



## GOP Sweeps; GLBT

### Leaders Ponder Impact

WASHINGTON, DC - The Republican Party gained control of both the Senate and the House of Representatives in Tuesday's national midterm elections, and Gay political leaders had mixed reactions about what the GOP sweep could mean for GLBT Americans.

The Log Cabin Republicans (LCR) celebrated the victory and called it "an indictment of the Gay community's continued reliance on" the Democratic Party, which has traditionally been more supportive of GLBT issues.

"It's time the Gay community re-examined its blind allegiance to the Democratic Party and builds a truly bipartisan movement," said Rich Tafel, executive director of LCR, the nation's largest Gay GOP group.

"We have a chance to advance our issues now in a bipartisan fashion, with real results," Tafel said, citing the need to "work as a community with leaders in both parties."

Despite being a bipartisan group, the Human Rights Campaign - the nation's largest Gay and Lesbian political organization - endorsed 17 Republican candidates out of more than 200 endorsements, according to its Web site.

HRC acknowledged that the GOP victory presents a "new, rocky political terrain on Capitol Hill," but the group's leaders said that bipartisanship will be a key strategy during the next two years, the Gay.com/PlanetOut.com network reported.

"Over the years, we have built a strong bipartisan approach, and this will serve not only as a bulwark against harm, but will ensure some key Republican (congressional) members will continue to push forward on issues of concern to GLBT Americans," said Elizabeth Birch, HRC executive director, in a written statement.

But Lorri Jean, executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), called it a "fallacy" to expect a GLBT-inclusive "big tent" under President George Bush.

"It is indisputable that the vast majority of pro-Gay congresspeople are Democrats, and that most Republican congresspeople are not pro-Gay," she said.

"Where the long-term impact is going to be felt is with the conservative judges that are likely to be appointed by a conservative, Republican-controlled Congress," Jean continued.

"When our community has been unable to make progress on Capitol Hill because of the disproportionate influence of anti-Gay religious political extremists, we

have been able to make progress in the courts. As more conservative judges are appointed, this will be more difficult."

John Marble, media and field director of the National Stonewall Democrats, noted that his organization will have to become more aggressive on the grass-roots level to block potential anti-Gay judicial appointments that may now be approved by the Senate.

"We may have to take our case more to the court of public opinion than to the senators," he said.

Noting that the new political climate could also lead to more anti-GLBT legislation, the NGLTF put the GOP on notice for better results.

"The outcomes in this election now allows the party of the 'compassionate conservative' to show how truly compassionate they are," said NGLTF's Jean.

## Kentucky GSA Protested

CANNONSBURG, KY - More than 2,000 people gathered in a church parking lot Sunday, November 3, to protest a vote that permits a Gay-rights student group to meet at Boyd County High School.

Opponents of the Gay-Straight Alliance urged the school to ban the group, and they signed petitions and donated money for a legal fund. They also urged the school to set up classes that teach both tolerance and that homosexuality is wrong. Last month the school's teacher-parent council voted 3-2 to let the alliance meet at school. Twice before the council had rejected the request but changed its decision after a letter from the American Civil Liberties Union said the rejection violated the Equal Access Act, which says all extracurricular clubs must be treated alike.

David Miller, vice president of Citizens for Community Values, a Cincinnati pro-family activist group, told those attending the rally across the street from the high school that they can serve as an example for others who oppose Gay rights organizations in schools. "Your stand, your courage, is going to lead the way," said Miller. Members of the alliance did not attend the rally. Some have said they have been spat on, subjected to slurs, and threatened with violence. "Homosexual kids always have it toughest. They're the ones who are ostracized for being different," said Tim Dail, 20, a Boyd County High graduate who attended the rally even though he opposed its message.

## Canada Outlines Same-Sex Union Options

OTTAWA, Canada - The country could have legislation on same-sex unions by spring. The announcement was made by Justice Minister Martin Cauchon as he released a consultation paper setting out the possibilities, reported 365Gay.com

The paper makes no recommendations, but tells the Commons justice committee there are four possibilities: do nothing, give Gays and Lesbians full marriage rights, create civil union legislation or leave marriage solely in the hands of religious institutions.

"The purpose of the discussion paper is to provide the standing committee with straightforward, contextual information about the legal and social issues concerning marriage and the legal recognition of conjugal relationships, both in Canada and in other jurisdictions," a Justice Department statement said.

The committee will begin public hearings this winter. Cauchon said he expects a report with a recommendation by spring with legislation to be introduced in the House shortly after that.

Gay and Lesbian couples have taken the federal government to court in British Columbia, Ontario and Quebec, challenging the legal definition of marriage as "a union between one man and one woman to the exclusion of all others." The Gay couples in British Columbia have appealed to the provincial Supreme Court, and Ottawa is appealing the pro-Gay decisions in Ontario and Quebec.

Several of the couples involved in the suits scoffed at Cauchon's options, saying nothing short of full legal marriage is acceptable. They say unless Parliament removes the restrictions on marriage, they will fight all the way to the Supreme Court of Canada.

One of the couples, Michael Hendricks and Rene LeBoeuf of Montreal, told 365Gay.com they believe the minister is attempting "a smokescreen" to strengthen the government's position in the appeals court.

"We intend to go to the Supreme Court of Canada, if they will hear us, to seek full equality under the law. In fact, a Supreme Court decision in our favor is important because it will create the jurisprudence necessary to assure that Gays and Lesbians will have full civil equality in Canada forever," Hendricks said

"We want to make it clear to the minister that modifying the definition of marriage to include same-sex couples is the only option which is viable, constitutional and fair," said John Fisher, Egale's executive director. "This is a simple question of equal dignity and respect.

A Gay member of the Ontario legislature agrees. "The equal recognition of same-sex relationships must be the starting point for any legislative initiative. The equality provisions of the Charter are not up for debate," said George Smitherman.

The issue has divided the federal government.

If the justice committee recommends changes to the status quo, "there's going to be a major can of worms," said Toronto Liberal MP Tom Wappel.

Another Toronto area Liberal, Dan McTeague, said: "I didn't think that this would rate as one of the more important issues."

Wappel and McTeague led a revolt within the party when the government brought in legislation granting spousal benefits to same-sex couples. To get the bill passed, the government was forced to add a clause reiterating its support for "traditional" marriage.

Opposition Leader Stephen Harper said Thursday that he is opposed to marriage, but indicated he might be prepared to support civil unions.

"There are several options in this paper that are ultimately consistent with our goal of preserving the traditional definition of marriage," he said.

## TPD To Report Walsted Murder As Hate Crime

TUCSON - Wingspan recently obtained a copy of the full Tucson Police Department (TPD) Report regarding the June 12, 2002, murder of the openly Gay man, Philip Walsted.

This report included transcripts of interviews conducted by TPD, one of which stated that they thought the alleged perpetrator had committed the crime because the victim was Gay. When asked by TPD about a reason for the crime, the witness responded, "I don't know, I think it was because this guy was Gay." This line was not probed further, Wingspan believed that this was a hate crime and met with TPD police detectives, resulting in TPD announcing that it will report the murder to the FBI, as a hate crime, something many staff members of Wingspan expressed their pleasure over the decision.

Walsted, 24, had been an employee with American Airlines. He had been severely beaten with a baseball bat on June 12, and was found alive but died shortly thereafter at a local hospital. Police arrested David Higdon for the crime and charged him with first-degree murder. Prosecutors have not stated whether they will utilize the state's hate crimes law in this matter.

## Transgender Day Of Remembrance November 20

TUCSON - On Wednesday, November 20, Tucson community members will gather for a candlelight vigil to remember those Transgender people who have been killed due to anti-Transgender hatred or prejudice.

The candlelight vigil and service of remembrance will begin at 6:00 pm at Catalina Park, located at 4th Avenue and 2nd Street. Following the vigil, there will be a silent march down 4th Avenue, ending with a reception at Wingspan, 300 E. 6th Street.

The National Day of Remembrance recognizes and remembers Transgender people who have been killed due to anti-Transgender hatred or prejudice. It is an acknowledgment of the bigotry and intolerance that still exists in our country and even our community.

The event is held in November to honor Rita Hester, whose murder on November 28, 1998 kicked off the "Remembering Our Dead" web project and a San Francisco candlelight vigil in 1999. Rita Hester's murder — like most anti-Transgender murder cases — has yet to be solved.

According to the National Day of Remembrance web site ([www.gender.org/remember/day/](http://www.gender.org/remember/day/)), over the last decade, more than one person per month has died due to Transgender-based hate or prejudice, regardless of any other factors in their lives. This trend shows no sign of abating — there have been 25 reported deaths since the last Day of Remembrance. **NOTES FROM THE FOR-REAL SIDE**

All over the United States, not just here in Tucson, the job of city court judge has traditionally been regarded as an appropriate political patronage plum to be given as a reward for faithful party service. The thinking was that city court generally gives out rather modest penalties that can always be appealed, so, even if the job fell to political hacks who didn't know much law, they couldn't do much harm.

The theory wasn't that unreasonable. Even if a law-abiding citizen got caught up in the court, even if the cops lied to convict him, even if the whole thing was part of a municipal extortion scam, even if the judge walked all over the Constitution to convict, the harm done to the individual citizen was more of an annoyance than anything else. John Q. paid a small fine, grumbled under his breath and forgot about it.

All that changed when we as a society decided to give up our privacy to the internet. Soon all misdemeanors are going to be available on the net (if they're not all there now). Now prospective employers, in ever increasing numbers, feel that they can ask job applicants about their misdemeanors. And now applicants had better own up.

In Arizona you can't presently get a license to sell real estate unless you explain any misdemeanor to the licensing authority and they decide to forgive you.

Since the lack of privacy that the internet has established has made it matter what happens in city courts, it's time to get serious about this heretofore humble institu-

tion and require that the judges who run it know something about the law.

The current requirements to be a judge: You must be of good moral character. You must be a resident of Arizona for one year immediately preceding recommendation. You must have been admitted to the practice of law in Arizona for five years immediately preceding recommendation.

These requirements provide a large pool of candidates from which the politicians can choose. They do not, unfortunately, guarantee that the chosen will know much about criminal law or how to run a court.

Admittedly, if they've been admitted to practice law they've been to law school, but it's not unusual for a law school to require only six semester hours of criminal law. You'd learn less law in six semester hours than you'd learn from a season of watching LAW AND ORDER. Incidentally, the UA law school only requires two semester hours of criminal law.

And of course the vast majority of lawyers don't practice criminal law. Judging from a quick glance at the Tucson yellow pages, eighty percent of ours are doing other things. But the requirements for the court don't say you have to have practiced law of any kind. They merely say that you have to have been admitted to practice it.

Prospective city court judges have to go through something called the "non-

partisan merit selection commission," whose membership is determined in part by party affiliation. They should have called it "bipartisan." This is where the rubber meets the road, and the results are exactly what you'd expect.

I won't characterize the level of legal knowledge of our city magistrates. That would be unkind, especially coming from a non-lawyer. But if you ever happen to wander through their courtrooms, don't be surprised to hear the phrase, "I really don't know what the law is in this instance, but I'm going to rule for..."

If we ever decided to have a serious city court, because of the internet or whatever, we could do it with a far less complicated selection process than we currently have. Any half dozen criminal law professors could come up with a 500-question multiple choice test that would separate the extremely knowledgeable from the knowledgeable from the less than knowledgeable.

Forget about law school, admission to the bar, and past legal practice. Let anyone walk in and take the test for a fee often bucks. Then hire the people who actually know something about what they're supposed to be doing.

Let it remain a patronage job if you must, but let's limit the plums to partisans who at least have a passing interest in criminal law.

**Gay Icon Jonathan Harris of 'Lost in Space' Dies**

ENCINO, CA - The Associated Press reports that Jonathan Harris, the "flamboyantly fussy" actor who portrayed the dastardly antagonist Dr. Zachary Smith on the 1960s sci-fi show *Lost in Space*, has died. He was 87.

Harris died from a blood clot in his heart while receiving therapy hospital for a chronic back problem, family spokesman Kevin J. Burns said.

Born Jonathan Charasuchin in the Bronx, N.Y., to Russian Jewish immigrant parents, Harris adopted the stage persona of a classically trained British actor, with his grandiloquent accent, crisp enunciation, and professorial manner. When people would ask him if he was from England, Harris would confess, "Oh, no, my dear, just affected," according to Burns, a longtime friend and director of the 1998 documentary *Lost in Space Forever*. Harris also worked with Pixar Animation Studios in recent years, supplying the voice of Manny the praying-mantis magician in *A Bug's Life* and the elderly doll repairman in *Toy Story 2*.

*Lost in Space*, which ran on CBS from 1965 to 1968, was a science-fiction takeoff on the Swiss Family Robinson story in which the castaway clan was trapped amid the uncharted fathoms of space instead of on a deserted island. Harris's character, Dr. Smith, was a saboteur who caused the Robinson family's ship, *Jupiter II*, to fly off course—but he also found himself trapped with them in the craft.

## Scam Artist At Work In Tucson GLBT Community

A diabolical scam is being perpetrated in our local GLBT community. It goes like this. The scammer works from a list of names and phone numbers. He calls a local Gay man (no Lesbians have reported so far). He says that he is so-and-so from Tucson calling from another city (San Diego, LA, Phoenix so far) and tells the unwitting Gay man that he has been Gay bashed and is in serious condition (broken arm, leg or nose, etc) and since the 'bashers' took all his money he needs to pay the emergency room and other bills so he can get back to Tucson.

How does this work - easy. For example he picks up a copy of the Observer. Sees a business card with a name and telephone number and assumes that identification. Or he looks at the classifieds. Plenty of names and numbers there. Check out the calendar page and you can pick up a lot more. Most of these names are familiar to members of our community. The scammer is apparently quite convincing because of the number of victims so far. He could use club or organizational lists and call up a club member and try his scam. If at first he doesn't succeed he will try again with another name and another phone number.

This little scheme (scam) has worked on several of our local community. Some report losses in the hundreds of dollars.

Tucsonans beware. This is a serious situation and we warn you to use your head when anyone asks for your money as described above. Be sure you are talking to the real person.

Scott Blades, executive director of TIHAN, whose name is well known in the community, was used by the caller. The scammer usually calls in the middle of the night awakening the victim with his tale of lies, and apparently has been quite successful in convincing the victim of who he is and makes his story so sad that the victim falls for the scam, wires money to a Western Union office in specified city and then goes on to another victim.

The Tucson Police Department has been alerted to this scam. If you should, by chance, get a call as we have described, get as much information as you can (caller ID, or the Western Union number, city etc). Call the Tucson Police Department and ask for officer Wycoff, 791-4444.

The Reverend Tim York, who is pastor at the Heritage Temple Free Will Baptist Church in Cannonsburg and president of the Boyd County Ministerial Association, put the crowd size at 2,350. York said the association organized the rally because "we are concerned about homosexuality being promoted on school time as a normal lifestyle." The rally was the latest round in a battle over whether a small group of students can gather occasionally at the school for meetings of the new club. The 30-member student group has started an uproar in the community. More than 400 of the school's 990 students skipped school November 4 in protest of the council's decision to allow the group to meet.

High students Douglas Duncil, 17, and Bretnic Hall, 15, said they are considering transferring to another school because of the alliance and that other students also are thinking about going elsewhere. "It's very unfair," said Duncil, who said the senior class was organizing another school boycott. "The homosexuals, or whatever you want to call them, seem to get more rights throughout our school."

### Queer As Folk Cleared By Canadian Censors

TORONTO, Canada - The Canadian Broadcast Standards Council ruled Wednesday that the U.S. version of Queer as Folk contains "sexually explicit" content without being exploitative, says The Hollywood Reporter.

The panel ruled in response to a viewer complaint about the show, noting that broadcaster Showcase Television had not aired sufficient viewer advisories about the program's content. The complaining viewer wrote the council that she was "appalled to see blatant, explicit sexual acts playing on [her] television screen," but the censors concluded that the show's content did not breach the Canadian Association of Broadcasters' sex-role portrayal code and that it was "not exploitative of either males or females."

In other Queer as Folk news, Variety reports that six members of the show's cast (Peter Paige, Gale Harold, Thea Gill, Scott Lowell, Michelle Clunie, and Randy Harrison) entered into collective bargaining, empowering lawyers Peter Nelson and Bruce Gellman to negotiate for them. Nelson recently successfully negotiated raises for The West Wing's supporting cast, and he triumphed again, getting fourfold raises for the sextet from Showtime. The actors will now make salaries per episode in the mid five-figure range for the show's third season.

Speakers urged Sunday's after-church crowd to resist what they said was a national homosexual agenda that has targeted this part of northeastern Kentucky. There was frequent applause and "amen"s. "Most places where I fight this, the liberals are in charge. But I think they made a mistake by pushing this in this community," said Scott Lively, an attorney who is president of Abiding Faith Ministries of Sacramento, Calif. Lively was retained by the Boyd County Ministerial Association. Boyd County could become a model for the rest of the nation, Lively said, if it follows his idea to get rid of the club by replacing it with a class that would teach tolerance for Gays. Speakers stressed nonviolence and urged that club members not be bullied but made it clear they consider homosexuality to be a personality disorder that can be "cured."

Lively cited statistics he said prove a Gay person runs a greater risk of dying of AIDS than a smoker does of dying of lung cancer. "We're not going to have a Marlboro club, but we're going to have a homosexual club," Lively said. "Does that make sense?"

The alliance and its teacher-adviser, Kaye King, said in a statement issued Friday by the ACLU that opponents of the group "should respect our right to meet. We ask for tolerance if acceptance is not part of others' belief systems." But Boyd County

# Gay World In Brief. . . . .

## Prince Charles' Valet Says He Was Raped By A Man

LONDON, UK - The British royal family was faced with further awkward revelations after a former servant of Prince Charles's said in a newspaper interview that he was raped by another man on the staff. Prince Charles's office has said the allegations were investigated internally and by police and that there was no basis for prosecution.

George Smith a former royal valet, told The Mail tabloid he was assaulted by one of Charles's servants in 1989. Smith, who was 29 and married with two children at the time, said he was invited to the man's home for lunch; given gin, beer, and champagne; and raped as he slept on a sofa. The alleged attacker was not identified in the report.

Smith was quoted as saying the man also tried to assault him while they accompanied Prince Charles on a visit to Cairo. The law firm Kingsley Napley later released a statement on behalf of the unnamed alleged rapist, denying Smith's claims. "The allegations made now to The Mail on Sunday by Mr. Smith differ substantially and significantly in many regards from those made to the police last year and must cast serious doubt on Mr. Smith's reliability and the accuracy of any allegations he might be persuaded to make."

The allegation of rape was one of the sensational claims to emerge from the trial of Princess Diana's former butler, Paul Burrell, who was acquitted on November 1 of stealing items from her estate after Queen Elizabeth II revealed she knew he took the items for safekeeping. The jury heard Diana was said to have kept a tape recording of the alleged rape victim talking about the incident, but no names were revealed. According to The Mail on Sunday, Smith, a former soldier who served in the Falklands conflict, told Diana of the alleged rape in 1996, and she recorded his accusations. The newspaper claimed she deposited the cassettes, one labeled "The Confessions of George Smith" in a locked mahogany box. Last week Charles's office at St. James's Palace said the alleged victim did not raise the issue until 1996. It said in a statement the allegation was fully investigated but not reported to the police, since "no evidence was forthcoming and because the person concerned did not want to pursue the matter further."

## Vatican Affirms Opposition To Condoms To Fight AIDS

VATICAN CITY - The Vatican reiterated its opposition to condom use to fight AIDS, saying chastity is the best way to prevent the spread of HIV, reported gfn.com.

The Roman Catholic Church has argued that condoms do not offer 100 percent protection, said Monsignor Javier Lozano Barragan, president of the Pontifical Council for Health Workers. There is only one way to prevent HIV from spreading, Barragan said Wednesday. "We say that prevention...is called chastity."

The Vatican has been criticized for its steadfast opposition to condom use, especially in poor regions such as Africa that have been devastated by the epidemic. Developing countries are home to more than 90 percent of the world's 37.1 million HIV-infected people. Seventy percent of these, or 26 million people, live in sub-Sa-

haran Africa.

Two years ago in the Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano, Monsignor Jacques Suadeau of the Pontifical Council for the Family hinted at a possible softening of the church's stance, saying condoms are one of the ways to "contain" the spread of HIV. He stressed that chastity is the only way to prevent the spread of the virus but that in the case of Thai sex workers, for example, condom use is a "lesser evil." Later, however, Suadeau denied he was signaling a change.

## Police Arrest 30 For Sex In A Gym

HO CHI MINH CITY, Vietnam - Police arrested 30 men allegedly engaging in sexual activity last Sunday, November 3, inside a fitness center in Ho Chi Minh city, according to Agence France-Presse.

A police spokesman said the men were arrested after being caught having sex in the center's sauna and massage parlors. Afterward the men were sent to an "education center."

Among the men detained was the fitness center's director, Le Van Yen, 29.

"Even though there were no prostitution activities in the location, such mass homosexual conduct breaches administration regulations and is harmful to social order," a Ho Chi Minh City police officer, who asked not to be identified, told Reuters.

Though not illegal, homosexuality is considered a social evil in communist-controlled Vietnam.

It is unclear from various reports what sort of "education" the men receive at the center or how long they are held there. The men may also be fined.

## House Of Lords Okays G/L Adoption

LONDON, UK - Reversing itself from last month, Britain's upper chamber of Parliament voted Tuesday, November 6, to allow unmarried and Gay couples to adopt children. The approval signals that the measure will likely become law.

The House of Lords' approval came a day after the measure was passed for a second time in the House of Commons.

According to the Associated Press, the law makes Britain the fifth European country to allow Gay couples to adopt, following Denmark, Iceland, the Netherlands and Sweden.

Under current law, only married couples and single people can adopt. Supporters of the new law say it will help the thousands of children who are waiting to be adopted.

Alan Milburn, the government's health secretary, said, "As a result of tonight's vote, many children in care institutions will be able to hope for a life out of care and in a stable and loving family."

Opponents had argued that married couples offer the most stable homes for children. The House of Lords, which is traditionally the more conservative chamber, first rejected the measure on October 16.

Five days after the general election, the long-awaited answer of who would be Arizona's next governor was answered, finally. Thanks to more than 200,000 nitwit Arizona voters who requested an early ballot, only to vote it late, very late, the determining results didn't come the usual day after the election but four more added on to that.

As we, or at least Jane Dee Hull and the campaign staffs for the respective gubernatorial candidates, waited with baited breath, the "very-late-early" ballots were tabulated and on Sunday, November 10, with 11,000 or so ballots to still be counted, it was over and Arizona Attorney General, Janet Napolitano, the Democratic candidate, was victorious.

Matt Salmon, the Republican candidate, former Member of Congress and homophobe, came out of his house in Lilywhiteville, with his sugar coated family behind, smiling for the last photo-op of this year, and officially conceded before the throng of media camped out in his driveway, wishing Napolitano his best and "God-speed." Dick Mahoney, the independent candidate who garnered 6% of the vote, was incommunicado, probably kicking himself, or maybe hurling manure with his shovel, for giving the election to Janet, instead of "his good friend Matt."

Despite the bleak outlook for the state, especially for fiscal matters, the election has been held and here's the rundown of those who won the election campaign but now face the bigger battle.

Due to the throngs of Maricopa County voters, who will vote for anything with an "R" (for Republican) next to it's name, Jan Brewer is our new Secretary of State. Homophobic State Senator David Petersen, who strongly believes in the stock

market, as it's falling further and further, is the new state Treasurer, so put your money in a sock and bury it in the back yard! State Representatives Mike Gleason, Jeff Hatch-Miller, and incumbent Arizona Corporation Commissioner (ACC), Jim Irvin - a current defendant in a civil case, are the new members of the ACC. They supported deregulation of electricity and Qwest, so stock up on candles and cell-phones! Douglas Martin, incumbent state Mine Inspector was re-elected to his final term in the post due to term limits and being ignored by his own party.

One bright spot, in addition to Napolitano's victory, on the state level for the donkeys was the race for Arizona Attorney General and who would succeed Janet Napolitano. Former Phoenix Mayor Terry Goddard, the Democratic candidate, easily defeated Andrew Thomas, the ultra-conservative, very-anti-Gay, Republican candidate.

For Arizona's Legislature, the Republicans have majorities, to no one's surprise, in both chambers: 17-13 in the state Senate, 39-21 in the state House (really 40-20 thanks to state Rep. Of the openly Gay candidates, four will serve: Phoenix Democrats Wally Straughn, Robert Meza and Jack Jackson Jr., in the House and Ken Chevront, another Phoenix Democrat, won his election to the state Senate. Tucson State Rep. Ed Poelstra, despite the overwhelming

voter registration numbers and being ignored, shunned, screwed over by his own party, was beaten, not for a lack of trying.

Of the initiatives on the general election ballot; Proposition 202 was the only gaming initiative, sensible to boot, that was approved by the voters; cities won't be able to go further into debt for roads; the state land trust snake oil deal lost for the fifth time; senior property owners will get tax relief; feel good vigilante justice won out with the passage of Proposition 103; funds for education will actually have to go to that, thanks to the approval of Propositions 104, increasing school spending limits and 300, which made sure school trust land revenues go for students too; medical marijuana didn't light up with the voters; the lottery was extended; drug probation, the remedy offered by the Arizona Legislature was approved; the state's tobacco tax was raised to pay for trauma care centers; a proposed pay raise for state lawmakers who got us into this mess was shot down; and, an override for Pima Community College (PCC), Proposition 400, was defeated.

Meanwhile, in Southern Arizona, former Democratic Pima County Supervisor Raul Grijalva, is our new Member of Congress, for Arizona's new seventh Congressional District. Republican Jim Kolbe was elected to a tenth term for the eighth Congressional District.

### The Vatican Has It Wrong Again

In a nation where violence has become increasingly normative, with headlines boasting that the US has "killed" al-Qaeda leaders; where the murder rate among the urban youth in Oakland continues to rise; where the majority of American people support a government that greases its wheels with the rhetoric of evil; it is more astonishing than ever that the Catholic church would seek to restrict even further those who want to dedicate their lives to peace and love in the world.

The Vatican follows in lock step behind the government in misplaced blame and displaced responsibility. Earlier this year the Catholic Church had the chance to untangle the dynamics of sexual repression, the deep roots of homophobia, the religious reinforcement of misogyny, and the abuse of power. Instead they have once again scapegoated Gay men as pedophiles. The conflation of homosexuality and pedophilia is a tired fallacy.

Religious institutions are meant to be a presence in the world that reminds us we are all human, a needed corrective a society that so easily dehumanizes. This policy they are drafting has little to do with sex and everything to do with fear. After all, fear is the religion of the day.

At the Metropolitan Community Church of San Francisco Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgendered people and friends create spiritual community based on transformation and hope. The world needs more of us, not less.



### New HIV Ad Campaign Hits A Nerve

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - The city's Stop AIDS Project's four new ads—which feature HIV-positive men suffering with constant diarrhea, protruding stomachs or facial wasting from lipodystrophy, and night sweats—are an in-your-face attempt to portray the side effects of anti-HIV medications. "Don't get me wrong, I'm glad to be alive," each man in an ad states. "But HIV is no picnic."

The campaign is designed to counter the widely held perception among HIV-negative men that contracting HIV is no longer something of much concern. "I had an HIV-negative man tell me...it is OK to have sex with me without a condom because all you have to take is a few pills and you are fine," Keith Folger, a program manager with SAP, told the Bay Area Reporter. "We don't want to see another generation of Gay men die if we can stop it."

But the ads, which appeared in the Bay Area Reporter and on city bus shelters beginning in early October, are hitting a nerve with some HIV-positive men. "Stop AIDS is running the campaign on a fear-based perspective. [It is] not approaching it from a public-health perspective at all," said Michael Stanley, 54, who has lived with HIV for 18 years. Stanley has taken to streets in the city's Castro district to petition against the campaign.

Despite the concerns raised by Stanley and other Gay men who are upset with the campaign, SAP officials said they have no plans to drop the ads, which will run another 16 weeks. The petition drive, which has generated several hundred signatures, did not surprise SAP program director David Evans.

"It was never our intention to harm or stigmatize anyone," Evans said, "but the HIV-positive guys who make up our Positive Force Program have been waiting to tell negative guys how tough it can be to live with HIV. We consider this a truth-in-advertising campaign."

### Court Upholds Boy Scouts Gay Ban Again

WASHINGTON, DC - The U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia turned a Gay rights victory into defeat on Thursday, November 7, by reversing a ruling in favor of two Gay Eagle Scouts, reported the Gay.com/PlanetOut.com network.

Two men in their 30s, Michael Geller and Roland Pool, were both stripped of their association with the Scouts after they complained separately about the organization's increasingly visible ban on Gay members. In 1995, they brought a combined challenge to the D.C. Commission on Human Rights, arguing that the Boy Scouts' actions violated the local anti-discrimination law.

The commission heard the case in 1998, but delayed an opinion until the U.S. Supreme Court had a chance to weigh in on the same issue in a different case. In 2000, the high court did so, reversing a decision by the New Jersey Supreme Court and giving the Scouts the green light to ban Gay members despite local discrimination laws.

Given the 5-4 high court ruling in *Boy Scouts of America v. Dale*, many observers were surprised when the D.C. Commission went the other way in June of 2001.

The D.C. Commission managed to sidestep the Dale opinion, ruling that since

Geller and Pool were not trying to advance a "Gay agenda" in the Boy Scouts, their membership did not threaten the Scouts' values. Further, the commission found that the District of Columbia had a compelling interest in enforcing its anti-discrimination law.

Since the U.S. Supreme Court outranks the D.C. Commission on Human Rights, the appellate judges threw out the commission's ruling based on the Dale precedent.

In other Scout news, the Seattle Council expelled Eagle Scout Darrell Lambert, who refused to pledge that he believed in a "higher power," another one of the Boy Scouts of America mandates. Lambert, 19, has been an atheist since ninth grade. Making a statement to the contrary, he noted, would be in violation of Scout principles of honesty and integrity.

### Officials Fired Over Porn Actor's Appearance

ST. LOUIS, MO - Two top officials of an AIDS agency have been fired for using public funds to hire a Gay-porn actor to appear at an event promoting safer sex.

Both the St. Louis comptroller's office and the St. Louis Health Department are investigating whether Blacks Assisting Blacks Against AIDS improperly spent some of its \$96,000 federal grant to fight syphilis—and whether the star acted appropriately during his presentation. The actor's dress at the event also prompted the St. Louis Health Department to cancel the remainder of BABAA's grant, which amounts to about \$6,000, said Mark Pasewark, attorney for the agency.

BABAA's board voted unanimously Friday to fire its director, Erise Williams Jr., and senior director, James Green. The two had hired porn star Edgar Gaines, whose film name is Bobby Blake, to speak at a July 20 event at Williams's downtown St. Louis loft. Gaines was paid \$500 from the federal grant. Two former employees of the group alleged that the actor stripped and made sexual contact with some of the two dozen guests at the event. Bruce Hopson, BABAA's lawyer, denied the allegations but acknowledged that the porn star appeared wearing only a towel and boots during part of his presentation.

### Civil Union Plaintiff Dies

HARTFORD, CT - In September the Connecticut supreme court agreed to take on what could be a landmark civil union case. But one of the plaintiff's in the case, retired local businessman Glen Rosengarten, died of lymphoma.

Now Rosengarten's attorneys are saying they will push to keep the case alive. Rosengarten and his then-partner of 15 years, Peter Downes of New York City, were joined in a civil union in Vermont on New Year's Eve, 2000. Six months earlier Vermont had enacted the country's first law allowing same-sex couples to enter into a legal relationship. Rosengarten, who was 54 when he died, filed a petition this summer asking the state supreme court to review decisions made by the state's lower courts, which said they had no jurisdiction over civil union matters, since the state does not recognize same-sex marriages. Vermont is the only state that does recognize such unions, and Rosengarten was considered the first person in the nation to attempt to legally dissolve a civil union outside of that state.

Rosengarten's lawyers say they

will push to keep the case alive by waiting for the executor of Rosengarten's estate, a determination made in probate court, to stand in for Rosengarten in court. "We're asking the supreme court to keep this case because we think it's a matter of important public interest," said attorney Gary Cohen, who is married to Rosengarten's former wife. "The question of whether the courts have jurisdiction here does not die with Mr. Rosengarten, and there are other couples [affected] by this."

In the past year Rosengarten grew seriously ill with lymphoma and HIV. He said prior to his death he did not believe Downes would try to stake a claim on his assets, but to be on the safe side he wanted to protect the inheritance rights of his three children from a previous marriage. In their petition to the state supreme court, Cohen and co-counsel Kenneth Bartschi of Hartford wrote that the courts should have the jurisdiction to end a civil union, since it is a contract like any other. "Even though Connecticut does not have its own civil unions scheme and does not issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples, the lack of the ability to form such relationships in Connecticut does not evince a strong public policy as to the dissolution of civil unions formed elsewhere," the lawyers wrote. "Dissolving the parties' civil union will not affect any of the myriad rights and responsibilities of marriage for any couple in Connecticut. Nor does it effect the scope of the state's authority to decide who may marry."

### Trustees Feel Heat On Silber

BOSTON, MA - Nearly two months after Boston University Chancellor John Silber disbanded the Gay-straight alliance at a high school run by BU, criticism continues to mount and is now being directed at university trustees.

The Boston Globe reports Massachusetts state Senator Cheryl Jacques urged BU alumni to withhold donations to the school in protest of Silber's move.

"The university needs to understand there are repercussions for their actions," said Jacques, who is an openly Gay graduate of Boston College. She told the Globe her call was loudly applauded.

Silber, 76, resumed his longtime position as president of the school shortly after Jon Westling resigned in July. He gave orders in September for a two-year-old group for Gay students to be dismantled at BU Academy, saying sex education had no place in the 9-year-old institution.

Boston City Councilor Michael Ross, a BU graduate, called for Silber to reinstate the alliance, citing the chancellor's "strange fascination with imposing his conservative values on others."

National Gay civil rights activists said Silber misunderstood the purpose of the student group. The Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network said the alliance is aimed solely at a safe environment for Gay teens. It issued a statement calling for Silber's resignation.

Reid Williams, who is a member of the network's board of directors, said Silber had "made it abundantly clear, and not for the first time in his career, that he is ill prepared to have a role in shaping the leaders of tomorrow or even in providing a safe learning environment."

## Gay Games Close; Success Declared

International Federal of Gay Games co-president Kathleen Webster told travelbiz.com that the Sydney event set a "new standard" for the Gay Games.

More than 12,000 athletes from more than 80 countries competed, and more than 2,000 medals were handed out.

During weeks leading up to the event, however, there were doubts that the Games would happen, due to reports of financial problems; but community leaders struck a last-minute deal that made the event possible.

On Saturday, Sydney Lord Mayor Frank Sartor closed the event and handed over the Gay Games flag to a representative of the Montreal Gay Games organizing committee. Montreal will host the next games in 2006. Titled "Rendezvous 2006," the event is scheduled for July 29-August 5.

### Gay Student Leader Asked To Leave Religious Group

PELLA, IA - The student body president at Central College has been removed as the leader of a campus Christian group because he recently announced he is Gay.

"He was basically asked to step down because he didn't agree with our statement of beliefs," said Betsy Loomans, a campus staff worker with InterVarsity Christian Fellowship.

Brad Clark acknowledged this fall that he is Gay. He remains student body president, but he was asked to step down from his role of organizing worship services for InterVarsity Christian Fellowship. InterVarsity is a nondenominational student Christian group with chapters on more than 560 college and university campuses nationwide. The group's Wednesday night worship service attracts 400-500 Central students each week. According to its constitution, the organization does not discriminate on the basis of members' sexual preference but does consider the sexual orientation of its leaders.

The decision has provoked a review of the student organization's constitution by the student government. Some students argued that the group should be kicked off campus because it discriminates against Gays. The college, affiliated with the Reformed Church of America, has a nondiscrimination policy that includes sexual orientation. After a lengthy debate, Central's student senate voted 22-12 last week to continue to recognize InterVarsity. But an emotionally charged argument rages on among students and faculty. At issue is how the liberal arts college of 1,528 students can be welcoming to students of different sexual orientations while respecting the religious views of those who believe homosexuality is a sin. The debate over acceptance of Gays still is unresolved in many Christian denominations worldwide, including the Reformed Church of America.

Clark said he is disappointed by the vote. "I don't feel it's right or just for them to be recognized as an organization," he said.

A diversity task force made up of faculty, staff, and students is reviewing how the college deals with organizations whose values conflict with Central's policies. "There's an apparent conflict between the college's nondiscrimination policy and the organization and how we view acceptance and respect and how they view those issues," said David Roe, Central's president. Roe said Central's diversity task force was started two years ago because of conflicting beliefs among students of different Christian faiths on campus. "We get students from a variety of backgrounds who don't always understand what it means to exhibit mutual respect," he said.

### Lead Cast In Transgender Thai Kickboxer Film

BANGKOK, Thailand - Agence France-Presse reports that featherweight kickboxer Asanee "Art" Surwan, ranked fifth by the World Muay Thai Council, will put on gloves and lipstick to play famed Transgender kickboxer Nong Toom in the upcoming film Beautiful Boxer. "Katoey," or "ladyboy," Nong Toom won the hearts of the sport's fans over a 60-bout career.

"I strongly believe that Nong Toom's life will be an inspiration to many, and I will do my best to do justice to the role," Suwan said at a casting announcement ceremony. The \$2.5 million film is set to be released internationally in late 2003.

Nang Toom gained fame in the late 1990s by unabashedly wearing lipstick in the ring and announcing that his goal was to earn enough money from competing to pay for a sex-change operation. The kickboxing star became a woman in 2000 after retiring from the sport.

### Chicago Passes Transgender Equality Law

The measure, which reportedly passed without controversy, prohibits discrimination in employment, housing, public accommodations and credit transactions based on gender identity or expression, reported the Gay.com/PlanetOut.com network.

Chicago Mayor Richard Daley endorsed the ordinance.

"Transpeople are some of the most abused and violated people in our society," said Rick Garcia, political director of Equality Illinois. "Today we sent the message that all people in Chicago, including gender-variant people, must be treated fairly and with respect."

Chicago becomes the 11th jurisdiction in the country to approve such protections. Other cities on the list include Dallas, New York City, Philadelphia and Decatur, Ill.





# Election Wrap-Up Across The Country

## The Not So Bright Side

WASHINGTON, DC - No one was expecting the Democrats to make enormous gains last night, but few imagined that they would get the thumping that 2002 is being chalked up as. In one very bumpy evening, the Democrats lost the Senate and failed to gain any ground in the House.

Midterm elections aren't supposed to work that way. Democrats failed to gain traction on any of the issues they're credited with dominating: the wheezing economy, a reeling Dow, a looming health care crisis, soaring drug costs, corporate corruption. Well before Election Day, ardent rank and file Democrats were tugging their hair in frustration that the leadership had failed to draw clear lines between the parties on these issues.

What happened to the Democratic agenda?

The biggest sledgehammer hobbling the party was probably Bush's tax cut, the centerpiece to the president's so-called economic program. So many Democrats worried about their re-election prospects caved in and voted for it, the party leadership was robbed of what otherwise might have been a principal line of attack.

Republicans have also been remarkably shrewd at countering Democratic plans with their own proposals that sound similar but differ in key respects. On prescription drug assistance for seniors, for instance, the GOP put forward a proposal extremely favorable to the pharmaceutical

industry, which gleefully pumped millions into campaign ads that made the less generous Republican plan sound better than the one proposed by the Democrats.

Ironically, the fact that Democrats controlled the Senate made it harder for them to take Republicans to task because it raised a difficult question: If they had such great ideas, why hasn't the Senate passed any of them?

Things look pretty grim for the Democrats today, no question, but there may be a small ray of hope. With attention now moving to the presidential election in 2004, it's thought that Democrats challenging Bush won't feel nearly so constrained.

It's a safe bet that despite President Bush's popularity and his galling directive ordering Democrats to "get in line," the President's programs and designs will attract a level of opposition they haven't since he took office.

As bright sides go, it's pretty weak. But maybe now someone in the Democratic leadership will realize that perhaps the reason Bush is so popular is because no one of any stature is offering the country a different take on the man.

It's not much, but it's better than nothing.

## Voters Side With Equal Rights

WASHINGTON, DC - With the exception of voters in Nevada, where an anti Gay constitutional amendment received overwhelming support as expected, voters across

the nation sided with equal rights in Gay-related ballot initiatives across the country.

In Sarasota, Fla., voters added a Gay-inclusive antidiscrimination amendment to the city charter. The amendment was approved by 73% of voters, with all the precincts reported. The proposal prohibits discrimination on the basis of age, disability, gender, marital status, national origin, race, religion, sexual orientation, or veteran's status in the areas of housing, employment, and public accommodations.

Voters in Westbrook, Maine, narrowly upheld a Gay rights ordinance approved by the city council in July. The vote Tuesday was 51% in favor of the measure and 49% opposed. The ordinance outlawing discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation in employment, housing, credit, and access to public accommodations is one of 10 such measures on the books in Maine cities and towns.

In Ypsilanti, Mich., voters rejected by a two-to-one ratio a proposal that would have revoked citywide protections for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgendered people. The protections have been in effect since 1998, when voters initially approved them a year after they were passed by the city council.

And with nearly all the votes counted, the tally was coming in 60%-40% against a proposal in Tacoma, Wash., that would amend the city's antidiscrimination law to remove protections passed earlier this year for the city's Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgendered residents.

In the one initiative defeat Tuesday, 66% of the voters in Nevada voted to amend the state's constitution to limit the definition of marriage to only that between a man and a woman. The measure received 70% of the votes in 2000. This second vote was needed in order to actually amend the state constitution.

## Medicinal Marijuana Initiatives Have Mixed Results

WASHINGTON, DC - Three ballot initiatives seeking to ease access to marijuana for chronically ill patients, such as those with HIV, and to loosen drug laws had mixed results at the polls Tuesday.

In Arizona, Proposition 203, the measure that would have established a registry to allow state residents with a chronic illness and a recommendation from a physician to use marijuana to treat pain, was defeated 57%-43%. Under the measure, the state Department of Health Services would have issued registry identification cards to residents ages 18 and older who qualified, and the state Department of Public Safety could have distributed as much as two ounces of medicinal marijuana to residents with the cards.

In Nevada, Question 9, the ballot initiative that would have allowed adult residents to legally possess up to three ounces of marijuana for private recreational purposes and would have required the state to regulate the sale and production of the drug, was defeated 61%-39%. Proponents of the measure focused their campaign on the issue of medicinal marijuana. If Question 9 had been approved, Nevada voters would have had to pass the initiative again in 2004 to ratify it as an amendment to the state's constitution.

In San Francisco, though, Proposition S, the measure stating that city officials

must "examine the possibility" of creating a city program that would grow and distribute medicinal marijuana for use by patients, passed 63%-37%. The measure could make San Francisco the first city in the United States to provide medicinal marijuana to chronically ill patients, a move that officials believe will put it on a direct collision course with the federal government. Mitchell Katz, the city's public health chief, supported the measure, saying that he recommends marijuana to some of his HIV patients because "it has benefits that other drugs can't achieve," the San Francisco Chronicle reports.

## G/L Candidates Elected In Mid-Terms

WASHINGTON, DC - All three of the openly Gay and Lesbian members of U.S. Congress will be returning to Washington next year.

Arizona Republican representative Jim Kolbe received 63% of the vote over his Democratic challenger, Mary Judge Ryan, who received 34% of the vote. Wisconsin Democratic representative Tammy Baldwin received 67% of the vote against her anti-Gay Republican challenger, Ron Greer, who claimed 33%. And in Massachusetts, Democratic representative Barney Frank was uncontested in his reelection bid. Three openly Gay congressional challengers, Republican Richter Elser of Connecticut, Democrat Hank Perritt of Illinois, and Democrat Gerrie Schipske of California were unsuccessful in their election bids.

Meanwhile, at least 31 of the candidates who were supported by the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, a group set up to support viable Gay and Lesbian candidates, have been elected to office. In addition to Baldwin, those candidates include:

Carole Migden, a California Democrat who was elected to the state board of equalization;

Christine Kehoe, a California Democrat reelected to the state assembly;

John Laird, a California Democrat elected to the state assembly;

Mark Leno, a California Democrat elected to the state assembly;

Gail Dekreon, elected as a California superior court judge;

Jennifer Veiga, a Colorado Democrat reelected to the state house of representatives;

John Brady, a Delaware Republican who was elected Sussex County recorder of deeds;

David Cantania, a Republican reelected to Washington, D.C.'s city council;

Jim Graham, a Democrat reelected to Washington, D.C.'s city council;

Karla Drenner, a Georgia Democrat reelected to the state house of representatives;

Larry McKeon, an Illinois Democrat reelected to the state house of representatives;

Maggi McIntosh, a Maryland Democrat reelected to the state house of representatives;


