

Richard Heakin: An Involuntary Contributor To Human Rights In Tucson

TUCSON - Excerpts from the Arizona Daily Star, June 8, 1976: "Charges of first degree murder were filed against four youths yesterday in the beating death early Sunday (June 6, 1976) of a 21-year-old visitor from Lincoln Nebraska. Police found Richard J. Heakin dying outside the Stonewall Tavern, 2921 N. First Ave., shortly before it closed Sunday morning.... the four young suspects were part of a group of 13 youths who were cruising E. Speedway early Sunday morning in four automobiles. The youths had been drinking beer prior to the incident and decided to go to the Stonewall Tavern and "beat up" some homosexuals. (Heakin) died at 1:45 am of a brain injury...."

The four youths who were charged in the death of Heakin in 1976 were ultimately ruled delinquent and received probation until their 21st birthdays. The charges had been reduced to involuntary manslaughter. Is deliberate violence against another person "involuntary?" The violence resulted in Heakin's death no matter what technical legal terms are used to describe the act.

Heakin's death raised the awareness of many in the Tucson community. Tucson Gay Coalition formed at the time and with others in the LGBT community took actions which resulted in adoption by the City of Tucson of a human relations ordinance which prohibits discrimination in public accommodation, employment and housing. Tucson was one of the first cities

to adopt such ordinances.

Many members of Tucson's LGBT community today want to find a means for the people of Tucson to remember Heakin, to be reminded of his involuntary contribution to our community, and to remember his unfortunate death. Efforts have begun to raise funds for a memorial to Heakin consisting of a plaque and bench which the fund raising committee hopes can be placed in a city park. A goal of \$5000 has been set for the fund.

June 6 is the 26th anniversary of Heakin's death. On Thursday evening June 6 the committee will hold a candlelight ceremony at midnight on or near the parking lot of the former "Stonewall Tavern," 2921 N. 1st Avenue. We are asking anyone who would like to participate to bring their own candle or flowers to mark the spot where Heakin died.

During the weekend of June 7, 8 and 9, members of the fund raising committee will be at the doors of local LGBT bars soliciting funds for the memorial fund. On Sunday June 9 and 16 a benefit BBQ will be held at IBT's on N. 4th Ave. See an ad in today's Observer for times and places.

Why Richard Heakin Will Never Leave Tucson

Everyday I wake up a little changed - less likely to quit my job and join the Peace Corp. Less likely to study a map of the Middle East or stand on the street with a sign, proud of a good idea... Everyday I wake up more likely to doubt my efforts - the few hours I've spent attempting to change this world. Yet every day I wake up, Richard Heakin is still only twenty-one years old - unchanged - dead of man-slaughter, beaten outside a Gay bar

in Tucson. Everyday, he's back at it again - reminding us how precious we are; how much love is required to forgive those who slight us, or those who kill us. Everyday, Richard Heakin pursues his lofty ideal: to live in a city and be Gay. To be young and naive. To work and be safe. He continues to take this risk for us, unable to turn his back or second-guess himself - and he is killed again, everyday.

Internet Blocking Law Struck Down

PHILADELPHIA, PA - Gay civil rights advocates joined with free speech activists in celebrating a federal court ruling that overturned the Child Internet Protection Act (CIPA).

A three-judge panel of the U.S. District Court in Philadelphia agreed with arguments made by the American Civil Liberties Union and others that claimed Internet blocking software intended to screen adult material unfairly denied public access to other non-pornographic material online.

The court called blocking software a "blunt instrument" and added that "the [technical] problems faced by manufacturers and vendors of filtering software are legion."

Ann Beeson of the ACLU said the action by the court safeguarded fundamental liberties. "The court today barred the government from turning librarians into thought police armed with clumsy blocking programs."

Beeson said the court rightly determined that the technological sophistication of Internet filtering programs was simply inadequate to prevent their blocking of general interest material. The reliance of the law on these imperfect systems meant that library patrons all over the country

would be deprived of accessing valuable speech online.

CIPA, passed in December 2000, sought to tie crucial federal funding to the mandated use of blocking programs, such as Cyber Patrol and Smartfilter, on online computers in public libraries. Libraries that refused to install these systems faced the loss of millions of dollars.

Libraries were expected to be compliant by July 1.

Despite spirited denials from filter manufacturers, more than 100 pages of testimony and investigation revealed that "tens of thousands" of general interest web pages are wrongly blocked by the programs.

"Any public library that adheres to CIPA's conditions," wrote the panel, "will necessarily restrict patrons' access to a substantial amount of protected speech in violation of the First Amendment."

Ginnie Cooper, the lead plaintiff in the ACLU's lawsuit, said the law as written simply did more harm than good. "No one wants children to be exposed to pornography on the Internet, on television or anywhere else," she said. "What's important is finding effective solutions to this problem."

Psychoanalyst Group Backs G/L Adoption

WASHINGTON, DC - The American Psychoanalytic Association (APsaA) gave its unqualified endorsement to Gay families and would-be Gay and Lesbian parents by saying the interests of the child are best served by having loving parents, regardless of their sexual orientation.

The group said a person's sexual orientation ought not to play any determining factor in laws relating to conception, child rearing, adoption, visitation and custody disputes; and said that evidence suggests Gay individuals and couples are just as capable as other parents.

"Accumulated evidence suggests the best interest of the child requires attachment to committed, nurturing and competent parents," the American Psychoanalytic Association said in a statement. "Evaluation of an individual or couple for these parental qualities should be determined without prejudice regarding sexual orientation."

"The APsaA believes," continued the statement, "that Gay and Lesbian individuals and couples are capable of meeting the best interest of the child and should be afforded the same rights and should accept the same responsibilities as heterosexual parents."

The Human Rights Campaign

praised the statement saying its endorsement of Gay families came at a crucial time. "The children of many same-sex couples live in great risk because some courts and state governments have prevented both parents from having a legal relationship to their own sons and daughters," said the HRC's Lisa Bennett.

"Children in many of these families can be denied insurance coverage or medical care in an emergency," Bennett continued. "If the non-adoptive parent dies before such children turn 18, they can be removed from the only home they know. We hope this policy statement leads to greater protection for these vulnerable children and families," she said.

The APsaA's president, Dr. Newell Fisher, took a firm stand against discrimination in adoptions. He said in his statement that opponents of same-sex adoption often distort the truth.

"It is disturbing to hear about cases in which Gay or Lesbian parents are being denied custody or the right to adopt solely on the basis of their sexual orientation. That's discrimination," said Fisher. "The American Psychoanalytic Association deplores such discrimination and is especially troubled when psychological findings are distorted, misrepresented or blatantly ignored, as is so often the case in these legal decisions."

Scientists at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology may have found a new way to combat HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. The work was reported in the Sunday (June 2) online edition of the journal Nature Medicine. Nobel Prize-winner Dr. Phillip Sharp, leading a team of researchers at MIT, found a form of RNA that can render genes that play a role in HIV infection ineffective.

"What that essentially means is we have an exciting new way to think about how to stop the virus," said Mark Clements, a genetics researcher in the pathology and immunology departments at Washington University in St. Louis who is familiar with the study.

RNA, or ribonucleic acid, carries the blueprint for constructing proteins. The virus needs to construct these proteins to infect healthy cells. If scientists can find a way to shut down this mechanism, they will help stop HIV's ability to destroy healthy cells.

"Scientists have been using this kind of method in other areas in the lab for the past several years," said Clements. "In this case, they aren't going to be able to shut down the virus completely, but it does shut down the expression of the virus, essentially helping to stop the lethal nature of HIV, unless of course, the virus can get around that. Viruses are what you might call 'smart' about such things. They can and they may adapt."

In this particular case, Sharp found that the HIV virus has been reduced using this technique, but the technique does not completely eliminate the virus. If scientists were able to get this technique to work in humans, more than likely, it would have to be used in conjunction with existing

anti-viral drugs to work. HIV-positive patients won't be seeing this procedure being used at their doctors' offices anytime soon. The MIT scientists are still at the lab stage with this technique. They will still have to figure out a way to deliver RNA cells to humans or animals in a way that wouldn't have side effects or interfere with normal biological functions. But, the experts said, proving that the technique works is one positive step toward helping defeat the virus. ...

Connecticut governor John G. Rowland signed 39 bills Monday, June 3, including one that extends certain legal rights to same-sex couples. The bill, which does not specifically mention same-sex couples, allows a person to legally designate another person to make medical decisions and end-of-life choices, such as organ donation and life support. The bill also allows for private visits in nursing homes by legally designated people and requires employers to allow emergency phone calls to their workers from legally designated people.

Those portions of the bill take effect October 1. Another part of the bill orders the legislature's judiciary committee to study the policy issues of Gay marriage and civil unions before next year's legislative session. That portion takes effect immediately. ...

A Farmington, N.M., teenager has been sentenced to 40 years in prison in Cortez, Colo., for the beating death of a 16-year-old Transgendered Navajo. Shaun Murphy, 19, who pleaded guilty February 7

to second-degree murder in the death of Fred Martinez Jr., was sentenced Monday, June 3. Martinez's bludgeoned body was found June 21 near Cortez.

Last month Murphy had sought to withdraw his appeal but later changed his mind. During the sentencing hearing, Martinez's mother, Pauline Mitchell, asked district court judge Sharon Hanson for the maximum 48-year sentence. "All you ever said was you bug-smashed a fag," Mitchell said to Murphy, referring to his boasts after the killing. "You felt the rock break his skull, and you left him to die."

Murphy told investigators that he accompanied Martinez to a shallow canyon near Cortez to smoke marijuana. Before his plea, defense attorneys argued that Murphy had acted in self-defense when he hit Martinez with a rock on his head, hands, and stomach; Martinez's body was discovered five days later.

"No one knows exactly what happened," Hanson said, turning to Murphy. "But you knew you injured someone, and you didn't even make an anonymous call saying someone was hurt."

Gay rights advocates had raised the question of whether Martinez was killed because of his sexual orientation and gender identity. He sometimes dressed in girl's clothes and was considered Transgendered. Most of Murphy's family, including the Lesbian partners of his mother and aunt, said he would never kill a Gay person. "I don't believe my son did it," said Angel Taboronte, Murphy's mother.

In arguing for the maximum sentence, prosecutor Joseph Olt Jr. said that prior to the hearing Murphy attempted to cut through the bars of his prison cell, threatened to assault a guard, and was placed in lockdown for cursing at a guard. ...

Alberta Hamm ran on a diversity platform in her recent campaign for student government president at a central Pennsylvania community college. Hamm, who was a biological man for nearly 50 years, became Harrisburg Area Community College's first Transgendered Student Government Association president last week.

"I want to educate, embrace, empower everyone, every day, everywhere. And I think that should be a model for our student government," said Hamm, a 61-year-old who used to go by the name Albert Hamm, who said she feels accepted at the college, married and had a daughter before making the decision to become a woman. She then resigned from her position as church elder and moved to another part of the state, she said. Last July she underwent surgery to become a woman. Hamm works at a department store in a Harrisburg-area mall. "I knew I was born a woman, so I just took the necessary changes to become a woman," she said.

Trum Simmons, senior professor of English at the college, said some students don't know what to make of Hamm. "It's a mind blower," Simmons said. "It certainly was for me at first. But once somebody gets to know Alberta, so many stereotypes or misconceptions fade away."

Hamm, who said she has received mixed reactions from family members, said she often speaks to classes or health care

Tony Award Winners Include Plays by Edward Albee & Noel Coward

NEW YORK, NY - Once again it was great to be Gay at the Tony Awards.

The frothy musical *Thoroughly Modern Millie*, conceived by Dick Scanlan, won the evening with six trophies at Sunday's (June 2) 56th annual Tony Awards, including Best Musical, Best Actress, and Best Supporting Actress.

Out playwright Edward Albee beat out tough competition—including Ivan Turgenev—to take Best Play for his *The Goat or Who is Sylvia?* while *Private Lives*, by the late Noel Coward, took Best Revival, Play. Stephen Sondheim's *Into the Woods* bested the vaunted London production of *Oklahoma!* for Best Revival, Musical.

The evening's loser was the CBS network, which, in its efforts to keep the show on time, forced first-time Tony winner Elaine Stritch offstage for a commercial break during her emotional acceptance speech for *Elaine Stritch at Liberty*, which received the Special Theatrical Event prize. She told reporters backstage that she was "very, very upset. It's spoiled it for me. I know CBS can't let anyone give the Gettysburg Address just because they won a Tony award. But they should have given me my time."

Study Says Gays and Lesbians Key to Economic Growth

NEW YORK, NY - The New York Times reported on Saturday, June 1, there is a growing convergence of opinion among city planners and civic officials across the country that attracting Gays, Lesbians and artists to blighted urban cores is the key to revitalization.

Gary Gates, a researcher at the Washington-based Urban Institute, and Richard Florida, a professor of regional economic development at Carnegie Mellon University, say that towns and cities succeed economically when they attract what the researchers have dubbed the "creative class."

In his new book, "The Rise of the Creative Class," Florida explains that the creative class is not composed simply of musicians, painters and writers, but encompasses everyone who "thinks for a living" — doctors, lawyers, scientists, engineers, entrepreneurs and computer programmers, for example.

The core of Gates and Florida's theories are not especially new. The rise of the "thinking" or "creative class" has been

noted by sociologists for decades. These creative/thinking professionals, dubbed "bourgeois bohemians" or "Bobos" by journalist David Brooks, now account for some 30 percent of the workforce.

The Times notes that according to conventional economic theory, workers choose to live in cities that offer them the highest-paying jobs in their fields. But creative-class workers, Florida says, choose cities for their tolerant environments and diverse populations as well as good jobs.

This is where Gay people and bohemians come in. Trendy bars, fashionable restaurants and specialty boutiques that emerge in areas with high concentrations of Gay people add to the draw of these places by communicating the presence of an open-minded and varied community.

It is no coincidence that towns and cities with high Gay populations are more likely to have creative-class workers, high-tech industry and, as a result, strong economic growth. "You cannot get a technologically innovative place unless it's open to weirdness, eccentricity and difference," Florida says.



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It is almost to the halfway point of 2002 with the calendar hitting the month of June, and in Arizona, elections will be held for Arizona's Legislature, as a panel of three Federal judges ruled on May 30, that voters can elect state legislators with the map devised, delayed, screwed up and revised, by the Independent Redistricting Commission.

This ruling only applies for this election only since a trial on the state legislative map, plus the new boundaries for Arizona's eight Congressional Districts, for a myriad of allegations, will take place, January 2003, in Phoenix, most likely being televised by Court T.V.

So the campaign has started, for this map and most likely, for this election only, with the incumbents, their challengers and candidates scrambling for signatures (from both the old and new districts, thanks to a law passed during this past legislative session) and contributions, especially those pesky "Clean Election" kind, where it's \$5 from a registered voter, of the same party within the political district and must be obtained by June 12, the filing deadline for petitions and "Clean Election" contributions to be verified and certified.

It has been a confusing time for Arizona politics, with the mess created by the redistricting process, throwing a monkey wrench into the potential candidacies and raising questions about seeking other offices. So what of those openly Gay state legislative candidates who had announced their intentions earlier in this year, only to end up, watching, waiting and most likely worrying?

Will the first openly Gay state Representative, Ken Chevront, D-Phoenix, continue his bid for the upper chamber or will the revised map put a crimp in that and if so, what happens to Peter Moraga's bid for the Arizona House from the same district as part of a team (including Chev-

ront) of candidates? What is openly Gay state Representative Steve May's, R-Paradise Valley, intention? Another term in the House, possibly becoming the next Speaker, the State Senate, or perhaps a higher office? How do the new lines affect the candidacies of Thom Von Hapsburg, Robert Meza, Wally Straughn and Jack Jackson Jr.? Do their campaign's continue after the approval of the revised maps?

As of press time, Sam Wercinski, the openly Gay Democratic candidate for the Arizona House from the new District 11 has filed his petitions and "Clean Election" contributions for verification and certification. Wercinski is one of the very few, either straight or Gay, who has filed, so the answer to many of these questions posed will be given, after the June 12 deadline.

Not so for openly Gay state Representative Ed Poelstra, R-Tucson, who is running in the new central district, District 28, and Jesse George, who is running as a Democratic candidate for the Arizona House from the new Westside district, Legislative District 27.

When asked by this reporter, Jesse George stated his campaign is in the process of gathering more signatures to file and the \$5 "Clean Election" contributions before the June 12 deadline, and Representative Ed Poelstra said he's spending the time before June 12, collecting the needed signatures to qualify for the ballot.

What type of help are they getting from Tucson's Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender (GLBT) voting populace during this time, the month that "Pride" is

to be celebrated? Minimal to non existent for both bids, again as of press time, a week before the deadline.

It is an interesting irony that a series of activities is being planned to commemorate the date of the Stonewall Riots and the birth of the modern GLBT rights movement, in Tucson, with activity going on that hasn't been seen in many years but when it comes to something as important, protecting the rights gained by making sure openly GLBT or supportive candidates are elected, a lot of hollow, empty promises have been made with little to show for it, resulting in two campaign's, Poelstra's and George's, being left to "swing in the wind."

During the sixth month of the calendar, GLBT citizens, in Arizona and across the globe, are supposed to stand up for who they are, be proud of themselves and for what has been accomplished in all aspects of life and most importantly, they should be speaking out, demanding their full, equal rights entitled to them under the law which haven't been gained during the struggle - for which an avenue for this "voice" is to get involved in the political arena, especially during an election year but Tucson's GLBT populace is remaining silent during this important time - a big mistake.

Arizona has new maps, for at least this election and what is the upcoming political reality, most likely the Republican's will regain a majority in the Arizona Senate and maintain their majority in the Arizona House but all isn't lost, since coalitions can and have been formed to get matters of importance through the process

as recent history has shown with the success of the repeal of Arizona's archaic laws in 2001.

It is those coalitions that Tucson's GLBT populace must work to build, or reinforce for the next legislative session, by making sure openly GLBT or supportive candidates are put into office, so the time is now for action, by either volunteering your time or giving a monetary contribution of some amount to help, especially in the cases of Jesse George and state Representative Ed Poelstra, both of whom need our help immediately!

Jesse George is facing a contested primary, which in all likelihood will decide

'To Paraphrase...'

Dear LGBT Activists:

To paraphrase Benjamin Disraeli, there are lies, damned lies and bad polls.

The Log Cabin Republicans now tout a highly skewed, unscientific and unweighted poll to make a shameless argument that the Gay and Lesbian community is most keen on same-sex marriage, and much less so about employment nondiscrimination.

This sleight of hand, we guess, is intended to throw camouflage on national Log Cabin's indefensible waffling on ENDA. After all, as the national Log Cabin leadership would ask, if the community really isn't behind ENDA and instead craves Gay marriage, shouldn't that be our priority?

First of all, ENDA is before Congress now. The vote in the Senate will take place sooner rather than later. The political test of our civil rights is within our generation's grasp. We cannot afford to take our eyes off the prize.

If it's authentic polling data we need, and specifically public opinion research that is scientifically weighted and respected - check out the Harris Poll conducted online last June when 95% of LGBT individuals surveyed said they favored federal legislation to secure job nondiscrimination. What's more, so did 6 out of 10 heterosexuals.

If a bold majority of the American people and almost all GLBT individuals favor ENDA - how can the Republican Party and its Log Cabin wing stand in our way?

Moreover, the Harris findings, unlike the Zogby numbers, are conducted

according to ethical standards of disclosure adopted by the National Council on Public Polls, and are weighted demographically with a statistical sampling error plus or minus 3 percent.

In contrast, the Zogby conclusions are not weighted at all, do not conform to any polling standards, and are not projectable - the raw online sampling means nothing more or less about the attitudes of Gays and Lesbians on public policy. Earlier such Zogby/OpusComm research also reported that Gays and Lesbians, on average, earn almost 40% more than heterosexuals - an absurd and inaccurate claim of Gay affluence. Their raw numbers do not add up.

Finally, why should we buy the national Log Cabin argument about which of our priorities matters most and must come first? We must seek employment nondiscrimination and our full civil rights, including legal marriage. Why should we settle for less?

It's clear that the national Log Cabin Republicans will settle for neither, given their public agenda now is to simply distract us from our historic vote this year on Capitol Hill to secure passage of a federal ENDA - and, if the votes aren't there, somehow try to blame Representative Barney Frank rather than the Republican leadership of the House. Bad judgment, bad polls, and bad politics do not add up.

My quick thoughts - and those of many others, I suspect.

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
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
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Federation of Gay Games Applauds Ticket Sales Launch for Gay Games VI

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

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Record Turnout For G/L Pride In Brazil

SAO PAULO, Brazil - A record number of Lesbians and Gays marched through Sao Paulo, Brazil, Sunday, June 2, in what is being described as Latin America's biggest Gay pride celebration.

A sea of rainbow flags and the blare of disco and techno beats accompanied the hundreds of thousands of Lesbians, Gay men, transvestites and drag queens who marched a three mile route near the Praca da Republica, a downtown square that is home to many Gay bars and clubs.

Local police estimated the number of revelers at 400,000, twice as many that took part in last year's parade.

Organizers of the event attributed the unusually large turnout to the presence of non-Gay supporters who sympathize with the country's Gay rights movement.

A brigade of women motorcycle drivers - members of the Association of Women Who Love Women - opened the parade on Avenida Paulista, one of Sao Paulo's main avenues, as the city's Gay-friendly mayor Marta Suplicy, kicked off the festivities by saying she was proud of being the mayor of a city that serves as a showcase for Gay rights.

"Heterosexual couples are here with their children because they don't want them to grow up with prejudice," said Beto de Jesus, president of the Association for GLBT Pride. "They (heterosexuals) are important opinion makers that help demystify and shatter stereotypes."

Feinberg's first novel, Stone Butch Blues, won the prestigious American Library Association Award for Gay and Lesbian Literature and a LAMBDA Literary Award in 1994. Feinberg's other award winning and highly praised works include Transgender Warriors: Making History from Joan of Arc to RuPaul, Trans Liberation: Beyond Pink or Blue, and Trans Gender Liberation: A Movement Whose Time Has Come.

workers about her choice. "I want to inform and educate in reference to Transgender issues," she said. "I spent most of my life knowing I was a woman. If I can prevent one individual from going through the hell I've been through, it's worth it."

Christine Todd Whitman, who is a member of the Bush cabinet as administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, issued a statement to EPA employees on Friday, May 31, in honor of Gay Pride Month. The statement reads:

"As Americans, we have long been a united people of many differences. Every generation throughout our history has boasted tremendous variety in its members—ethnicity, economic background, race, and religion and in other qualities, attributes, and circumstances that define the individual. We stand together today as a nation of independent men and women whose guarantees of freedom and equal opportunity remain coupled with shared responsibilities to respect the differences among us. Clearly, discrimination based on sexual orientation cannot be tolerated in the workplace. Let us all work to ensure that sexual orientation is recognized among the differences that help distinguish us but not divide us.

"The observance of Gay and Lesbian Pride Month in June offers each of us a chance to reaffirm our commitment to promoting tolerance, understanding, and communication in our communities and in the workplace. The Office of Civil Rights and the Gay, Lesbian, or Bisexual Employees organization are cosponsoring activities here in Washington and throughout the Regions. I encourage all EPA employees to explore opportunities to participate in these events."

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
