TUCSON - A ceremony marking 10 years since the formation of the Tucson AIDS Project (TAP), and the beginning of an organized response to the AIDS crisis in Tucson took place this past Monday, May 1 at the Tucson City Hall.

"AIDS Awareness Day" was proclaimed by Tucson Mayor George Miller during the commemorative ceremony outside City Council chambers. The proclamation was to recognize the more than 500 Tucsonans who have died from AIDS and the nearly 1,600 now living with AIDS or HIV.

During the ceremonies, the tenth floor of Tucson City Hall was draped with 2,000 red streamers, each representing someone in our community who has died of AIDS or is now living with HIV/AIDS.

Also those in attendance showed their support for those who have died, or are living with HIV/AIDS by adding a red ribbon to a display at the entrance to the Council chambers. Ribbons were provided by the Tucson AIDS Project.

The numbers of those who are infected continue to climb. AIDS has become the #1 killer of all adults between the ages of 25-44, and women is the fastest growing group contracting AIDS.

Craig Bradford Snow, Executive Director of the Tucson AIDS Project said of the display, "The banners on City Hall and the red ribbons and streamers each represented a life lost or a Tucsonan living with HIV disease makes a critical point. As a community, we are all living with AIDS."

Mayor Miller was joined by other members of the Tucson City Council, Pima County Supervisor Paul Marsh (R-District 4) and State Reps. Elaine Richardson (D-LD 11), George Cunningham (D-LD 13) and Herschella Horton (D-LD 14) were also in attendance.

State Rep. Herschella Horton said she was asked to speak about what the Arizona State Legislature had done to combat the AIDS crisis. But she said that they had done "Absolutely nothing!"

Here is the text of the Proclamation:

HIV/AIDS Community Center On The Horizon In Tucson

TUCSON - People living with HIV/AIDS will have a place they can go, meet, socialize, exercise, learn about computers and partake in arts and crafts in Tucson in the near future.

This past week, community leaders met to discuss plans for a proposed community center for people living with HIV/AIDS.

The meeting was organized by Edgar Rivera of COPE, and was held at the proposed site, Project Team on Stone Avenue.

Various groups were in attendance, including: Shanti Foundation, People With AIDS Coalition Tucson, Amity COPASA, Cornerstone Fellowship/GLIA, Men's Social Network and Our Town Family Center.

Edgar Rivera of COPE, came up with the idea for the center said that "PWA's isolate themselves since they lack the resources to participate in various social activities. COPE's goal is to provide a place so that people can go and feel comfortable and respected."

Rivera went on, "The objectives for the center are: Providing a setting for people to increase social skills by using their talents. Also offering various courses to improve one's education, vocational abilities. Also to motivate those to participate in various outings such as movies, dances, sports and going camping. Lastly set up a speakers bureau to educate the community about HIV/AIDS."

The center, known as Project Team is located on North Stone Avenue is used part time for one of COPE's other programs, which deal with the mentally challenged.

The facilities are very spacious, with a weight room, a room for meetings and massage therapy, a t.v. center, and arts and crafts facility, a computer center for classes, a Home Economics center, a gallery to display artwork, area for case workers and a recreation area complete with pool table.

The question arose about the resources needed for the center to exist. Rivera responded that most of the needs are met through in-kind contributions. The building was donated as was much as the equipment to furnish the facilities.

RYAN WHITE REAUTHORIZATION NEEDS SENATE CO-SPONSORS

Senate Bill 641 (S.641), the Ryan White Reauthorization Act, currently has 48 co-sponsors. Of the remaining 52, senators Kyl and McCain are not co-sponsors, and we need to act to encourage them to do so.

Senator Bob Dole (R-KS), majority leader of the Senate, will not fast track legislation until it has more co-sponsors.

The concern in Washington is that the Ryan White Reauthorization Act may become the vehicle for a number of negative amendments from members of Congress that oppose most federal HIV/AIDS programs, such as Senator Jesse Helms and Republican presidential candidate, Rep. Bob Dornan.

We must send a loud and cohesive voice to support the reauthorization of the CARE Act, and that there is a possibility that those who oppose it, will wreak havoc on the program.

Also, the Chair of the House Appropriations Committee, Rep. Robert Livingston (R-LA), has indicated he doesn't want to fund any programs that have not been reauthorized. Thus a possible delay in reauthorizing Ryan White may jeopardize FY '96 appropriations for the program.

We need to call Senator's Kyl and McCain offices and ask them to co-sponsor S.641 as introduced by Senators Nancy Kassebaum (R-KS) and Ted Kennedy (D-MA). The number to call is (202) 224-3121.

The Marana recall elections took place last week, and the results showed that developer money can fool the masses. Marana's Mayor and Vice-Mayor, the "mascots for the developers", Ora Harn and Sharon Price were retained, defeating their two respective challengers.

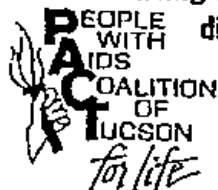

A Jew Again

Seventy-two years ago, when I was born to Jewish parents in New York City, I began a religious journey that has not ended to this day. Politics, curiously enough, has been a fuel in this journey, but not the kind of politics that propels the Reverend's Jerry Falwell or Pat Robertson.

As an act of faith and evolving spirituality, I joined the Catholic Church more than 15 years ago. In 1990, the growing assault on Gays by religious and secular conservatives prompted me to come out publicly as a Gay man, an act which had brought me immense spiritual healing. As radical right wing religious groups intensified their attacks on anyone who does not fit their image of a Christian America, including homosexuals and Jews, I took still another step in my journey of self discovery by reclaiming my birthright as a Jew.

When I was a boy, I went to Hebrew School and celebrated my Bar Mitzvah according to tradition. However the only connection I had with the religion after that was when I joined with my family in the various Jewish holidays. Although I never practiced formal Judaism, I always glorified in being a Jew, at least a secular Jew, and in the right heritage of my parents and millennia past.

Yet, on Easter Saturday of 1978, I was baptized in New York's St. Patrick's Cathedral and happily joined the Roman Catholic Church. Always searching for an identity, I believed then I had finally found my spiritual home in Jesus Christ. Although I would always remain a Jew, I could now participate in a religion that seemed to me to be the logical continuation of spiritual Judaism.

However, becoming a practicing Catholic never quite filled the emptiness I felt, the lack of any real cohesion in my life. It soon began to be like the other avenues I had traveled in search of that elusive self knowledge that might fill the void and bring me lasting contentment. It was only after 67 years of searching that I began to see clearly and count how many roads I had walked, how many tasks I had worn, how many roles I had played, all in order to avoid detection as a Gay man. Coming out in defiance of those who might reject me led me to accept the most central core of my being, that I was a homosexual.

Despite the overdue stability it offered, my very public self-disclosure as a Gay man in the summer of 1990 only started me moving again. I came out: simultaneously in the conservative *National Review* and the *Gay Advocate*. My autobiography, *Coming Out Conservative*, was published. I became an active participant in the affairs of the Gay community, writing columns and essays for gay publications, joining in Act Up and Queer Nation demonstrations, speaking before whatever group would invite me, working with the Log Cabin organization, trying to serve as a peer model for young Lesbians and Gay men. I wanted to utilize my conservative credentials to the utmost to counter the homophobia that was the latest currency of American right wingers, for whom homosexuals had replaced communists as the number one enemy.

I found myself surrounded by

young people, would be children and grandchildren, and became a virtual father figure in the Gay community. My life seemed to have turned around, enriched and full. I was at peace with myself and with God in all his many manifestations. I no longer felt the urgency to attend the Catholic Church or to formally practice any religion. I was, I believed, finally content and at peace.

Then, one evening, I saw the film *Schindler's List*. It jolted me awake. I realized then what was missing, the acceptance of the other half of my equation. I am a Gay man. I am also a Jew. I saw my family, my forbearers, my people, myself in too many frames of the film, and I finally saw the totality of me.

I knew then that I needed to be counted once more, by God and by my community, as a Jew. The film also made me achingly aware once more of the terrible parallels through the centuries of how those eager to prove their might resort to bigotry, fear, and hatred: against Jews, against homosexuals, against any who are different and don't fit in to their vision of paradise on earth.

Because I have always rejected hatred and bigotry, five years ago I came out to fight homophobia. Last year on May 19th, I came out again. This time it was not in any national publications. This time I stood proudly and awestruck before Bet Mispachah, the Gay and Lesbian synagogue in Washington, D.C., to reclaim my birthright and be publicly counted once again as a Jew. My sister and her husband were there, and I wore my father's prayer shawl. I believed the circle had finally been closed.

But not completely. In February of this year, I circulated a column in which I stated that I could no longer call myself a conservative, a Republican, or a Christian because of the homophobia and latent anti-semitism emanating from many who use those labels. I received a letter from Rabbi Bob Saks of Bet Mispachah expressing the concern of some members of the congregation by my "Christian" declaration, especially after I had publicly reclaimed my Jewishness before them some eight months before. "It's hard to come out publicly as a Jew, just like it's hard coming out as Gay," wrote the Rabbi. "It's one thing to say 'I'm Jewish' in the synagogue, another to say it in public, your resistance to the label in public upsets people who had hoped you were more 'at home' as a Jew than perhaps you are."

The Rabbi's point was well taken. I realized that coming out must be self acceptance and articulation of one's totality. I also now realize that hatred in all its many guises, and those who spread it, are equally my enemy both as a Gay man and as a Jew. Rabbi Saks' gentle chastising had finally helped to complete the circle.

Many years ago, I listened to Eleanor Roosevelt stress the importance of resisting all and any form of hatred, bigotry, and tyranny in equal measure, from where it emanates, be it communist, fascist, democrat, republican, conservative, liberal, secular or sectarian. It in these footsteps I hope to travel, and in memory of my countless martyred Jewish forbearers.

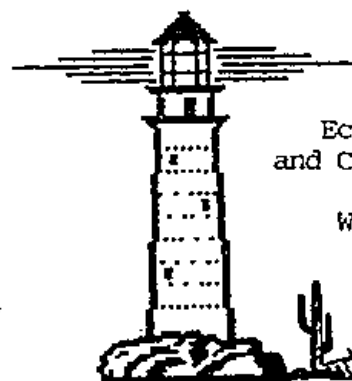

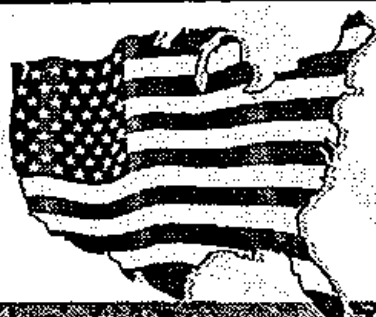

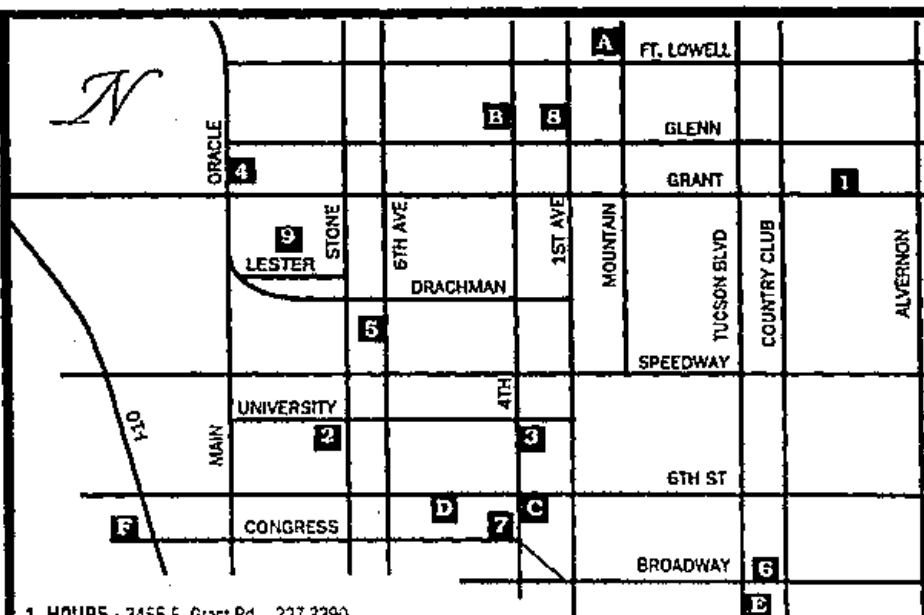

THE ENGLISHMAN WHO WENT UP A HILL AND CAME DOWN A MOUNTAIN

"Wales begins where the mountains begin," and for many many years, the fine townspeople of Fynnon Garra had been secure in the "knowledge" that the little knob outside their village was indeed a mountain.

Alas, who should arrive on the scene but two English map makers, Anson (Hugh Grant - Four Weddings and a Funeral) and Garrad (Ian McNiece), who are about to burst their bubble. It seems that the knob is about forty feet shy of qualifying as a real mountain, and, if the Brits have their way, shall forever after be recorded on maps as a hill.

Yikes! This will never do! If the mountains do not begin in Fynnon Garra, then the town really isn't in Wales, "And we're probably Englishmen, God forbid!"

These fine folk are not about to allow this abomination to transpire. They will stop at nothing to ensure that their hill is declared a mountain. While Garrad is maintained in a fine state of inebriation, Anson is being pleasantly pursued by the town tart, Elizabeth (Tara Fitzgerald). Meanwhile the good citizens go about adding the required forty feet of earth to their "mountain".

The story is set during World War I, and perhaps the most intriguing character in the movie is a reprobate by the name of Morgan the Goat (Colm Meaney). It doesn't take one long to realize that he more than likely received his appellation because with most of the able bodied men away in France, all of the new born children in the village bore an

uncanny resemblance to Morgan!

Shot on location in Northern Wales, the film is based on writer-director Christopher Monger's recollections of a true story handed down through the generations of his Welsh family.

This movie is typical British fare - rather laid back and quiet. The humor is subtle and sublime. It certainly is not an action packed thriller either. But it is fun, and makes for a good night out.

PANTHER

The mid 1960's - a time of war, upheaval and wrath; a young boy riding his bicycle through a city's ghetto; a car that doesn't stop at an intersection; a loud crunch as the child is slammed into the windshield and thrown through the air, landing on the unforgiving concrete; where seconds before there had been a vibrant life, there was now only a pool of blood and gore. This is the setting for the first two minutes of PANTHER.

However, it isn't so much the accident that irritates the down trodden of this neighborhood. It is more that it could have - and should have - been avoided. These people had been petitioning the city to install a traffic light at this intersection for years. But because they were black - or as they were called then - "Niggers, Shines and Coons" - no light was installed.

Once more the neighbors gather at the local church, and once more organize a peaceful demonstration to the intersection where the tragedy occurred. Here they are met by several car loads of police.

The police waste little time in unlimbering their truncheons and weighing into the pathetic group of blacks, smashing, brutalizing and humiliating them as the "pigs" did so well in this era.

An act that should have resulted in our outrage, went largely unnoticed. The country had grown numb. Every evening the Television brought us fresh scenes of senseless violence - from Selma, Montgomery, Little Rock; from Saigon, Quang Tre and Khe Sahn. But this didn't occur in Viet Nam nor in the South. This brutality occurred in the "liberal" North. And of all places, it happened in Oakland California.

And, so we are told, this is how and why the Black Panthers were born. "POWER TO THE PEOPLE!"

I will not suggest that this movie is at all even handed. I cannot quite believe that Huey Newton, Bobby Seals and Eldridge Cleaver were quite as nice as they were portrayed. At some points, I thought I was watching a documentary on would be Mother Theresas. Please!

Nor can I accept that all the police were as evil as the script writers would have us believe. There is, however, one exception. The plot alleges that the FBI, under, J. Edgar Hoover, deliberately introduced hard drugs into the ghetto to control the people. As evil as we have learned Miss Thing was, I find that see-

nario quite plausible (and perhaps that is only because I harbor a healthy hatred for Edwina!).

That having been said, I still strongly recommend the movie be seen.

For those of us who lived through that era, it will serve as a* solid reminder of how warped a society can become when it wallows in the pigsty of bigotry - regardless of whether it is prejudice toward race, religion, gender, or sexual preference.

For those of you not yet on this pleasant planet, it should give you a feel of what it could - and probably would - be like if the forces of intolerance and "law and order" ever unite again. Next time around, who knows who will be the "Niggers, Coons, and Shines".

food, and new members. At the Clubhouse, 7:30 PM at the Catalina Foothills Lodge Clubhouse.

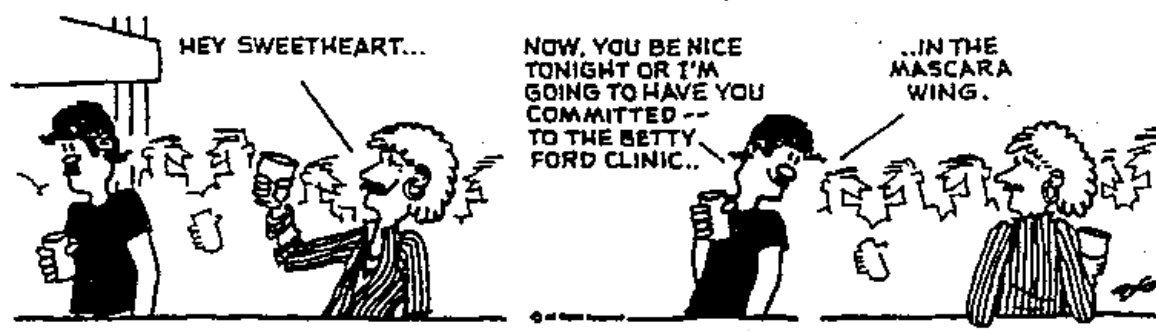
May 13 - Monthly Beer Bust and Chili Feed. Come and watch your favorite bears serve beer and chili at the Venture-N.

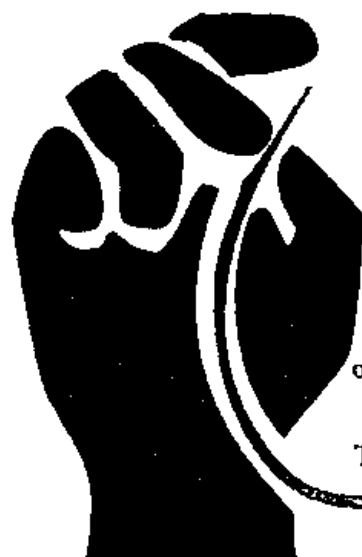

White House To Meet With Gay & Lesbian Elected Officials June 13

WASHINGTON, D.C. - For the first time in history, the White House has scheduled a meeting with Gay and Lesbian elected officials.

According to San Francisco Susan Leal, the liaison between the Administration and Gay and Lesbian elected officials, the meeting is scheduled for the White House, June 13.

"This much awaited meeting will give Gay and Lesbian officials the opportunity to provide input to the Administration and to discuss with Administration officials issues of common concern," Leal said.

On the morning before the meeting, the elected officials will conduct a coordinated series of Congressional visits to meet with key legislators.

Elected by popular vote, openly Gay and Lesbian officials epitomize strides that the Gay and Lesbian community has made towards dispelling anti-Gay stereotypes and achieving political equality.

"We have spent the past two years laying the ground work for this unprecedented event," says Leal. She added, "And now, to paraphrase Harvey Milk, we will give the American people the chance to judge us by our own leaders, and by our own legislators."

Among the 32 Victory Fund winners invited to the meeting are Supervisor Leal, U.S. Congressmen Barney Frank and Gerry Studds, and Arizona State Representative Ken Chevront.

The Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund is assisting Supervisor Leal in convening this meeting.

Gay Sailor Can't Be Community Center Ousted Court Rules

BALTIMORE, MD (AP) - A federal judge ordered the Navy not to kick out a Gay sailor who is fighting the Pentagon's "don't ask, don't tell" policy.

U.S. District Judge Joseph Young granted a six month injunction to allow Lt. Richard Selland to stay in the Navy while he pursues his legal fight against the policy.

The judge said there were questions about whether Selland's rights of due process were violated.

The Pentagon has said its policy is designed only people who engage in Gay sex, but it has moved to discharge several military personnel based on statements about their sexual orientation.

Selland's lawyer, Hank Hockeimer, argued that the Navy's case was based solely on Selland 1993 statement that he is Gay.

"They're kicking him out of the Navy because of something he said, not did," Hockeimer said. "he's done his job and that's the standard we should use."

Justice Department attorneys, however, said the decision to kick out Selland was fair.

"The policy requires that if someone makes a statement it creates the inference that they will engage in homosexual activity," government lawyer Joseph Lobue said. "The government takes them at their word."

Under the policy adopted in 1993, Gays can serve as long as they keep their sexual orientation to themselves and do not engage in Gay sex. Otherwise, they can be honorably discharged. Commanders may not ask service members their sexual orientation.

"It seems clear that an individual cannot be discharged because of homosexual status, but because of homosexual acts," Young said.
