dwan Rehabilitation Unit gives us hope that now she will get the rehabilitative care she deserves, and ultimately, to be able to go home — a home of her choice," said National Organization for Women President Molly Yard. The results of the court-ordered tests were announced in Minnesota on Dec. 12.

Sharon Kowalski is a seriously disabled, 32-year-old woman confined to a nursing home with a minimal rehabilitative program and forbidden the company of her friends and her partner of nine years, Karen Thompson. Her disability stems from a car accident when she was 27.

Kowalski's father Donald, her legal guardian, has refused to acknowledge his daughter's lesbianism and to allow Thompson, a professor of physical education who has training in physical therapy, to visit Sharon.

"We are pleased to note that the competency report recommended that Sharon be transferred to a long-term rehabilitation facility and that an assessment be made of the current situation with her family and her significant other relationship," Yard said. "The report confirmed Karen Thompson's conviction that Sharon is able to express herself and could benefit greatly from rehabilitative care, especially in her communications skills."

"The evaluation is a break for Sharon in terms of her care. It is a victory for the rights of the disabled, and it is equally a victory for the rights of a Lesbian to choose how she will live her life," said Yard.

"We are full of admiration for Karen Thompson for her continued fight to secure appropriate care for Sharon. In spite of repeated roadblocks, she refused to give up. This is yet further evidence that one person can make a difference," Yard stated.

The difference in this case is that Sharon Kowalski may be on her way to taking charge of her own life again.

## ACLU SHUTS TUCSON OFFICE

TUCSON - The Southern Arizona office of the Arizona Civil Liberties Union closed its doors last week. ACLU Director Louis Rhodes said that the decision to close was made by the state ACLU Board months ago due to a budgetary shortfall, which officials hope is only temporary.

"We hope to have the Tucson office reopened next year," Rhodes said.

## DRUG MAY SLOW AIDS PATIENTS WEIGHT LOSS

BALTIMORE, MD (AP) - A drug that appears to be successful in retarding wasting syndrome in terminally ill cancer patients, will soon be tested to see if it is equally effective in treating people with AIDS.

The drug, high-dose megestrol acetate, will be tested on AIDS patients at the University of Maryland Cancer Center here.

The drug, sold under the trade name Megace, has been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, but as a chemotherapy agent in breast, prostate and endometrial cancer.

## HISTORY GROUP

### GETS MATLOVICH PAPERS

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (BAR) - The San Francisco Bay Area Gay & Lesbian Historical Society recently acquired an important addition to its Archives when it received personal papers and other memorabilia from Gay rights activist and former Air Force sergeant, the late Leonard Matlovich.

The Matlovich collection is an eclectic combination of the interesting, the valuable, and the unexpected: snapshots of Leonard's three tours of duty in Vietnam, course materials for the class on racism he taught while in the Air Force, clipping, correspondence, and legal documents regarding his court case; his uniform, dog-tags, and medals; and the T-shirt worn by the TV movie crew with the Time cover, "I Am A Homosexual".

The collection opens much of Matlovich's life, from childhood to his recent activism, but the bulk of the collection covers his service record, his challenge to the Air Force's exclusion of homosexuals, and the resulting series of court cases.

There are also two large boxes of correspondence, dating from the time his case went national, from Lesbians and Gay men from all over the country. The shy career military man - who didn't act on his homosexuality until he was 30 - had become a hero to many Gays across the country.

PWA COALITION RELEASES NEW BOOK  
NEW YORK, NY - People With AIDS Coalition New York has released "Surviving and Thriving With AIDS Volume Two - Collected Wisdom," a 368 page book of writing by people with acquired immune deficiency syndrome. It also contains many photographs of people with AIDS.

The Coalition also announced that "Surviving and Thriving with AIDS: Hints for the Newly Diagnosed", published in 1987, will be reprinted for the second time. Twenty thousand copies have been distributed. Both books are offered free to people with AIDS and ARC.

"The two books are meant to be read together, and in order," according to Michael Callen, editor of both volumes. "Hints" is still essential reading for the newly diagnosed. 'Collected Wisdom,' expands upon the information and ideas contained in 'Hints'. It's an anthology of our attempts to cope with AIDS. It's a slice of lives which captures what it is like to live with AIDS in America in the later '80s," Callen said.

Volume Two contains a large section on treatment options. AZT, aerosol pentamidine, DPG, IFN, AL721, and holistic approaches are discussed in first-hand accounts. Volume Two also attempts to remedy what Callen views as the major deficiency of "Hints" - that it contained little material not generated by white, Gay men. The new book contains much material by and about women and AIDS and people of color with AIDS. It also includes a section about AIDS-Related Complex and HIV antibody positivity.



Christmas 1910 was a memorable time for me. Ten years old and new environment. I had been surrounded by family all my life until we moved to the homestead, then it was just father, mother and me.

Christmas until this year had been a gay affair when I was showered with gifts, mostly dolls. At one time I had fourteen. Now there were no dolls or other gifts, only the few things mother could get at the grocery store.

During the week I was with brother Clarence and his wife and going to school. When Christmas vacation came, I was home and mother tried to make it seem like Christmas. While I was away, she had made a tree so that Christmas would be special to me, though gifts were hard to come by. She had taken those poor little trees that she had planted in the spring, but died for want of water, and put them together with bits of colored string and scraps of colored paper (which was practically unknown) and fashioned a little Christmas tree. What love and patience went into that tree which showed her devotion to me, and the determination that the spirit of Christmas would not die because we were in such a barren country.

I don't remember what was under that tree, but whatever it was it was gift of love.

My sister-in-law had taught me to embroider and I had made a little white collar for mother's dress.

I hung my stocking, heavy, long, ribbed and black, to the back of a rocking chair. In the morning it had a tube in it that turned out to be a child's magazine that was called "The Youth's Companion". A neighbor lady knew about it and mother subscribed to it, so I would have a look at the outside world. I took it for several years and still have a cover page (first to be colored) which carries the date March 16, 1912.

I've never forgotten the love and patience of my mother and father showed in those youthful years. Now it would be judged by the young as a terrible existence, but I've never regretted the kind of life I had in those years and think I am more considerate now by living that kind of life.

So ends this tale, with a wish that all who read this may have a VERY MERRY CHRISTMAS, 1986.

A long time ago there was a baby born. Today the conditions under which he was born would seem primitive, even unsanitary, but they were standard for a person of his place and class at that time.

He was destined to become a King. This was known throughout the land of his birth and beyond. Many of his future subjects celebrated his birth and journeyed to be near him.

This child grew to adulthood without further distinguishing himself, although he did have one secret enemy with which he grappled throughout his life. When he became King he set in motion a great movement that was eventually to span many centuries, lands and peoples. The work of his life was to touch countless millions of lives.

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

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

## HIV ANTIBODY SERUM SCREEN: NON REACT

I tested negative for the AIDS antibody. I sit here at my computer and read that sentence over and over again. So much is contained in those seven words; it's hard to completely explain how I feel about the test results.

I am not really surprised I tested negative; in fact, I would have been more surprised had I tested positive. Although I was living in San Francisco when AIDS was first being recognized, I was never very sexually active. Sure, I had those few moments that all young people have when they first discover sex. I may have overindulged once or twice, but it was a big desert between cases.

As soon as I truly understood the implications of AIDS, back in about 1983 or so, I became very careful of my activity — sexual and otherwise. (I vividly remember when initial theories about what came to be called AIDS said a bad batch of poppers was the culprit! So, who could tell what activity was dangerous?)

Sure I enjoy sex. Don't we all? I guess I slid by, getting my fill of sexual discovery before there was an AIDS scare, and being mature enough to understand the potential personal danger while there was still time to do something about it.

I never felt a necessity to be tested for AIDS; I guess, honestly, I didn't want to know. I never put another person at risk, and I didn't want to know, so why bother? What made me change my mind and get tested? Actually, I didn't have a choice.

— I found myself in an awkward situation as a volunteer in a medical drug-evaluation study (in

which I am still participating as I write this column). As part of the physical evaluation prior to the study, I needed to pass a complex blood and urine screening, as well as a screen for Hepatitis B and the HIV antibody.

(I discovered ahead of time the HIV test would be done, so I guess I could have chosen to not be a part of the study and not have the HIV test. But, I had already volunteered and felt I really couldn't back-out. Does this mean I really wanted to be tested for HIV?)

I flew through with colors flying — and no Hepatitis B or HIV antibodies in my body.

Am I relieved? Not really. I never expected to test positive. Has my outlook toward life changed? No. Do I feel reborn, given a second chance? Again, no. In fact I feel, in a word, nothing.

What is the point of this column. I cannot tell you; I don't think I understand it myself. Perhaps I want to say don't despair, there may still be time to change your sexual habits — if indeed you have not already done so. Maybe I want to tell you to have the test, to find out for sure if you have HIV antibodies or not. Maybe I just wanted to share this with you with no further intent in mind. I really don't know.

Can we ever know ahead of time when we are going to die? No. Perhaps the point of this column is just to prove that point.
