TUCSON - Last Thursday, the Tucson Human Rights Coalition sponsored a presentation to the community about grassroots organizing against the religious right. Speaking to the crowd was Pat Hussain, the co-founder of Gays and Lesbians of Atlanta against Defamation, executive board member of the March on Washington. She also spends time producing a community TV program about Gays, Lesbians and Spirituality.

Hussain's experience and skills enabled her to share with audience of about 100, at the 4th Avenue Social Club, her insights about the motivations and methods of the Christian Right. Saying that they were neither "Christian" or "right" she reminded the audience of the hysteria of the early American church about "witches" in Salem, Massachusetts.

Calling them "Salemities", Hussain pointed out that in the last three hundred years there have been those in

organized churches to use messages of hate and intolerance to hang women who lived alone and were, therefore, witches; to justify and support slavery and lynchings because African-American people "had no souls" to campaign against giving women the vote because it was against God's law; and to organizing against desegregating their military and our schools because it was immoral to expect white people to have to share spaces with Negroes.

Ms. Hussain, who traveled here by car from Georgia, believes it is important to realize what the "Christian Right" is doing now is no different than it has always done, to protect its position of power and privilege, power and privilege for straight, white men only.

During a question/answer session, Ms. Hussain, promised that Sen. Sam Nunn, the senator from Georgia, would have more than he could handle in his reelection fight from the Georgia Gay and Lesbian communities.

tive Director. "Martina perfectly represents all things the Games stand for: strength, pride and dignity among Lesbians and Gay men participating in athletics."

## Gay & Lesbian Atheists Call For Federal Investigation of Houston Mayor and Police Chief

HOUSTON, TX. - The national office of American Gay & Lesbian Atheists, under the directorship of Don Sanders, sent a seven page letter, along with supportive evidentiary exhibits, to various Federal Government departments requesting an investigation of Houston Mayor Bob Lanier's and Houston Police Chief Sam Nuchia's frequent abridgements of several key tenets of the U.S. Constitution.

This action stems from both officials' frequent calls for special religious holidays, prayer services and other sectarian events at the expense of non-religious citizens. These actions send a clear message to Atheists and others who do not conform to the prescribed religion of City Hall that they are second class citizens.

In addition, the document also requests a Federal investigation into Chief Nuchia's rendering commendations to police officers, on the eve of Houston Lesbian/Gay Pride Week, who were directly involved in the August 17, 1992, brutalization of ACT-UP demonstrators at Gate 4 of the Houston Astrodome complex.

The document requests an investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the U.S. Department of Justice, and the Houston Office of the U.S. Attorney, to look into various charges that actions on behalf of the Houston mayor and police chief have violated the First and the Fourteenth Amendment rights of citizens, as well as Article VI, which specifically prohibits a religious test for public office or citizenship.

"During the month of May, 1993, Mayor Lanier involved himself in and endorsed a National Day of Prayer ceremony in which non-religious and non-Christian citizens were denigrated for not ascribing to the civic religion as outlined by him and other city officials, including Chief Nuchia," says Sanders. "Later that month, the mayor used his secular office to call for three more government endorsed days of prayer," notes Sanders. The atheist leader contends that such actions on behalf of a government official sends a clear message to non-theists and non-Christians that they are second-class because of their own personally held philosophical ideas, thus violating their Fourteenth Amendment right to equal treatment.

The document also points out that Police Chief Nuchia has used his secular position to declare special religious holidays to instruct citizens and religious leaders to pray for officers under his command, to the detriment of the non-religious officers on his force. The police chief has recently aligned his city

department with the Second Baptist Church to call for a Year of Prayer under a program called, "Shield a Badge With Prayer."

Sanders further accuses the police chief of bastardizing his secular office by using it as a pulpit for promoting sectarianism. "Chief Nuchia's rendering commendations, on the eve of Lesbian/Gay Pride Week, to officers who were involved in physical attacks on ACT-UP demonstrators sends a clear message to the city's Gay and Lesbian citizens that he has no concern for our constitutional rights based upon his own religious bigotry and prejudices," notes Sanders. Writes Sanders in the letter to the Federal officials: "This (rendering the commendations at the time in which he did) is just another way the Chief has sent a religious message, that he considers Gay and Lesbian citizens to be 'sinners.'"

The document asks the Federal Government to intervene to protect non-Christians and non-theists from further violations of their constitutional rights. It also notes out that despite a number of personal letters sent to the two city officials pointing out these infringements and asking them to remain neutral in matters of religion (as required by the Constitution), neither official has had the courtesy to respond. "Their silence on such important Constitutional matters demonstrates their acidity toward the rights of non-religious citizens," says Sanders.

## Gay & Lesbian Vets Return Medals

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual veterans marked the July 4th holiday by participating in the official Independence Day Parade in Washington, D.C.

A contingent of vets and their supporters marched through the nation's capital to display their patriotism and their pride in having served their country. Thousands of spectators lining the parade route cheered the Gay and Lesbian veterans, who passed the reviewing stand chanting, "Lift the Ban, Now!"

After the parade, a military color guard led the Gay and Lesbian contingent around Lafayette Park to a rally in front of the White House.

Veterans who had served in the Army, Navy and Air Force attempted to present their service medals to President Clinton, as a protest against the military's

## Congress Bans Funding of DC Domestic Partners

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The House of Representatives voted to ban funding to implement or enforce the District of Columbia's Domestic Partner's Ordinance.

Debate on this controversial amendment lasted several hours, often getting acrimonious and personal. During the debate, Congressman Istook stated that the "traditional American family would be saved" by a yes vote to the amendment.

In the end, the Amendment was passed by a vote of 253-167. 95 Democrats joined 158 Republicans to vote in favor of the measure. (Arizona Democratic Representatives Karan English, Ed Pastor, Sam Coppersmith, voted against the Amendment. Republican Congressman Jim Kolbe was one of only 14 Republicans who voted no on the proposal. Congressmen Jon Kyl, and Bob Stump voted in favor of the Amendment.)

The Amendment, proposed by Rep. Richard Istook, (R-OK.), to H.R. 2492, the D.C. Appropriations bill, effectively killed the Domestic Partner's Ordinance, which was passed by the District of Columbia Mayor & Council in 1992. Congress has the power to overturn laws draw up by the D.C. Mayor and Council.

## Tucson Adult Theater Patrons Wrongly Cited

TUCSON - Tucson police have been inadvertently using the wrong city ordinance when ticketing patrons accused of masturbating in adult entertainment businesses, said a police lieutenant.

Concerns were raised with police after a client of lawyer Emma Keller was arrested three months ago at a local adult entertainment establishment.

Keller, who is on the Citizens Police Advisory Committee, last month brought the situation to the attention of Lt. Kevin Mayhew of the police Special Investigations Unit.

During an advisory committee meeting at Northwest Neighborhood Center, 2160 North Sixth Avenue, Mayhew said he agreed that the city statute had been misinterpreted in some cases.

"In my opinion we did have a problem with people being (wrongly) cited for masturbating," Mayhew said. "I found reports of eight patrons cited from August of last year to May of this year."

The city ordinance under which the people were being cited states that adult enterprises and their employees shall not knowingly permit any person to masturbate on the premises.

Keller contended that police were singling out Gay men for the misdemeanor citations, because officers know which booths show Gay films at such establishments, and they cited only men who use those booths.

Mayhew has sent a memo to the officers making the arrests, who are not part of the special investigations section. He said the memo tells the officers, "if you're doing this, stop, because it (the statute) doesn't apply to the patrons."

"The statute does not refer to the patrons," Mayhew said. "In some cases it's (masturbation in such establishments) a violation of a (different) city code and perhaps of the state statute of public sexual indecency."

Mayhew said he expects most of the misdemeanor citations to be dropped.

# 'Images In The Age Of AIDS' Art Exhibit In Tucson Now

TUCSON - The Sixth Congress Gallery is proud to have the opportunity to present this very important exhibit to Tucson. This project merges the visual arts with the culturally relevant AIDS message as a means for education and awareness about the impact and reality of AIDS. The gallery is working with several local AIDS who will be participating in the exhibition in terms of outreach and education about the HIV virus and AIDS. This includes La Frontera, CODAC, The Tucson AIDS Project, Wingspan, El Proyecto Arizona-Sonora and the Pima County Health Department.

The exhibition consists of 29 pieces created by 16 of Colorado's most challenging artists: Lucille Rodriguez Contreras, Tony Ortega, Jerry De La Cruz, Carlota D. Espinosa, Carlos Frésquez, Ernie Gallegos, Robert D. Lopez, Judy Miranda, Sylvia Montero, Patty Ortiz, Jesús Polanco, Diana Roca, Meggan Rosana Rodriguez, Mruca G. Salazar, Carlos Santistevan and Francisco Zamora.

The artists in this exhibit have adapted traditional Latino images as well as created many of their own. The work holds no punches as it communicates the urgency of taking precautions against HIV ("If You're Gonna Hump Cover That Stump" by Lucille Rodriguez Contreras), challenges Latino culture to deal realistically with AIDS ("AIDS Reflexion" by Carlos Frésquez) and points to the poignancy of human suffering and loss ("Tri-

nity AIDS Wall" by Judy Miranda).

The exhibition was curated by Dr. George Rivers, professor of Sociology at the University of Colorado at Boulder and Dr. Aileen F. Lucero, Professor for Inter-cultural Studies at Metropolitan State College in Denver, Colorado.

## AIDS Activists and Pharmaceutical Companies in Historic Meeting

BERLIN, Ger. - The Treatment Advocacy Project, a group of community leaders working to enable disenfranchised people with HIV to access drug therapy, met with major international pharmaceutical companies at the Ninth International Conference on AIDS.

Abbott Laboratories, Bristol-Myers Squibb Co., Burroughs Wellcome Co., Glaxo, Hoffmann-LaRouche and Upjohn Co. were among those attending the historic meeting. The TAP outlined background information and concrete strategies for addressing this urgent situation.

"We hope to build a relationship with the pharmaceutical industry to discuss clinical trials and research and to examine specific characteristics of different HIV-affected communities impacting the design and delivery of research efforts," said Reggie Williams, Executive Director of the National Task Force on AIDS Prevention.

"This project will demonstrate which companies are interested in expanding access to people of color and which are not," said Williams. "So far, Burroughs Wellcome committed \$250,000 to

the project and challenged the others to match."

"Those of us working on the frontlines are convinced government, industry and the community all have responsibility to educate and save lives," said Phill Wilson, Director of Public Policy at AIDS Project Los Angeles and co-chair of the TAP. "Disenfranchised communities have had little or no access to quality health care and the drug companies have high numbers of potential HIV treatment consumers. Reaching these communities is a matter of social responsibility and economic opportunity."

The TAP recommended a Fellowship Program to train and educate treatment advocates who can then make recommendations to pharmaceuticals. Fifty fellows will initially be trained with an additional 500 being trained later around the country.

"The meeting went extremely well," said Wilson. "It was the first time any of these companies doing AIDS drug research have attended a meeting convened by people of color. We look forward to coming home and continuing our work with them."

the classroom and draws.

He knows he's different and he also knows he doesn't have to be a hero. He writes animal stories about illness, hospitalization and dying. He knows about his disease and he doesn't like it.

I have called every children's hospital I could find, and there isn't any help for him. Most doctors have never heard of an MPS patient. After months of searching for information, I contacted the MPS Society. This was my last hope. I think I avoided calling them because I knew that they would tell me what I could not bear to hear. And they did. But also, for the first time since Woody's diagnosis, I found out that I wasn't alone.

The MPS Society is a network of parents and friends of MPS children. We exchange information about our children's health information that can only be found from other parents. We share the frustration and hopelessness we feel when the doctors won't listen to us. We share our hopes for a cure for our children. Without the MPS Society, we would be alone.

Woody, to our knowledge, is one of two children in Arizona with MPSI/HS. I wouldn't know how to care for him without the MPS Society. We love him and want him to have as painless a life as possible.

The MPS operating budget for 1993 is \$82,750. That gives us about \$1,750 per state. It's not much, but it keeps us operating. We need your donation to keep this society from folding.

Woody is fortunate to be a part of the Tucson Lesbian and Gay Community. We have learned, through necessity, how





**POLITICS '93** by Mark Kerr

Sup. Raul Grijalva gets "boffo" ratings in HispanicTrack poll, and comments. Pima County Democrats "don't have act together", much to the chagrin of Democratic candidates. Recall launched against Boyd and Ed Moore; And some thoughts. Here we go:

Last week, I had mentioned in this column the HispanicTrack poll and the ratings some of our elected officials get with the key group in Arizona politics, the Hispanic community. Well, I saved the best results for this edition.

Pima County Supervisor, Raul Grijalva, was the elected official who got the highest ratings in the HispanicTrack poll. Of those surveyed, 75% gave Grijalva an excellent job approval rating. Also, only a mere 4% gave him a poor rating of his job performance. A whopping 16 to 1 ratio.

When asked about this, Grijalva attributed this to his work of 20+ years as an activist, Member of the Tucson Unified School Board, and as Supervisor. Also he stated his personal involvement with constituent casework plays a factor in that.

Okay, some "bad" news. This past weekend, the Pima County Democratic party showed that they do not have their act together. How might you ask? Well, one of the City Council campaigns, wanted to use the headquarters, and the voter registration computer, to verify the signatures of petitions of their opponent.

Well, the campaign got volunteers to come down to headquarters on Saturday, (an arduous task), and they were told that the computer tape changes had not been completed by the person who was "in charge of the tape". They had been informed it would be ready, they told the County officers that were there. Well to make a long story short, the person, who has a history of procrastinating, had dilly

dallied, and thus the tape was not ready. When reached, he vehemently stated he had told the candidate it would not be ready by Saturday. So the campaign has wasted a precious day trying to see if their opponent had valid signatures. Doesn't sound like much? Well, it is getting volunteers, a group of, to give time and to get a arduous project done. When will our County Officers get their act together?

Last week, a recall drive against Supervisors Mike Boyd (R-Dist. 1) and Ed Moore (R-Dist. 3), was launched last week at a press conference. The group, Total Recall, plans to start the drive around the Labor Day Weekend.

The group would need, in 120 days, to get 15,732 valid signatures for Boyd's District 1 and 11,664 valid signatures for Moore's District 3. The signatures must be of registered voters in the District's, and the circulators of the petitions must reside in the District in question. They will need to get twice the number to make sure they made it. A big task, but we will see if they can do it.

Frankly, this week, I am not happy with the House Democratic Leadership, in regards to the Amendment proposed by Rep. Istook, that killed the Domestic Partners Bill for the District of Columbia. 95 Democrats voted for the amendment, a majority came from "Dixie", but it was a slight majority, other Democratic homophobes came from the "open-minded" states of Pennsylvania, Minnesota, New York, Indiana, California, Illinois, Ohio, and New Hampshire.

A lot of these people had received support, financial and political, from Gay and Lesbian groups! These people have betrayed us! My question is where is the damn leadership by the Democrats? Where was Speaker Tom Foley? Where was Richard Gephardt, the Majority Leader? These are questions that must be answered now!

## At The Closet Door

On July 3 I was interviewed by KVOA's Joe Donlon as a spokesman for Guerrilla Grafix. A twenty-minute interview about oppression and the First Amendment was edited into about ten seconds on the air, but they captured my message.

They also interviewed Adam Colwell, editor of the fundamentalist Christian tabloid *Good News*, who claims that Guerrilla Grafix is violating his right to freedom of the press.

Have you seen this paper? It is published every month and placed in the "free publications" bins in grocery stores and such places all over Tucson.

There is no news per se in the *Good News*; every year they repeat the same twelve diatribes against all that is not fundamentalist, Christian, heterosexual, and so-called "traditional family."

The masthead proclaims that the paper's publishers (who also own two Christian radio stations in Tucson) intend that "all of (their) business endeavors spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ." In the first place, Christ's message was to love, not judge, one another. However, I am not here to debate these latter-day Puritans on their theology. I am here to distinguish between boycott and censorship.

Guerrilla Grafix is not a queer group. It is made up of thoughtful people of varied demographics. These loosely allied folks undertake various progressive, activist projects in order to liberate themselves, urge other people to think for themselves, and defend the liberties of all. The most visible (and most successful) of these projects is the Rotten Fish List.

The Rotten Fish List is named for the symbol of the fish, which the early Christians used to identify one another when Christianity was against the law.

I'm sure you've seen the fish signs on the backs of cars, which I suppose are meant to inform us that a particular automobile is saved. If you have looked at the *Good News*, you have seen that fish symbol used in advertisements for everything from carpet cleaning to used foreign auto parts.

It is meant to reassure the God-fearing Christian readers of this questionable "news" paper that the people selling them pool chemicals or life insurance are also Christian and therefore worthy of their business.

Guerrilla Grafix maintains a database of the advertisers in the *Good News*. Those displaying a fish symbol in their ad copy are assumed to be aware of the mission and political outlook of the paper and are not contacted. If there is no overtly Christian content in the ad copy, Guerrilla Grafix sends a postcard to the advertiser which asks, "Is this the image you want for your business?"

Several advertisers have responded that they were unaware of the sociopolitical tenor of the *Good News*, whose ad salespeople may say only that the paper is "aimed at the family market."

If, on the other hand, the advertisers know very well what their money is supporting, their names and addresses are published in the Rotten Fish

List and Guerrilla Grafix urges that they be boycotted. If the ads are withdrawn for whatever reason, the business is removed from the Rotten Fish List.

The *Good News* absolutely condemns homosexuality. They patronizingly argue that they "love the sinner but hate the sin," and that God loves us queers so much that we can be cured if we just admit we're defective and ask Jesus to fix us.

They accuse the environmental movement of worshipping the Earth as a god, thereby pissing off (their) one true God. Not coincidentally, they subscribe to the "stewardship" view of the Earth, which asserts that everything in the world is here to be exploited and used up by human beings (to God's glory, of course).

They extol the virtues of traditional sex roles and the right of a (married) woman to bear a child every year whether or not she wants or can feed it. Funny how the people who assert that society has a greater right to a woman's body than she does, and thus decry safe, legal abortion as murder, are the same ones who complain about their tax dollars supporting poor women's children.

In addition, they rail against pornography and other printed matter espousing viewpoints different from their own, but have been quick to wrap themselves in the Bill of Rights in the face of a boycott of their advertisers.

The sickest irony of all is that the boycott as practiced by Guerrilla Grafix is a tactic right out of the Christian Coalition's grassroots organizing manual.

Adam Colwell continues to present himself as just another newspaperman upholding freedom of the press. He strives to seem reasonable, thereby making logical loudmouths like me look unreasonable.

Yet I persist: the message of the *Good News* is one of oppression, restriction of civil rights, and unthinking conformity in the name of salvation. Any money spent in support of the *Good News*' advertisers is spent on the oppression of wimmin, queers, non-Christians, environmentalists, and the rest of us who dare to think for ourselves or are otherwise "untraditional."

Colwell cries that Guerrilla Grafix is attempting to censor his viewpoint. I reply that he may print whatever drivel he likes; it is my right to publish the opposing view, to withhold my money from his advertisers, and to tell them why.

At the Tucson Gay and Lesbian Meet Yourself on June 23, I was annoyed to see that Lown's Costumes had the nerve to show up as a supposed friend of Tucson queers after having an ad in the June "I Used To Be Gay" issue of the *Good News*.

I approached the woman in their booth and said, "May I ask you a question?" When she said yes, I asked, "Have you withdrawn your advertising from the *Good News*?" She said, "No, but I am working on an article that is going to be published in the *Good News*." I was so angry at her answer that I could not speak; I walked away.

Guerrilla Grafix has seen correspondence between Lown's and Bill

Ladd of C.J. Productions, which proves that Lown's Costumes has known and supported the paper's social agenda for some time.

I ran into Kenny Jacobs, who later confronted this same woman over the apparent hypocrisy of her actions: support the oppression of queers, but grab those queer dollars!

After all, we are supposed to have all the disposable income, just as (according to Nazi propaganda) the Jews in Weimar Germany had all the money. I quote Mel Brooks: "Face it, sweetheart: without Jews, fags, and Gypsies, there is no theatre." Face it, Adrian: you can have either the queer business or the fundamentalist business, but not both.

Kenny Jacobs is now getting grief over his confrontation with this woman, which was supposedly too harsh. I was there and did not hear anything out of the ordinary.

Quite the contrary, I think Kenny was very calm and reasonable; if I had not walked away from her table, I might have

# A View From The Rock

The phones start ringing, the cards are sent, everyone is excited! The new baby is born! All the relatives and friends gather around the new arrival and they coo, chuck its chin, make silly baby sounds, and fuss over the little one. And then come the expected remarks, she/he looks like the father, or the mother, or Grandpa Joe, or Aunt Mary. The baby is its mother's eyes, the father's mouth. The speculation about who the baby favors goes on and on.

My personal experience is that at first a new baby looks just like, a new baby. If it looks like anyone else the resemblance usually comes over a long period of time. And I'm not thoroughly convinced that all new born babies are cute and pretty. I've seen a couple that for the first few days were, well, not so cute. And besides, babies aren't potty trained, they have to be burped, they are really quite helpless, and they have no table manners!

New babies have a lot to learn, and it takes many years for them to walk, talk, get past diapers and such. We adults who are around babies know this from the start and we don't expect much from them at first. We patiently spend hour after hour, month after month, year after year teaching new things. Quite often over and over.

But there is another baby that doesn't always get that kind of sweet, loving, kind attention, but instead is criticized from day one. Both family and friends are also strangers expect miracles of instant maturity from the new Christian. We reverse another practice, too. For some reason we expect the Father to look like the baby, and not the other way around.

A new Christian has just entered into a whole world; born into a new life. And there is much, really everything to learn. 



anti-Gay policy. Despite a prior agreement with White House Police, guards refused to accept the medals from the veterans, who then left them at the White House gate.


"Those medals represent some of my greatest achievements and most cherished moments of my adult life," said Tanya Domi, director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Military Freedom Initiative, and one of the veterans who returned her medals to the President.

Domi also added that the Gay and Lesbian contingent being included in the parade was an historic occasion, and that the crowd support was thrilling. She feels that they have the hearts and minds of millions of Americans with them on ending the ban.

The July 4th actions kicked off the National Mobilization Against the Ban, sponsored by NGLTF and the Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Veterans of America. This on going campaign will next stage a rally on Thursday, July 15th, at the Lincoln Memorial. This is the date President Clinton has promised to issue an Executive Order to lift the ban on Gays and Lesbians in the military.

An August 13th demonstration is being planned for the Atlanta office of Senator Sam Nunn (D-GA), chair of the Senate Armed Services Committee and one of the most vocal opponents of lifting the ban. If the anti-Gay policy is not lifted, actions will continue around the country targeting the military, anti-Gay members of Congress and others who oppose ending discrimination.




## 'Don't Ask, Don't Tell' Just Won't Work

BOSTON - Let me begin with the obvious. It won't work.

I am not being clairvoyant about the compromise over Gays in the military that is being hatched for a July 15th due date. But I can say that any variation on the current theme entitled "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" won't work.

It won't resolve the legal questions. Sooner or later someone will ask, someone will tell, someone will be discharged and someone will be back in court.

It won't resolve the political questions either. Sooner or later, a compromise intended to satisfy the ambivalent majority, Americans who don't want to discriminate against Gays and don't want to accept them, will fall apart from the weight of its own contradictions.

And it certainly won't resolve the conflict between the military leaders and the Gay community.

When you get right down to it, "Don't ask, Don't Tell" is not really about ending the witch hunt. Nor is it really a gentleman's agreement not to talk about sexuality. Don't ask, don't tell, means don't talk, or else.

It means the closet.

The military no longer claims that Gays and Lesbians are a security risk. They no longer claim that homosexuals can't serve ably, even heroically. The last ditch effort to say that homosexuality is "incompatible with military service" will fail because, as Rep. Barney Frank says, it's "incompatible with the truth."

In these months of a long and often unwelcome debate, the Pentagon has finally come down to arguing one thing: that the discomfort, the fear, even the hatred of Gays is itself disruptive to bonding and morale. So disruptive that Gays cannot serve, and here is the crucial word, "openly."

Now, openness means different things to different people. There is a lot of room between being in the closet and being in your face. There's a scale of behavior that runs from repression to flamboyance.

But Gays have always been able to serve and succeed in the military, and everywhere else in society, as long as they were not "open." What differentiates the Gay rights movement even now from that blacks or women, is that homosexuals aren't discriminated against as long as they "pass."

For that reason, the primary symbol of Gay repression hasn't been a ghetto or a list of segregation laws. It's been the much more psychologically complex image of the closet: the dark place where cultural hate meets, and makes, self hate.

The closet may have claimed more Gay lives in America than hate crimes. It has surely devastated more psyches, through hiding and lying, than dishonorable discharges.

Because of the closet, the Gay rights movement has not just been about breaking the barriers. It's been about breaking silence. For a generation, the

most important Gay march has been a long line of men and women coming out, one at a time.

Some of these decisions have meant quiet and private talks with parents. Some have meant public and ostentatious pronouncements of a "Queer Nation." At times, a Gay comedian put it, "The love that dared not speak it's name can't seem to shut up."

This conversation about single sex love, lovers, and partners has, to put it mildly, made millions of Americans uneasy. But it has also made millions of Americans more comfortable with Gayness. Each and every survey says that straight Americans who know homosexuals personally, as family members are more accepting than those who don't "know" any.

In that sense, Gays and Lesbians become change agents simply by making themselves "known." We've seen that too in the argument over the military. The soldier coming out, with Purple Hearts and military bearing, are the ones who proved that homosexuality and heroism can go together.

It's the closet that's incompatible, with self-acceptance and public acceptance. And with change.

The compromise being worked out now will, at best, balance precariously on the threshold of the closet door. "Don't ask" offers a step forward for Gays in the military. But "Don't tell" threatens a step backward in the overall direction of the Gay movement.

Fused together, this may be the most we can expect from an anxious Congress, an angry Pentagon, a nervous president and an ambivalent public. A pretty good rule in politics is to take what you can get.

But take this one with a caveat. In the long run, in the medium run, and maybe in the short run: It won't work.
