New Jersey Court Prohibits Anti-Gay Discrimination

TRENTON, NJ - The New Jersey Supreme Court has announced changes to the state's judicial and professional codes to prohibit lawyers and judges from discriminating against people because of their sexual orientation.

The changes, which were originally proposed by the American Civil Liberties Union of New Jersey, makes the state's judiciary the first in the country to adopt anti-Gay discrimination clauses for lawyers and judges. The new codes were published in the August 2 issue of the New Jersey Law Journal.

National Helms Action Called for Oct. 6

DURHAM, NC - North Carolina Senate Vote '90, the statewide coalition working to stop Jesse Helms in 1990, has issued a call to Gay and progressive organizations across the country to help make Helms defeat a reality.

N.C. Senate Vote '90 is inviting progressive Americans to join them in "Countdown to Victory" events in all 49 supporting states on Saturday, Oct. 6, as North Carolinians opposing Helms and supporting his opponent, former Charlotte mayor Harvey Gantt, rally that day in Raleigh from all across North Carolina.

"People will be gathering at marches, rallies, potlucks, dances, concerts -- all kinds of events designed to bring people together in their support through the last 30 days of the pro-Gantt, anti-Helms push," said Vote '90s director Mandy Carter.

The cross-country effort, subtitled "A National Helms Liberation Action Day", is pivotal because Helms' Senate influence has persistent national repercussions and the national fundraising machine that finances his North Carolina races is among the most lucrative in the nation.

By August 20, the Helms campaign had raised \$7 million (75% from out-of-state) and the Gantt campaign had raised 12% of that amount (approximately \$800,000). Vote '90 has raised \$50,000.

"All Americans should have the chance to show their opposition to the Helms agenda," said Carter. "We need to let people know that Helms is not opposed-- here or elsewhere --by some small handful of single-issue activists. People from all walks of life believe the country will change for the better if Helms is sent back home."

Five major cities --Boston, New York, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Washington DC --are already planning events, and a "how-to" organizing kit is available from the Vote '90 office to help local people in every state organize their own "Countdown to Victory" commemoration.

OVER 8,000 PARTICIPANTS EXPECTED

The North Carolina October Countdown to Victory march and rally organizers are planning for at least 8,000 people to attend the event. The march will begin at noon followed by a rally. Singer/activist Holly Near, who will hold a special NC Senate Vote '90 benefit concert on the evening of the Rally, will be among the featured speakers and performers. There will be speakers representing the spectrum of issues and concerns committed to a Helms defeat and a Gantt victory.

The organization's credibility can be measured by the fact that their work has been covered by the state's major media without the anti-Gay bias traditionally shown in the South toward openly-Gay activity. Individuals and institutions within the state Democratic party, including the Gantt campaign, seem to be supportive of the groups' efforts to productively address what Gantt calls the "hot button issues" such as homosexuality, morality in the arts, and abortion.

Vote '90 even ended up in one of Jesse Helms' national fundraising letters that featured the attacks on homosexuals that have become a mainstay of the Helms campaign: "Mandy Carter, who describes herself as a black, Lesbian activist, just announced 'N.C. Senate Vote '90'" the letter began. "It's a coalition of arts advocates, peace activists, people of color, Gay people and other opponents of the Helms agenda. This left-wing conglomerate isn't just the homosexual crowd. It's the radical feminist NOW crowd, the 'radical chic' artists and the Union Bosses.

New Jersey Court Prohibits Anti-Gay Discrimination

"The Supreme Court of New Jersey has declared that bias in the state's legal system against Gay, Lesbian, or Bi-sexual people will not be tolerated," said Ruth E. Harlow, a staff attorney with the ACLU-NJ. "These new rules send a very important signal to all New Jersey judges and lawyers that all forms of discrimination -- including that against Gay people and the poor will not be accepted."

The amended portion of the Code of Judicial Conduct now says that "a judge should be impartial, and should not discriminate because of race, color, religion, age, sex, sexual orientation, national origin, marital status, socio-economic status or handicap."

The new Rule of Professional Conduct includes the same protected categories and says that lawyers engage in professional misconduct if they "engage, in a professional capacity, in conduct involving discrimination... where the conduct is intended or likely to cause harm."

William B. Rubenstein, the Director of ACLU's Lesbian and Gay Rights Project, said the New Jersey changes demonstrate how the battle for equal treatment of Lesbians and Gay men is being won on a state-by-state basis.

We hope New Jersey's actions will serve as a precedent for similar non-discrimination rules in other states, and eventually in the federal judiciary as well," he said.

ASU Refuses Grant Due To Porn

PHOENIX - Rather than sign an anti-obscenity pledge, the 11-member faculty of Arizona State's Creative Writing Program has rejected a \$9,965 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

University officials said they were advised of the decision on the grant that would have been used to bring nationally recognized poets to the campus for lectures and readings.

AIDS Mastery Workshop Oct. 12-13-14

TUCSON - The highly regarded AIDS Mastery Workshop has been scheduled for Tucson on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 12-13-14. This is the first time the workshop is being produced in Arizona. This particular workshop serves as a vehicle for the individual to develop the tools needed to move forward with living with HIV infection. Deadline for applications for this AIDS Mastery Workshop is Saturday, Sept. 22.

The workshop will be held at the Shanti offices, 602 N. 4th Avenue beginning with registration on Friday, Oct. 12 at 6:00 p.m. Introductory exercises begin at 7:00 p.m. This first evening should conclude around 10:00 p.m. The following day commences at 10:00 a.m. and continues all day until about 8:00 p.m. Sunday's hours are the same though finishing exercises should be completed by 6:00 p.m. with a "Graduation" party following immediately afterward.

As this is a group happening, it is imperative that all participants be punctual. The cost for the three days is \$50.00, including all meals. Scholarships are available on a first come-first served basis. Enrollment forms are available at any of the AIDS service organizations - TAP, PACT, SHANTI and EL PROYECTO. Telephone 325-5063 for further information with regard to scholarships.

"AIDS Mastery" workshops are being produced by the Positively Well Workshops in conjunction with the above local service organizations as part of ongoing expansion and development. Committed to bring to the Tucson HIV community alternative, complimentary therapies, this self-empowering forum is one other way to deal with HIV infection in a positive, productive manner.

The weekend is aligned and open to alternate treatments, presenting a way for those affected by AIDS to begin to see where they are in their lives and what is available to them to deal with the "victim" mentality which sees an AIDS diagnosis as a death sentence, and to see that a person has choices. A lot of sharing takes place, utilizing a

variety of techniques. Some are along the lines of group therapy, with participants sharing their feelings with the group and telling about themselves. Visualizations and theater games are also used. AIDS Mastery leader Sally Fisher uses visualizations in the Louise Hay manner, to create mental images which allow the participants to explore themselves and the healing power of their own bodies. There is even a little aerobics.

While the atmosphere is supportive, the weekend is also about taking a realistic look at the participants' lives. Fisher gives people a nudge when they need it. The weekend ultimately becomes about finding a way to take control again and stop surrendering.

The spiritual and holistic aspects of the weekend help contribute to improved mental health and stress reduction. (What could be more stressful than an AIDS diagnosis?) Without a positive mental attitude, any kind of healing process is difficult, if not impossible. Fisher utilizes different techniques emphasizing self-love, and self-acceptance. Positive mental attitude is also fostered by the large number of assistants. AIDS Mastery graduates who come back to help out at the weekends. As Fisher puts it, "It's spiritual and practical. Life becomes about living, not just about being sick. It's about being well."

Perhaps the most convincing testimony to the Mastery is the look on people's faces on Sunday night, especially those who came in sick and leave with an energy that can only be described as healing. The Mastery has a visibly uplifting effect on everyone involved, assistants and participants alike, which is one reason assistants return to help out. It is as if the support and humanity generated over the weekend is the secret weapon against this disease, the nexus from which alternate healing can be explored.



It has come to my attention, on my own excursions, that most Valley women are not accustomed to those of us who live in leather. There are some differences - mostly visibly, Leathermen's/women's attire. Leather is a most important part of our lives, and proper respect should be given it. Questions are fine. We expect, and are more than willing, to discuss our lifestyle with anyone. But handling our leather or other paraphernalia is not recommended unless you ask first - if only to be 100% sure that there really are keys to those handcuffs you just "borrowed". Common courtesy should be given to everyone, including Leathermen/women. No one appreciates being manhandled or having his/her clothing messed with by strangers.

There are a few other things that should be known, such as, if a woman or man wears a collar, that person "belongs" to someone else. Therefore, if you wish to speak to that person, it is best to ask permission from his/her partner/master. Problems might be inadvertently caused if you don't. If you were to see a collared person kneeling or sitting on the floor (or elsewhere), leave him/her alone. Any needs will be seen to by his/her master

Granted, this may seem strange,

even cruel, to some of you, but it is a lifestyle chosen by both parties. Some of you may have seen the fantasy routine my wife and I perform at various bars and functions. In it, she is whipped (and I don't mean a little). After untying her, she is forced to her knees and hot candle wax is poured across her scantily clad chest. Sound inhuman? It isn't. Bit Of The Old South

This last week I had a nice long visit with Chuck Mayer one of the founders of PACT For Life. And he has impressed upon me the importance of the early intervention program. Accessibility to treatments is one of the cornerstones of the Early Intervention Program of PACT. We know that AIDS is a treatable disease and the earlier you treat it, the more likely you are to manage it and keep it in check and stay healthy.

But there is still a lot of fear that keeps people from being tested, thus not learning your status and not getting early treatment.

There is one estimate that there are around 16 believed anti-viral treatments that work as well or better than AZT.

Shanti has assisted people who haven't been able to afford treatments. Assistance with treatments, immune system monitoring as well as many other aspects are what PACT For Life is about.

The Pima County HIV Planning Project estimates 842 HIV infected individuals in need of early intervention and health monitoring services. The Early Intervention Program should provide access to immune monitoring service support groups, treatment information and referral to existing services i.e. case management, clinical treatment, experimental protocols, and counseling both professional and peer-oriented.

The number one barrier to testing among the Gay men according to the Centers for Disease Control study, seemed to be the fear of receiving the "death sentence". On the other hand, hope offered by drug intervention at an early stage frequently was offered as reason some would want to be tested now. "Early treatment is a viable alternative to the death sentence."

More will be coming in upcoming issues of the OBSERVER concerning the

whole Early Intervention Program. For more information please contact PACT For Life, 322-9808. Much of the information was researched from past issues of the Shanti newsletter and papers written by Chuck Mayer.



News From
MCC/TUCSON

"Are there any scriptures in the Bible that clearly accepts a persons being a Christian and a homosexual? This is a question that is being asked often, and just as often, either being unanswered or being given the wrong answer.

Before we go to the Bible and start quoting scripture, we have to understand some of the history of the Bible as we know it today. The Old Testament was originally written in Hebrew and Aramaic. These writings were then transferred into Greek. One of the most important translations is the "Septuagint", translated approximately 250 BC.

This translation was used during the time of Jesus and no copy is in existence today. Then later the Old Testament was translated from the Greek into Latin (the Vulgate), Syriac (the Peshitta) and Egyptian (the Coptic). Until 1947 the oldest known Hebrew manuscripts of the Old Testament were translations dating from the 9th and 10th Centuries AD. In 1947 came the discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls which date approximately 100 BC.

Before the invention of printing in the 15 century AD, all translations were hand copied. This was usually done by a group of scribes, each of whom wrote out his copy of the manuscript as the head scribe dictated. If a scribe did not hear clearly, or failed to concentrate, mistakes would occur. Even a single copyist working from an original manuscript sometimes misread the writing or accidentally introduced his own mistakes. For example, there are two Greek words, "malakos" and "arsenokoitai" used in the New Testament scripture to denote "homosexual" but yet, neither word means homosexual in the original Greek.

But still, the English translations have included a homosexual meaning to both of these words. In Genesis we find the story of the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah and the much quoted scripture condemning homosexuality. But in Ezekiel 16: 49-50, Sodom and Gomorrah were destroyed for a different reason.

No, there is no scripture in the Bible that specifically condones homosexuality. But, every scripture condemning homosexuality in the Old Testament was to the Hebrews. This was a new and struggling nation, weak with a small population, the need to increase and multiply was necessary at that time. In the world today, the human

Cutting Off One's Nose

Once again, the United States military forces prove that intelligence and reason are nowhere to be found among the higher-ups.

The New York Times newspaper has reported renewed efforts to weed out homosexuals from the ranks of the enlisted. This time, Lesbians bear the brunt of the attention.

Vice Admiral Joseph Donnell recently said, in a message to officers in charge of ships and shore installations in the Eastern United States, that Lesbian sailors are "among the command's top performers". His message further stated that efforts to remove them from the service should be continued.

The Pentagon has long held that homosexuals should not be allowed among the enlisted or officer ranks, regardless of their proven skills and abilities. (See this column, Nov. 8, 1989).

Oh, logic, where is thy sting?

Representative Gerry Studds (D-Mass.) said, "If it is the Navy's policy to root out the top performers, what is going on here?" In reference to the Pentagon's pig-headed "no homosexual" stance, Studds continued, "This is a telling example, and in and of itself a repudiation of a bankrupt policy."

According to Pentagon information, about 1400 men and women are discharged each year for homosexuality. Although it used to be a crime punishable by

prison sentences, homosexuality is now punished with a dishonorable, forced discharge from the service.

Is it necessary for me to point out the hypocrisy with which our government continues to enforce its "no homosexuals" policy? In any other organization, top performance is rewarded, top performers are promoted, given raises, made heroes.

But, in the same government, with the same leadership which refused to publicly utter the word "AIDS" for nearly seven years, top performers are disgraced, discharged, and tagged as inferior -- just because of their sexual orientation.

It comes as a surprise that it is not the Pentagon's policy to discharge their military men and women for being black. It would make about as much sense.

One side of each sheet contains

information about activities that are "safe", "low risk" and "high risk" for transmission of HIV. In addition, we aim to tap into the energy and creativity of the Gay/Bisexual communities, and will continue to sponsor events that will help us spread the message. Last Monday's "Win, Lose or Draw" game at the French Quarter is just one event in a series that will culminate in a Think Positive weekend to be held next spring.

Community response has been encouraging, and we look forward to a growing accessibility to the Gay and Bisexual communities in Tucson. We are confident this approach to sex as an attractive and healthy exchange will be a benefit to all of us. It is in this spirit that we hope you will join the effort to help the Gay/Bisexual communities of Tucson live happier, healthier, sexier lives. National Helms Action (continued From Page One)

It's the Hollywood Left, the ACLU and the Rainbow Coalition. They want to destroy what Jesse Helms stands for: Traditional American values, faith in God, love of country and the family."

Vote '90 Coalition was jubilant in the wake of Gantt's Democratic Senate primary runoff victory over district attorney Mike Easley. The win, termed "a wallop" by several of the state's major newspapers, sets up a striking confrontation in November between Gantt and Republican incumbent Helms.

Gantt is only the second black North Carolinian to achieve nomination in a state-wide race in this century, and has been backed actively and near-unanimously by the state's Gay and Lesbian leadership. He has consistently voiced opposition to censorship of artists by the National Endowment for the Arts and support for expanded AIDS education and prevention efforts. Gantt is unequivocally pro-choice, opposes a constitutional amendment to ban flag-burning, supports hate crime legislation and privacy protections, and opposes the state's crime-against-nature status.

Blazing new trails is no mystery for Gantt. He was the first black student to attend South Carolina's Clemson University as well as Charlotte's first black mayor. Helms himself praised Gantt during his entrance at Clemson in a 1963 television editorial, characterizing Gantt as "sincere" and noting that "he has done a great deal, probably more than he himself realizes, to establish respectful communication across sensitive barriers in human relations."

N.C. Senate Vote '90 plans to continue to focus attention on the

facets of Helms' record. Vote '90 led two anti-Helms demonstrations during Helms' virulent Senate debate against money and legislation to benefit people with AIDS. The Charlotte Chapter joined arts activists to hold a demonstration when President George Bush bypassed the opening of the International AIDS Conference to stump for Helms on June 23. The 1400 anti-Helms partisans brought new attention to the broadly-based nature of the Helms opposition.

The decision to confront Helms so directly is still a subject of debate among the Vote '90s individual supporters, including Gay men and Lesbians. Carter and other Senate Vote '90 leaders acknowledge the dangers of open confrontation of Helms' far-right views, saying that fear of provoking a backlash kept Gay people largely silent in Helms' previous elections. The choice to "go public" in 1990 has been a consciously-chosen risk, Carter said.

"We think the voters of North Carolina are at the point that they want to hear more than Helms' propaganda of hate," she said. "Progressive groups across the country will be damaged if Helms is allowed to reign unchecked in the U.S. Senate for nearly a quarter-century -- which will happen if he wins again."

Vote '90 is planning to prove, she concluded, "that it's not open season on the people of any progressive movement in North Carolina anymore".


