

Barney Frank Receives Reprimand From House of Representatives

WASHINGTON, DC - The House of Representatives, in a stormy session last Thursday, July 26, rejected Republican efforts to expel or censure Rep. Barney Frank, for his actions in behalf of a male prostitute.

Upholding unanimous recommendations of their Ethics Committee, House members voted 408 to 18 to reprimand Frank for fixing 33 parking tickets for his former male companion, Stephen Gobie, and writing a misleading memorandum that could have helped Gobie in law enforcement proceedings.

But the Ethics Committee report mentioned no link between Frank's then unknown homosexuality and a misleading memo he wrote in 1986 to help Gobie who then was on probation for sex and drug convictions. Rep. Julian Dixon, D-Calif., chairman of the Ethics Committee, said that Frank's concern over revealing his sexual preference "does not, however, justify his making misleading statements".

Under House rules, a reprimand is the next-to-

mildest official rebuke that members can impose on a colleague. Censure which is accompanied by a loss of committee seniority, and expulsion are the most severe penalties. In the history of the House, only four members have been expelled and 22 censured.

Before the reprimand vote, the House rejected an impassioned attempt by Rep. William E. Dannemeyer, R-Calif., to expel Frank. Dannemeyer, a crusader against gay rights and homosexual lifestyles, attacked Frank's admitted homosexuality portrayed it as part of a "cultural war" in the United States between adherents of Judeo-Christian ethics and advocates of "moral activism" - which Dannemeyer defined as "situational ethics in which anything goes, as long as you don't hurt someone else".

"Do we condone a member of this body who knowingly permits a house of prostitution to be operated out of his residence?" Dannemeyer asked.

The issue, Dannemeyer said, was whether "there are

standards in our society that will affirm for ourselves and our children." Dixon called Dannemeyer's charge "the most edited, selected garbage that has ever been put forth... in this House."

Dannemeyer was joined in his call for expelling Frank by a fellow California Republican Rep. Robert Dornan, who said that in any other profession - teaching, the military, corporate management - "you'd be finished, fired if you didn't resign" for what Frank had done.

Pointing his finger at Frank, who sat through the four-hour ordeal flanked by fellow members of the Massachusetts congressional delegation, Dornan thundered, "I'm going to vote for expulsion because you don't have the honor or decency to resign." The House eventually voted 390 to 38 to reject Dannemeyer's expulsion attempt.

After the expulsion attempt failed, House Minority Whip Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., moved to increase Frank's punishment to censure. "We're not here simply to deal with Mr. Frank," Gingrich said, "We're here to repair the integrity of the House of Representatives. Widely interpreted by Democrats as a move to create a political issue out of Frank's case, the Gingrich proposal also was rejected, largely along party lines, 287-141."

In the Arizona delegation, Rep. Bob Stump voted for both expulsion and censure. Reps. Jim Kolbe, Jon Kyl and Jay Rhodes, all Republicans, voted for censure. Rep. Morris K. Udall, Democrat, voted against both stronger damaging measures.

Speaking to a hushed House, Frank, 50, said he "should have known better" than to write a misleading memo and to fix parking tickets for his former companion. He said some of the mistakes were made to conceal his homosexuality. "Three years ago, I decided concealment didn't work." "I wish I'd decided that...earlier."

"I am here to apologize to my colleagues, to this institution, to those around me," Frank said. Frank told his colleagues that he accepted the committee report and took full responsibility for his actions.

Rep. Fred Grandy, R-Iowa, summed up the feelings of most House members when he said Congress should not "pass down moral dictates" on their peers. "We don't enhance family values by damning individuals whose lifestyles differ from our own," Grandy said. "We are here not to prosecute, not per-

secute."

Speaking on Frank's behalf, Rep. Thomas M. Foglietta, D-Pa., defended Frank as a champion of civil and human rights and a "sane military budget". "Barney Frank does not stand accused of stealing money, or taking bribes or selling his office," Foglietta said. "He is accused of being stupid. And, my friends, if all of us were to be judged by that standard, there would be very few of us left here."

Rep. Vic Fazio, D-Calif., said those who would "up the ante" after a 10-month probe were a "genteel lynch mob". "Frank made mistakes, several mistakes," Fazio said. "He gets what he deserves here today - no more and no less."

In later comments to reporters, Frank noted that Dannemeyer has consistently voted against issues of importance to gay men and women. "There is something about homosexuality that sets Mr. Dannemeyer to vibrating. When you're dealing with Mr. Dannemeyer, there's a growing perception in the House that he and reality rarely coincide."

Frank said he hopes he can put the ethics controversy behind him and looks forward to wading back into legislative issues next week. "This is part of my life," he told reporters. "It's a part of which I am not particularly proud."

Ohio Bar Raided 41 To Fight City Law

LIMA, OHIO - The newly formed Gay/Lesbian Rights Project of the Ohio American Civil Liberties Union has announced that it would be representing 41 patrons of a Lima bar who were arrested when Lima police raided the bar on June 10. The night of the raid, the manager, a bartender, and all of the patrons in the bar were arrested and booked. The patrons were all charged with "visiting a disorderly house". The supposed crime is a Lima City law and carries up to 30-days in jail and a fine of \$250.

The night of the raid, the Office Bar had hired a company to provide entertainment including male dancers. According to some of the patrons, they did not even know about the entertainment and had simply gone to the bar for a drink. At the time of the raid, the performer on stage was dressed in a tuxedo and had taken off his tie. Two performers had undressed down to "T-bar" briefs before the raid.

Many of the patrons claim that the police of-


CRISTO AIDS MINISTRY LUNCHEON AUG. 4

PROTESTS RENEWED OVER GAY BOOKS
MUSCATINE, IOWA (AP) - Two Muscatine men say they will renew complaints about a library's collection of books dealing with homosexuality and with the library's selection of PG-13 and R-rated videotapes.

"I don't think the taxpayer should be paying for this," said John Fifer, 72. "It's immoral and unnatural."

Eric Marcus of San Francisco, the author of one of the books singled out, has offered to donate a copy of his "The Male Couple's Guide To Living Together," to the library if there are objections to spending tax dollars for it, said the library's director.

Fifer and Jerry Henderson, 50, already have complained to trustees of the Musser Public Library and to the Muscatine City Council. Fifer said the complaint will be renewed at the next library board meeting.

The dispute flared last month after Fifer complained that he found Marcus' book while he was looking for another book. Since then, he said he has found other books about homosexuality.

Marsha Tate, director of the library, said Fifer and Henderson will get a chance to address trustees at the next meeting, although no formal hearing is planned on the complaint.

Ms. Tate said that in the past, trustees have supported a library policy that "the patron has the right to choose what to check out." She also said the library is "getting incredibly fine support from the community."

BRIGHT LIGHTS EXPOSURE HELPS SOME DEPRESSION
NEW YORK, NY (AP) - A treatment with bright lights that can ease winter-time depression, is showing promise for non-seasonal depression, too, although why it works is a mystery, a scientist says.

It may work by adjusting the timing of internal body activities or by replacing the sunlight missed by people who spend most of the day indoors, said Dr. Daniel Kripke.

Speaking at the annual meeting of the American Psychiatric Association, Kripke, of the University of California, San Diego, and other researchers tested light therapy on 51 veterans who were hospitalized for depression.

Twenty-five patients were exposed to bright white light, usually from 8 to 11 p.m., every night for a week. The 26 others received a placebo treatment of dim red light for those hours.

At the end of the week, patients who received the experimental treatment showed significant lessening of depression, while those on the placebo did not improve, Kripke said.



Man Sues Lover He Blames For Giving Him AIDS

ORLANDO, FL - An Orlando man is suing his gay lover for damages contending the man gave him "AIDS" and knew he carried the "deadly virus", but didn't offer a warning.

Gay and Lesbian rights organizations could not recall a similar lawsuit anywhere in the country.

The plaintiff, John H. Hill, 46, is ill and cannot pay his medical bills, his lawyer said. The defendant, Marion L. Miller, 58, could not be reached for comment and his condition was unknown.

The case is different from that of the late actor Rock Hudson because his lover did not contract the disease. But a jury found that Hudson concealed his "AIDS infection". The jury awarded Hudson's lover Marc Christian millions in damages in damages from the actor's estate.

Bryan W. Crews, who filed the Circuit Court case, also thinks it is precedent-setting.

"As far as I know, there are no cases in Florida involved with a homosexual relationship and AIDS," Crews said.

According to the lawsuit which seeks unspecified damages of more than \$5,000, the two men began a long-term

relationship in 1981 or 1982.

Miller learned in July 1986 that he was an "AIDS carrier who had not developed the disease," the suit said, contending he had a duty to warn his lover but did not do so until six months later.

"I would say that if this is not the first case, it would be among the first" in the nation professor Arthur Leonard of New York Law School told the Orlando Sentinel. Leonard writes the monthly newsletter Lesbian-Gay Law Notes and scans Gay newspapers and magazines for information on "AIDS" lawsuits.

"I don't know of any such cases," said Evan Wolfson, staff attorney for the Lambda Legal Defense Fund, which publishes a bi-monthly guide to "AIDS" litigation.

His partner, Sandy Love, said, "There may have been cases that have been filed, but I think I would have heard of them."

Crews said similar suits involving heterosexuals and the herpes virus, have been won elsewhere in the nation. Juries in those cases found that people carrying infectious diseases have a legal duty to warn anyone in danger of contracting the illnesses.

Des Moines Native Charged In What FBI Says Is Hate Plot

DES MOINES, IOWA - An Iowa native remembered by a neighbor as someone who went out of his way to be nice is facing federal charges in what the FBI describes as a plot to blow up minority hangouts and a synagogue.

Robert John Winslow, a Des Moines native who had been living at the white supremacist Aryan Nations compound in Hayden Lake, Idaho, is accused by federal officials of plotting to blow up gay hangouts, bars frequented by blacks, Korean-owned businesses and a synagogue in the state of Washington.

An FBI document filed in federal court in Seattle said the 29-year-old Winslow talked in one of the plots of a "kill zone" a place to strategically place the bomb to kill most people as they scurried out of a bar.

"This thing is so bizarre I wish I could understand it," said Winslow's mother, Ann Winslow of Des Moines. "I don't know what to say. I'm sick about it."

Winslow, who was released from the Army in February, now is in jail in Idaho on charges of conspiracy to bomb, knowingly making, receiving and possessing pipe bombs and illegally carrying firearms. He is scheduled to go on trial Oct. 1 in Boise, Idaho, and faces up to 20 years in prison and fines of \$750,000.

Rob McKenzie, 57, a neighbor of Winslow's when he was growing up in Des Moines' Beaverdale area, said, "Rob was the kind of kid who went out of his way to be nice to you". Another neighbor, Pat Hardy, said "I'm stunned. He always seemed like he had his head screwed on right."

An FBI document filed

in Seattle said the FBI learned of Winslow's plans when it began to electronically eavesdrop on conversations between him and Steven E. Nelson, 34, another Aryan Nations member. It is believed the agents were tipped off by an inside informant.

"On April 8, 1990, agents overheard Winslow and Nelson describe their plans to manufacture a bomb and destroy a gay bar in Seattle," the document said. Court records said agents followed Winslow on April 14 to a mountainous area outside Hayden Lake and saw him detonate a pipe bomb.

The FBI contends that Winslow had targeted the Neighbors Disco, a popular gay hangout in Seattle. Also on the list, the FBI said, were the Raintree, a bar with predominantly black clientele in Tacoma, Washington and an unidentified synagogue in Seattle.

"Winslow stated that he and Nelson were going to place explosive charges inside the [Neighbors] bar. They would then telephone the bar, warn them that a pipe bomb would go off in three minutes, and then detonate the charges as patrons attempted to flee."

The bar occupants were expected to rush to the "kill zone" as the bomb exploded. "Winslow stated that he was confident that the explosion would result in high body count," the FBI document said.

Winslow and Nelson were followed to Seattle, where the FBI alleges they bought a 6-inch section of galvanized pipe, two end caps and a pound of smokeless powder at a hardware store, and a gun at a gun shop. The FBI arrested them soon after.





Just when we think he finally understands why he gets taken outside so often, he has an "accident". Another one of his less endearing habits is chewing. So far, he has chewed on two shoes (not mates), three throw rugs, a coffee table and several chair legs. As the old saying goes, if I had known then what I know now...!

Has anything like this ever happened to you? Something you thought would bring

you joy or pleasure ended up costing you far more than you bargained for? Perhaps some experience you anticipated to be the "ultimate high" left you instead wondering why you ever got involved, and more importantly, how you could ever get out.

Ohio Bar Raided, 41 To Fight City Law

Officers failed to read them their rights and were verbally and physically abusive. The police were wearing latex gloves during the raid and one of the officers referred to the bar as "an AIDS place". A non-Gay patron of the bar was told by a police officer that she didn't belong in a place like this and that "you should go to church in the morning". One of the patrons told the police she had a broken pelvis but an officer pulled her out of a booth and threw her to the floor.

All of the patrons were taken to the police station, booked and fingerprinted. Several patrons pled guilty and paid a minimal fine. The remaining patrons decided to fight the city and asked the OHIO ACLU and the Gay/Lesbian Rights Project to represent them.

Jerry Bunge, an ACLU cooperating attorney and the chair of the Ohio ACLU Gay/Lesbian Rights Project, said that the law is clearly unconstitutional on its face. The law defines a disorderly house as any place operated for the purpose of "prostitution, lewdness or assignation". Bunge said that no


one is claiming that there was any prostitution in the bar, but instead the city is relying on allegations of lewdness or assignation.

According to Bunge, "the word 'lewd' doesn't set any reliable standard or give any sort of warning to people. The assignation part of the law is just silly. Assignation simply means that people might go to the bar to meet other people and maybe engage in some sort of private activity later. If Lima is going to arrest every patron in every bar where people meet, the city will have more people in jail than out".

Loretta Mikolaj, Project Director of the Gay/Lesbian Rights Project, said that "this sort of bar raid is something that we all thought died out years ago. It is just astonishing to find it still going on in Ohio. This is exactly the sort of the thing that the Gay/Lesbian Rights Project will be fighting". The Project was formed recently to deal with legal, educational and political issues affecting Gay/Lesbian people in the state of Ohio.

Along with Bunge, a team of three attorneys from the Toledo chapter of the Ohio ACLU will serve as the trial attorneys. William Rubenstein of the national ACLU Lesbian and Gay Rights Project is serving as "Of Counsel".

Gay Leaders Praise Conservative For Announcing He Is Gay

WASHINGTON, DC - Marvin Liebman, a father of the modern conservative movement, is helping smash Gay stereotypes by publicly declaring his homosexuality, according to Gay political leaders. (OBSERVER, July 25)

In an interview with the New York Native, Liebman, 66, said he decided to announce he's Gay because he sees signs that the political right is becoming dangerously bigoted.

"The primary impact I wanted to have in this whole coming out was on the conservative community. Just to sort of alert them of the dangers of homophobia and all that comes with it," he said.

But Roger Stone, a conservative political consultant, said he did not think Liebman's statement would affect the conservative movement.

"I think it will be viewed as the actions of an individual," Stone said, adding that he did not believe bigotry was growing among conservatives.

Liebman first made his revelation in a letter to William F. Buckley, whom he describes as his best friend.

"I am both Gay and conservative and I don't find that a contradiction," Liebman wrote in the July 9 issue of Buckley's conservative "National Review".

Explaining why he chose to go public now, Liebman continued, "I fear that our cause might sink back into the ooze in which so much of it rested in (pre National Review) days. In that dark age, the American Right was heavily, perhaps dominantly, made up of bigots."

Buckley - who once suggested that Gay people with "AIDS" be tattooed on the buttocks and called Gore Vidal a "queer" on national television - responded by asking if it's reasonable "to expect the larger community to think of the activity of homosexuals as unnatural whatever its etiology?"

However, Buckley also wrote that he understood Liebman's "pain" and promised the National Review "will not be scarred by thoughtless Gay-bashing."

Liebman said he feels no rancor toward Buckley even though they disagree on whether homosexuality is moral or normal.

"There is nothing that Bill Buckley could say that would offend me or make me feel bad," Liebman said. "This is just the way the man thinks."

Born in Brooklyn, NY, Liebman was a Jew until age 55, when he converted to Roman Catholicism. Buckley was his godfather.

At 15, Liebman had joined the Young Communist League and for years was active in other communist front groups. He served two years in the Army Air Corps but was discharged in 1944 for being Gay - a fact he kept secret until this month.

After the war, Liebman joined Irgun, an underground Zionist organization and

worked as an organizer and fund-raiser. Until the early 1950s, Liebman worked for a variety of left-leaning groups.

But his politics shifted, and he teamed with Buckley and other to pioneer the modern conservative movement. He founded the Young Americans for Freedom and was active in the Conservative Party of New York and the presidential campaigns of Barry Goldwater and Ronald Reagan.

Liebman came to Washington after Reagan was elected in 1980, working first as a consultant to the federal government. From 1982 to 1987, he was director of public affairs and special projects at the National Endowment for the Arts. He is now director of special projects at the Federal Trade Commission.

Catholic Parent Group Says Gay People Should Wear Visible ID

TOWNSVILLE, AUSTRALIA - A group of Catholic parents in Queensland state says homosexuals should be required by law to wear visible identification and be counseled on "the depravity of their actions."

The call for ID cards for homosexuals is part of a 10-point program presented by the Queensland Association of Catholic Parents as "modern minimum health precautions" to help stop the spread of AIDS. The group does not have church backing.

AIDS activists criticized the ID proposal, saying it highlighted the failure of AIDS education to have a significant impact on the general population.


"Why don't we just go back to Nazism and put a tattoo on our heads?" said John Bonello, AIDS Council project officer for Townsville. The Criminal Justice Commission in Queensland will hold public hearings on homosexual law reform during the next few months.

The Catholic parents group program was described in a 50-page document submitted to the commission. Michael D'Dowd, the association's secretary, called on the state government to maintain existing anti-homosexual legislation. He described moves to decriminalize prostitution as "stupidity" in the extreme.

D'Dowd did not say how many people belong to his organization, but claims it represents "quite a large group of parents who want to keep traditional moral standards current."

The association's other recommendations included quarantining AIDS carriers, compulsory "AIDS testing" of all male flight attendants and known homosexuals, banning homosexuals from teaching positions and jobs involving food handling, and requiring hotels and restaurants to use disposable crockery and cutlery.



TEAM ARIZONA, made up of 85 athletes from the state are scheduled to arrive in Vancouver for the opening ceremonies of Gay Games III- "Celebration '90", which has been labeled the largest athletic event in the world for 1990. Over 8,000 athletes will be vying for medals in Vancouver.

Organized in December of last year, TEAM ARIZONA has been busy for the past six months raising funds to enable them to purchase uniforms and other items, including headquarters facilities at the Vancouver Ramada Inn, to field this record number of athletes at Gay Games III.

TEAM ARIZONA athletes will be participating in bowling, volleyball, cycling, tennis, golf, swimming, track and field, powerlifting, triathlon, physique, racket-

ball and badminton.

The Arizona team will sport "the hottest uniform in the parade!" The uniforms will be white in a poplin

the TEAM ARIZONA logo. A neon green stripe will run down the front of the jacket and the pants. On the opposite side of the stripe on the jacket will be the words, TEAM ARIZONA, USA. Retail cost for the uniforms would be \$130 but CD Garment Printing is donating the uniforms at their cost of \$75 each. Topping off the uniform will be neon green cowboy hats for each member.
