Celebration '90 To Bring Record Number Of Athletes to Gay Games III

VANCOUVER, BC - Celebration '90 is right on track, and the hundreds of volunteers working towards the games on August 4 to 11 are dedicated to providing participants with a rewarding and enriching experience. Centered on the principle of including people of all ages, colors and sexual orientation will compete in 29 different sporting events in Vancouver. A varied Cultural Festival including dance, music and literature is quickly selling out.

"When we began our planning four years ago, we based our projections on 4,000 athletes," says Mark Mees, Executive Director of Celebration '90. With over 5,100 paid registrants to date, the Games have become the largest multi-nation, multi-sport festival in the world this year. What is even more

exciting for the organizers is that 45 percent of the athletes are women — creating a balance no other international sporting event has ever matched.

"Our biggest challenge facing us as we count down to the Opening Ceremonies on August 4 is to fill the significant number of requests we have received for hosted accommodation," says Mees. The teams and individuals coming to participate in the Games have raised funds for their travel expenses but many have requested to be billeted with Vancouver hosts, Mees said.

There are men and women coming to Vancouver from towns and cities across the U.S. and Canada and from 20 other countries, including East Germany, Poland, Switzerland, Norway, Sweden, Ireland, Japan, Zimbabwe, Guam, Italy, England, Holland, Israel, Venezuela, and Papua New Guinea. Americans outnumber all other countries combined so far, followed by Canadians, Germans, Australians and New Zealanders.

Organizers are now estimating participation

levels of between 6,000 and 7,000 athletes, and several thousand more individuals are expected to participate in the Cultural Festival events. Gay Games II in 1982 drew 1,300 participants, and Gay Games II in 1986 drew 3,500 participants.

Mees points out that Celebration '90 will be the world's largest multi-sports event anywhere in 1990 and will likely only be surpassed by the 1992 Olympics. "The Goodwill Games in Seattle, also being held this summer will have about 2,500 athletes, and the recent Commonwealth Games in New Zealand and slightly over 3,000," Mees said.

With spectators included, Metropolitan Vancouver Athletic and Arts is expecting as many as 20,000 visitors for Celebration '90. "We are told that most direct flights to Vancouver are booked solid from some major cities, and that dozens of hotels are fully booked," said Mees.

Celebration '90 Office Manager, Mary Brooks, said "There are barely enough hours in the day to process the registrations. However, by the time the final registration deadline rolls around May 31, we'll be ready for anything."

Most athletes fall between the ages of 25 and 39, though eight percent of all athletes are either under 25 or over 60 years of age.

The most popular sports so far are Bowling, Volleyball, running events in Track & Field, Soccer, Slowpitch Softball and Swimming. There's still a lot of opportunity for participation in the Equestrian, Diving, 10K Physically Challenged Marathon, and in many field events of Track & Field. All other sports are represented well.

Asked about the possibility of sports roster cuts, Mees said, "Where the number of entries is insufficient in relation to the cost of the event, we may consider having the event cancelled. Obviously we would offer any affected athletes either a refund or transfer to another sport."

Over 4,700 athletes took advantage of lower entry fees by registering by January 31, 1990.

May 31, 1990 is the last date you can register for any Gay Games III and Cultural Festival sport or cultural event.

Sheldon Slams Safe Sex Ad in SF

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - Rev. Lou Sheldon, homophobic founder of the Traditional Values Coalition, spoke out last weekend against the San Francisco AIDS Foundation's new safe-sex ad campaign which features the words "Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness," and two young Gay men wrapped in an American flag.

On KGO-TV & Radio's "NightFocus", Sheldon blasted the ad for its use of the flag, and for promoting homosexuality, which he says is caused by a gender identification and can be "cured".

"There is a disservice that is done very clearly in this ad," Sheldon said. "(It creates) a false sense of security, because we know that the homosexual condition is not really something that produces life... that's going to produce death, not life."

Les Pappas of SFAF defended the ad, maintaining that the poster was created to have the greatest impact on young Gays at risk of HIV infection. Pappas said the flag was used in the ad to "send a positive message to young Gay men. They are part of this country and they deserve life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness," Pappas said.

In a series of bigoted remarks, Sheldon insisted that homosexuality, not AIDS, was the underlying illness. "The bottom line issue is not that condom," he said. "The issue simply is that you need to deal with a dysfunctional developmental disorder in a person's life."

When asked by NightFocus hosts why he would be opposed to the ad if it could save lives, Sheldon said there would be no life for people who participate in anal sex, and "other homosexual acts which produce the HIV virus."

Pappas attempted to educate Sheldon, reminding him that there is no kind of sex act that "produces" the HIV virus, while both heterosexual and homosexual unsafe sex practices spread the virus.

Pappas said that campaigns such as the new poster have proven effective at reducing the spread of AIDS. "It does save lives," he said. "We have experienced in San Francisco several years of producing effective prevention campaigns that are working, that are lowering the rate of transmission, and we are saving lives."

In the 30 minute program, Sheldon also said that homosexuality is evil and that the flag has been "hijacked" to promote Gay sex.

"I certainly don't see any desecration of the flag," Pappas said. "We're probably not going to change the minds (of homophobes) with this ad," Pappas said. "What we are going to do is save some lives."

In an unscientific phone-in poll conducted during the program, 71 percent of the callers approved of the campaign.

At the end of the program, hosts apologized for Sheldon's appearance and asked the audience to withhold its cards and letters from KGO.

ACT-UP/DC Steps Up Boycott Of Marlboro

WASHINGTON, DC - ACT-UP/DC is calling its boycott of Marlboro cigarettes a growing success in the three weeks since the organization called for the ban of the product and its parent company Philip Morris, targeted for its six-figure financial support of homophobic North Carolina Senator Jesse Helms.

"Nearly every ACT-UP chapter worldwide has supported the boycott," Earnst Underwood of ACT-UP/DC told the San Francisco Sentinel. He said that ACT-UP chapters in the U.S.A. are continuing to circulate flyers and posters that portray Helms and the cigarette company as partners in hatred and bigotry.

Boycott organizers have also contacted more than 200 Gay and Lesbian organizations in North Carolina to seek support and campaign to defeat Helms in his re-election bid.

ACT-UP/DC media spokes-

person Michael Petrelis said the boycott has been supported by a number of artists and artists' organizations, as well as international Gay rights organizations.

In New York, artist Hans Haacke stirred controversy last month over his display of a body of work called "Helmsboro Country" which connected Helms to Philip Morris.

The cigarette company has contributed more than \$20,000 to Helms' campaign chest since 1977, and donated \$200,000 to the proposed Jesse Helms museum, because according to Philip Morris spokesperson Alice McGillan, "he is supportive of (Philip Morris') business interests."

Helms has repeatedly attempted to restrict AIDS funding and prohibit legislation which he feels will "promote homosexuality".



TUCSON - One of Arizona's landmark businesses will be closing its doors at the end of May. Books Brothers, Ltd. located at 3242 E. Speedway in Tucson opened its doors in 1976. Originally known as Bookland, owners Michael Heimbuch and Mitchell Bunting have continued to operate the store which carried a very large selection of Gay and Lesbian literature.

Heimbuch and Bunting both agree that they are 'burned out' and the battle between the huge book chains that have entered the market, as well as the video revolution have made it very hard for an independent to compete. "You can go into a video store and rent the

movie instead of reading the book," Bunting said.

Both owners have been very active in the Tucson Gay community. Heimbuch was a founder of the Tucson AIDS Project and Bunting founded the Tucson Frontrunners in which he is still active. Both are members of the Old Pueblo Business and Professional Association. Both have contributed without question to any organization that needed their support.

Tucson will miss this unique business as will many in Arizona and surrounding states who took advantage of Book Brothers mail order department. They were an integral part in informing and providing the Gay communities of the latest Lesbian/Gay literature, fiction, medical information, newspapers and magazines. OBSERVER thanks both Mike and Mitch for their undaunted support of the paper through their continued advertising support, which goes back to the day they opened their doors in 1976. Male Prostitution Ring Exposed In Indiana

FORT WAYNE, IN (AP) - Investigators have uncovered a 39-state male prostitution ring they say was run by a Navy computer expert that advertised via an electronic network and homosexual magazines.

The ring was organized by James William Dayton, a computer scientist at the Naval Avionics Center in Indianapolis, who died of a heart attack March 16, Marion County Prosecutor Steve Goldsmith told the Journal-Gazette.

At least 50 prostitutes and 300 patrons are involved, police estimate. No arrests have been made.

The ring's clients and prostitutes included Indianapolis banking executives, a Cincinnati priest and a Marion County police officer, the paper reported last Sunday. The network drew clients and prostitutes from 39 states, including Arizona.

An FBI agent who answered the phone in the agency's Indianapolis office said the FBI has a policy against commenting on whether it is involved in investigations.

Police suspected Dayton, 44, had been involved in legal sexual behavior as early as 1981. Authorities began investigating an alleged prostitution ring in 1985, but met with dead-ends.

Dayton's death allowed the case to be cracked, said Indianapolis police spokesman Andrew Stoner.

Dayton died in a Tiffin, Ohio bed and breakfast after having sex with a man who wanted to join the network as a prostitute, police said.

Jim Browning, the Seneca County sheriff's detective who investigated Dayton's death, searched his car and found 140 pages of computer-generated job applications for two Gay escort services that listed names, addresses and phone numbers and photos of nude and partially clothed men.

Browning notified Indianapolis police, who searched Dayton's Indianapolis apartment and found evidence of an intricate, computer system for matching male clients with male prostitutes.

Don Smith, a computer expert at Indiana University-Purdue University at Indianapolis, helped police break the codes to get access to that network.

GAYBRIEFS

POLITICS AS USUAL

In New York, politics can be not only dirty but downright filthy. New York's Mayor David Dinkins reached out to the Gay and Lesbian community when he needed them as part of an electoral coalition of minorities to push him over the top during his primary and general election bids. It is well known that without the Gay and Lesbian vote, Dinkins would not be mayor today.

As part of the coalition that brought Dinkins to final victory, Gays and Lesbians were promised a number of things. Put simply, Mayor Dinkins would be genuinely sympathetic to their cause. That he would be their mayor, everybody's mayor. That he understood what the AIDS crisis is doing to the Gay community. That he recognized the real consequences of homophobia and would not stand for it in New York City. He promised a lot, but after four months as mayor, he has failed to follow through on any of those promises.

Dinkins started to turn on the Gay community with his appointment, above protests from not just the Gay and Lesbian communities but civil rights activists as well, of Dr. Woodrow Meyers Jr. as health commissioner. (OBSERVER Jan. 31). Meyers was considered by many to be the most homophobic choice possible for this position, and started his career in New York by holding a press conference on AIDS which excluded the entire Gay press.

After the Meyers appointment fiasco, Dinkins then failed to respond to the bias-related murder of a Gay Staten Island man. He used the excuse that he wasn't invited to either the funeral or subsequent march against anti-Gay violence (although he had recently attended other funerals and marches for victims of bias-related crimes without waiting for a formal invitation).

Then, the mayor failed to offer a timely reward for information leading to the killer's arrest, something routinely done with hate crimes in New York City. These actions were insulting, but his next attacks have threatened the Gay and Lesbian community's position as a viable part of the political process in New York.

The mayor proceeded to downgrade the Office for the Lesbian and Gay Community (a citywide liaison office for Gay concerns), putting it under the control of other minority groups and closing off the one direct port for input to and from his office which the community had used during the Koch administration in its efforts to empower itself.

Since then, he has further failed to appoint a new liaison to replace outgoing Lee Hudson (who, in another dirty move, was told of her ousting as director the night after Dinkins caustic presentation at the Gay and Lesbian Community Center).

At that meeting in February, concerning the historic case that New York City school teachers have in the State courts, requesting

equal spousal benefits, the mayor said that his decision (he could simply make an executive order which would grant equal benefits to Gays and Lesbians) would be made only after his counsel studied the economic consequences of such action.

When asked if we could only have cheap justice, if Gay justice wasn't worth the same price as that of other minority groups, he said nothing. When asked if similar considerations should have been applied to Black civil rights in the 60s, he again said nothing. He then failed to offer any plan to answer questions concerning housing for People with AIDS, a strategic promise he had made to the community during his election campaign.

The latest blow to the Gay and Lesbian community has been the mayor's failure to appoint any Gay or Lesbian members to the city's redistricting committee which will redraw district lines for the upcoming council elections. It is now doubtful that Gays and Lesbians will be considered when these districts are redrawn, even though the redistricting will be taking into consideration the empowering of other minority groups. Gays and Lesbians won't be considered a true minority. At least not one that matters or deserves a political voice.

What have Gay and Lesbian political leaders said to all of this? Surprisingly little! Comments range from, "He's the only mayor we've got," "We have to work with who's there" to "I still think it was the best thing for New York to elect David Dinkins". The president of one local Gay political group stated in an interview that if we couldn't get representation on the redistricting committee itself, perhaps a Gay or Lesbian would be hired for the staff! What is wrong with this story?

In 1970, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the Nazi Party began to distribute anti-Semitic literature in front of many Jewish-owned stores. When the Jewish community tried to come up with strategies to deal with the crisis, it couldn't. Some wanted to call the general community's attention to this bigotry, others felt that the best course of action would be to ignore the situation. Some wanted to protest and some wanted to avoid anything that might backfire and bring about further anti-Semitic acts.

In a lot of ways, this situation is just like our own today. Some want to protest, and take action. Others fear that public confrontations with the mayor, or the new health commissioner, would incite them or the general public, to retaliation. Like the Milwaukee community, many of us fear that if we do speak up, if we do come forward and point out this bigotry and injustice, no one will stand with us. No one will listen. That those who said they would stand by us (like the mayor) will distance themselves from us. That, as usual, anti-Gay acts

Cincinnati Judge Refuses To Unseal Grand Jury's Art Exhibit Transcript

CINCINNATI, OH (AP) - A judge refused last Wednesday, May 9, to let an art gallery's lawyers review the transcript of a grand jury that indicted the museum for displaying sexually graphic photographs by the late Robert Mapplethorpe.

Lawyers for the Contemporary Arts Center argued that the gallery could seek to have the case dismissed if Hamilton County grand jurors weren't told that the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that photographs found to have artistic value could not be obscene.

But Common Pleas Judge

Gilbert Bettsan said that while the gallery might have grounds to seek dismissal, he had reviewed the transcripts and saw no reason to breach the grand jury's confidentiality.

The Mapplethorpe exhibit includes five pictures depicting sex acts and two featuring nude children.

The Arts Center and its director, Dennis Barrie, were indicted April 7 on charges of pandering obscenity and using children in material involving nudity. (OBSERVER, April 11). If convicted, they could face \$6,000 in fines and Barrie faces six months in jail.

Marc Mezibov, a lawyer for the Arts Center, said the gallery needs to know whether grand jurors considered the Supreme Court's ruling.

Frank Pouty, senior assistant city prosecutor, noting that the hearing involved on the question of releasing grand jury transcripts, said the Arts Center lawyers hadn't offered any evidence that the grand jury acted improperly.

Louis Sirkin, who represented Barrie, said he plans to seek the case's dismissal because grand jurors indicted the gallery for displaying obscene materials before any court found that the photographs involved were obscene.



NATIONAL NEWS
Last week, three states held primaries to decide party nominees for U.S. Senator to Dog Catcher. The three states, North Carolina, Ohio and West Virginia produced few surprises. In Ohio, voters in the 1st District gave thumbs down to incumbent Republican Congressman Donald "Buzz" Lukens. Lukens was convicted last year of having sex with an underage minor. Lukens finished a distant third, in a five person race, with 14% of the vote.

In West Virginia, the incumbent Democratic Senator Jay Rockefeller easily won his primary contest with over 90% of the vote.

In North Carolina, the big question was who is going to face Jesse Helms? The answer is still up in the air. The Democratic primary had six candidates running for the Senatorial nod, and no candidate received at least 40% of the vote, which, by North Carolina statutes, is needed to win the nomination. The two persons who are in the runoff are former Charlotte Mayor Harvey Gantt and attorney Mike Easler.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN NEWS

The chairs of the State Democratic Parties from Colorado, Utah, Nevada and other rocky mountain states, convened to set up a regional Presidential Primary for 1992. The date that the leaders are looking at would be the last weekend of April.

The caucuses would take place that weekend, not like "Super Tuesday" which takes place on the same day, which the Southern states hold their presidential primaries.

ARIZONA NEWS

The latest Rocky Mountain Poll on the race for the Republican nomination for Attorney General is in and here are the results:

Last week, Richard Mahoney, Democratic candidate for Secretary of State, blasted the incumbent Secretary of State, Jim Shumway, for listing his office phone number on a solicitation letter to Political Action Committees. Mahoney called this a "selling of an office".

State School Superintendent C. Diane Bishop's campaign hit some brass tacks last week. It was reported that Mrs. Bishop, last year, tried to use her influence regarding a position for her husband at the University of Arizona. After this incident was reported, the Chair of her campaign, supermarket magnate Eddie Basha resigned. Later in the week, legislators on both sides of the aisle came out and spoke favorably of Mrs. Bishop and her record as State School Superintendent.

CANDIDATE PROFILE

Richard Mahoney is running for the Democratic nomination for Secretary of State. He holds a Bachelors Degree from Princeton, a

Ph.D. from Johns Hopkins University and a Law Degree from Arizona State University. Mahoney is an attorney, and a professor at the American Graduate School of International Management. He also serves on the Central Arizona Project Board.

In addition, Mahoney is a Board member of Chicans Por La Causa, Arizona Center for Law in the Public Interest and the Phoenix Commission on Excellence in Education.

If he is elected, Mahoney has stated he will institute his four point plan: (1) Put district caps on how much money special interest PAC's can spend on elections. (2) Put a limit on how much money can be spent overall in all legislative and statewide races. (3) Limit the number of terms an elected official can serve. (4) Make it easier for Arizonans to vote with same-day voter registration.

PIMA COUNTY NEWS

Chalk up another scoop for "Politics '90"! I am pleased to report that longtime Democratic political activist, Katherine Jacobsen, will be challenging District 12 State Senator John Mahoney (R-Tucson), in the upcoming campaign. More about Katherine in a future column.

The Lambda Democratic Caucus last week, held their first voter registration drive for the 1990 campaign. The Caucus had a booth at the TLGA Fiesta de Mayo celebration. Here are the registration results:

They'd all had just found out that they are HIV+. The feelings of fear and hopelessness almost overwhelmed me. We cried, hugged and talked a lot. I realized how ignorant I really was when it came to HIV+.

I spoke to my friend Ronnie, PACT and Shanti for help. The concept of dying with AIDS is history, we now see things clearer. People live with AIDS. It is not an automatic and immediate death sentence. With early testing and detection, a lot can be done. You can lead a relatively normal life. Of course you must adjust your sex life. Safe sex is positive sex!

It helps to stop drugs, smoking and excessive drinking. Eat healthy foods of course. With the help of such drugs as AZT and ddi, things can be made easier. Research is always discover-

ing more about AIDS. At one time it was 5 years incubation, then 7 years, 10 years to ??? Ronnie told me he has had a friend who showed no symptoms for 9 years. Please get tested. Early detection is important, but protection (prevention) is absolutely vital. When you don't protect (playsafe) and knowingly or unknowingly are HIV+, you are guilty of possible murder!

Think about it. You can have a great sex life and play safe. Just always remember to think with the head on your shoulders and not the one in your pants. Thinking with the wrong one could cost someone their life and it might be yours.

The two kinds of people I absolutely hate are: Apathetic and Stupid ones. Since I've decided to become more involved, I've met both kinds in the general community. A fellow worker at my job made the statement that people with AIDS are getting what they deserve for choosing their lifestyle. I

was so mad and shocked at such a stupid, insensitive and ignorant statement that I just let loose: "Who the hell made you God. What right do you have to say who deserves to live or die," I told her.

She always complained how her boyfriend cheats on her. I explained to her how people get it and that her unfaithful boy friend could easily get it and pass it to her. It's not a Gay disease! But God, I hope she never has to find out first hand. I wouldn't even wish it on the piece of dog excrement called Jesse Helms, despite his statement in the Senate on Monday that if "homosexuals all stop having sex, there would be no more cases of AIDS."

Talk about the height of stupidity! And he's one of the leaders in this country! We need to help ourselves. Support our own organizations. Only if we work together can we make a difference.

Speaking of which, the turnout for our Shanti Show Sunday was terrific. Once a few technical difficulties were taken care of, the show went great. At last count \$334 will go directly to

Shanti for AZT prescriptions for our brothers. It was nice seeing so many of our community leaders from various bars and organizations there.

I'd like to thank first off, the members of our community for attending and supporting. Special thanks to Dani Reid, Michelle Kristie with Jerry and Tim, Lisette, Lucinda Holliday, Ken Davis and Frank Chapman for lending their time and talent to such a fine cause. And JJ's Bad Intentions are well deserving of special praise, thanks girls. Danette on spotlight, Sloane on music, Moose and Tom at the bar, and Raven (Parker Ruiz) and Kenny S. for the decorations and finally Jim for his support and sponsorship.



Man Pleads No Contest In Death Of Lover

ALBUQUERQUE, NM (AP) - An Albuquerque man pleaded no contest to second-degree murder in the shooting death of his lover, who he said was using blackmail to garner sexual favors.

Steve Charles Hail, 24, entered his plea in the Oct. 1988 slaying of Sam Maestas, a 38-year-old appliance salesman. Hail, who faces up to 26 years in prison, also pleaded no contest to aggravated burglary, tampering with evidence, larceny, receiving stolen property and auto theft.

Sentencing has been set for June 14. Hail's attorney, Ron Koch, said Maestas was using a videotape of sex sessions to blackmail his client. "Maestas was in the practice of seducing people, including Mr. Hail, and taping their sessions without partners knowledge or consent," Koch said.

"Maestas was using a tape to blackmail Mr. Hail for continued sexual favors,"

he said. "Maestas threatened to expose the tape to all his friends and associates.

Koch said Hail had been drinking and was carrying a gun when he went to Maestas' home in late October 1988 to get the videotape. A scuffle ensued and Maestas was shot, he said.

A confidential informer who described himself to police as a close friend of Maestas said in a statement that Maestas had a habit of videotaping sex sessions with his partners.

The informer said Hail was one of the men who was secretly taped by a camera Maestas had rigged in the loft of his home. Police found a videotape of the two men at Maestas' home.

Prosecutors had alleged that Hail went to Maestas' home, shot him in the head and stole his sports car and several electronic items, including televisions and a stereo system.

Helms Battles \$600 Million Funding For AIDS

WASHINGTON, DC (AP) - Sen. Jesse Helms waged a lone battle last Monday, May 14, against a measure to provide \$600 million to states and cities hit hard by AIDS, saying he objected to more federal spending on a disease spread through "immorality".

Helms, R-NC, acknowledged the bill ultimately would pass by an overwhelming bipartisan margin. But he said it was left to him to raise troubling questions about the medical assistance bill, which he charged was being "used by the homosexual movement to proselytize their dangerous lifestyle".

"If they would stop what they're doing there would not be one additional case of AIDS in the United States," Helms asserted.

A bipartisan group of supporters described the measure as emergency relief for communities and public health systems overburdened by people suffering from acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

The bill has 65 Senate co-sponsors, more than enough for passage. Debate pitted Helms against a fellow conservative Republican Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah.

Hatch disputed Helms' assertion that ending homosexual behavior would halt the disease, saying the AIDS-causing virus continues to be transmitted through other means.



are subject to a slightly different deadline. Though the team and each member on it must be registered by May 31, team captains have until July 15 to finalize actual participant rosters. Additions, deletions and substitutions to team sport line-ups will be accepted until the mid-July date, provided that proper documentation accompanies each request and that each new team member had been registered by May 31. There is a ten dollar processing fee for roster changes that must be paid by July 15.

On May 31, to determine if you qualify as a registered Celebration '90 athlete, use the following check list:

1. I have completed both Phases I and I registration forms.
2. I have completed both consent and liability waivers.
3. I have completed all supporting documentation (for example: bowling average, golf handicap, swimmer's master number).
4. I have paid all required fees (\$40 per athlete per sport if postmarked by Jan. 31, 1990, or \$60 if postmarked by May 31), and \$10 for each team roster change made.
5. I have sent the above documents and payments to Metropolitan Vancouver Athletic and Arts Association (MVAARA) at 1170 Bute St., Vancouver, BC, Canada V6E 1Z6 by May 31, 1990 (July 15 for roster changes).
6. I have received back my five-digit registration number.
