June 24 - July 1

*Lesbian/Gay Pride Week, Tucson, AZ 1990*

TUCSON - Pride Week 1990 in Tucson begins Sunday June 24 and ends Sunday, July 1. The theme for this year's Pride Week in Tucson is "Look To Our Future". Souvenir T-Shirts, buttons and cups bearing the official Tucson logo are available at most bars and will be available at the Pride Picnic.

The Tucson Lesbian/Gay Alliance (TLGA), the coordinating organization which has produced Pride Week activities for the past ten years has been meeting each week getting this week-long celebration organized.

As usual, Pride Week this year begins with the 13th Annual Pride Week Picnic in the Northeast Corner of Himmel Park. Each year the crowds for this event have grown and last year it was estimated that 5,000 people attended the big kick-off event.

TLGA has held fund raising events and is able to produce a full week of events and subsidize many events to assure that there is no cost to those attending any events by contributing to prizes and money for contests presented during the week.

An updated schedule appears at the end of this article. Final plans will be published next week when flyers and posters will be distributed.

The big picnic in Himmel appears as though it will be bigger and better than ever. The schedule for the day as of press time is:

9:30 a.m. to Noon: Set up booths, tables, sound system, beer and soft drink distributing points and decorate stage area. There is no charge for booths. They are to be set up in an assigned area

and are taken on a first come best shade basis. There are usually 20 to 30 booths in the area.

12:00 - 1:00 p.m.: DJ Dance music. (Taped music to be recorded by the various DJs in Tucson and either played by them or by the TLGA DJ).

1:00 - 1:15 - Guitar and Flute by Terry Sheridan.

1:15 - 2:00 - Taped Music.

2:00 - 2:15 - Theatrical Skit

2:15 - 3:00 - Taped Music

3:00 - 4:00 - Color Guard; National Anthem; Pride Chorus; Statement of Pride Week Theme; Introduction of King and Queen of Fiesta de Mayo and the court and current Crown Holders; Presentation of the Mayoral Proclamation; Introduction of and short speeches by political incumbents and candidates; S.D.S. Balloon Release.

4:00 - 5:00 - Taped Music.

5:00 - 5:15 - Copper City Squares

5:15 - 7:00 - Taped Music.

An updated and more detailed schedule will appear next week.

Among the politicians committed to appear at the Pride Picnic (and the "Political Night", Friday, June 29) are: City Council members Bruce Wheeler, Janet Marcus, Steve Leal and George Miller; And State Representative John Kromko.

Candidates: Richard Mahoney (D) for Secretary of State; Richard Segal (D) and Georgia Staton (D) for Attorney General; George Stragalas III (D) for Treasurer; Marcia Weeks (D) for Arizona Corporation Commission; Marion Pickins (D-Dist 9) and Evan

Adelstein (D-Dist 12) for State Representative and John Dougherty (D-Dist 9) for State Senate.

Some of the political groups who will have tables or booths set up at the picnic include the Arizona Committee for Progress; Lambda Democratic Caucus; The Arizona & Pima County Democratic Party and VOTER (Same Day Registration).

It is not anticipated that all of these people will be afforded the opportunity to speak from the stage area but will be in the "political arena" near the stage area available to answer any and all questions that you may have.

# UPDATE

**TUCSON BOWLERS SCORE AT 1990 IGBO TOURNAMENT**  
 LOS ANGELES, CA - On Memorial Day Weekend, the 10th Annual International Gay Bowling Organization (IGBO) tournament was held here with 600 bowlers competing for thousands of dollars in prize money.

Tucson was represented at the IGBO Tournament. The New Joshua Tree Bowling League sent a team consisting of Jack Stockslager, Scott Howland, Bill Close and Mark Kerr. The Rainbow Room League sent a team headed by Jim Marr, Wayne Jackson and Richard Swaitly.

In singles, Richard Swaitly finished in second place with a score of 750. Mark Kerr led the New Joshua Tree with a score of 686, good enough to cash at 27th place. In doubles competition, the team headed by Richard Swaitly came in 16th place with a score of 1331.

The team of Stockslager and Kerr came in 17th place with a score of 1325. In team competition, the New Joshua Tree Bowling League came in 11th place with a score of 2487.

In the all-events competition, Tucson finished 1st and 2nd. Mark Kerr won the all-events with a score of 2081. Richard Swaitly came in second with a score of 2075. In division competition, Kerr and Swaitly scored in Division "B", (151-175) average. Kerr won in "B" Scratch Game with a 247, and won in Division "B" all events with a score of 1775.

Kerr came in sixth for Division "B" Scratch Series with a 610. Swaitly came in third in "B" Scratch Series with a score of 633. Swaitly won "B" handicap series with 750.

The eleventh annual IGBO Tournament will be held over Memorial Day Weekend, 1991, in Toronto, Ontario, Canada.

**PHOENIX CELEBRATING PRIDE WEEK JUNE 2-10**  
 PHOENIX - With the theme "A New Decade Of Pride", Phoenix will be celebrating Lesbian and Gay Pride week early this year and without the usual March that has been held in past years.

The weeks activities wind up with a Pride Day Festival at El Lienzo Charro Rodeo Grounds at 27th Ave. and Baseline Road. The festival will open at 2:00 p.m. and run until 9:00 p.m. Nationally known Lesbian comedian Lynn Lavner will headline the entertainment during the day.

**UNIVERSITY TO TEST SALK AIDS VACCINE**  
 TUCSON - The AIDS vaccine that Dr. Jonas Salk developed, will be tested at the University of Arizona Health Center. The test, however, will involve less than 100 AIDS-infected patients, and only half of those will receive the 'real' vaccine.

University Medical officials have been reluctant to give out information concerning the vaccine study because when it was first learned that UA would conduct tests, they have been inundated by calls from AIDS patients desperate to get the vaccine. Officials have promised that if the test results are promising at the end of a year of study and future tests would be widened to a larger group of individuals.

During the initial study the vaccine, which is designed to prevent the disease, will be used for treatment rather than prevention. It won't be given to uninfected people in this first testing. It will, however be administered to AIDS patients whose health is good and who show no sign of immune system deterioration; whose T-cell count is over 600, the same as that of an uninfected person.

Researchers are hoping to find if there is any toxicity associated with the new vaccine and if it will prevent the HIV-antibody from progressing. Early tests on chimpanzees and also human patients indicated that it can hold back the virus successfully as well as partially destroying it.

The tests have been postponed twice because of packaging problems, but it is hoped that they can be started in July.

The new vaccine is made from 'killed', not 'live' HIV virus which has been stripped of its envelope of surface proteins. Scientists are hoping immune system cells will recognize and fight the virus in that state by producing antibodies against it.

**REFORM JUDAISM MAY ALLOW GAY RABBIS**  
 NEW YORK, NY (AP)- Reform Judaism, one of the three major Jewish branches in the United States is considering lifting age-old barriers against ordaining homosexuals as rabbis.

Reform Judaism, with 1.5 million members nationwide, would be the first U.S. Jewish branch to allow homosexual rabbis.

Adoption of the new ordination guidelines would go against traditional Jewish emphasis on procreation and aversion to homosexuality, dating to pre-biblical times.



## TMCC To Form Lesbian/Gay Pride Chorus To Sing At Pride Picnic

TUCSON - John Kissler, interim manager and director of music of the Tucson Metropolitan Community Chorus (TMCC), Arizona's only Gay and Lesbian chorus, has announced the formation of the 1990 Gay and Lesbian Pride Chorus. This special chorus is being formed to sing at this year's Pride Picnic in Himmel Park, Sunday, June 24.

The entire Gay and Lesbian community is invited to join current and past members of the Tucson Metropolitan Community Chorus in a pride celebration. In addition, clubs, organizations, and Gay or Lesbian owned businesses are encouraged to participate.

"We would like to have representatives from every walk of Gay and Lesbian life in Tucson take part in this event," Kissler said. "You don't need prior experience

singing in a choir to participate, and there will be no auditions. If you have a desire to sing, and want to take an active part in better uniting our community, then we need you," he said.

Rehearsals will be held each Monday and Thursday night up through Thursday, June 21. Rehearsals are from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. in Room 106 at the School of Music on the University of Arizona campus. Parking is available at the corner of Speedway and Park (either the parking garage on the north side of Speedway or on the surface lot on the south side).

Kissler concluded, "If you can't make both rehearsals each week, then we still encourage you to come out and join us on a different night. So make plans to join this community-wide event to show your pride."

## "Art Attack" Gay Pride Exhibition Expanded To Other Media

TUCSON - The Photo Exhibition and Contest that was announced by TLGA as a Pride Week event has been expanded to include Photography, and artists in Painting, Sculpture and Mixed Media.

The contest and exhibition will open on the UofA campus at 6:00 p.m. on Monday, June 25. The four media exhibit will be judged and prizes will be awarded to first and second place winners. 1st Prize in each area is \$50 and 2nd Place receives \$25 with third place being awarded a ribbon.

In order to get the exhibit set up properly, the

tentative deadline for entries is June 18.

It is hoped that because of enlarging this exhibition, it will give more people in the community a better opportunity to show their art, and will cause more interest by the public in art that is produced by the Gay and Lesbian community.

## Oral Alfa-Interferon Wafers On Sale In Manhattan for \$18 For 21 Wafers

NEW YORK, NY - Oral Alpha-Interferon, the treatment reported on in recent issues, is now available in New York city from the PWA Health Group. Steve Wilkinson, a member of the Group, told the New York Native that the Group is now selling 21 wafers for \$18. The wafers are covered with low-dose oral alpha-interferon, which was obtained from England. The drug is manufactured by Burroughs Wellcome, and is called Wellferon. The PWA Health Group sold 40 packages of the wafers on the first day of sale last week.

Derek Hodel, director of the group, told the Native that a number of doctors have contacted the organization seeking to obtain oral alpha-interferon. The organization hands out two sheets of information about the drug, warning that "very little is understood about the role interferon plays in the body". The Group warns that if the oral alpha-interferon is effective, it could also have dangerous side effects.

Seven weeks after the New York Times reported on the claims from Kenyan researchers that Kemron, a cocktail of natural interferons, was dramatically improving the condition of nearly all the "AIDS" patients treated. Clinical trials have not yet begun in this country.

Meanwhile the Native has been told by Amarillo Cell Culture in Amarillo, Texas, that the company is concerned that the oral alpha-interferon which the company provided free to Kenya for research purposes is now being sold there for a price that far exceeds the real cost of the product.

One patient who traveled to Kenya a few weeks ago for treatment with Kemron is keeping a journal about his experiences, which the Native plans to publish in the near future.

Mount Sinai Hospital in New York has received approval from the Food and Drug Administration, and is scheduled to begin a study in which 21 patients with swollen lymph nodes who tested positive for HIV will be given oral alpha-interferon, and 14 will be given a placebo. Dr. Joseph Hasset, who is an immunologist, will oversee the study.

Amarillo Cell Culture is reportedly conducting clinical trials in Britain, the Philippines and Thailand.

DEAR SIR:

While I certainly sympathize with Mr. Ken Davis' concern for his safety in this admittedly homophobic world, I am aghast at his response to that concern. Common sense -- if not simple integrity -- should tell him that the kind of deception he is practicing is not only unethical but self-defeating.

If removing the essential word from his title allows Mr. Davis to "pass" for someone he is not, how does this falsification of his identity further the cause of Gay/Lesbian pride? What kind of message does his behavior send to the "straight" community? More importantly, what kind of message does this behavior send to Lesbian and Gay youngsters who are struggling with doubts or fears about their own identities?

It's not easy, it's often quite scary, and sometimes -- as I'm sure we can all attest -- it's downright dangerous to stand up and affirm who we are. But Gay rights, Gay pride, and Gay liberation are furthered not by self-negation, not by acquiescing to homophobia, but by honest individuals taking the risk that people (even apparent homophobes) can be educated by our courage. If we are, indeed, a community deserving of respect, it's time that we, as well as our leaders, support each other's daily acts of courage, rather than excusing each other's timidity.

To all our leaders (not just Mr. Davis) we should make it clear that we expect them to speak out against homophobia, not to accept it. We expect them to provide leadership against oppression, not capitulation to it. If they think this is too much for us to ask of them, then they have no business representing our community.

Knowing this young man, I am sure he would agree with Mr. Tower's letter wholly. His past record as being a hard-working, openly Gay member of the Gay community prior to his arrival in Tucson, and since he has been here, are commendable and he should be given the chance to prove his good intentions.

It is extremely difficult to find members of our

community who are devoted and who will work for the betterment of it. It is always the same 'old guard' who do the work in the 'trenches' to get our work done. All too often these workers burn themselves out for others in the community who are too lazy or too busy to assist in important work that must be done to further improve the vision of the Gay and Lesbian community.

It is refreshing to see 'new blood' coming out to help. The community needs it. And the young people, who, with their enthusiasm often make mistakes, should be no reason to banish them. The very fact that these people want to, or are destined to, become our leaders of the future should be the catalyst to forgive them of their error. If they were not in the 'public eye' these indiscretions would more than likely go unnoticed.

### PFLAG Seeks Executive Director In Expansion Move

WASHINGTON, DC - Parents FLAG (Parents & Friends of Lesbians & Gays) will increase its professional staff to include an executive director to administer its expanding program of support, education and advocacy on behalf of families with Gay and Lesbian members. The announcement was made by Paulette Goodman, Parents FLAG Federation President.

"We have grown substantially in recent years, but it is now clear that we cannot continue to rely on volunteers and part-time staff if we are to fulfill our mission of reaching out to all the millions of families who are hurting and in need of education," she said.

Accordingly, the organization has undertaken a nationwide search for an executive director who will head a paid staff at the Federation's national office in Washington, DC.

Parents FLAG now has three part-time employees two in Washington and the other in its chapter support and development office in Denver. The Denver office will be closed by the end of 1990 so that all functions can be centralized under the administrative responsibility of the executive director.

The organization's increasing national role as an advocate for the civil rights of Gay and Lesbian persons was a key factor in the decision to locate the con-

solidated operation in Washington.


Last month, for example, Parents FLAG officers were among those invited to the White House when President Bush signed the Hate Crimes Statistics Act. (OBSERVER, May 2). The Act is the first national measure ever to contain provisions expressly designed to benefit Gay citizens.

"We know we have an important role to play in the effort to alter public attitudes toward our children," Goodman said. "We think society will listen to us because we are motivated by love for our children and a commitment to keeping families together."

The Parents FLAG Federation embraces more than 200 local chapters and contacts. A principal function of the local chapters is to provide support groups and other services for persons who have difficulty accepting the homosexuality of a family member or friend.

The Federation conducts support, education, and advocacy programs on a national scale, including a burgeoning AIDS Family Support Project.

The decision to hire an executive director and to consolidate Federation functions in Washington was made by the organization's directors at their mid-year meeting in Denver.

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## GEARING UP FOR GAY GAMES III

This coming August, the world will once again witness an event that expresses the finest in the Gay and Lesbian community. For an entire week, an expected 8,000 athletes and 3,500 artists from throughout the globe will come to Vancouver, British Columbia to the major sporting and cultural ceremonies of Gay Games III, called "Celebration '90".

Celebration '90 has been labeled the largest athletic event in the world in 1990! The Goodwill Games which will be held in Seattle the week preceding Gay Games III, have only 2300 athletes participating compared to the 8000 athletes vying for medals in Vancouver.

Team Arizona, the coordinating body for the athletes who are entering and will represent Arizona in Gay Games III, reports that 85 Arizona athletes will be represented this year as compared to the 40 members in 1986.

Gay Games III will hold its opening ceremonies in the showplace sporting facility of Vancouver, Place Stadium. The temperature-controlled stadium has a maximum capacity of 60,000. For the Games, part of it will be closed to provide a more intimate setting for the spectacular entrance of athletes.

The stadium has a fabric roof, sustained by air pressure, which is somewhat translucent. The organizers of the host city are excited about the dramatic possibilities that the evening show will provide onlookers.

It's an excellent facility, Shawn Kelly, execu-

tive director of Gay Games II said. "And not the least of its attractions is that it's not subject to the kinds of weather variety that we had in San Francisco in 1982 and 1986. Anyone who was at the opening ceremonies of Gay Games II will recall being frozen to death. We will have a controlled environment in Vancouver, which will make it a much more predictable event."

Team Arizona has ordered their uniforms for the Celebration '90. It is predicted that they will be the "hottest uniforms in the parade!" The uniforms will be white in a poplin cotton fabric. The top jacket will have a zippered front with a stand-up collar. The pants will have zippered bottoms. Prominently on the back of the jacket will be the Team Arizona logo. A neon green stripe will run down the front of the jacket and the pants. On the opposite side of the stripe on the jacket will be the words, "TEAM ARIZONA, USA". These uniforms are being donated at cost by one of Team Arizona's sponsors, CD Garment Printing.

Further, CD Garment Printing have agreed to donate neon green cowboy hats to complete the uniform. A preliminary thought is to have Team Arizona, as they round the first corner in the opening parade, and in unison, throw the hats into the crowd.

The opening ceremonies of Gay Games III are scheduled for Saturday, Aug. 4. The closing will be held in

## POLITICS '90

### NEWS OF THE WEEK

Over in the United Kingdom, a political force in the early 1980s voted itself out of existence last week. The Social Democrat Party voted to disband after staggering losses in the recent local elections. The SDP was founded in 1981 by seven former members of the British Labour Party who felt that the Labour Party had drifted too far to the left. The SDP rose in popularity, due to the ineptness of the Labour Party, and because of the discontent with Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's policies, and the conservative government.

In the 1983 election, the SDP received 22% of the vote, and 28 seats in the House of Commons. In 1985, the SDP forged an alliance with the Liberal Party for the next elections. In the 1987 general election, the Liberal/SDP Alliance garnered 17% of the vote and 23 seats. But the breakdown showed signs of trouble for the SDP; the Liberals won 17 seats, the SDP 6.

In 1988, the Alliance became a merger, the liberal and Social Democratic Party was formed with the former Liberal head, Dr. David Steel as the party leader. But a small faction within the SDP was dead set against a merger and bolted. But the SDP was a shell of its former self, with 3 seats in Parliament.

In recent local elections, the SDP was wiped off the map, losing what few

seats they had on the various local Councils, even the radical Green Party fared better than the SDP. Thus the move to vote itself out of existence.

In Peru, the first ever televised debate between the Presidential candidates, Alberto Fujimori and Mario Vargas Llosa took place last week.

In New York, Governor Mario Cuomo made it official last week. He will be running for another term as governor. In his announcement, Cuomo did not promise to serve a full term as governor, thus raising speculation about a possible candidacy for the 1992 Democratic Presidential nomination.

In Massachusetts, the State Democratic Convention nominated three candidates for the September Gubernatorial Primary: Lt. Gov. Evelyn Murphy; former State Attorney General Francis Bellotti and Boston University President, John Silber.

In Arizona, several candidate announcements were made last week. Dr. Mike McCormick, formerly of Governor Mofford's staff, announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for State School Superintendent. In his announcement, he stated that the incumbent, C. Diane Bishop, has been made politically vulnerable by recent events.

The big news of the week came from Legislative

District 12, with the announcement from Senate Majority Leader, John Mawhinney's intention not to seek another term. He stated family and financial reasons for his decision not to run. The Republicans will be putting up former Pima County Republican Chair, Bob Stash. The Democrats will be putting up business consultant Katherine Jacobsen. With Mawhinney's announcement, the Democrats have their best chance to regain control of one "house" of the State Legislature.

### "Longtime Companion" A Review

For a film without a plot, "Longtime Companion" tells one of the most compelling stories of this era—and easily becomes one of the most important films about real-life ever made.

The lack of plot does not hinder the power of this film; it serves to expand the parameters of the film, allowing it to deal with more subject matters in its 90-minutes.

Opening in 1981, on New York's Fire Island, the film progresses in a diary-entry-style format, ending in 1989.

The audience is introduced to the characters in the film as they read the morning newspaper, and an article detailing a new cancer found in a number of Gay men.

What starts out as mere rumors, guesses and theories grows as the film progresses, into what we now know as AIDS. As knowledge of AIDS spreads among the characters, so does its effects—starting in the film's first minutes with the death of a major character. Through the film, the other characters feel the effects of AIDS in varying degrees.

But, this film does not preach. It does not moralize. The film does, however, capture the fear, denial, dread, then anger and outrage experienced by those in-

habitants of New York—and any metropolitan city—during the early years of AIDS.

The film is virtually faultless. The script by award-winner Craig Lucas is hauntingly familiar—spiced with touches of Gay life in the early 1980s. It includes familiar dialogue, breezy, throw-away lines that inform, entertain, or haunt the audience, and a gripping speech by the main character during a funeral.

Direction by Norman René deftly, subtly captures mannerisms, affectations and personal styles which define each Gay character's individuality.

The acting is superb, with a stand-out performance by Mary-Louise Parker as Lisa—the only non-Gay character. Although the part of Lisa, a friend to many of the main characters, is small, Parker provides her with a life and power that is astonishing—and which leaps off the screen. She serves as an interconnection between the characters.

Campbell Scott, as Willy, is the narrator of the story. Around him, all things in this film revolve. Scott is marvelous to watch as he reacts and adapts to the changes AIDS forces in his life—and the lives of the characters around him. It is Scott who delivers the magnificent funeral speech,

and is spellbinding.

Mark Lamos and Bruce Davidson, as lovers Sean and David, are strong in their performances as AIDS stalks them. As David, the patriarch of the group of friends, Davidson provides a strength and dignity in a Gay character which is commendable.

The rest of the cast is equally marvelous, with a special nod to Dermot Mulroney who plays John. Perhaps the smallest role, his is the most important—and Mulroney plays it with the greatest command of acting as an art among the cast.

Acknowledgement must be registered for the ending of the film—one which will be written into the annals of great moments on the silver screen. The "End Of World War Two" scene is indescribable in its power. An incredible moment that could have easily become trite, or campy, becomes a gripping tribute to the men and women who gave their lives in the fight over AIDS.

In a supreme irony, this film opened in Phoenix over Memorial Day Weekend—providing, perhaps, a new, more compelling meaning to the holiday.

### Hate Crimes Victory

HARTFORD, CONN. — A decision by the Connecticut Catholic Bishops to support proposed legislation increasing the jail time for crimes of bigotry, including assaults against homosexuals, is being hailed as a victory by Gays and Lesbians in the state.

About 50 Gay and Lesbian activists rallied on the steps of the Cathedral of St. John and said they were encouraged by the bishop's decision, but wanted the church to do more.

"We want to have a continued visible presence here to remind the church that we expect full support of Gay and Lesbian legislation," said Michael Michaud, a spokesman for the group.

Homosexuality is against the teachings of the church and the Connecticut Catholic Church has a history of opposing any legislation which may be seen as promoting homosexuality.

Its position on the Hate Crimes Bill pending in the house has wavered four times. Church leaders had originally opposed the bill because it included sexual orientation as a category.

The bishops said in a joint statement that they would support the bill if it was amended to make it clear the law protects people and not abnormal sexual activity.

The group called on the church to actively support the proposed legislation and "work energetically for real justice for Gay men and Lesbian people.

 the same stadium, on Saturday, Aug. 11.

In Gay Games II, there were 17 sports represented. Gay Games III will present 28 sports, including some new entrants: race walking, ice hockey, equestrian, croquet, touch football, water polo, women's fast-pitch softball, martial arts, squash, badminton and darts. The added events reflect an expansion based on regional participation from Seattle and Vancouver.

The expanded cultural festival will include a women's music evening, an ongoing book fair and festival at which authors will lecture and engage in panel discussions, and three theatrical performances that will be held throughout the week.

Kelly says, "It definitely will fulfill its function as the largest and most elaborate festival sponsored by the Lesbian and Gay community in the history of this planet. It will be the worldwide convention of Gay people from all walks of life, from every political stripe, from every level of ability, from every area of interest."

A large and active group of Christian fundamentalists is waging a war against what they perceive as the "sodomite invasion" to take place in their city this fall. Nevertheless, there is extraordinary support for the Metropolitan Vancouver Athletic and Arts Association, host organization of the Games, from the major city political structure.

"The mayor of Vancouver appeared at a press conference for the Games," Kelly reports, "and there is an openly Gay councilman who is very enthusiastic about it."

"The Honorary Board for the Games in Vancouver has a tremendous list of prominent people on it, including John Turner, who at one time was the prime minister of Canada and who is now leader of the opposition to Canada's conservative party. This is a tremendous boom [that] someone of such national stature [would be involved] that no one should be in any way hesitant to associate him or herself with the event."

"The crucial message I have for the people who will be coming here," Kelly says, "housing is potentially very, very tight in Vancouver. There will not be as much ability to house people in private homes as there was in San Francisco, because the total number of athletes will be larger, and the total population of the Lesbian and Gay community as a whole is somewhat smaller than San Francisco."

"August will be the height of the tourist season in Vancouver, and hotel space will be at a premium. Although Seattle is a mere two hours' drive from Vancouver, the International Goodwill

Games are being held there, which will overlap with the Gay Games schedule. This will put a "tremendous burden on hotel accommodations" in both cities, according to Kelly.

People who participated in Gay Games I or II, whether as athletes or onlookers, can recall those events and what they signified. "I think," Kelly says, "that in retrospect, if you look at 1982, you could see the Gay Games as one of the first significant times in which the men's and women's communities in San Francisco worked collectively together to produce a really spectacular event."

"If you look at a lasting effect of 1982, I believe that those of us who were involved in it or were in San Francisco, saw what a tremendous uplift it gave to the community during our darkest hour of the AIDS crisis. We saw the chance for some tangible display of how our hopes and dreams could still be realized."

"This is an event that can change people's perceptions of themselves, and can change society's perception of who Gay and Lesbian people are — and the kind of community we can build — among people of all sexual orientations, races and ages, when we join together to celebrate our human existence, our happiness, our health and our beauty."

## News From MCC Tucson



# Chancellor Blames Reagan For Bigotry Explosion

NEW YORK, NY (AP) — The chancellor of the City University of New York on May 1 blamed "eight years of Ronald Reagan" for an explosion of bigotry on campus and in society.

"Eight years of Ronald Reagan and eight years of accelerated maldistribution of national wealth has led not just to bigotry on campus but to ethnic conflict in almost every major city in the country," said chancellor Joseph S. Murphy in a keynote speech at a Manhattan conference on campus bigotry sponsored by CUNY, the Anti-Defamation League and other organizations.

Murphy called on universities to fight prejudice through education and by fostering a climate of respect for ethnic differences. But he cautioned educators against stifling free speech in the quest to stamp out bigotry.

"The academy... bears a special responsibility both for dealing with prejudice and for fostering full and unconstrained expression of controversial ideas," he said.

"If we in the university fail to confront bigotry in our midst, to rebut the bigot and at the same time to hold true to the First Amendment values that underlie our existence, then no other institution in this society in this decade will do better," he said.

He said bigotry "directly results from a set of public policies pursued through the 1980s and a fail-

ure of leadership at every level." Reaganism, he added, promoted bigotry by elevating "unbridled greed to the status of virtue."

He added, "For at least the past five years every major conflict in our midst has degenerated into a field day for ethnic confrontation."

He said this was the "inevitable result of scarcity of resources... People will form into whatever tribal subgroups make sense and start attacking one another for the food or the jobs or the places in the university that do exist."

With 194,000 at some 20 junior colleges, senior colleges and graduate institutions, CUNY is the third-largest university system in the country. Its student body is 31 percent black, 22.5 percent Hispanic, 8.6 percent Asian and 37.3 percent white, according to Rita Rodin, a CUNY spokeswoman.

Racial incidents at CUNY have recently been in the news. Professor Michael Levin, a tenured philosophy professor at City College, sparked a near-riot when he delivered a speech at a private college in which he stated that white fear of blacks is justified. Levin has written papers in which he claims to use scientific data to prove that blacks are less intelligent than whites.

And re-accreditation was recently deferred at another CUNY branch, Bernard M. Baruch College, because of the school's failure to at-

tract minority professors and retain minority students.

To fight bigotry on campus, Murphy recommended condemning all bias-related violence; protecting the expression of all ideas, "however loathsome"; and ensuring that curriculums expose students "to the contributions of many cultures."

But he added, "Our obligation to protect free speech in no way compromises our freedom to respond - or our obligation to do so. The racist or anti-female or anti-Semitic remark made publicly that gets a quick and overpowering rebuttal does less harm than the suppressed comment that circulates away from the light of inspection."

Institutions that monitor bias incidents have reported recent increases in harassment and violence against Gay students, minority students and Jewish students. The ADL said there were 69 anti-Semitic incidents in 1989, up from 54 incidents the year before.

Other speakers at the conference included Robert Hess, president of Brooklyn College, and Sister Francesca Thompson, assistant dean for minority affairs at Fordham University.

Thompson asked that administrators be more understanding of the alienation many minority students feel at schools where whites dominate the administration and faculty, if not the student body.

"How do minority students cope? They withdraw inwardly and they die psychologically. The obstacles they face are almost insurmountable," she said.

Hess said administrators can foster a tolerant atmosphere by promoting changes in the curriculum and in extracurricular affairs. For example, he said Brooklyn College turned an annual country-style fair into a celebration of diversity by asking students to bring in foods reflecting the 53 different nationalities represented on campus. He also said all students are required to take a course in Asian, African and Latin American culture.

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
