

Shepard Murder Trial Won't Be Televised

LARAMIE, WY (WS) — Television cameras will not be allowed in the courtroom for the murder trial of one of two men charged with killing Gay college student Matthew Shepard.

Judge Jeffrey Donnell has denied the request by Court TV for live, uninterrupted coverage of Russell Henderson's trial. The judge said he based his decision on concern for the privacy of witnesses and members of the jury.

Another concern, Donnell said, was being able to seat an impartial jury in the trial of the second defendant, Aaron McKinney. Henderson's trial is scheduled for March 22. McKinney's is set for August 9.

Chasity Vera Pasley and Kristen LeAnn Price will also stand trial, sometime in the spring. The young women, both of Laramie, are accused of helping to dispose of bloody clothing police say was worn by Henderson, Pasley's boyfriend. Both women are being charged as accessories to all three crimes their boyfriends are being prosecuted for: first-degree murder, kidnapping and aggravated robbery.

Shepard was pistol-whipped, robbed, then tied to a fence and beaten again. He was left in near freezing temperatures for some 18 hours before he was found by a passing bicyclist. Testimony given to police after the two young men were placed under arrest revealed Shepard was taunted and tortured while McKinney inflicted some 18 blows with the butt of a .357-caliber Magnum revolver. The bloodied weapon along with Shepard's shoes were later found in McKinney's truck.

In December, Prosecutor Cal Rerucha served notice he would seek the death penalty against both men.

New Library Policy Set For Texas Town

WICHITA FALLS, TX (NP) — After struggling for some eight months with religious objections to "Heather Has Two Mommies" and "Daddy's Roommate" being part of the collection at the Wichita Falls, Texas public library, a divided City Council established a new policy which may itself be challenged by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU).

The two much-challenged works are books for children which portray children of Lesbian and Gay parents. After rejecting several other proposals, by a 4-3 vote the Council determined that any book can be moved to a special "adult" section if 300 library cardholders sign a petition to

Legislature Attacks Gay And Lesbian Foster Parents

PHOENIX (ON) — Arizona state Representatives Karen Johnson, R-Mesa, and Barbara Blewster, R-Flagstaff, have added a directive to the Fiscal Year (FY) 2000-2001 state budget footnotes that cuts off all state funding to unmarried foster parents who are cohabitating with another unmarried adult. Funding of adoption services to single, unmarried people would also be cut off by this directive.

Capitol sources are calling this parliamentary procedure just another thinly veiled attempt to get at Gays and Lesbians, as several other measures of concern to the community continue to wend their way through the legislative process.

The potential unintended effects of the restrictions on foster homes concerns Lorraine Gordon, Public Information Officer for the Department of Economic Security, the state agency which runs the foster care program.

Gordon said one-third of the foster parents are unmarried, and that virtually all children end up with foster parents because their parent(s) are unwilling and/or unable to care for their own children. If Johnson and Blewster's directive is approved by the legislature, about 600 foster homes of the 2,001 currently licensed in Arizona would be affected. With a steady increase of children in the past three years in the foster care program (from 5,666 in FY '96-'97 to 6,708 in FY '98-'99), Gordon added that there is a shortage in the number of licensed foster homes to take care of the steady influx of children, with only enough places for 4,875 children.

"Mrs. Johnson's and Mrs. Blewster's actions are utterly irresponsible," according to the Arizona Human Rights Fund. That organization said in a written statement, "This type of budget manipulation should not be tolerated, especially at the expense of innocent children."

Openly Gay state Representative Steve May, R-Phoenix, asked, "Why are we trying to punish the children for the perceived sins of the parents?"

In the parliamentary procedure employed by Johnson and Blewster, legislators can use the state budget, going through the Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC) to carry out their proposals in a directive through the budgetary footnotes. These footnotes can direct how state monies are spent.

These proposals can only be stopped in the legislature — in fact, if the budget is approved with such a directive in the footnotes, Governor Jane Hull can't even

use her line-item veto against it, since it doesn't involve an actual state appropriation of moneys.

However, the governor's office does have the option of seeking an opinion from the state Attorneys General on whether the directive is germane or not; if not, the directive could be disregarded, but action seems likely before it reaches the governor's desk. According to Francie Noyes, press secretary to Governor Hull, the governor has stated that "we need all the good foster homes we can get." State House Majority Leader Lori Daniels, R-Chandler, has assured other legislators that this directive will be taken off the budget before the final vote.

Meanwhile, other legislative proposals dealing with funding for Arizona's AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP), mandatory HIV testing or releasing of HIV information on accident victims to a "third party," continue to work their way through the state Legislature.

HOW MUCH WILL THE ADAP CHECK BE FOR?

As expected, the Senate Appropriations Committee voted to approve \$1-million in funding for ADAP, with an amendment "calling for adjustments." Governor Hull had proposed \$1.7-million in her budget but earmarked for the program, while JLBC proposed and the House Appropriations Committee already approved only \$1-million for the program, since Arizona is due for more federal funding (\$4-million) under the Ryan White Care Act. Despite the setbacks in both chambers, Hull continues to push for her original proposal, and Noyes says Hull will do so when the governor meets with the state House and Senate leadership to hammer out the final details of the budget.

BEING INVOLVED IN AN AUTO ACCIDENT COULD WRECK YOUR LIFE IF HB 2496 IS PASSED AS WRITTEN.

Despite questions over its vagueness, particularly regarding what happens to the records after a "third party" has obtained them, a bill to force mandatory HIV testing or the release of HIV medical information of any victim in an accident in which a "significant exposure" of blood to a "third party" (primarily a public safety employee) took place continues to steam-roll through the state House.

The House Rules Committee ap-

proved HB 2496, and it has now been placed on the Consent Calendar; after five days, if no objections are raised, it will go directly to House Third Reading (final consideration). Sources say the bill will be rewritten in the Senate after its expected approval in the House. According to David Hoover, president of the Arizona AIDS Policy Alliance (AZAPA), the fire fighters (the measure's primary proponents) and AZAPA are meeting to come up with acceptable language to deal with the questions surrounding what happens after when the medical records are obtained.

WILL THE BILL BANNING EXTENDING BENEFITS TO DOMESTIC PARTNERS EVER BE HEARD?

Two other proposals are pending. One, also proposed by Representative Johnson, which would ban the extension of medical and dental benefits to the domestic partners of government employees, still waits to be heard by the House Committee of the Whole.

HB 2524 has been pulled from the calendar twice previously by the House Speaker due to the fact that, according to capitol sources, the bill doesn't have the votes for passage. Representative May predicts that the benefit prohibition proposal won't be considered until after the state budget is approved (later this week or sometime next week).

PROMOTION OF HOMOSEXUALITY?

With the appearance of the second measure, another lawmaker's obsession over the perceived "promotion of homosexuality" in Arizona's schools caused an uproar in the state Capitol. When the Arizona Legislative convened in January, state Representative Linda Gray, R-Glendale, had introduced a measure to ban Gay and Lesbian support clubs from public school campuses. Gray eventually pulled that bill when public opposition mounted. This past week seemed like a broken record for the Glendale Republican, when she proposed to eliminate \$1.6-million in funding for women's studies programs at the three state universities:

Gray stated that it wasn't her intention to gut the academic departments, but that she wanted to focus attention on her personal concerns about state funding for programs that promote an unhealthy acceptance of homosexuality.

Representative Gray's proposal got more attention than she expected. The three university presidents were outraged, as well

1999 Update On Our MPS Boy Woody Tullis

Woody's Mother, Beth Tullis-Perry gives us the 1999 "State of Woody" address.

We've had an exciting (as well as challenging) year, as I look back I have so many memories . . . I can remember the desperation and hopelessness I felt. The sleepless nights, the heartbreak of watching Woody slowly get worse. I can remember his frustration and anger as well as mine. . .

In November of 1997, Woody and I went to his doctor, once again, hoping he could help us. We left that appointment with the doctor saying, "take him home and enjoy the time you have with him." We got in the car and I started crying. I couldn't stop. Five years of hoping and searching seemed to have come to an end. I couldn't control the tears anymore, I felt the weight of five years crushing my heart.

A week went by and I started to regroup. We had the Norman Tabernacle Choir to get ready, for the Christmas Show. As has happened in the past, my friends enthusiasm and encouragement kept me from giving up. As I was looking for my phone book to contact the choir members, I could see a package outside. I picked up the package and saw the name, "Dr. Kak-kis," and I went number.

As I opened the package and read the words, I was in a state of shock. The first human trial for enzyme replacement therapy was to begin and Woody was chosen as one of the ten participants for the trial.

This would mean thousands of dollars that our community would need to raise. Unlike the other families, I didn't worry, we started the MPS Christmas Party, raising \$2,000. Then Chuck Brady, David Zinke and Jeff Meyer put "Woody's Dream Show" together to raise more than \$6,500. As a community, we gave Woody a chance. We did this working together.

On March 13, Woody will receive his 52nd treatment. A year ago he was going to school half-day, missing school constantly. He was waking up every night with head aches. He spent most of his time on the couch, in front of the TV because he was too tired to do anything else. He was slowly becoming wheelchair bound. It was becoming a struggle for him to participate in anything. When I explained the trial to him and asked if he wanted to try it, his answer was: "Lets do it, I can't hurt any worse than I do now."

Woody's life has changed dramatically this past year. He gets up in the morning, throws on his clothes (Hmm . . . who taught this kid to accessorize?) and off he goes, his energy level has increased 100%, he no longer has headaches, his liver and spleen decreased 32% to normal, he has grown six inches and gained twenty pounds, his joints don't ache and you don't see him front of the TV until 8:00 o'clock at night. Woody feels alive again.

Woody's treatment is unpleasant and painful. Yet week after week, he goes to the hospital and says, "let's get this over with, I've got a life you know!" The treatment makes him sick to his stomach and he's covered with hives for a couple of hours, yet he refuses to give up. As I watch him, week after week, I admire his courage and his determination.

What makes me different than any other mom? Nothing. I've done what any mom would so to save the life of their child. What makes you different? Everything. You didn't have to do anything, yet you've done everything you possibly could to provide this chance for Woody. I have been blessed to have special people in my life. I could never have done this alone.

Unfortunately the FDA didn't approve Woody's treatment, so we will need to go to Los Angeles for the next 52 treatments, so once again we will be doing another fund raiser. Miss Aviva Diamond will be contacting the Norman Tabernacle Choir for their second annual Easter Show. If you've never seen the choir, then you haven't lived dahlings! This will take place at the Graduate on April 3. Watch the Observer for more details.

In closing, I cannot overstate that magnitude of what we have accomplished, not only for Woody, but for the 3,000 children who are waiting for the treatment. As I told the FDA, Woody has been lucky. But let's not forget that until every child diagnosed with MPS has a chance for treatment. . . . Our work is not done.

Ivins Takes on Arizona Politics:
 "The thing I like about Arizona is that you can count on politics here having real bite — like a habanero pepper," begins syndicated columnist Molly Ivins' February 20 column on a proposed bill in Arizona.

Penned by state Rep. Karen Johnson (R-Mesa), the bill in question would ban the provision of insurance benefits to the same-sex partners of government employees. Ivins writes that "this is because, according to a particularly peppy and well-informed sponsor, [Rep. Barbara Blewster,] homosexuality shares a room with bestiality, cannibalism and human sacrifice." Ivins recounts Blewster's use of the Aztec culture as an illustration of the link between these far-removed practices, although she notes that, "the culture was noted for neither homosexuality nor bestiality, although it is possible that Blewster was confused by the often-reported fact that the Aztecs were fond of wearing pink feathers."

And what of the bill's author? According to Ivins, "Johnson spoke at length about 'Gay bowel syndrome,' which is something she claims affects Gays [although it] came as news to everyone else at the hearing." But Ivins is not the only one to challenge Blewster and Johnson. She writes that openly Gay Rep. Steve May spoke against the bill and its sponsors, continuing to illuminate the fascinating nature of Arizona state politics by noting that "[t]his being Arizona, May is also a conservative Republican," whom she further notes was raised as a Mormon. "Arizona politics has not been as much fun since they recently got over their habit of electing hopeless nincompoops to the governorship," Ivins writes, referencing Gov. Jane Hull's dismissal of the bill. She concludes the piece, saying, "I hate when they get reasonable here. It's not nearly as much fun."

Walls of Educational Photos Irk Paglia: The February 22 Wall Street Journal featured an op-ed by prominent academic and openly Lesbian feminist Camille Paglia, entitled "It Wasn't 'Romeo and Julian'" and referring to a Newton, Massachusetts, junior high school's posting of photographs of Lesbian and Gay historical figures in celebration of diversity.

According to Paglia, the Newton schoolteacher who created the exhibit told the Boston Globe that it was intended to teach "tolerance and respect." But much to Paglia's chagrin, featured persons include people who were not, in their lifetimes, "professed Gays," pointing to William Shakespeare, Michelangelo and Walt Whitman. Paglia says that in spite of their admittedly likely attraction to men, "In the absence of hard information, to call them 'Gay' is ethically wrong."

At the crux of Paglia's argument is her assertion that "to introduce major artists to schoolchildren via sexual scandal rather than through the art itself is a perversion of education." She chastises the exhibit's inclusion of Eleanor Roosevelt for "reduc[ing] a bold, dynamic woman to gossip and speculation." She notes that Shakespeare's work was never inclusive of Lesbian and Gay themes, except in negative

and implied portrayals. In fact, she writes, "Shakespeare is world-famous for his celebration of heterosexual love, as in the eternally popular 'Romeo and Juliet.'"

Paglia then delves into a discussion of the roots of sexual orientation, claiming that "it certainly is not inborn," and asserting that the "intrusion of militant Gay activism into primary schools does more harm than good by encouraging adolescents to define themselves prematurely as Gay." Toward the end of her piece, Paglia suggests that it is a "kind of arrogant cultural imperialism shown in Newton - where 'tolerance and respect' would clearly not be accorded to a fundamentalist Christian or Hindu who declared homosexuality immoral."

Paglia misses the point. The photographs presented were not supposed to contest the varied achievements and contributions of their subjects, nor were they intended to "hoist" anyone as "a Gay saint." And while it is true that some of the figures did not self-identify as being Lesbian or Gay during their lifetimes, Paglia glosses over the fact that there wasn't a cultural identity in the sense that she's discussing in the time of figures such as Michelangelo and Shakespeare. In delving into the notion of "causes" of homosexuality, Paglia, a humanities professor at the University of the Arts in Philadelphia, treads into waters where she wouldn't seem to have much credence or expertise. And finally, her presumption that a desire to promote tolerance and respect for diversity would inherently be at odds with acceptance of fundamentalist Christians and Hindus is absurd.



Difficult Dialog

At the end of January, I attended a conference of the American Psychological Association devoted to multi cultural diversity and issues of race, ethnicity, gender and sexual orientation. The most compelling part of the conference was a demonstration of how to facilitate what are often difficult discussions of race, gender, and sexual orientation. The demonstration was led by two psychologists who specialize in diversity training, and the panel of discussants was composed of four male and six female psychologist of various racial and ethnic backgrounds. One of the women self-identified as Lesbian, four of the panelists self-identified as straight, and the other five panelists did not make reference to their sexual orientation. The task was simply to talk to each other about their personal experiences and emotions in regard to race, gender and sexual orientation, while the rest of the conference attendees observed.

One of the common themes running through the comments of the panelists of color was exhausted they are, on a day to day basis, in dealing with the effects of racism and in having to teach white people about racism. One of the common themes running through the comments of the white panelists was their awkwardness in trying to avoid making racist comments and their ignorance in understanding the effects of racism. The early discussions seemed to be fairly flat emotionally, until the Lesbian on the panel tried to make a comparison between the ethnic and religious discrimination she has experienced as a Jewish woman and the discrimination she has experienced as a Lesbian. At that point, a straight, African-American male on the panel boldly stated that as a Christian, he believes that Gay and Lesbian people are morally wrong and that he finds our behavior sinful. The Lesbian, clearly taken aback in surprise, asked that if he cannot support GLBT people, that he not work against us as our enemy. The panel quickly diverted their discussion to more safe topics of how religion can be a healing force. The rest of the conversation after that, contained a lot of efforts to use humor to diffuse the emotions. As a result, it felt more superficial.

I was struck more by the things that were not discussed in the dialogue, than by things that were discussed. A common complaint I hear from people of color in these situations is how frustrating it is for them when white people divert discussions away from the topic of racism. The panel bore this out, as they began talking about race, had a brief emotional interchange about sexual orientation, and ended up talking about religion, which was not the purpose of the discussion. Things were left unsaid about racism. Things were also left unsaid about heterosexism. The panel never addressed the issue of why it was acceptable for them to tolerate, blatantly heterosexist talk. As a result, throughout the rest of the conference, I felt that little nagging fear that it was no longer completely safe to be Gay among some of these people. I suspect this was a similar fear that people of color and women often feel around white people and men.

The difficulty of these types of dialogues can be discouraging. At this conference of psychologists, people who are training to know better about emotions and psychological process, it was particularly discouraging. However, I ultimately take encouragement from these dialogues. Difficult though it may be to deal with the

angry and painful emotions that get stirred up, I have seen hearts and minds changed as a result of honest and focused discussions of racism, sexism and heterosexism. It is wearying and scary to do, but rewarding when the change happens.

Wingspan is used to having dialogues about heterosexism occur within our walls, which makes our community safer for GLBT people. My hope is that dialogues about racism and sexism also occur within Wingspan's walls, to make our community and our community center safer for people of color and women.

Symposium Attacked By Anti-Gay Group

BOISE, ID (WS) — The organizers of a forum promoting tolerance and diversity in Idaho came under attack from a group of religious conservatives, accused of "covertly" preaching acceptance of the "homosexual lifestyle."

The attack by leaders of the Idaho Family Forum caught symposium organizers off guard. The public gathering slated for March is being underwritten by computer giant Hewlett-Packard, which also came under blistering attack from Family Forum leaders. Securing the participation of retired Gen. Colin Powell seemed particularly upsetting.

"This is a Gay and Lesbian issue, and they're masking it under minority status using a hero to do it," the Family Forum's executive director, Dennis Mansfield, said. Mansfield said his group was planning a radio and television ad campaign taking aim at Hewlett Packard.

A Hewlett-Packard spokesman told the newspaper they did not understand the conservative complaint and denied they had a secret pro-Gay agenda. "We're certainly not attempting to focus on the Gay-Lesbian issue or any other issue for that matter," said Bob Trerise, a Hewlett Packard human resources manager.

Mansfield cited HP's recent support of a hate crimes bill in the Idaho Legislature, a bill that included protections for Gay people, as "proof" of the company's pro-Gay position. He also said symposium television ads featuring people removing one word labels such as "black" and "Gay" from themselves provides further evidence of a pro-homosexual agenda.

The Family Forum plans to run anti-symposium ads welcoming Powell and reminding television viewers that according to statements made before a Congressional committee in 1992, Powell does not view racial bias and anti-Gay bias in the same light.

"Skin color is a benign, non-behavioral characteristic," Powell said, arguing against allowing Gay men and Lesbian to serve openly in the U.S. Military. "Sexual orientation is perhaps the most profound of human behavioral characteristics. The comparison between the two is a convenient but invalid characteristic," he said.

MADISON, WI (WS) — In the first public airing of a hypothesis he says is a part of a work in progress, Larry Kramer, the Oscar-nominated screenwriter and founder of ACT-UP, told a group of activists that the 16th president of the United States, Abraham Lincoln, was Gay.

Kramer, addressing the Midwest Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Campus Conference in Madison, told the audience that a 28-year-old Lincoln carried on a four-year affair with a 24 year-old shopowner, Joshua Speed.

Kramer said he was nervous about his lecture, "Our Gay President," because he had never before taken his thesis public. But the writer's nervousness was not enough to shake his faith in the authenticity of his views.

Larry Kramer 'Outs' Lincoln In Address

"Between 1839 and 1842 Abraham Lincoln and Joshua Speed loved each other," Kramer said definitively. After 1842, they loved each other but not as strongly, Kramer said. Both eventually married, as dictated by the standards of the age, but neither coupling was happy.

Kramer says Lincoln met Speed shortly after his arrival in Springfield, Ill in 1839. With no money and no place to stay, Speed offers the gangly and overly tall Lincoln space in his bed above the store he ran. Kramer says Lincoln fell in love with the blue-eyed and black-haired Speed almost instantly.

"For years they shared a bed and their most private thoughts. They fell in

love with each other and slept next to each other for four years," Kramer said. Quoting young Speed from letters, Kramer read: "He often kisses me when I tease him, often to shut me up . . . He would grab me up by his long arms and hug and hug."

Kramer said Speeds, who affectionately called Lincoln "Linc," was a sensitive man who craved physical contact and the warmth it gave. "Yes, our Abe is like a school girl," Speed wrote about his friend. "He often kisses me when I tease him, often to shut me up . . . He would grab me up by his long arms and hug and hug."

Kramer also points to Speed's sense of otherness in a question posed to Lincoln, which the author interprets as an

attempt to legitimize their feelings and assuage a sense of guilt about their relationship. Speed is quoted as asking Lincoln if he thought there were others like them, the young Lincoln responded he was sure there were because "it felt so fine," Kramer said.

Several critics in the audience challenged Kramer's conclusions. He said if students of history won't accept his version of events, his take on Lincoln would at least force people to think about the possibilities of otherness. "I'm very aware that my truth is very different from other people's truth." Whoever writes about history owns it, he said.

Letters between Lincoln and Speed have been available since they were written, Kramer said, and their absence from regular public discourse is a reflection of a society intent on keeping Gays a modern aberration, rather than an integral part of human history. His current project, a 2,000 page non-fiction book called "The American People," is an attempt to redress that omission.

GLMA Urges Universal Hepatitis Vaccinations For Gay Men

SAN FRANCISCO, CA — The Gay and Lesbian Medical Association (GLMA), has called for universal Hepatitis A and B vaccinations for men who have sex with men.

These guidelines note that Gay men are at increased risk for both Hepatitis A and B, both of which are communicable and have a high morbidity rate. With the announcement, GLMA is urging other healthcare organizations to update vaccination recommendations.

"While health care providers working with Gay men have understandably focused attention to HIV, the fact is that Gay men are at increased risk for other medical conditions which also have fatal consequences," according to Dr. Darren Carter, chair of GLMA's Policy Committee. "It is long past time for health institutions to address other pressing health needs among Gay men, especially Hepatitis A & B. We hope that funding is available, either through local or state governments, or through the CDC, to offer easier vaccination accessibility, through the creation of outreach programs, such as mobile vaccination center, that can target establishments frequented by Gay and Bisexual men."



Getting Your Needs Met

I often find reading personal ads to be interesting, if not out-right amusing. Sometimes, I'll go to the back of one of the local papers and read through the ads. It amazes me the list of things people include in their ads.

Reading on-line personal ads is even more astounding to me. I suppose that because people are not limited by a per word charge, they can write on and on about the mate they are seeking. It's not uncommon for people to list the age, hair and eye color, height, weight, build, and specific interests and sexual activities they expect from a partner in some of these ads. I often wonder: do they want a mate or a fantasy?

Writing a personal ad for a mate is something of an adaptation to what many counselors suggest people do when beginning to date. Many counselors suggest making a list of what an individual wants in a mate. Based on the list, the person can determine what is significant to them in a partner. Many counselors will stress that it's vital to "get your needs met" in a relationship. The theme of "getting your needs met" continues in most counseling for couples when trouble in the relationship arises. But what does "getting your needs met" really mean?

It's true enough that a person should be clear about what he or she is looking for in a relationship. That's why counselors will encourage clients to make lists or do other things to clarify what's of primary importance and what can take a back seat. How significant is the physical aspect of the relationship to you? The emotional? Sharing common interests? Class, education, income level and age? All of those things do have some bearing on our ability to sustain an intimate relationship with another person. Those are the kinds of things one often finds in personal ads. They have something to do with having our needs met in a relationship, but they aren't the whole picture. I'm not sure they are the most important part of the picture.

Unfortunately, what I believe often happens is that people's real needs get reduced to a list of characteristics or attributes. Often, those attributes are fleeting and prevent a couple from entering a long

term relationship. For instance, in a long term relationship, do you need someone with the body of fashion model? Clearly, some would say, "yes." But many more people would probably admit, at least privately, that knowing that they are loved and cared for by the other is more important than a great body. Do you need to always have incredible sex to feel loved and cared for? If you do, consider that things will become difficult when the day comes and the sex is just ordinary. Do you need to have someone who is always interested in all your activities? Perhaps it's also worth considering that the relationship remains engaging when both partners share some interests and have their individual pursuits. That means that there are always new things to bring home and talk about with your partner over the years you are together.

It's my opinion that what all of us need when it comes to a long term relationship is to be able to build our lives with another with whom we can share some common interests, values, and life-goals. Yes, romance and attraction is definitely part of it. But couples who are together for 10, 20, and 30 years will often report that what got them through the difficult times (which come to all relationships) wasn't the attraction or the long list of attributes they sought before they met. No, it's the friendship and mutual respect each has for the other. Friendship and mutual respect grow out of sharing common interests, values, and goals in life.

Building a long term relationship is a matter of creating balance between the lives of real people. Couples need to find a comfortable rhythm between intimacy with each other and distance apart from each.

In terms of getting your needs met, the truth is that no one person can ever meet all the needs of another. Further, health, whole, integrated people know that they alone are responsible for assuring that their needs are met. In that light, a mate is someone with whom a person shares the journey of life over time.





Don't book the land till you've got the air. At this writing, you cannot book an airline ticket from anywhere to anywhere, between next December 20 and January 10, for under a thousand dollars. (Yes, I'm exaggerating, but not by much. If you want to fly from Topeka to Indianapolis, you're still in luck.) Your best bet is a package that includes air from a city within driving distance.

Where do you want to go? Don't pay that extra money unless that trip will be special to you. If you never liked Caribbean cruises, they're not going to be more fun just because the calendar suddenly acquires a bunch of zeroes. If you're going to do



as students, faculty and a large segment of the public. In wake of this, Gray purportedly withdrew her proposal and postponed a meeting of the subcommittee overseeing university funding, which she chairs, to consider the matter, for the time being. In an interview, Gray said she would consider reintroducing legislation if the departments did not adopt a more conservative attitude. "They better get it together and in a hurry," she said.

Gray said she favored elimination of women's studies programs after hearing about a play, sponsored by the Arizona State University women's studies department, entitled "The Vagina Dialogues"; she also received several complaints from students at the University of Arizona, who were upset over having to purchase several books for a class from Antigone Books, which Gray and state Representative Jean McGrath, R-Glendale, say has a reputation for catering to homosexual groups.

Antigone co-owner Trudy Mills denies the charge, saying that the store features a large selection that features positive images of women and minority groups. Mills said that many professors from various departments, such as English, education and anthropology, have ordered books through her store. She went on to add that the practicality (time), philosophical reasons and the service at the bookstore were some of the factors why professors have gone through Antigone Books, instead of the student bookstore on campus.

Further study was also the reason given for Gray's pulling the anti-school club measure, and May, the nation's only openly Gay Republican state legislator, had committed to assist her in her education. There was even a possibility that Gray would even attend a meeting of such a support group to add to her more insight.

that effect. Appeals against such petitions can only take place if the city manager chooses to bring them to the Council. No petition has yet been submitted, while the formerly rarely read books continue to fly off the shelves.

The controversy began in May 1998, when members of the First Baptist Church congregation complained to their pastor Robert Jeffress. Jeffress said he just happened to be preaching about Sodom and Gomorrah at the time, "And as I looked at these books and saw that these books were actually promoting homosexuality to children, I was enraged as a parent that tax dollars would be used to support a lifestyle which God has called an abomination. . . . And our point is that, given the fact that sodomy is against the law in the state of Texas that it is associated with one of the greatest epidemics in human history, AIDS, and that it violates the teaching of three major world religions — Christianity, Islam and Judaism — we do not feel that our tax dollars should be used to purchase these kinds of books." (Texas' little-enforced 19th-century sodomy law is currently the subject of a legal challenge by two men who were arrested in one's home when police broke in based on a false phone tip.)

Jeffress refused to return the books, although he eventually paid fines which were used to replace them. His original petition to the Council asked the city to remove from its library "any literature that promotes or sanctions a homosexual lifestyle."

The books had been acquired in October 1997 after careful research by veteran library administrator Linda Hughes. She found that they appeared on the American Library Association's Best Books for Children list. A formal complaint about the books was unanimously rejected by the Library Advisory Board, but Jeffress and like thinkers took the matter on to the City Council.

The Library Advisory Board is now asking the Council just what it's expected to do, since the Council failed to consult with the Board at all about the policy change. Ironically, because of privacy protections, it will fall to Hughes to validate the signatures on any petition which may be presented, even though the petitions themselves cannot be kept at the library for patrons to sign.

A group called the Wichita Falls Coalition Against Censorship formed to oppose Jeffress' efforts. In a statement on the eve of the vote, Coalition co-founder Vicki Downing charged that the policy would violate constitutional guarantees of free access and due process and "set a dangerous precedent that we simply cannot tolerate as Americans." She said that, "This isn't a Gay issue. This isn't a religious issue. This is about our rights, freedom and individual liberty."

The ACLU's North Texas regional director Diana Philip sat through the hours of discussion at Council meetings and concluded that, "It was all about homophobia." She said, "This is constitutionally protected material. We're not talking about pornography. Yet, people got up and said to the City Council that anything to do with Gay and Lesbian issues is pornography." She is urging the state ACLU to litigate the policy.

Australian Ambassador Introduces Partner To Queen Of Denmark

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (SMH) — The Australian ambassador to Sweden, Stephen Brady, presented his Gay partner, Peter Stevens, to Queen Margrethe of Denmark in Copenhagen in a gesture that has inspired wild expressions of gratitude from Gay men and women all over the globe.

A Danish tabloid said Mr Brady's act of introduction was a diplomatic first in the Scandinavian country - the first time an ambassador has officially introduced his homosexual partner to the royal family.

A spokeswoman for the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade declined to confirm the report, adding the department did not believe it appropriate to comment on the "private concerns" of its staff. "The department does not discriminate because of sexual orientation for the recruitment, appointment and promotion of its staff," she said.

Ambassador Brady, who is based in Stockholm, also represents Australia in Iceland, Finland, Latvia, Lithuania and Norway.

"I think it's great," said Australian Greens Senator Bob Brown. "It's terrific the Australian ambassador took his partner with him to present his credentials to the Queen. He has put Australia on the map in Scandinavia and certainly throughout Europe."
