## Federal Hate Crimes Law Cited In Lesbian Couples Slaying

WASHINGTON, DC - The U.S. Justice Department invoked the federal hate crimes statute for the first time in a case involving the murder of Gay victims, charging a Maryland man with the deaths of two young New England women killed while camping in Shenandoah National Park in Virginia in 1996.

Attorney General John D. Ashcroft, appearing at a press conference after meeting with the victims' families, said that Darrell David Rice of Columbia, Md., had been charged with killing Julianne Marie Williams, 24, of Burlington, Vt., and Laura S. "Lollie" Winans, 26, of Unity, Maine, the Boston Globe reported.

Rice acted out of hate for women and Gays, the attorney general said.

"Criminal acts of hate run counter to what is best in America, our belief in equality and freedom," Ashcroft said. "The Department of Justice will aggressively investigate, prosecute, and punish criminal acts of violence and vigilantism motivated by hate and intolerance."

In announcing the indictment, Ashcroft spoke at length about his meeting with the parents and about the lives and character of the victims: two Midwesterners who migrated to New England, met and became lovers, and shared a love of science and the outdoors.

"I struggled to express the deep sadness that we feel for the great loss of these families," Ashcroft said. "Julianne Marie and Lollie Winans were young women who loved life and cherished every single day."

Rice, already in prison for assaulting and attempting to abduct a female cyclist in the park more than a year after the Williams-Winans killings, could face the death penalty if convicted of the double murder.

The bodies of the two women were found just off the Appalachian Trail at a crocksite campsite on June 1, 1996. They were bound, and their throats were cut. Rice allegedly told authorities that they "deserved to die because they were Lesbian [expletives]."

The federal hate crimes sentencing law authorizes a stiffer punishment for federal offenses proven to be hate crimes. Some advocates said the fact the law has rarely been applied in a case involving sexual orientation shows a need for Congress to pass legislation expanding protection for Gay Americans.

The current law applies in cases in which people have been targeted because of their race, sex, or national origin as they participated in federally protected actions like attending a public school or voting or in cases in which a federal crime has been alleged. The Williams-Winans killings fall into the second category, because the victims were murdered on federal property and Rice was allegedly motivated by his hatred.

Senator Edward M. Kennedy, Democrat of Massachusetts, has filed legislation that would establish a broader federal hate crimes law, in which crimes against people targeted because of their race, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, or disability would also be federal offenses if prosecutors can prove that a firearm was used or the victim was transported across state lines or if local prosecutors decline to "satisfy the national interest" of affording equal protection.

George W. Bush was criticized as a presidential candidate for not pushing hate crimes legislation, and his administration has come under similar criticism. Asked yesterday whether Rice's indictment will move the Justice Department closer to supporting broader hate crimes legislation, Ashcroft said only that hate crimes legislation filed in Congress is "under review."

"Pending the outcome of that review, we would make an announcement if we chose to support the legislation," the attorney general said.

Kennedy praised the indictment in a statement he released.

"The fact remains, however, if Julianne Marie Williams and Laura Winans had been murdered outside of Shenandoah National Park, the Justice Department would not be able to prosecute the case as a hate crime," Kennedy said. "Until Attorney General Ashcroft supports the hate crimes legislation pending before Congress, his promise to aggressively prosecute hate crimes is an empty promise."

Given the limits of the law, it is unclear what practical effect Ashcroft's decision will have. Rice, charged with premeditated murder, could have faced the death penalty even if the guidelines were not used.

But Betsy Gressler, director of public affairs for the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, said the Justice Department's move has important symbolic value.

"There is certainly a value to identifying it and calling it what it is."

## Students Use Day Of Silence To Support G/L Classmates

WASHINGTON, DC - Thousands of high school and college students around the country vowed not to speak to protest anti-Gay bias in schools.

The silence is meant to draw attention to the isolation that can drive Gay students to higher rates of suicide and substance abuse, the Nando Times and the Associated Press reported.

Some took a nine-hour vow. Others ate at silent lunch tables during the protest, now in its seventh year. Organizers said the Day of Silence has grown from 200 schools a year ago to 1,776 schools in 49 states this year.

"My deliberate silence echoes that silence, which is caused by harassment, prejudice and discrimination," read cards protesters on the Butler University campus gave to passers-by.

A few recipients crumpled cards in

disgust.

In Albany, N.Y., half of the 1,600 students at Bethlehem Central High School pledged silence for the entire school day. At Hellgate High School in Missoula, Mont., about 150 students - amounting to a few in each class - did not speak.

"There are always a few people who are like 'I bet I can get you to talk,' and it's always very satisfying when they can't," said Hellgate senior Michael Parrish, an organizer of the protest.

About 100 students each at Nicolet High School in suburban Milwaukee and Greenwood High School in suburban Indianapolis pledged silence.

An art teacher at a New Albany, Ind., high school wrote assignments on the board in silent solidarity with 40 student protesters at the school.

## Investors Challenge EXXON/Mobil Policy

DALLAS, TX - The Securities and Exchange Commission has refused to let ExxonMobil delete a shareholder resolution from its proxy ballot that would add "sexual orientation" to the energy company's anti-discrimination policy.

The resolution was proposed by a group of shareholders including the New York City Employees Retirement System, Trillium Asset Management and the Human Rights Campaign, the national Gay rights organization that called for a boycott of ExxonMobil last year but kept its shares - and encouraged others to do so - in order to vote on the shareholder resolution.

The measure will come up for a vote as scheduled on May 29 at ExxonMobil's shareholder meeting in Dallas, reported the Gay.com/PlanetOut.com network.

"Everybody else in the industry is moving ahead with this, and Exxon is behind," said Diane Bratcher with the Equality Project, an organization that brings pressure upon publicly traded companies to implement sexual orientation nondiscrimination policies.

"The message to the Gay and Lesbian community is Exxon is not committed to equal opportunity for Lesbians and Gay men. If Exxon does not discriminate and wants to make that clear, it should put it in its policy," Bratcher told the Gay.com/PlanetOut.com Network.

ExxonMobil, which is the world's

largest energy company, says it has always been its policy not to discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation. The company says its opposition to adding the words "sexual orientation" to its current anti-discrimination policy is based on principle.

"We don't agree with the U.S. regulation that requires companies to list criteria for discrimination," company spokesman Tom Cirigliano told the Gay.com/PlanetOut.com Network. "We don't agree with breaking out special groups in any policy. Our policy is we don't discriminate period."

In fact, to that end, Cirigliano says, ExxonMobil has two anti-discrimination policies, one for the United States that includes words such as race, religion, color, etc., and another one for other countries that doesn't mention any specific groups.

This is the fourth shareholder resolution in as many years asking Exxon to add sexual orientation to its policy. While it has never passed, the Equality Project's Bratcher says it continues to gain support, and it will continue to be put up for a vote until ExxonMobil changes its policy.

## ADHS Rules To Revoke Opela's License

TUCSON (ON) - The Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) ruled on April 9 that Tucson Fire Fighter, Franchot Opela, convicted of assaulting an openly Gay man outside a Tucson restaurant in February 2000 should have his state EMT license revoked.

With their decision, ADHS overturned the initial ruling by Administrative Law Judge, Eric Bryant, who had ruled in favor of the fire fighter in March of this year.

In their four page ruling, ADHS cites A.A.C. R9-25-503, which states an applicant for certification, "who is on parole, probation, supervised release, or is presently incarcerated ..." is to be denied certification by the Department.

The ruling goes on to state that persons must be in compliance with the regulations during the applicant period, but also during the time the individual has the certification, something ADHS in the ruling said, was violated in this case, when Opela was convicted of assault, receiving probation from Justice of the Peace, Susan Bacal in July of last year.

ADHS goes on to state in their ruling, that under A.R.S. 36-2211, "based on the circumstances of the case. i.e. the Medical Director exercises discretion, the Department has established, through rule, that in the case of criminal probation status of an EMT applicant or certificate holder, the appropriate penalty is revocation," for which the department states they have issued four previous orders of revocation in other cases.

Opela's status as a paramedic or an employee with the Tucson Fire Department (TFD) hasn't been determined by city officials, since the ruling has been handed down, stating his certification has been revoked, because of the city government's requirement that all TFD employees hold current EMT certification, so whether he still has a position with TFD is still up in the air.

Todd Hale, Opela's attorney in the matter, in two interviews with the morning and afternoon daily newspapers hasn't made clear what route they will take in the case, since the ADHS has ruled, their option is an appeal, within 30 days of the date the ruling was handed down, either through ADHS, something Hale told the Tucson Citizen on April 11, they intend on doing or filing a complaint in Superior Court, for which Opela's counsel told the Arizona Daily Star on April 11 as well.

If the ruling stands pending an appeal, Opela would be terminated from his employment with the City of Tucson.

# Integrated HIV And Substance Abuse Prevention Programs Offered For Latinos In Southern Arizona

TUCSON (ON) - Proyecto Conexión, a multi-agency collaborative effort to provide HIV prevention and substance abuse prevention in the Latino community, has been launched in southern Arizona. Through culturally and linguistically tailored science-based prevention programs, Proyecto Conexión will expand services offered to Latino people living with HIV/AIDS and Latino men who have sex with men.

"HIV prevention efforts with Latino people are vital in maintaining our community's health," stated Oscar Hinojosa, Proyecto Conexión Manager. "In Pima County, Latino men and their sex partners are at high risk for contracting HIV."

One reason for continued risk behavior is substance abuse, which will be addressed through Proyecto Conexión. Another area of service expansion is focusing more HIV prevention effort with people already living with HIV/AIDS to support them in not infecting others. In addition, Proyecto Conexión will work with a range of local service providers to encourage them to conduct HIV and substance abuse risk assessment and service referral with their clients.

A consensus panel of community members and service providers will guide the project throughout development and implementation to ensure appropriate lan-

guage and methods are used to deliver the services.

Southern Arizona AIDS Foundation (SAAF) heads the collaboration, coordinates with the other service providers, and provides HIV prevention services. COPE Behavioral Services provides substance abuse expertise. The Tucson Urban League and La Frontera Center are designing culturally and linguistically competent training for other local service providers. A "continuity of care coordinator" located at El Rio Health Center's Special Immunology Associates office will integrate substance abuse prevention, HIV prevention, and treatment education for people living with HIV. The Pima County Health Department will increase the opportunities for Latino men who have sex with men to be tested for HIV in non-traditional settings such as bars, home parties, and picnics.

"SAAF is very pleased to be working with so many committed local organizations to offer comprehensive services to the Latino community," stated Anne Maley, Executive Director of SAAF. "Prevention is our only cure for AIDS. We must strive to dedicate the community's efforts to promoting health throughout southern Arizona and beyond."

Proyecto Conexión is supported by a recent three-year grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration of the U.S. government. The project has incorporated Salud es Poder, a prevention program of SAAF, which has provided HIV prevention and sexual health promotion to

Latino men who have sex with men for the past nine years. The grant award will expand Salud's services by integrating substance abuse prevention into its activities and enhancing the referral and follow-up processes to reach more Latino men at increased risk.



**'Second Chances Shouldn't Be Wasted'**

A reprieve of sorts was given this past week to Tucson's Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender (GLBT) populace, groups and organizations, by an action taken by a state agency.

Arizona's Department of Health Services (ADHS), on Tuesday, April 9, issued a ruling in the Franchot Opela case, the City of Tucson firefighter, who was convicted (July 2001) of assaulting an openly Gay man outside a Tucson restaurant (February 2000), stating that Opela's state EMT certification should be revoked because of his conviction, currently serving a year's probation for his crime, something for which state law prohibits an individual from holding any state licenses or certifications. Opela has thirty days to appeal the ruling, either to Superior Court by filing suit or requesting another hearing through ADHS.

GLBT Tucsonans owe a collective debt of gratitude to ADHS, for making the right decision, and to the City of Tucson GLBT Commission, for their persistence in pursuing the matter, despite the machinations and roadblocks thrown up by officials within Tucson's city government and the complete lack of a response from the GLBT populace, groups and organizations. The Commission's actions have been vindicated by the ADHS ruling but serious questions remain whether people, groups and organizations will come together and act, as a "community," so that government will respond when another trouble situation, such as the Tucson firefighter arises.

This second chance shouldn't be wasted. Individuals, groups and organizations must now realize that they have a part to play when a crisis or threat develops, paraphrasing the slogan of ACT-UP, the silence as was during the Tucson firefighter situation could have been the death of GLBT rights in Tucson but with this opportunity, thanks to ADHS, every individual, group, club, association and organization must now speak out, act and respond, showing that no individual's rights should be subjugated because of their race, creed, color, national origin, gender identity, etc. There are no excuses acceptable for silence, or not taking any palpable action by any individual, group or organization, when a threat arises, especially for a populace's "center," something people turn to for leadership, guidance, motivation and action.

Wingspan, which purports to be "Tucson's GLBT Community Center," failed as well in the matter of the Tucson firefighter, seeming to get more television sound-bites and quotes in the newspapers than getting a "community" response, such as a march, protest, or a massive letter writing and phone calling campaign, something which high ranking officials in Wingspan had stated they intended on doing, in both the mainstream press and this publication. Their response on this and purported claims of their programs, "community" involvement and overall successes, made by the organization prior, raises serious questions of the intent and purpose of Wingspan, and whether the organization is focused on its purpose and commitment but a second chance is being offered to this organization, something which GLBT Tucsonans can help with.

Wingspan is conducting a survey of Tucson's GLBT populace, to see whether the organization is getting its message across and are they achieving the goals set out by the group. This is an important and very needed step in the right direction for the organization but they need to hear from every GLBT individual, group and organization on this important project ongoing for them since its time for action in the creation and resurrection, of a Tucson GLBT community, with a "community center" focused on the common good of the individual instead of having an organization that has lost its focus on its purpose and commitment, resulting in the organization causing misery instead of striving to end the misery for the people it purports to serve. We hope that this survey will refocus Wingspan, something GLBT Tucsonans needs for the organization to do during these times. **NOTES FROM THE FOR-REAL SIDE**

**'Nap' Time For Barbara**

In late December of 2001, Karl Budinger, a 74-year-old man who was drunk at the time, was checked into the Pima County Jail. Shortly thereafter, he was checked out - dead.

In early April, more than three months after the fact, the forensic pathologist released Mr. Budinger's autopsy report to the press.

The report tells us that the manner of death was "Homicide." It tells us that the cause of death was "blunt impact injury of the head and neck with cervical spine fracture and injury to the underlying spinal cord."

The detailed description of Mr. Budinger's injuries wouldn't fit in this column. The highlights, in general terms, are these: "Blunt impact of head and neck with... Abrasions and contusions... Cervical spine fracture with spinal cord contusion... Blunt impact of trunk with rib and sternal fractures and abrasions and contusions... Blunt impact of extremities with abrasions and contusions."

More specific findings: "Toward the front of the vertex of the head is a 1 inch indentation in the skin with another 1 inch indentation in the upper forehead nearby... There is an unstable fracture of the fifth cervical vertebra with moderate hemorrhage in adjacent soft tissue of the neck which extends toward the right side of the neck near the carotid artery... rib fractures as follows: left fifth anterior, and right 4, 5, 6 and 7 anterolaterally. Ribs 5, 6 and 7 on the right are dislocated at the juncture with the sternum. There is scant soft tissue hemorrhage adjacent to these fractures and dislocations. The sternum is fractured at the second intercostal space with moderate adjacent soft tissue hemorrhage."

There are several things that we don't learn from the autopsy report. The work on it was completed in December. It wasn't released to the press until April. Did any official from the jail request that its release be stalled?

What sort of weapon was used on this poor old drunk? Would it have been made of wood or metal? Had sharp or its length? Would it have had sharp or round edges? Could the pathologist have estimated its length, thickness and weight?

How many blows would have been necessary to cause all of these injuries?

Is it likely that just one of these blows would have been enough to knock the victim out so that the others were delivered "for good measure"?

And aren't questions like these routinely addressed in the autopsies of homicide cases?

The pathologist states that, "This injury was sustained in an altercation with law enforcement officers while decedent was in their custody." "Altercation" is an awfully polite word to have chosen. One dictionary defines it as "a noisy or angry dispute." What the report seems to reflect is someone being methodically beaten to death.

Of course it's not the pathologist's job to tell us who inflicted the mortal beating, but just the bare fact that no one has been indicted for the killing in the last three months makes it reasonable to surmise that the killer was not one of Mr. Budinger's fellow inmates. If that had been the case, an indictment would have followed in about five minutes.

The Sheriff's Department is supposed to produce a report of this incident. One gathers, after three months, that there's no particular time limit within which the report must issue. When and if it does, presumably our County Prosecutor, Barbara LaWall, will take a look at it.

But how long should she wait - three months, six months, a year? Perhaps the time has come for Ms LaWall to awaken from her long winter's nap and bestir herself to find out who killed Karl Budinger, and how, and why.

## 'A Bill Grows And Dies In 1700 West Washington'

Despite no agreement being reached on solving the state's budgetary woes, the current fiscal year's and the billion dollar problem looming for the next fiscal year in July, state lawmakers are still trying to salvage the session by passing legislation of some sorts for the upcoming political campaign.

Bills dealing with matters ranging from the silly, like the football stadium for Phoenix's professional football team, to important issues, such as contraceptive equality, are getting hearings before committees and making their way through the legislative process in an attempt to show the voters in September and November of this year than they can accomplish something, perhaps not on important things like the state's budget, but finally settling that long-simmering issue of how much and where will that waste of taxpayers' money, also known as a football stadium for that loser of a team, is going to be built near which freeway off-ramp.

This past week, legislation of some relevance and importance finally saw the light of day, receiving a committee hearing and consideration on Wednesday, April 10, reviving a proposal to require schools' sex education programs to provide accurate information about sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV.

A similar bill, SB 1157, died in the state Senate earlier this session, the House Natural Resources and Agriculture Committee took an unrelated bill (SB 1425) and replaced its contents with the sex education measure with a strike everything amendment.

Under the new bill, if a school has a sex education program, it would be required to provide instruction that is medically accurate based on information from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"It's very important information

for any sexually active person in this day and age," said state Representative Linda Binder, R-Lake Havasu City, who introduced the strike everything amendment which the committee approved the revamped SB 1425 by a 6-1 margin.

This revival with this bill, was a short-lived one, thanks to the Republican House Speaker, Jim Weiers, who on the following day, April 11, assigned SB 1425 to the House Education Committee, chaired by the ultraconservative, homophobic state Representative, Linda Gray, R-Phoenix, who has stated she will not hear the bill.

So is the issue dead for this session, along with many other good proposals? Not according to proponents of SB 1157 and the second attempt, SB 1425, who plan to use parliamentary maneuvers yet again in an attempt to pass legislation on this important matter, a rarity for this session of Arizona's Legislature who are gearing up for the election that may be even more problematic than trying to enact new laws, especially this year.

On Friday, April 12, a state judge refused to delay the trial on the legality of the state's new congressional and legislative districts which will cause havoc on the upcoming election, since this goal of Maricopa County Superior Court Judge Kenneth Fields is to have all testimony completed by May 20 and then render his decision.

Field's ruling will result in leaving little time for appeal or for the candidates to garner signatures and contributions, (those \$5 kind for individuals running as a "Clean Election candidate"), in whatever district, since the deadline of June 12 stays because for that date to be changed, the U.S. Justice Department must review the matter and give its okay, because of the federal voting rights act, since the state didn't give a damn about minorities, especially when it came to voting, prior to the passage of the voting rights act. Not to say "I told you so" on this matter, but.



**'David Wetstein Cited For Saving Woman's Life**

TUCSON - A waiter at a North Side restaurant saved the life of a choking woman by performing the Heimlich maneuver, a fire captain said.

Wetstein said of his ability to perform the lifesaving maneuver. "I know I picked it up there."

Firefighters rewarded David Wetstein, 44, with a certificate of appreciation last week for aiding the 65-year-old woman, said Katherine Heiden, Northwest Fire District spokeswoman. Wetstein is well known in the local Gay community by his pseudonym Aviva Diamond.

Paramedics arrived minutes later. By then, the woman had recovered.

While people around the woman were panic-stricken, Wetstein remained calm, Heiden said.

"There was a lady clinching her chest, and I asked her if she was having difficulty breathing," said Wetstein. "I told her I would do the Heimlich maneuver on her and just gave a real good yank. Immediately, I heard the air come out."

"He seemed so modest about what he did, yet he really seemed to grasp the importance of knowing how to do this," Heiden said.

Fire Capt. Pete Bidon said he believes Wetstein is a lifesaver.

The woman began choking at 11:25 a.m. March 18 after a chip lodged in her throat, Heiden said.

"The (woman's) airway had been completely obstructed, and she was not breathing," Bidon said.

"By knowing and using the Heimlich maneuver, David saved her life."

Wetstein said it was his third time helping choking customers at Las Margaritas Restaurante at 6011 N. Oracle Road, where he has worked for 21 years, reported the Tucson Citizen.

Heiden said Northwest provides first-aid and CPR classes for \$12 for people living within the district and \$17 for all others. For more information about the classes, call 887-1010.





### 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Tucson LGBT Pride Parade And March Planned

TUCSON (ON) - Organizers have announced that the third annual Tucson LGBT Pride March and Parade will take place Sunday, June 30, 6:00 p.m., at Fourth Avenue Park, continuing the tradition of having a Pride Parade/March in the Old Pueblo.

Participants, according to the organizers, the Lesbian Avengers and OUTrage, are being encouraged to decorate their vehicles (if they plan on participating with them) with electric lights to add to the festive atmosphere of the evening.

Organizers stated that they intend on obtaining city permits for the Pride Parade, which will run approximately \$5,000, and are asking Tucson's LGBT populace to help through sponsorships or entry fees, which are as follows:

Priscilla (Queen of the Desert) - \$1000, which includes entry fee for the float or vehicle and places your name or business on Pride Parade advertising. Your logo will also be placed on a special banner to be displayed at the after-party, (a copy-ready logo is required with check).

Stonewall - \$750, which includes entry fee for the float or vehicle and lists your name or business on advertising and your name will also be placed on a special banner to be displayed at the after party.

Friends of Dorothy - \$500, which includes entry fee for float or vehicle and lists your name or business on parade advertising.

Entry fees are \$200 for a parade float, \$150 for parade car or truck for businesses or organizations, and \$75 for parade cars for individuals.

If people want to just donate some money for the event, organizers stated they can do so as well. For those wanting to be included in the advertising, monies should be in by May 1, after that date, it will cost 10% more to be included in the advertising.



Gressler said. "It's a crime against a group of people. It causes Gay people everywhere to take pause, because there are people out there who hate Gays."

FBI figures show that hate crimes against Gays and Lesbians increased by 17 percent from 1995 to 2000, the last year for which statistics were available.

In the assault case for which Rice has been jailed, he screamed sexual references to the female cyclist, tried to force her into his truck, and then tried to run her over when she resisted, prosecutors said. He plead guilty to attempted abduction and was sentenced to 136 months in prison.




