



## Demos Win Senate Control Gubernatorial Race Too Close To Call Most Endorsements Win

At 5:00 a.m. on Wednesday morning the outcome of the Governor's race in Arizona was neck and neck and too close to call for either candidate to concede. There was all sorts of speculation about uncounted precincts. 96% of all precincts were counted. But due to some weather problems, some ballot boxes from northern Arizona had not reached Phoenix Election Headquarters to be counted.

Some 8,000 votes separated the two candidates. Terry Goddard held the lead throughout the evening but as the it wore on, Pife Symington narrowed the lead and finally forged ahead with that narrow lead. Beside the missing precincts, there were a good number of write-in ballots that still had to be counted and then there was the Max Hawkins vote that could possibly force this election into a runoff between Symington and Goddard.

It was also speculated that the uncounted ballots were from rural areas which were heavily Democratic precincts and there was speculation that there were still some precincts from Maricopa County that were still uncounted that were primarily Republican strongholds. So, after a long wait, the outcome was still in doubt and in order to go to press on time it became impossible for a final word on the gubernatorial race to be made.

In the state legislature, however, in Southern Arizona every candidate that was endorsed by the Arizona Committee for Progress and the Observer won. The two exceptions were in District 12 where Republican Ann Day won a cliff hanger from Katherine Jacobson, and Evan Adelstein lost to incumbent Jack Jewett.

In Dist. 7 Peter Rios won in the Senate and Art Celaya and Dick Pacheco won their House seats.

Dist. 8 Gus Arzberger, Mike

Palmer and Ruben Ortega won.

In Dist. 9, John Dougherty unseated Senate Whip Jeff Hill in a surprise vote while Marion Pickens won a House seat.

Districts 10 and 11 were strong in the Democrat column and to no one's surprise Jesus "Chuy" Biquera and Jaime Guterrez both were returned to the Senate while Peter Goudinoff and John Kronko were returned to the House.

In Dist. 12, beside Ann Day being elected to the Senate over Katherine Jacobson, Ruth Eskesen was elected to a House Seat. Evan Adelstein was beaten out by Jack Jewett.

Dist. 14 saw David Bartlett returned to the Senate and Eleanor Schorr returned to the House.

In Dist. 15, Former Representative Cindy Resnick won the Senate seat vacated by Bill DeLong while Ruth Solonon and Herschella Horton won House seats.

Two losses in the Statewide office endorsement - For Attorney General, Georgia Staton lost to Grant Woods and George Stragalas lost the state treasurer race. But on the bright side, Richard Mahoney won Secretary of State, C. Diane Bishop won Superintendent of Public Instruction and Marcia Weeks returned to the Corporation Commission.

The most important thing that happened in this election was the Democrats winning control of the State Senate. There will be a redistricting done during their term in office and hence will be able to determine the new boundary lines after years of being unable to participate in the process.

The outcome of the Governor's race will be known Wednesday, Nov. 7 - at this point we can only keep our fingers crossed for Terry Goddard.

## Salk Vaccine To Be Tested At UofA

TUCSON - The University of Arizona is one of nine centers across the country which will take part in testing a new AIDS treatment developed by Dr. Jonas Salk. Early results of tests have shown that the vaccine helps the disease fighting immune system attack the HIV virus.

The vaccine will now be tested across the country with about 100 people who are HIV+ but who have not contracted the pneumonia, cancers and other infections that make up AIDS.

testing of the HIV immunotherapeutic, as the product is now called, will be limited to individuals infected with HIV. The product might be tested as a vaccine in the future, but that would mean injecting it into individuals who are not infected with HIV.

The year-long study will be double-blinded and involve placebos, with neither patient or doctor knowing until after all the data is collected, who was treated and who received the placebo. It is hoped that the HIV

SANTA FE, NM - The Rainbow Flag that first flew over any State Capitol was given a home at the National Coming Out Day headquarters in Santa Fe, NM. Santa Fe City Councilwoman, Debbie Jaramillo, attended the ceremony and spoke of the importance of equal rights for all members of society.

Activists representing Gay and Lesbian organizations in California and New Mexico were on hand, along with CBS and NBC to welcome the Rainbow Lesbian/Gay Pride Flag to Santa Fe. Lynn D. Shepodd, Executive Director of National Coming Out Day, announced that "we will work with Lesbian and Gay activists in every state to see the Rainbow Flag fly over state capitols from coast to coast for the 1991 National Coming Out Day."

The controversy rages in California since the rainbow flag was ordered down after permission was given for it to fly for National Coming Out Day, Oct. 11.

Gay Activists had received permission from California Senator Milton Marks to fly the flag in celebration of National Coming Out Day. It wasn't flying for 15 minutes before homophobic Assemblyman Gil Ferguson (R-Newport Beach) demanded that Gov. George Deukmejian's office bring the flag down. A furious Ferguson told reporters, "It's another one of those in-your-face actions by homosexuals and pedophiles." Ferguson's aide Jim Bieber, later told the San Francisco Sentinel: "Any flag celebrating people's sex practices is

not appropriate. If we're to have a flag glorifying homosexuality and their sex practices then what's next, a flag celebrating bestiality and people who have sex with trees?"

The fact is, many different flags are already flown over the capitol including anti-smoking banners, red, white, and blue bunting for President Bush's visit, a flag commemorating the Armenian genocide (Deukmejian is of Armenian descent); a POW/MIA flag and numerous flags commemorating historical events important to minority communities. Susan Trowbridge, a spokeswoman for the Governor said, "The flag was flown in error. No flags representing special interest groups or causes are to be flown. When asked to comment about the numerous exceptions listed above, she declined further comment.

Senator Marks' office said they would look into whether the governor's office actually even had the authority to order the flag down. Marks, in a statement to the press said, "I consider this decision inappropriate. The Rainbow Flag represents the diversity of our state and the struggle to gain rights and acceptance for all people. In that sense, it is a general symbol of freedom."

In a final slam at the lame-duck governor, Marks added, "The governor's action - clearly in line with his policy on AIDS issues, the veto of AB 1 and other civil rights questions - is a

## Pima County Health Dept. Offers Influenza Vaccine

TUCSON - The Pima County Health Department is offering influenza vaccine through their walk-in clinics for \$5.00. Influenza vaccine is approximately 80% effective in preventing influenza and should be given each year to people at high risk for complications from the disease.

People should consider getting this vaccine who are: 65 years of age or older; immune-compromised (including HIV infection); chronically ill with heart disease, lung disease, diabetes, kidney disease or chronic anemia.

Also, anyone who lives or works with people who are in the above high-risk categories should be immunized. The health department is encouraging people with HIV infection and the employees and volunteers of AIDS service organizations to get flu shots.

On the 12th, Oprah's personal assistant returned after a three week illness to a stack of messages, including those from Rob Eichberg.

In the 1977 movie "Outrageous", Russell played a flamboyant drag queen and performed many of his impersonations, especially of West, his idol. He had worked briefly as a secretary for her when he was 17.

immunotherapeutic will prove more effective than AZT, which is the only drug on the market that directly attacks the HIV virus.

HIV immunotherapeutic is designed to attack and destroy the virus rather than holding its progress in check. Officials said they anticipate no side effects from the treatment. AZT carries the threat of seriously impeding bone marrow production which in turn, depletes the patient's store of disease-fighting white blood cells.

Salk, who developed the first polio vaccine in the mid-1950s, founded the company that is in charge of the research - The Immune Response Corp in San Diego.

In addition to the UofA, the other sites involved in the testing will be the San Francisco General Hospital, the U.S. Naval Hospital in San Diego, Northwestern University Hospital, University of Southern California, the University of Vermont, and the facilities of a private physician in Philadelphia and two hospitals in New York City.

The treatment will be tested on up to 12 people at each of the nine research centers. Subjects will undergo repeated blood tests to measure the treatment's effect on the level of HIV in the blood.

Experts estimate that the number of HIV-infected people worldwide to be 10 million. More than 60 percent of those infected worldwide are heterosexuals. The World Health Organization predicts that unless an effective treatment is found, 30 million people will become infected and progress to AIDS by the end of the century.

SEATTLE, WA (AP) - It was a Halloween trick, but the sight of five naked men dancing onstage with rocker Billy Idol was a surprise.

Idol told a crowd of 14,000 at Seattle Coliseum he knew something would happen because Wednesday, Oct. 31 was the last night of the tour - the night band members traditionally play pranks on each other.

Not to mention that Idol had already had 600 dead fish dumped on Faith No More as they opened the show in a soggy, smelly gag spoofing one of the band's videos that shows a fish flopping on the ground.

When the payback came, Idol grinned widely as the naked men cavorted onstage in a conga line, wearing only masks or T-shirts over their heads. Idol kept plugging away at his final song, "Got To Be A Lover" until the bare band danced off, then blushed a little and broke out laughing.



NEW YORK, NY - The organizers of Gay Games IV held their first in a series of volunteer solicitation meetings on Thursday, Sept. 29 at the Gay and Lesbian Community Center in Manhattan, drawing a standing-room crowd of 175 people. The Board of Directors and associate members discussed the history of the Gay Games and presented a 13-minute video purporting the advantages of hosting Gay Games IV in New York City. Invitees included members of Team New York, local athletes and cultural participants at Vancouver (Gay Games III) and other members of the metropolitan Gay community.

Karen Kerbaun, co-president of the Board of Directors said, "We were very pleased at the large turnout and high level of enthusiasm from the community. We have already begun to utilize volun-

teers, and have organized several of our committees." The communications committee, for example, already has over 30 members, many of whom work for major news organizations such as Newsweek and NBC Nightly News.

"I am positive that as New York in '94 moves forward, so will the community," said co-president Tom Crocovia, "175 people interested in volunteering at such an early date is commendable."

After the 12-member Board was formally introduced, the floor was opened up to questions. Participation from all segments of New York's community was stressed. More open meetings will be held to gather and disseminate information throughout the community.

# Cocaine Hastens Growth of AIDS Virus

## In Lab Tests

ATLANTA, GA (AP) - Cocaine speeded the growth of the AIDS virus in laboratory tests, prompting concern that it could increase infected people's chances of developing the deadly disease, researchers reported.

Microbiologists at the University of Minnesota Medical School exposed cells that are the primary target for the AIDS virus to doses of cocaine. The HIV virus was found to grow as much as three times faster in the cocaine-laced tests than in control studies. If what happened in the test tube happens in HIV-infected cocaine users, it could increase their risk of developing AIDS, said Dr. Ronald Schut, the lead researcher.

"In persons who are infected, if they continue to abuse this drug, it may have a significant impact on the development of clinical AIDS," Schut said.

While about 150,000 AIDS cases have been reported in the United States, researchers say a million or more other Americans are infected and at risk of developing AIDS.

Test tube tests, however, don't always mimic what happens in the human body. The question now for researchers is whether drug use somehow modifies the immune system to enhance the HIV growth in humans. "The initial in-vitro (test tube) studies suggest that it's possible," Schut said.

Schut presented the findings at the Interscience Conference on Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy, sponsored by the American Society for Microbiology.

Further studies are under way using immune cells from drug users in a methadone program, where cocaine use is high, "to see if the virus grows easier," Schut said.

Dr. James Curran, director of the Division of HIV-AIDS at the national Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, said little if any solid information is available concerning the AIDS risk of cocaine users. He added that drug users are notoriously difficult to study, and many cocaine users are involved in injectable drug abuse, which can spread HIV by dirty needles.

Nearly one-fourth of the AIDS cases reported in this country stem from intravenous drug use, according to the CDC.

Curran said that although the Minnesota test results may be correct, of greater concern is the practice of trading cocaine for sex, leading to the spread of the AIDS virus by sexual contact.

Still, as far as cocaine is concerned, Curran said, "I think it's safe to recommend don't do it".

Also at the microbiology conference, Curran predicted that homosexual men will still make up "a large proportion" of AIDS cases five years from now, despite the increase in AIDS among intravenous drug users and their sex partners. Half of last year's AIDS cases in the United States involved Gay men, he said.

Dr. Douglas Richman, an AIDS specialist at the University of California, San Diego, predicted that even without an AIDS vaccine, combination drug treatments will enable infected people to live "normal" lives and approach normal life spans. "A patient with HIV will be treated similarly to a patient with diabetes or hypertension—prevent the progression of disease and maintain the quality of life," Richman said.

Complications from high blood pressure and diabetes can be controlled and reduced with drug treatment, and so will various complications of HIV infection, he said.

Development of an AIDS vaccine is "a concept that is achievable," said Dr. Lawrence Corey, an AIDS specialist at the University of Washington in Seattle. But "cocktail" vaccines, combating various HIV strains, aren't at the human trial stage yet, and the protection offered by some vaccines tested in animals has tended so far to be quite short in duration, he said.

Because of the risk involved in testing a whole-virus AIDS vaccine, it's more likely that the researchers will aim for development of a "sub-unit" vaccine, using only pieces of the AIDS virus, he said.

TUCSON - In past issues we have reported on the Gay-related murders which have taken place in Tucson and how the Tucson Police Department is asking help from the community to gather leads in the deaths to help solve the crimes.

Pictured above are three murder victims. Kenneth Geiger and Dale Richards both were murdered in the last few months in separate incidents. Because of these two murders and a third assault which has left the victim in a comatose state, the Tucson Police Department has re-opened another unsolved murder case which took place over four years ago - that of Richard Garcia. These cases are similar in that they are Gay-related, and the fact that these Gay men were known to cruise parks and bookstores for their encounters, taking their 'trick' either to their home or to a motel where the murder took place.

Another thing you may contemplate is the fact that it is a very dangerous world out there and if you are taking chances picking up strangers for sex, your picture could well be next on these pages. Life is dangerous enough without going out and seeking violence through a chance encounter as these three men did.

Your assistance is urgently requested. Any little incident or fact may break one of the cases open and lead to an arrest.

## A Badge of Achievement

A couple of weekends ago, I attended a society function. I was covering it on assignment for one of the newspapers for which I work. The guest list was impressive including: then candidates for governor Terry Goddard and Pife Symington, Barry Goldwater's granddaughter C.C. and Kay Herberger.

The last name may not mean a lot to some people; but Kay, together with her husband Robert, has been responsible for some of the most important--and useful--philanthropic endeavors in the Phoenix area and the state. Perhaps the most important of these endeavors being the eponymous Herberger Theater Center in downtown Phoenix.

But, this column is not about Kay. It is about age.

While attending this dinner, I had the singular pleasure of being seated between Kay, and Meredith Harless, wife of late Congressional Senator Richard Harless who first represented Arizona in Washington DC in 1942.

In the course of the evening, during conversations with both women who are good friends, the topic of age came up: both because of my comparative youth and their seniority. I must admit I was taken aback when I discovered both women are in their 70s! Neither looks older than my mother who is considerably younger.

As conversations about age tend to do, both women lamented the passing years, the toll it takes physically and emotionally, and our culture's strange worship of youth at the expense of age.

I told both women my philosophy of age: each year that a person lives should, on each birthday, be worn as a badge of distinction, of accomplishment. It should be a symbol of mistakes made and knowledge gained; of achievements, and experiences.

I pointed out that ours is one of the few cultures that shows little respect for senior citizens. This is due directly to advances in medical care and societal standards.

Centuries ago, when half of all people born, died before the age of ten, very few people attained the ages of fifty or sixty, or older. These few people were justifiably respected for they held wisdom and knowledge attained through years of life.

Native Americans, the Greeks, Romans, and others have a history of reverence for the aged. Conversely, Americans have a history of disposing of the most intelligent, most experienced, most important people in our culture: the aged.

As with so many other things, I am amazed at how short-sighted we are too think age means stupidity, or lack of ability. Sure, age means slowing down, sometimes; but it is easier to learn from the mistakes they have made than to make them all ourselves.

Perhaps my unique view of aging stems from something which happened before I was born: all four of my grandparents had died. I grew up without the resource so many now take for granted. All their wisdom, their experiences, their knowledge were denied me.

But, to know such women as Kay and Meredith, to be able to get from them the wisdom of the ages is, for me, a suitable substitute.

Do you really want to get mad about AIDS and the research being done. Then you will want to read "Good Intentions", a new book which attacks the conflict of interest in medical research today. Sub-titled "How Big Business and Medical Establishment Are Corrupting the Fight Against AIDS". Written by Bruce Nussbaum, published by Atlantic Monthly Press, it is based on interviews between 1988 and 1990 with key figures in AIDS research. 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

### Jewish Lesbian Daughters of Holocaust Survivors Hold Fall Meeting Nov. 16-18

BOSTON, MA - In this last decade of the 20th Century, waves of anti-semitism and anti-Jewish violence are sweeping much of the world. Jewish cemeteries are being desecrated, and reports of attacks and defacements from Paris, London, Stuttgart, Jerusalem, Moscow, Auckland, Quebec, and throughout the United States indicate a resurgence of racism and anti-semitism. Modern demagogues are revising history by belittling, and even denying, the Holocaust.

But the reality that was the Holocaust continues to have an impact on the second and third generation of those who survived. On the weekend of Nov. 16-18, in New Hampshire, Jewish Lesbian Daughters of Holocaust Survivors (JLDS) will meet for discussion, support, and networking around issues faced by children of survivors.

JLDS has become an international organization, with people from Australia and Nicaragua in addition to its members from the United States and Canada. The membership grows each year as more Lesbian daughters of survivors learn of the existence of this unique support group.

JLDS is for Lesbians whose parent or parents survived the Holocaust. This includes parents who were in Nazi Europe or North Africa in 1933 or later and who survived death camps or in hiding, by passing as non-Jews, or by managing to leave for safer territories.
