





CITY OF TUCSON OFFICE OF THE MAYOR PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, 1990 marks the 21st Anniversary of the June 1969 events known as the Stonewall Rebellion in New York City marking the opposition of harassment of Gays and Lesbians; and

WHEREAS, the Gay and Lesbian community remember at this time of year the many homosexuals put to death in Nazi concentration camps during World War II; and

WHEREAS, in February 1977, the Tucson City Council recognizing the discrimination suffered by Gay and Lesbian individuals, passed by unanimous vote, an amendment to the Human Relations Ordinance banning discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations based on sexual or affectional preference; and

WHEREAS, "Look To Our Future" has been chosen as the theme for 1990, giving all Tucsonans an opportunity to increase our understanding and awareness of the importance of eliminating harassment of others based on sexual preference; and

WHEREAS, all persons, regardless of sexual preference, are entitled equally to all freedoms under the law,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Thomas J. Volgy, Mayor of the City of Tucson, Arizona, do hereby proclaim June 24-July 1, 1990, to be

ANTI-DISCRIMINATION WEEK

in this community, and urge all of our citizens to support the freedom shared by all.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the City of Tucson to be affixed this 25th day of May 1990.

Helms Museum To Open, Funded by Phillip Morris and Brown & Williamson Tobacco Companies

CHARLOTTE, NC - If Jesse Helms gets his way, he may just close every museum in the country. But don't be disheartened. He has a plan to take care of your cultural cravings. Those deep inner feelings which few of us can explain or understand. Now to be in the know about culture you won't need to go to museums filled with sexual filth. Instead there will be museums without sensuality. Museums without sex. Without penises.

What might these museums have in them. What might their subject be? What would Jesse Helms approve of? How about a Jesse Helms Museum? Well, as crazy as it sounds, that's just what the future holds. This art hater has decided to open his own museum. Called the Jesse Helms Citizenship Center, it will be located at Wingate College, his alma mater. Sort of a conservatives Pee Wee's Play house without any little (or big) pee wees.

I write it WILL BE located because Helms has already raised \$4 million dollars of the needed \$5 for construction. It will house his official papers, a research center and a full scale replica of his Senate office. It will be the first such museum devoted to a living member of Congress. But the funding, now there is something pornographic.

The largest corporate donor was the Phillip Morris cigarette company, the second largest was the Brown and Williamson Tobacco company. (Helms, by the way, often refers to AIDS as a self-inflicted disease. He takes his museum's funding from corporations which manufacture the means by which people end up with self-inflicted cancer - and all this death and addiction is still government subsidized thanks to... well... Senator Helms!)

What's most fitting is that this obscenity of obscenities was discovered, not by a newspaper reporter, not by a congressional committee, not by a special prosecutor but instead by New York artist Hans Haacke while creating his anti-Helms work called Helmsboro County. An investigation of financial impropriety is now taking place. I guess Jesse Helms was right, artists are dangerous.

UPDATE

PUBLIC HEARINGS ON ANONYMOUS AIDS TESTING
TUCSON - Public hearings on anonymous testing will be held this Thursday, June 14 at the Pima County Board of Supervisors Hearing Room, 110 W. Congress at 1:00 p.m.

The Arizona Department of Health Services originally required all HIV positive tests be reported to them. This policy led many to fear getting tested because of the possible ramifications that might result from public disclosure of the names of HIV infected people in Arizona.

Because of a great outpouring of protests about that policy, the state health department temporarily amended their policy for a period of time to allow for anonymous testing with only statistics being kept by the state - not names. The amended policy will expire on September first of this year, and the old policy of listing the names of every HIV positive person might again be the policy.

The policy of allowing anonymous testing is not a law in Arizona, but rather a policy of the Arizona Department of Health Services. Hearings such as these will help gather information to determine if that policy should continue or not. The public's attendance at this meeting, and possible participation in testifying could have dramatic results in the future of anonymous testing in Arizona.

All interested parties are urged to attend this public hearing and voice their opposition to changing the current policy of anonymous testing in Arizona.



GAY BRIEFS

Gay Pride Week is coming again. But pretty soon, if conservative anti-pornography groups get their way with the N.E.A. (The National Endowment for the Arts) a Gay Pride Day march, parade, picnic, art show, movie, retrospective, or just plain Gay anything might be illegal. In the arts, be it painting, photography, sculpture, performance, whatever, it's open season on Gay and Lesbian visibility, and repercussions are far more threatening than most of us seem to realize. Especially when so many in our community, including Gays, Lesbians and artists, can be found, who hedge on their unrestricted support for freedom of expression in the arts.

The main weapon in this assault on Gay and Lesbian visibility is Jesse Helms' amendment to the N.E.A.'s charter renewal, which is due before congress very soon. Put simply, it restricts artists from receiving funding from the N.E.A. if their work makes positive reference to homosexuality, or "homosexualism". It also says that you can't show child molestation, and directly equates homosexualism with molestation and obscenity.

To accept N.E.A. funding an individual or organization will have to sign an oath that states they will not produce these types of "obscene" materials with the funds. Production of many plays (The New York Shakespeare Festival has already turned down N.E.A. monies

because of the oath that must be signed) is being threatened. Indeed, almost anything could be restricted under these requirements that have already been put into effect.

A production company could produce 20 plays from the classics in one season along with one single play that has a Gay theme (like "The Normal Heart") and have both its federal and private funding threatened. This threat has put a chill on all community-based arts programs who are looking carefully at what they might produce or support in the next year. As a matter of fact, it's clear that the purpose of this restriction is not just to limit use of N.E.A. funds but also to limit private and corporate funds through threat and intimidation. Self-censorship will finish the job that Helms has begun. It's already started.

What's shocking, and confusing if you don't figure pure homophobia into things, is that even artists have objected to recent AIDS education programs. One artist, reported in The Village Voice, was worried that his daughter might see an AIDS education card that showed two Gay men kissing and with the message: "Kissing doesn't kill; Greed and Indifference Do".

People simply want Gay invisibility, that's the aim of this movement. They don't want G, L or H words mentioned. Do you realize that ultimately the Public Broad-

casting Network will be prevented from showing programs like "Andre's Mother"? Everything with a Gay theme will be eradicated, don't kid yourself that this won't happen. Not only will government funding be denied, but corporate and individual sponsorship will be withheld (they already are) based upon the perceived threat of action by conservative groups, or the N.E.A..

Corporations and individuals who financially support Gay-themed art have been threatened by national anti-pornography/pro-family groups at a frightening rate during the past few months. Members of the Board of the Cincinnati Museum were told that their personal businesses would suffer from financial boycott if they didn't take action against the recent Mapplethorpe retrospective there.

The President of the Cincinnati museum's Board resigned during the uproar and then sent a letter to his employees urging them to withdraw their financial support of the city's Fine Arts Fund. Censorship has a way of multiplying its insidious effects. Objection to two photos brought about a conservative boycott of the entire arts community in Cincinnati. And most of us sit passively by, unconcerned about what is happening to a few artists whose works we judged as being in poor taste. And who spoke out within the Gay community? We are giving these bigots the rope to hang us with!

Recently the right-wing American Family Association, headed by Rev. Donald Wildmon, sent every member of

Congress a mailing which contained two pages of graphic photos of homosexual sex acts in an envelope marked, "Warning! Extremely Offensive Material Enclosed!" These photos were cut from David Wojnarowicz's "Sex Series". In his letter, Wildmon points out that the show was supported by the N.E.A. (The N.E.A. paid for \$15,000 of a total of \$45,000).

But the "Sex Series" is only a small part of the overall show, and the homosexual images are only a smaller part of those pictures, small circular images inset in canvases measuring 6 by 9 feet. These anti-pornographers are willing to lie, cheat and take works out of context to get their way. They want to monitor what we see, what we do and what we think about.

If this really were a matter of money, one wonders why Charles Keating, whose prominence is so easily noted in the anti-pornography leadership, was willing to sell uninsured and now worthless bonds to over 20,000 Californians at taxpayers expense. Yes, he's connected directly to the savings and loan boondoggle as well as being a former member of the President's Commission on Obscenity and Pornography. He personally took this commission to court to attempt to prevent its findings - that pornography doesn't cause sex crimes and that we need sex education in our schools - from becoming public. These people will do anything to get their way.

Does all this sound too

OUTSIDE SEX SEEN FROM INSIDE

A: Having a more active sex drive doesn't explain anything. Personality differences do not drive people apart, incompatible behaviors do. Since you don't want your partner to have outside sex, you need to renegotiate your sexual contract with him.

Most couples haven't made a contract in writing, but all couples develop implied contracts over the

years. Now you have a good opportunity to consciously design one.

The first step is deciding exactly what you want. If you want a sexually exclusive relationship, that's what you should ask for. Of course this position makes no further negotiation possible, and your demand for exclusivity could feel like an ultimatum to him.

There is another option that may meet both your needs. A sizable number of couples give each other permission for outside sex under certain conditions. For example, outside sex might be allowed only during times when you are otherwise unable to be together.

In Partners' National Survey of Lesbian and Gay Couples, "monogamy with exceptions" was the preferred option for 26 percent of the men and 7 percent of the women. Eleven percent of the men were "non-monogamous", as were 3 percent of the women couples.

While the issue of sexual behavior is important, there may be more at stake here. To find out, ask yourself a few questions:

** Is there a sexual arrangement that will make both of us happy?

** Have I clearly heard all his/her concerns?

** Is sexual exclusivity the only major problem in my relationship, or is it just one area of miscommunication?

** Are there other things that make me feel like I am being used or that "drive me bananas"?

Ultimately, it will be the making and keeping of agreements based on mutual concern that can enrich your relationship.

If sexual exclusivity is absolutely necessary for your well-being, you need to get an non-coerced agreement from your partner. The first step is to have distraction-free time together to talk things over and not just before sex or bedtime. Assistance from a third party is often very helpful — preferably someone with counseling experience. If this and other issues have been brewing for a long time, it may take time to sort them out.

Should your partner be unwilling to work on this issue, it is a good indication that he either doesn't perceive a problem or he feels threatened by the confrontation. Should this be the case, your unhappiness may bring you to question the wisdom of staying in this relationship.





POLITICS '90

WORLD NEWS
Czechoslovakia, last week, held their first free elections in 44 years. The political organization, Civic Forum, headed by Vaclav Havel, won a big victory, by taking 169 seats (out of 300), in the National Parliament. The Christian Democrats came in second with 50 seats. The Communists came in third with 48.

In Peru, Alberto Fujimori defeated Mario Vargas Llosa in the second round of balloting for President. Exit polls show Fujimori ahead by 10 percent.

NATIONAL NEWS

In North Carolina, the runoff election for the Democratic nomination for the U.S. Senate was held, pitting former Charlotte Mayor Harvey Gantt and Attorney Mike Easley. Gantt becomes the first black candidate in over a century for the U.S. Senate from North Carolina. Gantt will be facing the ultra-conservative Republican Jesse Helms.

In California, former San Francisco Mayor Diane Feinstein defeated Attorney General John Van de Kamp for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination by a 52% to 41% margin. Feinstein will face Pete Wilson, the U.S. Senator, who easily won the GOP nomination.

In New York, the State Democratic Convention nominated Mario Cuomo for a third term as Governor. Cuomo faces very token opposition from the Republican Party.

ARIZONA NEWS

The Arizona Democratic Party held their State Convention last Saturday in Phoenix. The big todo was the expected challenge by supporters of former gubernatorial candidate Carolyn Warner to unseat State Democratic Chair, Sam Goddard. But the possible attempt never got out of the starting gate.

At the Awards Banquet later in the evening, Pima County Democrats scored big. Pima County Chair Bill Minette, was named Democrat of the Year. Winston Smith, Chair of Legislative Dist. 13 Democrats, was named District Chair of the Year.

PIMA COUNTY NEWS

The political hotbed of Dist. 12 has some new candidates to consider. Ann Day, sister of the Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, will challenge Bob Stash for the Republican nomination for Legislative Dist. 12 State Senate seat.

In the Dist. 12 House race, two more candidates have emerged on the Democra-

tic side. Chiropractor Phil Pierce and activist Danny White, have decided to run for the Democratic nomination for the State House of Representatives. It has been rumored that former State Senator Luis Gonzales is contemplating a run for the State House of Representatives against incumbent Philip Hubbard. Expect an announcement in the near future regarding this possible candidacy.

END NOTES

Harvey Gantt, the Democratic nominee for the U.S. Senate from North Carolina, faces a tough battle trying to unseat the extreme right-wing, homophobic incumbent, Jesse Helms. But with a lot of help, he could do it. But, Gantt needs help not just from the citizens of North Carolina, but from all of us. So let's send some help? Here's One I Didn't Write About

Last year the story was everywhere; on television, in the newspapers, in magazines.

In fact, one person even caught the actual incident with his video camera --and the film-clip was everywhere to be seen. What began as a casual, cursory "tour around the ship" ended with a horrific explosion.

Days and weeks later, the story behind the explosion on the USS Iowa came to light --or so we had been led to believe.

According to the Navy's official version of events, Clayton Hartwig, a gunner's mate, distraught over a Gay-affair-gone-sour, killed himself and 46 of his crewmates.

I didn't write about the Iowa story last year. I wanted to; but something about the story rang false to me. It seemed all too simple, the explanation came too easily.

The families of the two men involved denied the story loudly and often --and one thing good lawyers know is that an innocent person will proclaim his innocence loudly and often.

What especially troubled me, was the spate of "accidents" the navy seemed to experience last year. (Ironically, the Navy has defended last year's poor performance by saying it was the best year ever in terms of the lowest number of accidents).

No. Too much of the puzzle seemed unclear.

I often write about events in the news, unfolding stories, events past and present. I never write, however, on any topic unless and until my mind is clear, my position defensible. The Iowa incident left my mind unclear, unsatisfied --and now I know why.

Last month, the General Accounting Office, essentially the government's watchdog, issued a report documenting the results of tests by an independent laboratory --and the Navy has been backpeddling since.

You see, Hartwig's job aboard the Iowa was to place gunpowder-filled bags into the gun turrets. These bags provide the motive force behind the projectile. The Navy said Hartwig placed an ignition device in the turret along with the bags and blew up the gunpowder, himself, and his crewmates.

The independent tests, however, showed the gunpowder bags could explode when rammed into the turret with too much force. No ignition

device was needed to cause an explosion very much like that aboard the Iowa.

It appears as if the two men, one dead, the other now married, have been vindicated. But, moreso, the image of Gay men has been wiped free of this tarnishing episode.

One would hope, but not hope too much, that government agencies will join the rest of America in the 20th century, will rethink their image of Gay men as sullen, heartbroken, ineffectual wet mops who crack at the first rejection by another man.

THIS IMAGE is why Gay men and Lesbian women --who have proven to be superior military personnel-- are STILL not allowed to be open about their orientation in the military.

THIS IMAGE is why openly homosexual men and women are not allowed to enlist, or re-enlist. "Bad for morale," the government insists; "Would upset the balance between an officer and the enlisted troops," they protest.

THIS IMAGE is why homosexuality was quickly pegged as the cause of the Iowa explosion.

Let us hope it was the last time this image will be exploited.

absurd to worry about, too crazy to think that it could go on? Consider this: when N.E.A. chair John Frohnmayer responded directly to Rev. Wildman, he said, "Remember the commandment against bearing false witness..." Whew! At least he's sane, right? But according to A.I.A. (Art in America) he also wrote, "The images are disgusting and offensive to me, and undoubtedly to a large part of the population.... I would hope that with procedures I am implementing at the Arts Endowment, images such as these would not be funded." Remember, Gays and Lesbians in general are disgusting and offensive to a large part of the population as well.

So far mail to Congress and the N.E.A. about this issue has been 100 to 1 FOR censoring art. Few Gays have written, and I wonder why? Reading the Gay press I still read arguments for censoring. People ask, "Do we have to defend pornography?" "Do we have to defend S&M". "People can make that kind of art, but do we taxpayers have to pay for it?"







Well, the answer is, you do have to defend it. Just as we all pay for colleges and universities that teach some courses we agree with, and some we don't. Learning, culture, life, is made up of more than one point of view. More than one experience. We have to defend the N.E.A. because these religious fanatics don't only want to stop pornography, they want to stop every bit of Gay information and visibility that's out there. Every bit.

When there are any restrictions on art, even simply restricting government funds for these works, then there will be attacks on any institution that dares to show it. There will be attacks on any individual, group or corporation which dares to sponsor it. The Helms amendment stabs freedom of expression squarely in the heart. There is no half way in this battle.

Next year the argument will be: "But why does the city have to pay for the use of a park for a Gay Pride Picnic?" or "Why should my taxes be used to pay police to provide services at a Gay march?" Because Gay anything will be taboo. Gay = pornography! And remember, bigots like Jesse Helms aren't going to stop with "pornography! They want you dead!

That's why they fight tooth and nail to prevent any funding of AIDS research. That's why they fight any AIDS education. That's why they fight any sex education. That's why these anti-pornography groups are headed by

men like Charles Keating who has said, "homosexuals should be prosecuted and put in jail". They aren't simply homophobic, they are homophobers, sex haters, women haters. They want your blood.

And so far, we as a community haven't taken any organized stand against them at all. We need direct action. We need an ACT-UP to work towards maintaining what civil rights we have now. Every Gay and Lesbian person in this country should already have written to their Congressperson or Senator supporting a free National Endowment for the Arts. But they haven't. Instead we quietly march off to our own execution while many of us say, "but you know, they have a point..." Stop debating... this is war!


