3 accused of Gay nightclub bomb plot plead innocent

BOISE, IDAHO - Three men accused of plotting to bomb a Gay nightclub in Seattle to further the white supremacist movement have pleaded innocent to federal charges.

Proctor James Baker, 57, entered his plea before U.S. Magistrate Stephen Ayers at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. He is charged with conspiracy to bomb and making or possessing a pipe bomb.

In Boise, Robert John Winslow, 29, and Steven E. Nelson, 34, both pleaded innocent. All three are scheduled to stand trial in Boise starting June 25 before U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan.

In a grand jury indictment returned last week in Boise, the three are accused of building pipe bombs and plotting to bomb a Gay nightclub, listed as Neighbors Disco, Seattle. Federal

Philip Morris has made some contributions to AIDS organizations, but the \$200,000 donated to the JESSE HELMS CITIZENSHIP CENTER (OBSERVER June 13) directly counteracts them. It is similar to making donations to the KKK while also supporting the NAACP.

We are already receiving support from smokers, Gay bars, businesses and activists.

3 accused of Gay nightclub bomb plot

authorities allege the three also planned to bomb other Western Washington businesses or buildings owned or frequented by minorities.

Winslow and Nelson are each charged with conspiracy, making or possessing a pipe bomb and carrying firearms during a crime of violence.

Baker, who is unemployed, was arrested at his home in Coeur d'Alene on the evening of May 12. Winslow and Nelson were arrested the same day in Seattle.

All three men have ties to the Aryan Nations, a white-supremacy sect that has headquarters north of Hayden Lake, Idaho, the FBI alleges.

Winslow recently was discharged from the U.S. Army at Fort Lewis, Washington, and Nelson had acted as head of the Aryan Youth Program, which sponsored a gathering for neo-Nazi skinheads at the Aryan Nations compound in April, authorities have said.

A former wrestler spent four years convincing north Idaho white supremacists that he had abandoned his love of the ring for a hatred of Jews, minorities and Gays.

But Rico Renaldo Valentin apparently was working for the FBI, and was the tipster who allowed federal agents to arrest the three men who allegedly were plotting to bomb the establishments in the Seattle area, the Spokesman-Review and Spokane Chronicle newspapers reported.

"I was convinced and thought of him as a close friend," said the Rev. Richard Butler, 72, founder of the Aryan Nations sect in Hayden Lake.

WEST VIRGINIA TOWN LOBBIES TO CHANGE NAME

GAY, W. VA. - Chuck Raines says he's sick of hearing the town he calls home called a lot of other things. So he has begun a lobbying effort aimed at getting town fathers to rename this tiny Jackson County town near the Ohio border.

"When the community was first named, the word gay meant merry, joyous and lively," Raines said. "But as times have changed so has the meaning of the word."

Last week, Raines petitioned the Jackson County Commission, which would have to approve any name change. Raines hasn't suggested a new name, he just "nows he hates Gay."

The commission has not acted yet, but already Raines is facing opposition. Ruth Skinner, the town's postmaster for the last 32 years, said the town got its name in the 1850s. The way she sees it, Gay was Gay before Gay was homosexual.

"I'm satisfied with the way things are. This place was named Gay a long time before this other stuff got started."

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Tucson AIDS Project responds to letter

DEAR EDITOR:

I am pleased to respond to Sean Thomas's request, in a June 13, 1990, letter to the Observer, for information about the Tucson AIDS Project, Inc. (TAP). It's a substantial request that will require space in the Observer over several weeks to fulfill and that Sean and I are also meeting to discuss.

The first question Sean posed is about TAP's purpose. At a meeting, Sean clarified the reason behind the question: some people are concerned about whether TAP is a gay/lesbian organization and whether it served the gay/lesbian community.

The simple answer is that TAP does the latter. But there are complexities related both to the question and the answer.

According to Sean, strong animosity toward TAP and toward me on the part of some gay/lesbian community members prompts the question. I've known for a long time that TAP's choice and mine to serve the entire Tucson community was not one all others in the gay/lesbian community would have made and that it's a choice some dislike. I (and we) do not apologize for it.

I do think that the overwhelming demands of our work at TAP -- providing a wide array of services for people living with HIV disease, who number over 260 in the last year alone, and providing vital prevention services to many thousands each year -- have led to our not appearing aggressively in

certain gay venues and in the gay/lesbian press. Although I think others have handled that part of our community struggle with AIDS well and, in a sense, "covered the territory," I am sorry that we've not been much in touch with those venues and their people and with the gay/lesbian press. I commit, so far as the Observer and the folks I refer to will let us, to keep in better touch and help "cover the territory."

In other gay/lesbian territories (or venues) and for hundreds of gay men living and dying of AIDS, TAP has been there. Although we decided several years ago to serve all PWAs and their loved ones, the reality is that more than 85% of the more than 500 people (PWAs, partners, families) we've served since 1985 have been or are gay men. In subsequent articles, my colleagues and I will detail the professional services we provide to the gay men among our current census (registered, on-going clients) of 160 persons living with HIV. Even this aggregate number, however, suggests the magnitude of our service to the gay community. Couple that with our prevention programs that include specific interventions for Gays and Lesbians, TAP serves great numbers of gays and lesbians each year. Many of our paid and volunteer personnel, who together number over 250, are lesbian or gay or bisexual; so our roots in the gay/lesbian community are personal as well as deep.

Nonetheless, TAP is not a 'gay organization', as some

would have us be. TAP is an AIDS service organization (ASO), vitally involved in the gay/lesbian community. In this regard, we are, I think, no different from Tucson's other AIDS focussed groups, which at least in written material do not declare themselves to be exclusively Gay focussed as well as AIDS focussed.

Gay ownership of AIDS is an issue that has cropped up around the country. Since most ASOs grew out of gay/lesbian communities (and TAP is no exception), it's not surprising that there is a movement afoot to keep them there and people angry when they don't stay there. This is a topic I shall develop further in a future letter, for I think it is crucial to understanding all the "politics" surrounding AIDS. It's an issue as volatile as the disease that brought so many of us together. My hope is that we can keep it from being an issue that rips us apart.

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
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Mark Kerr with Marion Pickens, Democratic candidate for the House of Representatives from Dist. 9.

POLITICS '90: Secretary Shumway, what was your reaction when Governor Mofford asked you to become Secretary of State?

SHUMWAY: I was honored and also surprised. I knew that if I accepted, I would be jumping into that fishbowl all politicians get into. I also knew that I could not make this decision without consulting my family. So I held a family council with my wife and children and reached the decision to accept.

POLITICS '90: Before becoming Secretary of State what were you doing?

SHUMWAY: I was the State Elections Director.

POLITICS '90: When you were asked by Governor Mofford to become Secretary of State, did she make any stipulations?

SHUMWAY: Yes. She asked me if I would run for another term. She did not want someone just to fill out the term.

POLITICS '90: Is the petition verification process difficult or what?

SHUMWAY: The petition process is really two steps. First we check the signatures. We have 17 days to do this. We usually get done in 7 working days. Then we send a sample of the petitions back to the County Recorders for verification.

It was great to hear the candidates speak; they really got me going. The night was a success for Lambda, for TLGA and for the community, more walls came down and doors opened for us.

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
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
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News From MCC/Tucson

If the U.F.M.C.C. can do it, so can the Lesbian and Gay Society as a whole.

A Division Of Loyalties

It was Thursday morning, June 22, 12:30 a.m. An earthquake measuring 7.3 on the Richter scale hit off Iran's border in the Caspian Sea.

Early estimates of the damage say at least 40,000 people died; over 100,000 people were injured; more than 400,000 left homeless.

At first glance, the scene is devastating. It brings to our minds memories of burning apartment buildings and collapsed freeways in San Francisco last October.

What it should bring to mind, however, is the faces of the United States citizens who were held captive for 444 days in 1979.

We SHOULD think of the evening news showing Iranians burning the American flag while shouting "Death to the Imperialists".

What we SHOULD think about is the airplanes that have been bombed, the lives that have been lost, the hostages held, and the threats to kill Americans—all of which have come, in one form or another, from the mouths of Iranians. Yes, the same Iranians now asking for international aid.

Iran's spiritual leader, Ali Khamenei, has called this earthquake a "spiritual test". And I agree.

Let the European countries which have suffered at Iranian hands stand silent while Iran digs out from under tons of debris. Let us watch as they struggle alone. Let us watch as their "god" comes to aid his "chosen" people.

Iran has wanted to be a country alone; without ties to the rest of the world. They have made enemies, killed innocents, and denounced European ways. Fine, let them have their way. Let

them deal with this disaster without the European ways they hate so much.

Iran and its officials will learn that they are merely a small fish in a big pond only when they see how impotent they are without aid from other countries.

Some say American aid might open up talks to free the hostages still held. For all we know, the hostages are dead; either by the earthquake or before.

I ask: How much do we have to do? We have waited, we have opened diplomatic channels. And, now, we offer aid to the country which has damned us.

I am sympathetic to the grieving and dead. But there comes a time when a lesson must be taught: Offering cookies to a child who continually starts fires is no way to assure he/she will never start another.

CAPSULE COLUMN: Last year, NBC announced it had purchased (for \$250,000) the rights to make a film based on the bestselling book about AIDS "And The Band Played On" written by Randy Shilts.

Last month NBC announced it had dropped the film from development. Rights for the film were quickly snatched up by HBO—with a history of running films and documentaries about homosexuals (including the 1990 documentary-Oscar winner about the AIDS Quilt).

Officials at NBC say they decided not to continue with the film, adding that 70% of all films put into development are never made.

Shilts believes the reason is political. His book blames the government in power during the dawning days of AIDS (Reagan) with foot-dragging.
