

## Over 8,000 Attend OUToberFEST 2001 'Out In The Desert'

TUCSON (ON) - More than 8,000 Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgendered (GLBT) people from Tucson and across the country, their families and friends, converged on the DeMeester Bandshell for OUToberFEST 2001: "Out in the Desert," Saturday, October 13.

OUToberFEST is the annual event, organized by the Tucson Lesbian/Gay Alliance (TLGA), marking National Coming Out Day, and for GLBT Pride in Tucson.

Organizers said attendance was down from last year's event but the financial impact the GLBT community brought was the largest TLGA had ever experienced, raising \$32,000 for local charities and to help TLGA to put on the annual event.

People jammed the corner of Reid park, lounged in front of a stage that featured performers like Pepper MaShay (singer of "Dive in the Pool," Showtime's *Queer* as Folk's television theme song), Kenny Thames, Barba Williams Performing Company, Slack Jaw, Reveille Gay Men's Chorus, Lynne Francis Anderson, Laurie Riccobono, Dance Inc., Fuerza Latina, Faith Michaels, Aja Simone, Janee Starr,

Bunny FuFu, Elektra Bleu, Mr. Kenneth Blake, and LeAnne Savage & Shockadelica.

Vendors sold everything from rainbow-tinted sun catchers and wind socks to leather accessories and confetti-filled cascarones. There were political and informational booths, and IBT's had a special dance floor. People scribbled notes on large message boards.

Attendees said the best part of the day was seeing old friends and making new ones. But at the same time, they said, the day was a reminder there are still struggles ahead. Some said it's important for people to have a place they feel safe to express their sexual preference and have a good time and not worry about the sad reasons they can't be so out the rest of the year, something OUToberFEST provided.

Openly Gay state Representative, Ed Poelstra, R-Tucson, along with Tucson Vice Mayor, Fred Ronstadt, took part in the political portion of the program, reading the Pride Proclamation from Tucson Mayor, Bob Walkup, which read:

## Calif. Gets Sweeping Gay Rights Law

SACRAMENTO, CA - Joined by the former partner of San Franciscan Mark Bingham, a victim of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, Gov. Gray Davis signed legislation bringing California's domestic-partnership law closer to marriage on several fronts, reported the San Francisco Chronicle.

By adding health care, estate planning and adoption benefits now enjoyed by married couples, the measure Davis approved puts California second only to Vermont in granting legal rights to domestic partners.

"Given what happened, I think Mark would want me here," said Castro resident Paul Holm, 40, the friend and former partner of Bingham, 31, who helped fight off the hijackers on United Airlines' Flight 93. The plane crashed into a Pennsylvania field, killing all aboard. "We both wanted fair and equal treatment of people, regardless of their orientation."

The measure was written by Assemblywoman Carole Migden, D-San Francisco, who called it the foundation of an "everlasting fight for Gay and Lesbian equality."

The new law, which takes effect Jan. 1, applies to same-sex couples of any legal age and to male-female couples who include at least one partner older than 62. The expansion of benefits beyond Gays and Lesbians is a recognition that senior citizens often want to live together for safety, comfort and economic reasons without the formality of marriage in their advancing years.

The first section of the new law also is a legal and symbolic admission by the state that Gays and Lesbians may, in fact, love each other. For the first time, a domestic partner will be allowed to sue for emotional distress if his or her partner is killed in a negligent way.

Until now, that legal right to collect damages was reserved for married couples and their children. Gay and Lesbian activists questioned why the state would place a monetary value on the emotional lives of male-female couples but not others.

The new law also removes a hurdle for Gays and Lesbians who adopt children. It allows the second domestic partner to be treated as a stepparent seeking adoption, removing a significant legal step -- a court petition -- from the process.

The new rights apply only to couples who register with the California secretary of state as domestic partners. That registry, which Migden helped create two years ago, lists 7,670 California couples -- out of a state population of almost 34 million.

In previous legislation, California has granted legal rights to hospital visitation and health benefits for the partners of state workers who register with the secretary of state.

The expansion of benefits signed by Davis allows workers to take sick leave to care for a new child or sick relative. It lets a domestic partner file disability benefits on behalf of an incapacitated partner.

In financial and medical decisions, the law gives domestic partners a legal standing to represent their partner in conservatorships. And it allows an unemployed person to relocate with a partner without losing jobless benefits.

"The law I am going to sign today is about responsibility," Davis said, stressing that California was not making Gay marriage legal. "It is about respect, and most of all it is about family."

## AIDSWALK 2001 Oct. 21

TUCSON - The Southern Arizona AIDS Foundation (SAAF) has been gratified by the outpouring of support from the Tucson community as AIDSWALK 2001 approaches on October 21.

All over southern Arizona, business, school, and community groups have formed fund raising teams to walk in AIDSWALK in support of care services for people living with HIV/AIDS. Dozens of people have come in weekly to the offices of SAAF to volunteer their time to ensure AIDSWALK is successful, and more than two hundred of them have committed to volunteering on October 21, to produce the best AIDSWALK yet.

Many community members take on the responsibility of forming a team to walk, in support of someone they know who is living with HIV/AIDS, in memory of someone who has died from AIDS, or

simply to ensure that support and prevention efforts exist.

"Tucson is such a caring community," noted Anne Maley, Executive Director of SAAF. "Understandably, the community's attention has been focused on the international situation. We are heartened that so many people have expressed their desire to do something positive at the local level."

Significant corporate sponsorship covers all of the expenses of AIDSWALK, so all walker dollars go to support critical services for people living with and affected by AIDS and needed prevention programs for people at risk for HIV.

Based on past years, SAAF expects more than 3,000 walkers on October 21. So far registered walkers are below last

## Jazz Great Diane Schuur In Concert With Reveille October 20

TUCSON - Southern Arizona music lovers are in for a special treat this Saturday night, October 20, 8:00 p.m., when legendary jazz vocalist Diane Schuur will be appearing for one night only at the TCC Music Hall.

"Reveille's Crescendo" will feature Schuur, a two-time Grammy award winner and former Tucsonian, along with her jazz ensemble. Performing with Ms. Schuur will be the Tucson Jazz Society Orchestra and Reville Gay Men's Chorus, in an evening of superb vocal and instrumental jazz.

Diane Schuur, universally acclaimed for her vocal versatility and incredible 3 1/2-octave range, has inspired rave reviews throughout the world. Now called "the new First Lady of Jazz," she made Tucson her home for three years in the late 70s. She last performed in Tucson to a sold-out house at the U of A Centennial Hall in 1993.

"Crescendo" was rescheduled from an earlier date due to travel restrictions immediately following the terrorist attacks on September 11. Ticket prices for this rescheduled event have been reduced and are available for \$25, \$35, and \$47.50 at the TCC box office or from Ticketmaster, (520) 321-1000 (or online at [www.ticketmaster.com](http://www.ticketmaster.com)). "We're hoping these reduced ticket prices make the evening more affordable," said Bill Harrison, Reville's Executive Director.

Patrons holding tickets for the originally scheduled performance must return them to place of purchase for exchange or refund. General concert and ticket information is available by calling Reville's Crescendo hotline, (520) 577-5525.

Diane Schuur's rise to musical prominence began early, taking piano lessons at the Washington State School for the Blind, which she attended until transferring to public schools at age 11. In the early '70s, she performed at small clubs in Seattle, singing and playing the piano, and releasing her first single (Dear Mommy and Daddy/The Sun Is Shining) in 1971. Her first big break came in 1975 - an informal backstage audition for Doc Severinsen, bandleader of The Tonight Show led to an invitation to sing at that year's Monterey Jazz Festival.

Since then, Schuur, called "Deedles" by her friends, has developed a unique and world renowned vocal style, steadily building a huge following of devoted jazz and blues enthusiasts in the process. She has made numerous appearances on television, and was featured in the proclaimed 1982 PBS Series "In Performance At the White House." Schuur has released over 15 albums, topping the Billboard Jazz charts several times (Pure Schuur, Heart to Heart, among others), and was honored with back-to-back Grammy awards in 1986 and '87. In addition to playing the major jazz venues in this country, Schuur has toured extensively overseas including Europe, Japan, and South America, delighting jazz lovers around the world.

Ms. Schuur's love of music and life in general extends beyond her musical achievements. In 1996 she married retired

space engineer Les Crockett. That same year, she took another plunge -- parachute jumping from an airplane at 13,000 feet. "Nothing's going to stop me," Schuur says, "because the only thing that limits you is your own mind, if you let it. I feel very blessed when I'm on stage. I want to go out and hug everybody."

On October 20, that could be a lot of hugs. The TCC Music Hall has over 2000 seats -- all sure to be filled with Schuur's enthusiastic fans.

# OUTWest 2001 Film Festival Opens October 18

TUCSON - Laughs Galore ... that's the ticket for the Tucson's Annual Lesbian and Gay Film Festival Opening Night celebration, "Hellava Gayla". The doors open at 6:15 p.m. this Thursday, October 18, at the Historic Rialto Theatre, 301 Congress Street. The Box office will open at 6:00 p.m. The evening will begin with the musical styling of the "Betty Diamond" band. There will be a cash bar and hors d'oeuvres (provided by Kingfisher, Barrio, Presidio Grill, Fioritos and Dakota Cafe) will be served.

Act One, starts at 7:00 p.m., promises laughter and creative genius with a full slate of International Animations. Included are the further adventures of "Rick and Steve: The Happiest Gay Couple in the World" (last year's fest favorite) with new episodes #2-3-4. Other animation pieces will be screened from Switzerland, Canada, and France.

Act Two, starting at approximately 8:30 will be the feature film "Sporty Girls" (a.k.a. Drama Queen). A fast paced cabaret performance by Lesbian comedian Georgia Ragsdale. Starting at 5:00 p.m., will be the "Sobrevivencia Latina/Latin Survival" program (subtitled) with three short documentaries dealing with the Latin community-homophobia and Lesbian domestic violence. It is sponsored by Wingspan Domestic Violence Center and Salud Es Poder. "Mixed Bag: Family Fun" is 8 International short films with interest to all members of the community starting at 7:00 p.m., which is Sponsored by Lesbian Looks Film and Video Series and U/A LGBT Studies Committee.

At 9:00 p.m., "Out In Public" Frank dialogue about men's public sex, Cybersex, and "bare backing" vs. Safe sex. Four very explicit films. This program is sponsored by GMHP (Gay Men's Health Project) and the Bears of the Old Pueblo.

The Screening Room, plays host again, SUNDAY October 21. The documentary "Undetectable" at 3:00 p.m., is our annual tribute to the AIDS WALK, a film

## A GLAAD Closer Look At Identifying Sexual Orientation

As Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender people have become more comfortable living their lives openly, the media have not always been equally at ease identifying such people when they make news. (Unless, it seems, when the news is negative.)

To be fair to the media, it must be acknowledged that the decision to identify someone by their sexual orientation or not is difficult. When is sexual orientation relevant to the story? When is inclusion sensationalistic? When is not including the information an omission, particularly when the person was open about that part of his or her life?

Coverage of Sept. 11's events and aftermath was and continues to be a textbook study of this dilemma.

Mark Bingham is believed to have participated in a revolt that crashed the hijacked United Flight 93 into a remote field outside Pittsburgh instead of a target in Washington, D.C. Fire Department Chaplain Father Mychal Judge was killed at ground zero while ministering to an injured firefighter. And Graham Berkeley, Daniel Brandhorst and Ronald Gamboa, David Charlebois, Carol Flyzik, Jack Keohane, Sheila Hein and many others who had lived brave, openly Gay lives were among those lost to the terrorist attacks.

Media coverage of these Gay and Lesbian heroes and victims has been and continues to be spotty.

For example, "The Courier-Journal" in Louisville initially reported that Ronald Gamboa, partner of Daniel Brandhorst and adoptive father of David Gamboa-Brandhorst, was single and childless. NBC's Oct. 2 "Dateline" report on the downing of United Flight 93 identified Bingham as a rugby player, yet made no mention that it was a Gay rugby team. Bingham's mother, who was interviewed for the piece, has stated publicly that Bing-

ham's Gay identity was a crucial part of his life - a facet of Bingham's character and heroism that NBC had a responsibility to report. Likewise, the centrality of Judge's identity as a Gay man - especially in the context of his longtime ministries to the LGBT and AIDS communities and membership in Dignity, a Gay Catholic group - has been shamefully overlooked by all in the mainstream but "The Village Voice."

Some argue that there were no Gay or Lesbian victims of the Sept. 11 attacks - there were only American victims and why the "special" need to identify by sexual orientation? The need is not special at all. It's a step media should take to provide a full understanding of the events and people involved, and not just in crisis reporting, but also in day-to-day stories.

Much information can be gathered by media consumers without explicit mention. Race and heritage are apparent by pictures and sometimes by name. Clothing and accessories can identify religious beliefs, political affiliations and economic status. Media consumers are able to say, "Here is someone like me" or "Here is someone not like me, and this is new information for me about this kind of person."

Sexual orientation is not so apparent. Unless the media make the effort to identify this integral aspect of the person, Americans never learn that the people they respect, admire and even hold up as heroes are Gay. This lesson goes a long way to prevent Gay people from falsely being shown as not a living, contributing part of society. It's a portrayal that is misleading, unfair and, in an increasingly splintered and violent world, potentially dangerous.

## 'The Starship Enterprise Legislative District Is No More'

Arizona's Independent Redistricting Commission has approved new legislative districts that create more minority-dominated districts while giving Republicans solid ground to continue to dominate the Legislature, despite the will of the voters when they approved Proposition 106 in 2000.

The new map also reflects differing population growth rates in the state, giving another legislative district to the Phoenix area by taking one from Tucson and leaving rural areas' number of districts unchanged.

Approval of the 30-district legislative map came two days after the commission approved the eight-district congressional map. Both maps will take effect with the 2002 elections if they survive the inevitable legal challenges.

The five-member commission was created under last year's voter-approved Proposition 106 to take the drawing of new lines for congressional and legislative districts out of the hands of the Legislature. Two Democrats, two Republicans and one independent was the makeup of the commission. Proposition 106 charged the commission with creating equally populated districts while attempting to respect local government boundaries, protect minorities' voting rights, preserve so-called "communities of interest" and, if doing so does not significantly hurt the other priorities, create competitive districts, but did they?

Arizona's new legislative map gives the Republicans a voter-registration

edge in 18 districts and Democrats 12 - the same ratio as under current districts. By another scale used by the commission's consultants, Republicans would dominate 16 districts and Democrats 10, though four others would be considered competitive. Maricopa County would get 18 legislative districts, while Pima County would only have five (plus splitting one with the rural areas), with the rural areas getting seven districts.

Pima County and Tucson's legislative districts will include, pending the inevitable legal challenge:

A Northwest Side district, which takes in the upper part of the Catalina Foothills, Oro Valley, Catalina and eastern Marana, (Voter Registration - GOP 46%, Democrat 35%, Other 19%);

A South Side district, which takes in Armory Park and the University of Arizona. (Voter Registration - GOP 27%, Democrat 52%, Other 21%);

A West Side district, which includes the area near the Tucson Mountains, (Voter Registration - GOP 23%, Democrat 54%, Other 23%);

A Central core district, which runs down the middle of town, (Voter Registration - GOP 32%, Democrat 46%, Other 22%);

A far East Side district, which takes in the lower foothills, Green Valley and Sierra Vista, (Voter Registration - GOP 49%, Democrat 31%, Other 20%);

And the sixth district, taking in the remainder of Northwestern, Western and Eastern Pima County, along with several portions of rural counties, (Voter Registration - GOP 31%, Democrat 53%, Other 16%).

None of Pima County and Tucson's legislative districts are considered competitive.

A new congressional map was also approved by the commission, by a 4-1 vote, giving Republicans the edge in five districts and Democrats in two. An entirely rural district in northern and eastern Arizona would be up for grabs. Five congressional districts' populations would be entirely or mostly in the Phoenix area while two other districts would be in southern Arizona and each dominated by Tucson.

Tucson and Pima County will be split between:

A southeastern district, which includes the northwestern and eastern parts of Tucson, as well as Green Valley and Sierra Vista (Voter Registration - GOP 37%, Democrat 43%, Other 20%);

And the new district includes southern and western parts of Tucson, as well as Nogales, Yuma and extends into a portion of Maricopa County (Voter Registration - GOP 27%, Democrat 53%, Other 20%).

Arizona's Congressional and Legislative District maps now go to the U.S. Justice Department for their approval; under the guidelines set down by the U.S. Voting Rights Act.




game of his team's match.


